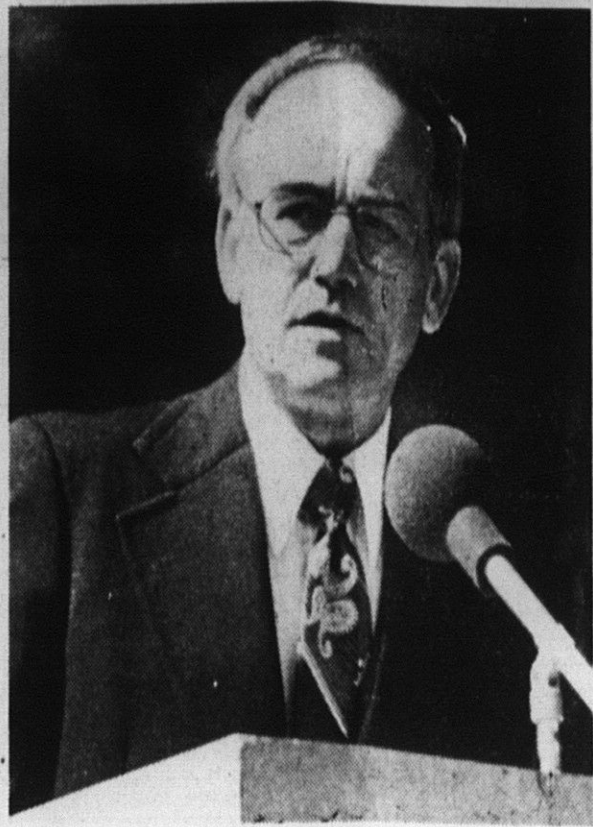

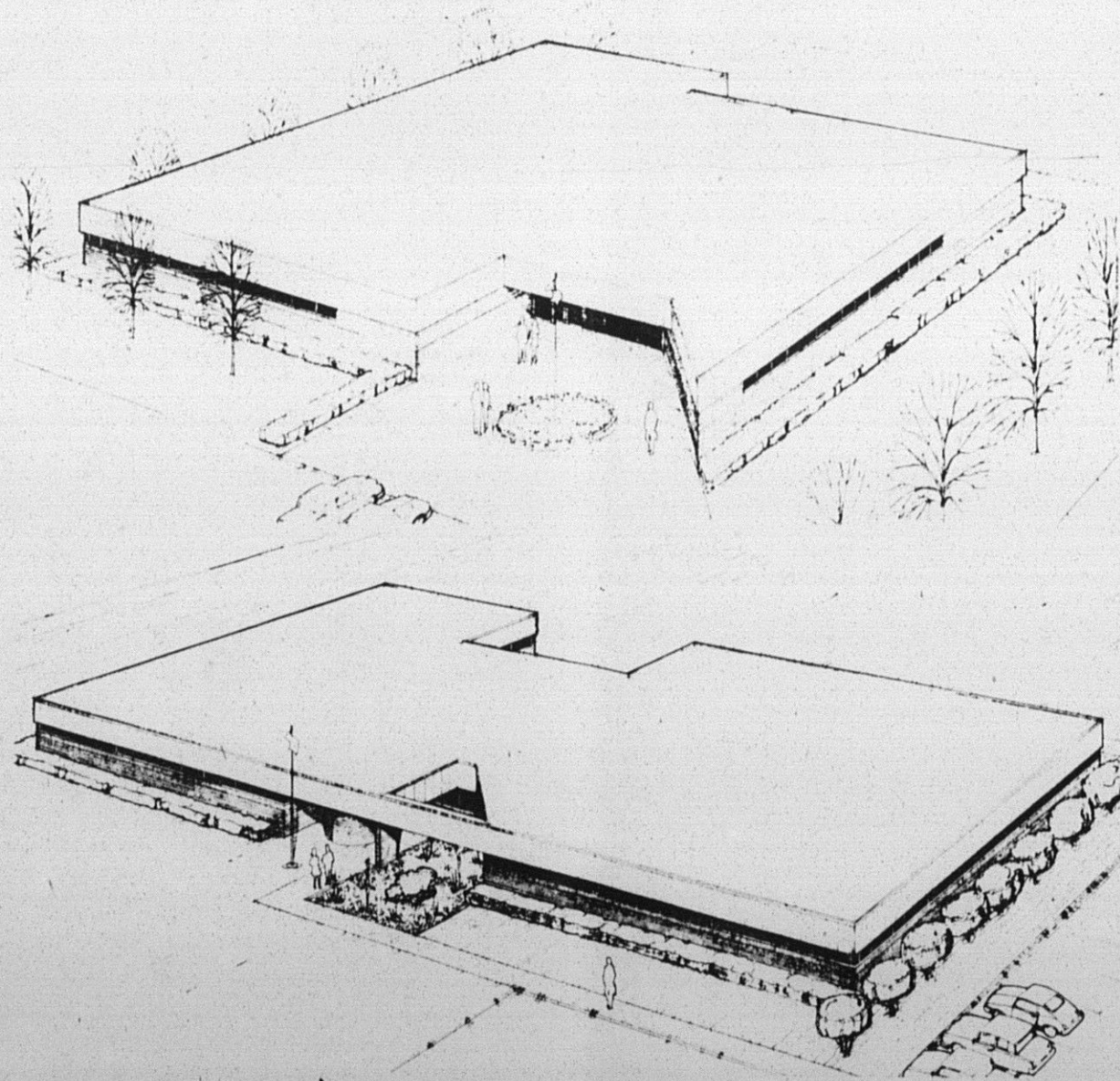
Bubble Yum Chews Up Ground

Ground was broken Wednesday for the new \$15 million addition to the Holland Life

Savers plant on 48th St. in Holland's South Side Industrial Park.

president of Life Savers Inc. with offices in New York City, to Mayor Lou Hallacy, all

Allegan Man Is Arraigned

ALLEGAN—An Allegan man was arraigned Tuesday in Allegan District Court on charges of attempted murder and criminal sexual misconduct of a 20-year-old Allegan woman.

At lunch later, President Morris said, "The Holland plant is a special plant since it is the only plant that manufactures both candy and gum. We are pleased to be a part of the Holland community."

And Mayor Hallacy expressed the same sentiments from Holland. "Holland is very happy to have Life Savers a part of the community. In fact, Life Savers is Holland's largest taxpayer and the new addition is most welcome. We are delighted to have you here."

Morris reviewed Life Savers operations in Holland where production started about 10 years ago. The Holland plant has an annual payroll of \$5.6 million, employs 600 persons today and spends \$750,000 for materials and supplies purchased in the local area and pays \$600,000 in utilities. The latter figure, he explained, involves 20 per cent less than two years ago through energy-saving moves.

"We have already hired 100 persons since we first announced plans for the expansion and plan to hire another 200 for a total of 800, a major contribution to the economy and well-being of the community," he said.

He reviewed the highly successful story of the new product Bubble Yum. The local plant currently is operating five lines and by next year expects to be operating 24 lines.

"Some people regard the Bubble Yum story as a runaway success but it was not an overnight success. It was in March, 1971, that we decided to go into a bubble

gum program and by 1973 had completed the development. It took another year to put us into production and we tested the product for a year and a half in Phoenix, Denver and Salt Lake City.

"It is the most successful of all new products, and in one year we have produced more Bubble Yum in one flavor that we did Life Savers in all flavors!"

He spoke of history of the company which started out 69 years ago in Canajoharie, N.Y., manufacturing Beech-Nut gum. In 1913 the rights to Life Savers, the candy with the hole, were purchased for \$2,700 and some years later the purchaser paid \$8 million for a successful radio chain.

Roscoe Giles, executive vice president of the Holland Chamber of Commerce, presented Morris with the traditional pair of wooden shoes.

Both Life Savers Plant Manager Mike Gentile and Mayor Hallacy referred to efforts of city officials which were effective in settling a labor dispute some months ago, leading top officials to reconsider cancelling the local expansion move.

The 76,000 square foot addition will be erected on the west side of the present plant and extend northward. It will be almost entirely production area for the Bubble Yum product.

Business Tax Breaks

On several occasions, City Council has been confronted with applications from local industry for tax exemptions in connection with renovation, expansion and new plants.

This is an involved process which eventually can lead to a reduction in taxes of up to 50 per cent for 12 years.

It all comes under the Plant Rehabilitation and Industrial Development District Act which was passed by the Michigan Legislature in 1974 to provide a stimulus in the form of significant tax incentives to industry to renovate and expand aging plants and to build new plants in Michigan.

The local process calls for two public hearings, one to establish a Plant Rehabilitation District or an Industrial Development District, and the other for an Industrial Facilities Exemption Certificate.

After applications are filed, reviewed and approved locally, they are subject to review at the state level by the State Tax Commission and the Department of Commerce. The State Tax Commission is ultimately responsible for final approval and issuance of Industrial Facilities Exemption Certificates.

Applications may cover anything from a small portion within an existing plant covering only machinery (personal property) to a huge new development.

Exemption certificates may be issued up to 5 per cent of a municipality's State Equalized Valuation. In Holland's case, SEV totals \$150 million or \$7.5 million for exemptions. Applications need special state approval after the 5 per cent limit.

Holland has cause for rejoicing in that its south side industrial park, developed more than 10 years ago by the Holland Economic Development Corp., is able to accommodate expanding industry. In its 10-year history, the industrial park has attracted new industry to Holland and provided sites for many local industries to relocate their plants.

In an entirely different program, Holland arranged for \$12.5 million in industrial development revenue bonds for Beech-Nut some 10 years ago, and about two years ago \$2,735,000 in bonds for the H.J. Heinz plant for pre-treatment of plant wastes before passing into the city's sanitary sewer system.

Female Forester Fleetly Functions

There's more in them than woods than trees.

Veronica Sullivan, female forester, knows.

The recently selected supervisor of Ottawa County's Woodland Management Project was marking trees for the thinning project when she encountered a car covered with boughs.

The apparent attempt to conceal the vehicle had failed. Veronica reported the incident to state police who investigated and discovered the car had been stolen.

Alone when she found the car in an unoccupied, isolated area, Veronica now packs her department's walkie talkies to "keep in touch."

Chosen from among 21 applicants, the 25-year-old forester is well-qualified and experienced to handle the large project which is being directed by the Ottawa Soil and Water Conservation District.

Assuming the responsibility for hiring three crew leaders including Randy Kuipers of Holland, Ms. Sullivan also assisted in hiring and training of 30 crew members, mostly CETA employees.

Admitting to minimum experience operating chain saws, the former Lansing resident has nonetheless selected and ordered equipment for the project.

Solely she is responsible for selecting which trees will be felled, a process and system for which she has been extensively trained and educated.

Sullivan received her BA from Michigan Technological Institute in Houghton and her MA, also in forestry, from

Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff.

As a college student she faced the dilemma of being the only girl in forestry. "When I graduated there were 13 girls in the program," she says enthusiastically.

"But right now I wouldn't recommend anyone go into forestry. There aren't any jobs," she grimaces.

When dating forestry students, the conversation would inevitably focus on that interest. Frequently conversations would cease. In amazement often would come the male response.

"Oh, that's right. You understand!"

Understand she does.

For being affixed in a field (or forest) which offers few opportunities, Ms. Sullivan has garnered her share. The Ottawa County project is her sixth forestry position. Most projects such as the one in Ottawa County are financed by limited funding, making it at best a transient occupation.

Thus far, Sullivan is hopeful the Ottawa project will be extended beyond its six months funding. There is really about two to three years work on the Ottawa County property, she explains.

Crews have been at work approximately five weeks and have pruned and thinned 40 of the anticipated 1,000 acres to be completed. Another thousand or so acres are also in immediate need of work.

Veronica is proud of her work crews stating that they are doing quality work. Ten persons are operating chain saws and 20 are stocking and measuring. There are eight women working on the project.

Confiding that she is ill at ease just talking socially at times, Ms. Sullivan spouts a wealth of specifics (crown closures, watersheds, genetics, "vigorous" trees) when simply asked.

Originally a botany major, she switched to forestry in her freshman year because she "wanted to be outside."

"When I work in something else I can't stand it until I get back in this. I love it."

Her enthusiasm was evident Tuesday. Donning a red hard hat with her waist length blond hair trailing behind, Ms. Sullivan fleetly ventured into her world of the forests.

A pack of approximately 30 persons directly or indirectly involved with the preliminary planning stages of the forestry management project tagged behind.

Many including county commissioners who supported the project sought out Veronica's expertise at a thinning site. She responded with as much technical information as each listener was able to absorb.

Kenneth Raak, chairman of the Ottawa County Board of Commissioners from Holland, stated at the program Tuesday that the Woodlands Management Project was "one of the few worthwhile projects we (commissioners) have going."

Although she consistently credits numerous organizations and individuals with assistance particularly in "little things that can slow you down," Veronica Sullivan is likely a sound contributing factor for the project's success.

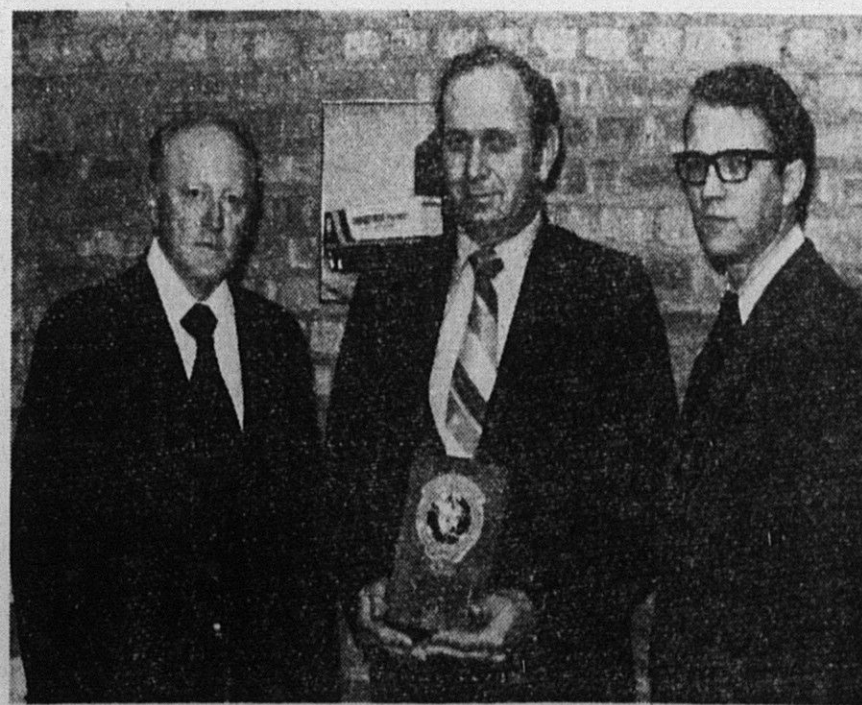

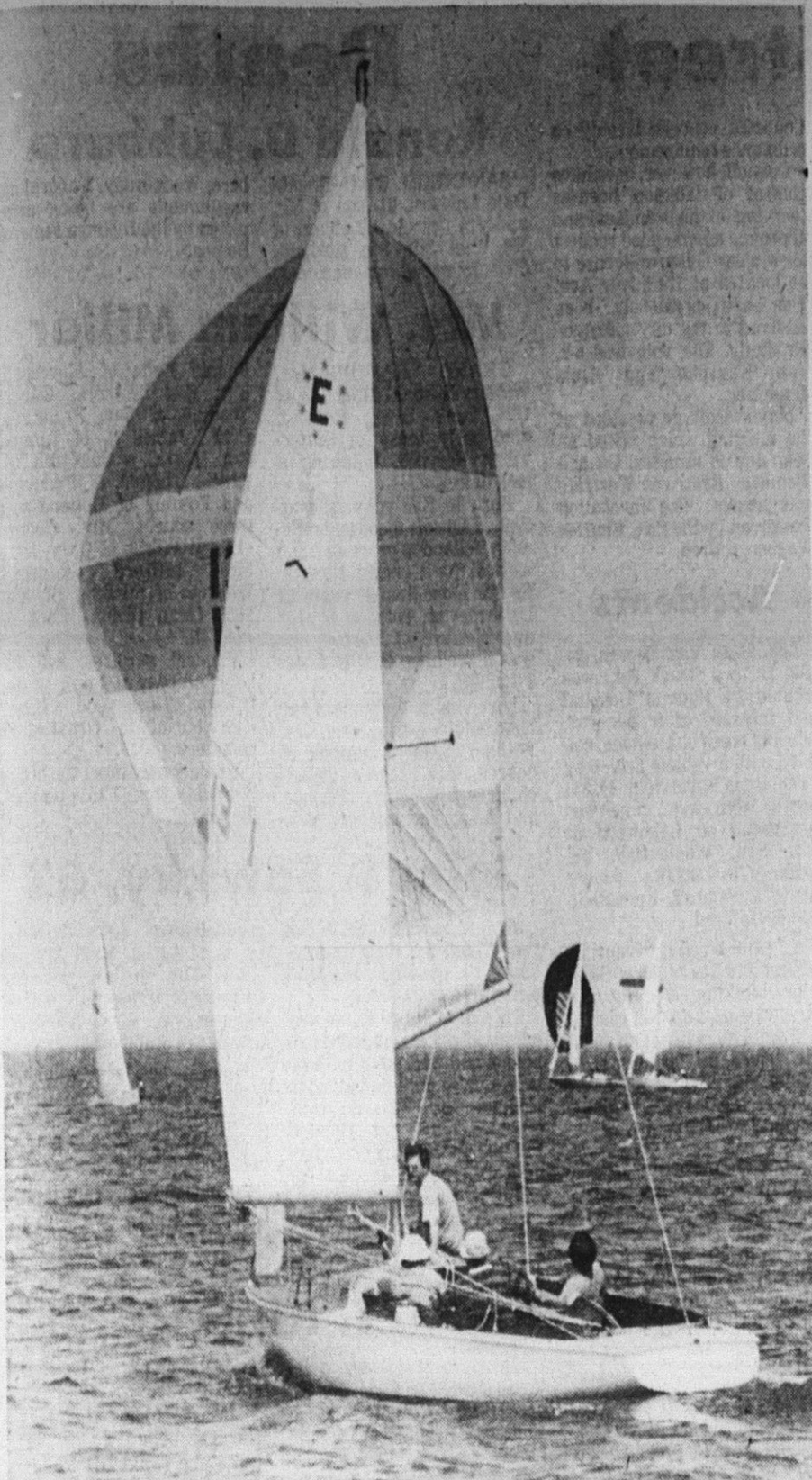

Luff Stuff — At the Races

There was a lull silence, as if the waves were even straining at the starting line.

The white warning flag, was lowered and the blue flag flashed into position--five minutes, four, three, two, one....

Boats danced back and forth at the starting line, like horses taking places at the gate.

A loud crack shattered the morning calm as the red flag snapped in the air--but were they off?

It was hard to tell whether they'd gotten the message. Three or four minutes passed before the first boat crossed the line!

Sailboat racing is unfamiliar to most of us--I expected something like the Indy 500, minus the roar.

Then again, where else would such a beautiful sight be seen. Bright "tubs" in a rainbow assortment with clean, refreshing white sails, gliding together like a flock of rare, tropical birds....

As a spectator sport, however, it will never match the Indy or Kentucky Derby. As the last set of luffing sails meandered towards the horizon it became obvious why there isn't a "Saturday afternoon at the sailboat races" on TV.

Sailors are a fun-loving crew, though, \$nq th their excitement, hinted that there was more to the competition than meets the eye.

"It's like a giant game of chess, except all the pieces are moving," claimed Dr. Clark Weersing, Rear Commodore of the Macatawa Bay Yacht Club.

Saturday, May 21 opened the racing season at the club. Unfortunately it was a calm day, the wind sometimes at a half" hearted 3-5 knots, sometimes leaving the crafts to drift.

At that rate the 14.5-mile contest could have taken a month of Saturdays; thank goodness for the four-hour time limit.

This particular race was divided into two divisions, one for ships over 30 feet and another for 30-footers and under. Each craft is given a handicap that takes into consideration the build of the vessel, the area of its sails and other characteristics.

All kinds of models are able to compete this was different from "one design" races that pit boats of like make and length against each other.

"The giant chess game" has complicated rules that allow boats to pass each other only under certain conditions, with specific maneuvers.

"It's a constant battle to get into the right position," said race committee member and veteran "110" racer Bill Vandenburg.

To the land-lover the rules sound like jargon from the days of Blue Beard, not to mention the array of signal flags used--pretty, but confusing.

One mis-read flag can disqualify a skipper and crew; one wrong tack can lose the race.

The spectator could easily miss these finer points of the contest, however. In Saturday's race the first, second and third boats over the starting line came over the finish line in the same order. Who knows what happened in between.

Alan Peat led the fllet with "Lucky Number" around the triangular course, stretching from the Holland channel to Saugatuck.

"Sun Fever" followed after in second place, skippered by Bill Trip and captain John Batts jockeyed "Bat" in third.

Unfortunately the second division never finished the

race--smaller boats with smaller sails are a definite disadvantage when every little breath of air makes a difference.

But even on a slow day the sailors are intent--every tittle of the sail, touch of the tiller and wisp of wind are carefully coordinated.

These racers work hard to gain a foot over a rival, and they must "know their stuff."

Bob Brink from Grand Rapids, one of "Night Owl's" crew, describes the excitement and pressure as a kind of therapy: "While you're doing that (racing) you don't think of anything else.... not the job or taxes.... it completely relaxes you."

Spectators can take advantage of this aspect of sailboat racing too. Just watch one, it will relax you--it will put you to sleep!

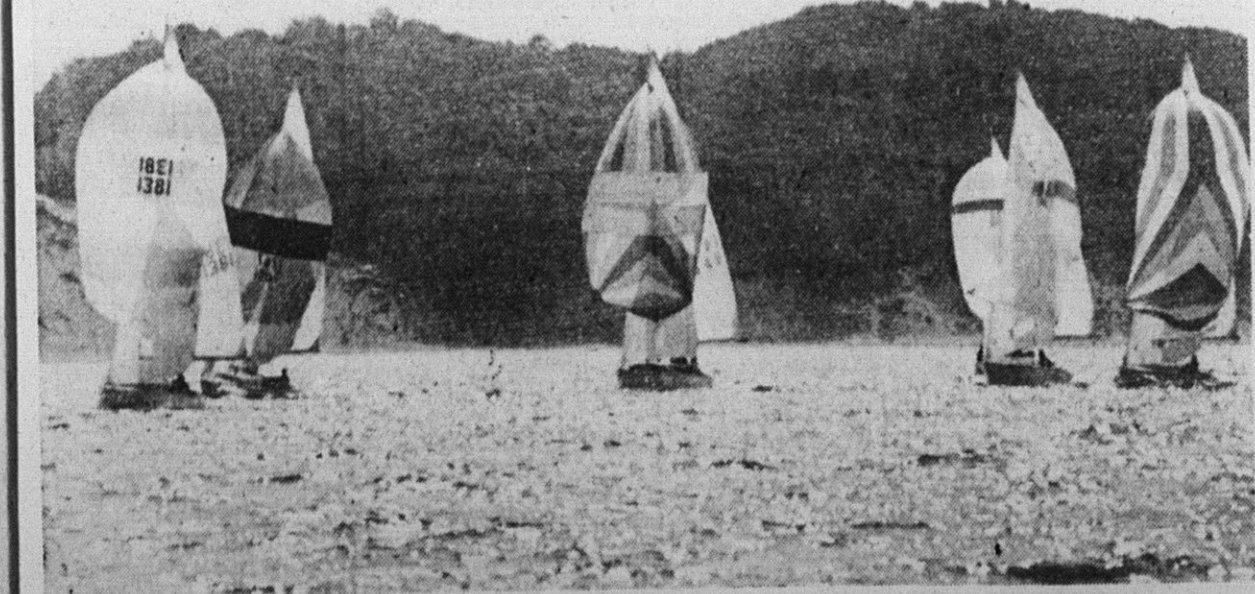
Police Notes

"It is my sincere hope that this situation will not occur in Holland and that our residents will take the time to

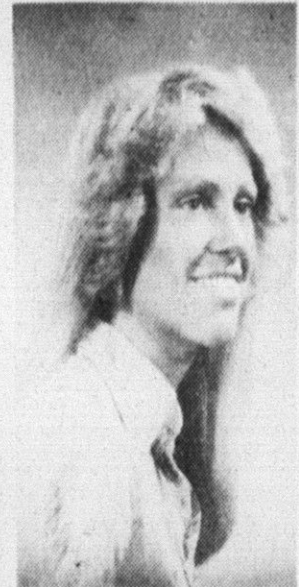
thoroughly acquaint themselves with this very important issue.
