### West Ottawa Discusses Reading

A discussion of the cost and operational complications concerning the reading resolution accepted earlier occupied the greater portion of the West Ottawa Board of Education meeting Monday night.

Supt. Brad Henson methodically described current reading and testing programs throughout the system noting possible improvements. He also described cost estimates for initiating various projects and explained that any comprehensive program will encounter at least some complications.

Board President Wes Waldron read a letter from Ed Haltenhoff who was unable to be present. Haltenhoff expressed his concern that a new reading program must be met "head on" and examined specific proposals for improving reading in the system.

The 1976-77 tuition rate was set at \$311 for K-six and \$384 for 7-12.

Administrative reports included a report from Assistant Supt. Peter Roon who announced that West Ottawa had again applied for funds for the paperback book program. Roon indicated that due to the increased number of applications from communities the matching dollar funds would probably be decreased.

Roon also noted that the district had applied to operate a driver education program during the school year and also reported that 143 students in the district are in different special education programs.

A total of six persons attended the two public meetings to discuss policies and practices of the district, Henson reported. The superintendent indicated that he intended to continue the meetings next year and expressed his concern that when voters in the district understand the administration's and board's interest in voter opinions the attendance will grow.

At least one board member expressed his disgust at the lack of interest by the public in the schools.

Waldron reported on the meeting of the Michigan Association of School Boards he attended recently and cited one specific goal of the organization: to request the state legislature not to mandate any additional programs without providing matching funds.

A revised code of conduct for athletes was accepted by the board.

Henson explained that the West Ottawa Board is in compliance with an "open meeting" requirement which will take effect in April and noted the exceptions for closed sessions.

Henson said that by Dec. 23 the district will know whether the \$238,000 grant applied for to expand locker room facilities will be granted.

A total of 60 new students are attending the high school according to Henson and of these 14 are from states other than Michigan.

Roon explained that West Ottawa library is conforming to all University of Michigan standards for accreditation with only one area of shortcomings: job descriptions for media personnel. This is currently being complied with, Roon indicated. The next meeting will be held Dec. 20.

### Seek to Balance Budget for 1977 by Cutting Department Funds

## County Aides Frustrated With Budget

**GRAND HAVEN** — The frustrations of Ottawa County Commissioners in attempting to reach a balanced budget for 1977 was evident at their meeting Thursday.

One commissioner broke down while attempting to read a letter she said she prepared for news media concerning Community Mental Health and another said after the meeting that budget cuts were being made with no consistency.

The touchy departments were sheriff and mental health and for a few moments the entire Civil Defense program was in jeopardy.

And commissioner John Langeland again voiced his objection to using revenue sharing funds to balance the budget.

"I hope this board will continue a tradition of 140 years to balance our budget with our own funds," he added. Commissioners Thursday cut

\$7,500 from the clerk's office salary, trimmed the travel fund and copy machine fund of the controller, cut postage in the equalization department and cut some travel funds from the prosecutor.

Equipment rental funds were halved for the register of deeds, temporary salaries were eliminated for the property description department and a full time person was cut from the treasurers staff.

But nothing was cut from the \$1 million sheriff's budget and commissioner Marilyn Sherwood said it was "ridiculous that we can't find \$100 to cut from the budget."

"I think we must establish a base service to the townships and charge for additional services," she added.

Commissioner Raymond Vander Laan agreed but added that a committee has been studying the purchase of services and it

should be explained by the chairman, Donald Stoltz of Holland. Stoltz was not at the meeting.

Commissioners agreed not to act on the sheriff's budget until a report was heard from Stoltz on purchase of services.

The health department budget remained unsettled after it was pointed out that a decrease in local funds would amount to a decrease in state aid. A fee system for environmental services was under study and could generate some added revenue, Vander Laan said.

Perhaps the most frustration was with the mental health budget where commissioners said they wanted additional information on the half a dozen or so line items listed on the budget sheet.

Commissioners said they were unable to determine from figures present what services were

included in the budget items and referred the matter back to the commissioners serving on the Mental Health Board for answers.

William Kennedy suggested the county board pay for mandated services such as institutional treatment and give the department so much money with which to operate.

The total mental health department budget proposed for 1977 is \$3,033,568 of which \$303,356 is the request from the commissioners.

Mental Health has been the subject of recent criticism and commissioner Eunice Bareham attempted to read a letter she said was prepared for the news media.

She said she had attended 17 meetings in recent weeks on mental health budget and departmental problems and was concerned with the services the staff was still able to provide.

### Blast, Fire Continue Under Study

Fire investigators said Friday a gas line hooked by a backhoe digging a trench for a sewer line apparently broke outside the basement foundation of a home destroyed by a blast Thursday seriously burning two men.

Officials dug through debris of the Orlan Uitermark home, 454 West 21st St. Friday in an effort to learn the cause of the explosion that injured Uitermark and Ray Barrett.

Investigators said the gas line was broken outside the basement foundation but they were unable to determine whether a break developed in the gas line inside the basement because of the extent of damage caused by the explosion.

Neither were investigators able to determine what touched off the blast.

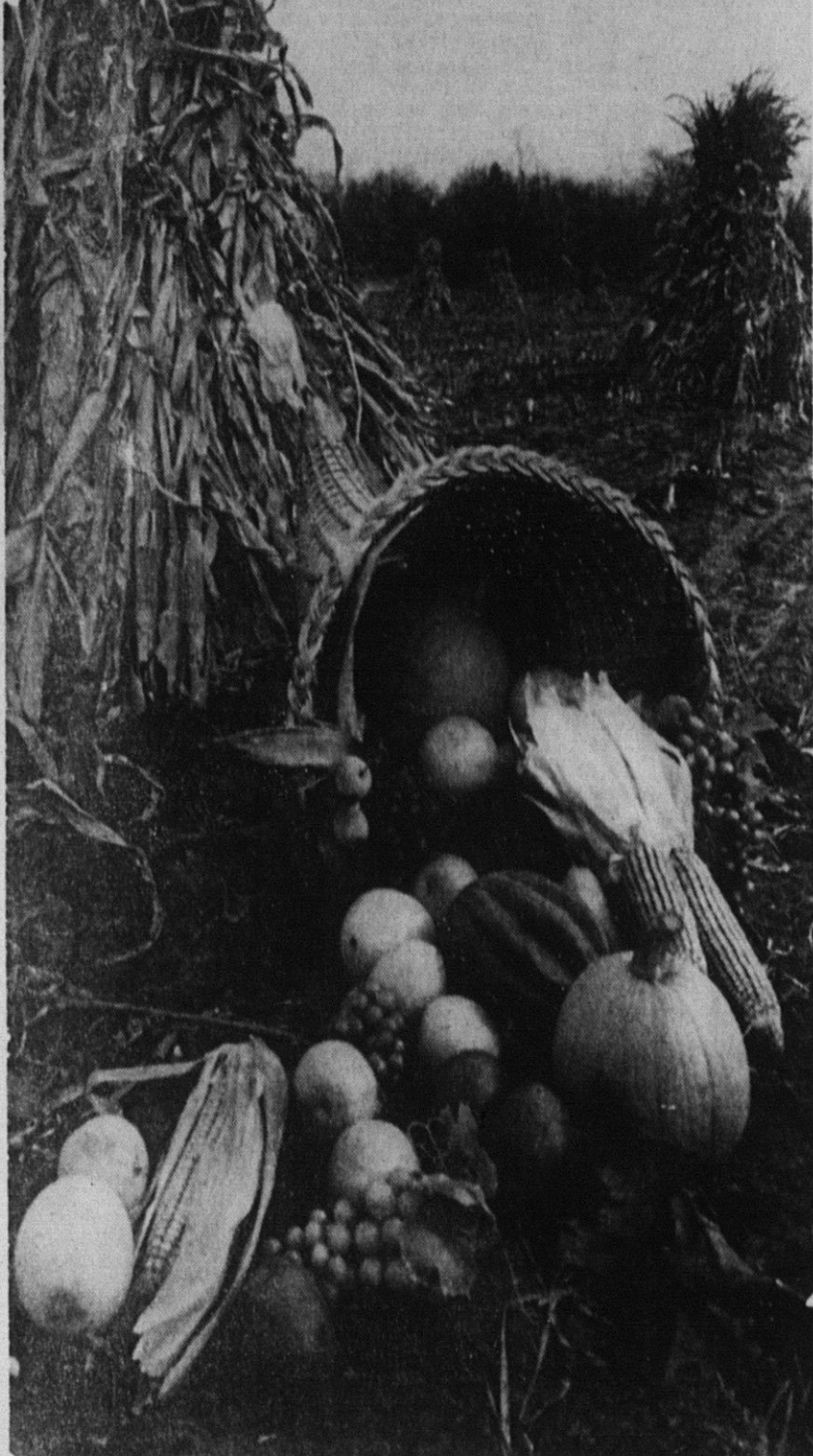
Investigators said Uitermark and other workers apparently realized a problem had developed after the backhoe hooked the gas line. Uitermark entered the house and called the gas company.

He came out, smelled gas and with Barrett went back into the house when the blast occurred.

Investigators said they were unable to talk with either Uitermark or Barrett. Both men were in the burn center at Bronson Hospital in Kalamazoo with first and second degree burns.

The Uitermark home was a total loss and officials said the family of seven lost all their possessions.

The Uitermarks' home church, Montello Park Christian Reformed, has begun a drive for aid to the family, who lost everything, household goods, clothing and food in the explosion. Ron Johnson of 618 South Shore Dr. is coordinating the family's needs and proffered aid, and may be called by anyone wishing to give assistance.

### Two Men Burned Listed "Serious"

## Firemen Seek Cause Of Blast That Ruins House

Holland fire inspectors dug through the ruins of a house leveled by a gas explosion Thursday which burned two men seriously in an effort to determine what ignited the gas-filled basement of the structure.

Deputy fire chief John Du Mez said inspectors returned to the debris today to seek a cause of the explosion.

Injured in the blast at 11:45 a.m. Thursday were the owner, Orlan Uitermark, 43, of 454 West 21st St., and Ray Barrett, 41, of 540 Pinecrest.

Uitermark suffered first and second degree burns of the head, neck and leg while Barrett had first and second degree burns of the face, head and toes. Both were listed in "serious" condition in the burn center at

### R.A. Nykamp Accepts Call To Florida

The Rev. Robert A. Nykamp, director of field education and associate professor of pastoral care at Western Seminary has announced his acceptance of a second call to the Bayshore Gardens Reformed Church in Bradenton, Fla.

A native of Hamilton, and a graduate of Hope College and Western Seminary, Nykamp began the initial services for the Bayshore Church in the summer of 1957. He served as pastor of the Ross Reformed Church of Gary, Ind. from his graduation from Western in 1958 until 1963. While in Gary he studied at the Chicago Theological Seminary. In 1963 he became the pastor of Hope Reformed Church, Chicago, and joined the seminary faculty on July 1, 1965 as director of field education and instructor in pastoral care.

Nykamp studied for the doctor of education degree at the University of Pennsylvania.

In 1968, Rev. Nykamp became director of counseling and professor of pastoral care. During his tenure in this position the counseling program at the Seminary was much enhanced, and a new level of training in counseling was given to students in preparation for the ministry.

In 1970 he was named director of professional development for the Reformed Church in America. He assumed his most recent post as director of field education and associate professor of pastoral care during the past academic year.

In May of 1976 the board of theological education of the Reformed Church in America promoted Professor Nykamp to the rank of associate professor of pastoral care and the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America at its June, 1976 meeting named him to the ecclesiastical office of professor of Theology.

The Nykamps are members of the Bethel Reformed Church, Holland. They are the parents of three children. They will begin their pastoral work at the Bayshore Gardens Reformed Church about Feb. 1.

### Lincoln Ave. Water Main Gets Okay

The Holland Board of Public Works Monday accepted a Council recommendation to install a water main in Lincoln Ave. under the alternate procedure but asked more care by city aides in making commitments for utilities.

The water main will be installed between 34th and 35th Sts. and had been requested by a developer who is erecting apartment units.

The BPW had recommended installation of a water main to 40th St. to complete a service loop and become part of a long range system for a second Lake Macatawa crossing.

But council earlier rejected that idea.

BPW members claimed the developer had been given the impression that water would be available before he began construction and BPW president Charles Cooper suggested the BPW obtain copies of blueprints before building permits are issued to protect the BPW and citizens against laws involved.

City Manager Terry Hofmeyer said the applicant in this case had the perfect right to install a water well and the building permit issued was not inconsistent with the issuing of permits. He said the developer considered a water main as an alternative.

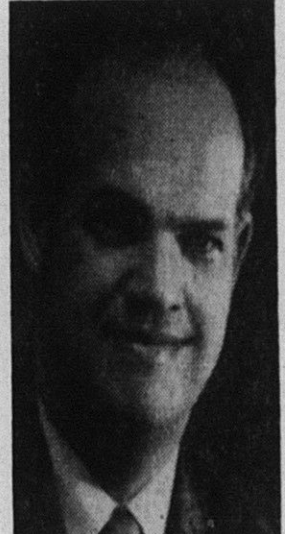
Board member Stuart Padnos said persons building in areas where water service is not available should be alerted to the procedures necessary in bringing water to that area so the BPW will not be caught in the matter.

"Apparently somebody presumed water would be available and we are carrying out their presumption," Padnos added.

Total cost of the project is \$13,900 of which the developer will pay \$1,700.

The BPW heard a progress report on the area wastewater treatment study and were told the preliminary facilities plan was received. Phase two is plans and specifications and additional federal funds will be sought.

A public hearing is scheduled Thursday, Dec. 9 at 7:30 p.m. in the West Ottawa Middle School to review the preliminary facilities plan and to hear recommendations for the type of treatment facilities.

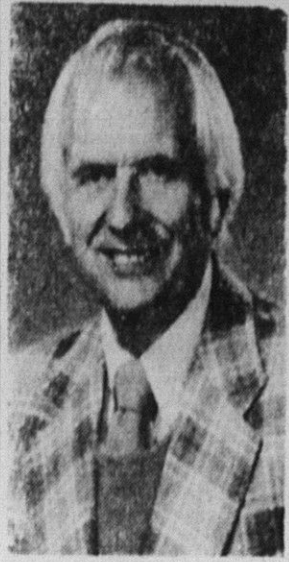

## Suzuki Violin Method Advances in Holland

A story of the Suzuki approach to playing the violin written by Mrs. Shirley Cavanagh, orchestra director for Holland elementary schools, is appearing in a publication of the National School Orchestra Association. It is based on a Suzuki Violin Workshop held recently in Okemos and an institute last August in Stevens Point, Wis.

Mrs. Cavanagh was accompanied at both events by her eight-year-old daughter Kristen whose picture with a Suzuki instructor taken in Wisconsin will appear with the article. Kristen's brother also attended the week-long Wisconsin event. Participants in Wisconsin American Suzuki Institute came from Japan, France, Australia and Canada.

While in Wisconsin, the Cavanaghs met Dr. Suzuki of Matsumoto, Japan, and Kristen, fourth grader at Beechwood Elementary School, was so thrilled at shaking hands with the master violinist that she didn't wash her hand all day. 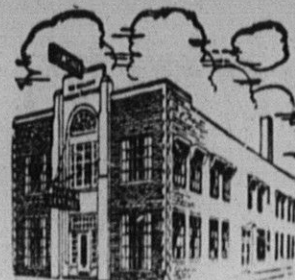

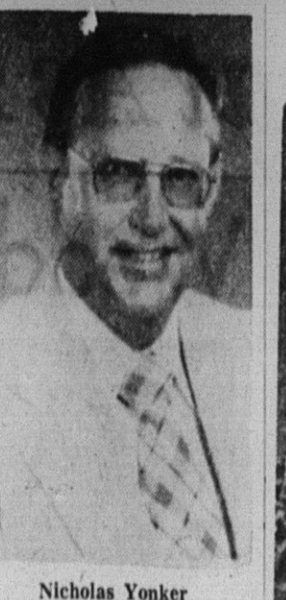

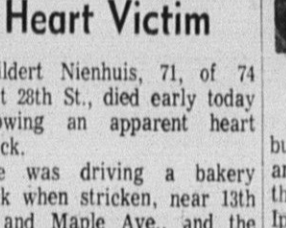

Holland DART Driver Wins State Contest

By Emily Warn Two weeks ago 12 inches of snow fell in 48 hours turning Holland streets into a slippery obstacle course. People who normally walked were calling Dial-A-Ride for lifts.

The dispatcher's office in a corner at the Warm Friend Motor Inn was doubly busy because they were pulling one bus out at a time to put on snow tires. One of the Holland DART drivers, Ed Dykema, has proven his driving skills are a match for any inclement weather. Last month Dykema won a state wide "roadie" sponsored by the Michigan Department of Transportation for small bus systems.

Out of 26 drivers from across the state, Dykema earned the highest score of 406 points out of a possible 500 in three categories to win the competition. He received a plaque and a \$100 U.S. Savings Bond.

Dykema said he was surprised he had won. At first he was nervous, but realizing he was no different from anybody else, he just did the best job he could. He felt honored just to have been chosen to represent Holland, because he said, many other drivers in the Holland system could have done just as good a job as he did.

From the level tone of the dispatcher's voice coming over the bus radio, it was hard to tell she was so busy. The dispatcher that morning was Dykema's wife, Norma. "It's the only time she can tell me when and where to go" Dykema chuckled.

That morning she had to tell people that there would be a 30 to 40 minute wait. "It's better to tell them beforehand they will have to wait, commented Dykema, then to leave them up in the air wondering when the driver will show."

"We all feel bad when we have to tell people to wait that long. There is a real unity among the drivers because we all try to make the system, which is a service for other people, work. But sometimes delays can't be helped."

Delays could be cut down if people who have found another ride after they've phoned up would call the dispatcher and say they've found another way. Each no show costs a driver five to six minutes of valuable time. There is a sense of com-

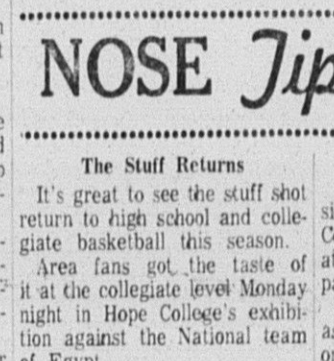

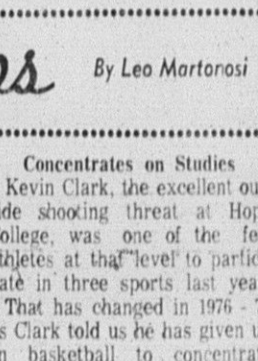

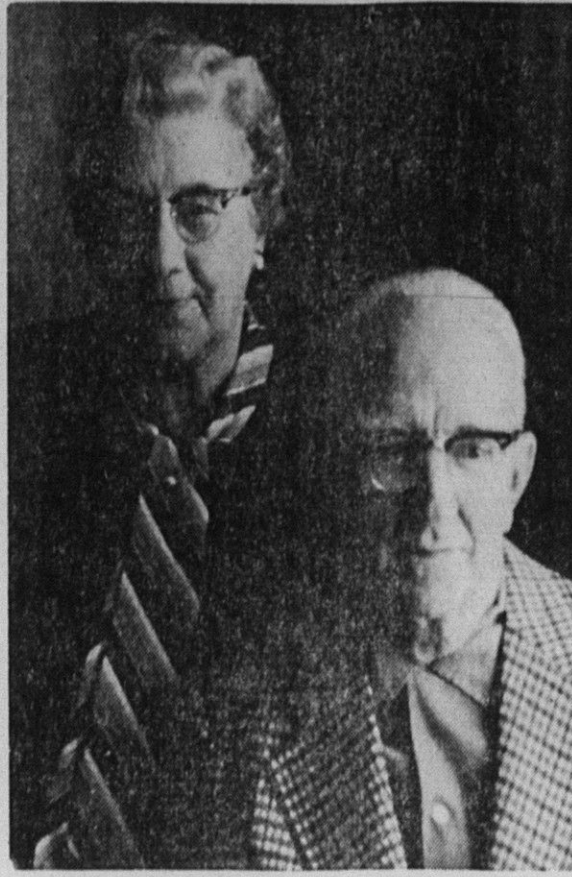

### Talk on 'Assertiveness' Sparks Discussion

"Assertiveness" was the topic of the Thursday branch meeting of the American Association of University Women. 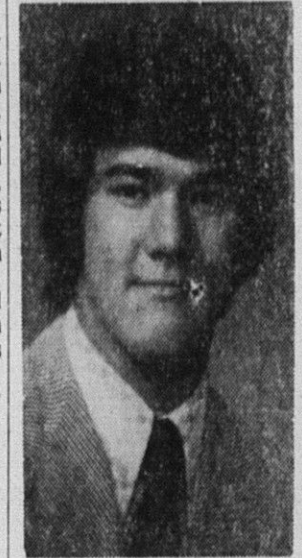

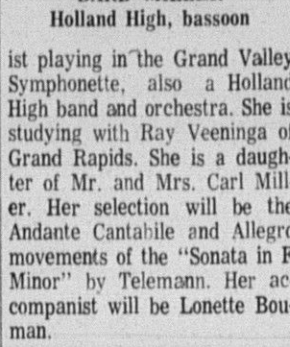

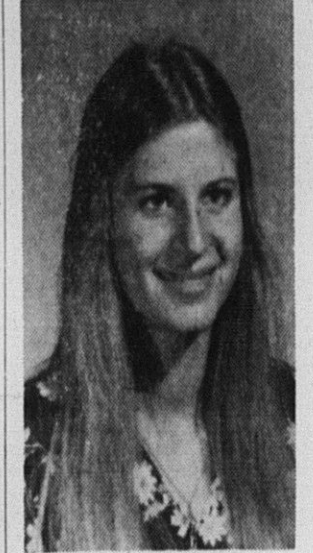
