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Thirty-five Years

IN CENTRAL REFORMED CHURCH

Dr. and Mrs. John A. Dykstra concluded their pastorate at Central Reformed Church, Grand Rapids, on October 31, 1954. This date marked the completion of thirty-five years of service to this congregation and the attainment of the denominational age for retirement.

At this time the Consistory of the church by unanimous action, with the concurrence of the North Classis of Grand Rapids, declared Dr. Dykstra Pastor Emeritus of the church as of November 1, 1954.

Dr. Dykstra, who has been a member of the Hope College Board of Trustees since 1935 and President of the Board since 1939, was graduated from Hope in 1909. He was graduated from New Brunswick Theological Seminary in 1912, the year he was ordained to the ministry. He served the First Church of Catskill, New York, and the Hamilton Grange Church of New York City, before his acceptance of the Central Church all in 1919.

During his years of exemplary service to his church, his service to the denomination's General Synod, Boards of Domestic and Foreign Missions, Grand Rapids Ministerial Association, has been multitudinous. Nor has Dr. Dykstra confined his service to the church. An editorial in the Grand Rapids Herald published on the occasion of his retirement attests to his earned stature in the community. (Editorial reprinted in this issue.)

Mrs. Dykstra, nee Irene Stapelkamp '12, has been one of the outstanding ministers' wives in the long story of the Reformed Denomination. From the very beginning she has taken great interest in young people's work and in Christian education. Outstanding among her contributions is her development of dramatics both in the church and in the community.

The Dykstra's two sons are also Hope Graduates — J. Dean '40, pastor of Fair Street Reformed Church, Kingston, New York, and William D. '49, in business in Grand Rapids.

The Hope men and Hope women the world around wish to add their congratulations to Dr. and Mrs. Dykstra, for 35 years of exemplary life. May the years ahead be as many and as filled with service!

A Fine Legacy

Editorial from the Grand Rapids Herald, November 3, 1954.

Thirty-five years ago a new church was formed in Grand Rapids, the Central Reformed Church, through union of the First and Second Reformed Churches. It then called a young pastor, a native of Grand Rapids, from his pastorate at Hamilton Grange Reformed Church in New York City.

Now Central Reformed Church's one pastor through more than a third of a century has retired, leaving behind among other accomplishments a legacy of complete Christian charity. For it is said of Dr. John A. Dykstra that he never spoke ill of anyone.

Dr. and Mrs. Dykstra, since their arrival here in 1919 to lead the congregation of the newly-formed church, have devoted their lives to the affairs of their people and their city. So it is entirely in character that Dr. Dykstra, now Pastor Emeritus, is planning an active schedule of service for his church. In addition to an invitation to preach in January in Florida, he expects to do supply preaching in this area.

A Past President of the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America, Dr. Dykstra has been a member of the Safety Council, the Executive Board of the Boy Scouts, President of the Grand Rapids Ministerial Association and pastor-adviser to many youth groups. In 1950 he received The Netherlands' decoration of Knight of the Order of Orange Nassau for services to the people of The Netherlands during and following World War II.

That Dr. Dykstra, through his many years of unflinching service, has earned retirement Grand Rapids will agree; that he is making his retirement only "part-time" Grand Rapids will applaud.

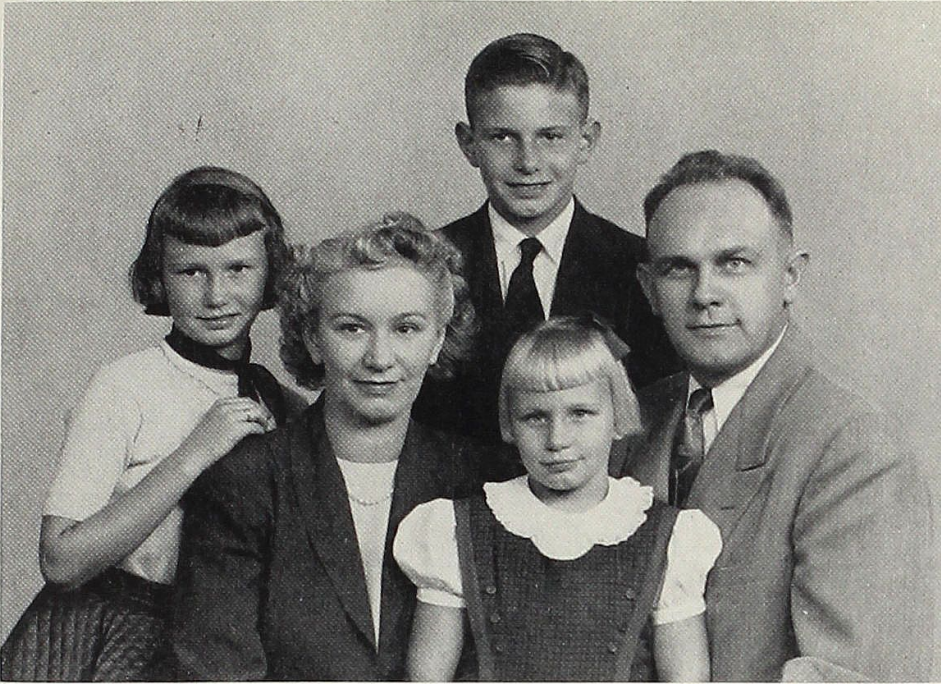

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NYKERKS RETURN TO ARABIA

Dr. Gerald '34 and Mrs. Nykerk and their three children, David 12, Nancy 11, and Laila 9, sailed from New York on December 17 for the Persian Gulf country.

After 11 years in mission work, both Dr. and Mrs. Nykerk wound up with a siege of tuberculosis. For that reason they returned in October 1951 and Dr. Nykerk spent 20 months and Mrs. Nykerk 22 months in Sunshine Sanatorium recovering their health. Since Dr. Nykerk regained his health he has been helping overburdened Holland doctors to the extent that the Holland people would have liked to keep him here.

But Mrs. Nykerk said "Nothing would induce us to stay. There's the religious side of it — I won't try to explain all that means to us — and then there's the need. We are so much needed there. While we were ill we prayed for a return to good health so we might return to Arabia. We are so happy now that this prayer is being answered."

The Nykerks first went to Arabia in 1941 and were at Bahrain at first, associated with Dr. Paul Harrison. Later they were transferred to Kuwait, at that time a city of 60,000 in which Dr. Nykerk was the only physician. In 1949, on the retirement of Dr. Harrison, they were transferred to Bahrain to take his place and worked there until illness forced them to return to this country.

They are returning to a station new to them, Amarah, Iraq, where Dr. Nykerk will be in charge of a 40-bed hospital. There will be another doctor in the station taking off some of the pressure he had when for years he worked alone in a big area.

Their new locale is the most northerly they have had and will give them better working conditions. Amarah is near the traditional site of the Garden of Eden and is on the Tigris River.

Dr. Nykerk is delighted by a fine gift to the hospital at Amarah which a group of Grand Rapids doctors is making. Most of the doctors are members of the Reformed Church who will be better pleased if their names are not announced.

They are sending eye instruments and other surgical equipment, some hospital beds, a suction machine, an operating light and other gifts to help Dr. Nykerk with the vast amount of work there.

Missionaries in India Facing Transition

India is on the march. Since Independence in 1947 she has embarked on the first so called Five Year Plan. With the help of some foreign aid, principally from the U.S.A. and also from the Colombo Plan she is marching steadily forward. This morning's paper says amongst other things: "Favorable indications of India's continued industrialization were the expansion of the steel industry, completion of one of the new petroleum refineries, increases in the production of the locomotive works and of the Sindhi Fertilizer Plant, and the completion of the Government D.D.T. and Penicillin Factories." This is but an indication of India's tremendous stride forward in the economic and industrial fields. Many more similar items might be mentioned, especially in the area of irrigation and water power, along which lines the greatest advance has been made these last years.

I turn a page and find: "Sri Nehru, yesterday underlined his Government's desire rapidly to turn into a Welfare State. He said that he would endeavor to see that everyone in the country had enough food to eat, sufficient clothing to wear, and a decent home to live. 'I feel feverish whenever I think of these slums'." Just how stupendous that program is for India whose seventy-five per cent of the people by our reckoning live in slums is beyond my power to describe. But the clearance of them is in the program of the Congress Government — a worthy one indeed and absolutely necessary to keep one step ahead of Communist agitation and propaganda. There is beyond any doubt a keen awareness and dislike of Communism by the present government, though the manner of combating it is different from ours. The aegis of Democracy is as well beloved by such men as Nehru and Radakrishman as by any at home but they see the hope of their people realized better in a 'Welfare State' than in the modified capitalism that has been so potent a factor in the development of America. Let us be charitable in our judgment remembering that well over seventy-five percent of India's people are still illiterate, whose thinking must be done for them by others and whose welfare planned by their better educated fellow citizens.

"The Prime Minister yesterday criticized the work of some 'missionaries' who were out to reform the spirit of life of

tribal people — the first thing these people seem to have done is to spoil the usual tribal life of laughing, singing, and dancing, which underlie the spirit of these people." So runs another comment of the day. It suggests a growing criticism of the work of Christian Missions, subtle and deadly. It is so easy to concur in such sentiments, to say that Christianity must not destroy, but fulfill. But those who have really experienced the love of God in Christ Jesus know well that the Christian life does involve an eradication and a complete transformation. This is what Christianity proclaims and other religions or 'no religion' deny. Here we stand before an issue where no compromise is valid from the Christian viewpoint.

I want to make one more quote. It comes from an address given by the Rev. Sumitra, Moderator of the Church of South India before a large group of Christians in Madras on the occasion of the commissioning of missionaries to parts beyond the Church. In the course of his address on that occasion he said: "From the Union Government downwards there were officials who were not quite satisfied with the presence and work of foreign missionaries in India. He had heard remarks by even the non-officials in towns and villages 'when the British Collector has gone why should the British missionary remain?' Such an attitude to the presence of foreign missionaries was grave — officials and leaders in India were full of praise for what the missionaries had done in the field of education and medical relief, but they did not say one word about the achievement in the spiritual field." That is the situation. We are in India facing a crisis. Bishop Sumitra draws the conclusion that the church in India, weak though it be in many respects, must rise to the occasion. Opportunity and demand must be matched with zeal and sacrifice. Crisis must not lead to hopelessness and despondency, it must in spite of threat usher in a new day of glory.

It is possible that the days of missionaries are numbered. The Bishop concluded: "The Church could not exist without evangelization as it existed for the saving of the world. The foreign missionaries might be sent away, but they would leave behind 8,000,000 people who believed in Jesus Christ. If these became evangelists and proclaimed the

glory of the Gospel, then the Kingdom of Christ would grow."

These are some of the declarations with which we begin a new day in India, this October 8th. They are worthy of reflection. In themselves directly or obliquely what a testimony they are to the worth of our missionary undertaking. Surely in the midst of trial, they give proof that our cause is not in vain. By ways direct, and sometimes devious, our God will cause His will to be done.

HOWARD HARTOUGH HEADS NEW HOUDRY SECTION

Howard D. Hartough has been appointed to research on new petro-chemicals and catalysts at the Marcus Hook (Pennsylvania) laboratories of the Houdry Process Corporation. The announcement



was made in Philadelphia on October 19.

Mr. Hartough holds 70 patents and has authored 30 publications, two-thirds of them on thiophene. (Thiophene is a colorless mobile liquid originally isolated from coal tar but more recently synthesized from petroleum refinery by-products; used principally in the drug and dye industries.) He has written the only books in English on this chemical. "Thiophene and Derivatives" was published in 1952. "Compounds with Condensed Thiophene Rings," co-authored with S. L. Meisel, was brought out this year.

For 13 years Howard worked on petro-chemicals and the development of thiophene at the Socony-Vacuum Laboratories, Paulsboro, New Jersey. He left there to join the Hercules Powder Company three and a half years ago, in Wilmington, Delaware, where he was engaged in market development for petro-chemicals until joining Houdry.

He grew up on a farm outside Fairview, Illinois, not far from Peoria, where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Hartough, still live. His brother, Bernard, is an electrical-engineer in Peoria.

After receiving his A.B. degree from Hope College in 1936, Howard went on to George Washington University, Washington, D.C., where, in 1938, he earned his master's degree on a two-year teaching fellowship.

He and his wife, the former Cornelia Tysse '36, live at 20 Boulder Brook Drive, Wilmington. They have three children: Howard Dale, Jr., 11; Linda, 8; and Alison, 1.

HOPE COLLEGE GRADUATE RECEIVES CITATION FROM U. S. PARK SERVICE

Robert N. Perkins, Jr., Class of '53, was one of seven members of the Grand Teton National Park Mountain Rescue Team to be awarded a certificate of merit by the U. S. Department of Interior.

Assistant Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Mr. Orin Lewis, acted for Douglas McKay, Secretary of the Interior, in his absence. Mr. Conrad Wirth, Director of National Parks, and Mr. Howard Blake, Regional Director, joined in the presentation of the award.

The citation was given for the part the seven rangers played in the rescue of Miss Norma Hart of Lynn, Massachusetts, who fell 35 feet, breaking her back at the 13,000 foot level on the Grand Teton peak, highest in the Teton range. Mr. Perkins and his six companions was the first team of the rescue crew to reach Miss Hart. They were relieved in relays by other rangers in the day and one-half spent bringing Miss Hart down the mountain.

The July 3 issue of Saturday Evening Post speaks of the rescue of Miss Hart by the Park rangers.

This is the second time Mr. Perkins has received the Park Service Certificate of Merit. Last year he played a leading part in the rescue of Robert Saltonstall of Boston, Massachusetts, who had fallen while climbing the Grand Teton.

Mr. Perkins is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert N. Perkins of Claverack, New York, and at present is employed at the Grand Teton National Park, being a member of the ranger staff and the mountain rescue team. For the winter months he has been assigned to Everglades National Park, Florida.

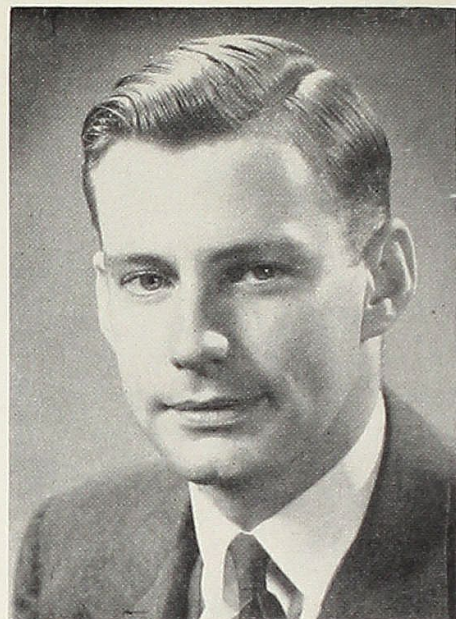

HOPE PIANIST WELL RECEIVED AT TOWN HALL

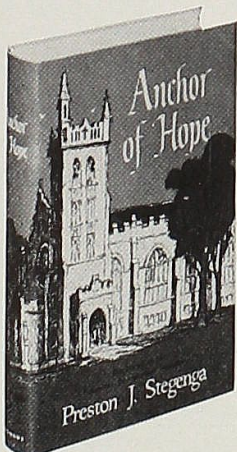

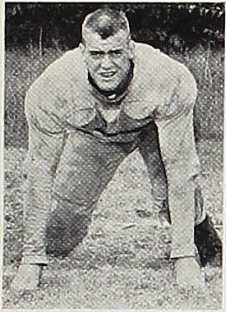

Only one letterman returned from Hope's 1953 cross country co-champions. Yet determined individual effort and careful guidance by Coach Bob Vanderham brought three wins in the first four meets. Then Hope ran into the league powers and dropped their last three, ending the season with a dual meet mark of 3 wins and 4 losses which put them in fifth place. In the MIAA meet, held this year at Adrian, Hope edged out Hillsdale for fourth place—although the Dales had won the dual run from Hope during the regular season. Thus these two squads tied for fourth in the final standings. The outstanding individual runner was captain-elect Ron Den Uyl, who copped three firsts, two seconds and two thirds in the dual competition. Den Uyl came in seventh in the MIAA meet with a time of 22:53 for the four mile course—only 59 seconds behind the winner.

On the gridiron the Dutch finished with their worst won and lost record since Al Vanderbush took over as head coach. However, the 3-6 record alone does not tell the story—in fact it indicates the opposite of what is true. Although dropping all three non-league games, to a powerful trio—Beloit,

The athletic fortunes of the Dutchmen this fall and winter may best be described by the adjectives hot and cold. Both of the completed fall sports, cross country and football, and the indoor court season now in progress, found a good crop of

Carroll and Michigan Normal—and only breaking even in the six MIAA contests, Hope ended up with more total yardage than the opponents and topped the MIAA in total offense. The lack of experienced depth deprived the Dutch of a scoring punch and led to the fourth place MIAA finish. Individual standouts for Hope were the four all-MIAA selections. Johnny Adams, right halfback on the mythical eleven, led the league in rushing and the Hope squad in rushing and total offense as well as being selected to the 55 man all-American team selected from the 425 member schools of the Nat. Inter-collegiate Athletic Assoc.; co-captain Bill Heydorn, all-MIAA last year at tackle, was switched to right guard this year and chosen league's best at that position; big 6-4 Doc Van Hoeven became the best in the conference at left tackle; and "Deacon Dave" Kuyers plowed his way through the line for enough yardage to rank third in league rushing and be named the top fullback. At the season's end Heydorn was chosen the team's Most Valuable Player while Adams and end Lynn Post were elected co-captains for next year. Although Hope only loses five seniors, all linemen, league champion Hillsdale will also have practically their whole squad back for what perhaps will be the best MIAA season yet in quality and competition.

In the hoop season almost half completed, Hope's six returning lettermen, led by twice all-MIAA Bob Hendrickson, are finding the going rough—for bench strength is a necessity in the fast breaking style of play which has brought Coach

John Visser two league champions in his first three seasons at Hope. The "go-go" boys have hung up a record of 31 victories and only 6 defeats under his tutelage. While there are several promising new faces on the bench, they once again lack the savvy to run with the MIAA leaders. However, if they can find themselves in the second half of the schedule, Hope may once again make good its title of perennial contender.

New Assets at Hope

PERIODICALS

One of the happiest suggestions coming from the Friends of Hope College Library organization is that of advertising our needs. There is a chance that those early volumes of the *Journal of Philosophy* may have been inherited by some alumnus not interested in philosophy. Perhaps also some information about the growing periodical collection at Hope and its importance in the changing picture of modern education will be of interest to Hope College alumni.

Periodical holdings are one of the greatest assets of the modern college. More and more use is being made of scholarly journals and general periodicals in the teaching of today. Whether the student looks to the future, or to the past, or at the present, books are no longer adequate for a complete or authentic picture. As for faculty research, the importance of periodical literature can hardly be overstressed. The present collection, together with a micro-film reader for periodical material not available at Hope can change the aspect of research in the Hope College Library.

The value of journals to the science faculty has been pointed out frequently. It is even said that scientific data in book form is out of date before it is off the press. Today it must be added that the use of scholarly journals in the humanities and social sciences is equally important. The reading of the results of recent scholarship in these fields is as necessary for instruction and research as is familiarity with recent advances in chemistry or physics. In fact, periodicals must be listed as basic equipment in the laboratory of the humanities and social sciences.

The world moves so fast in so many directions that the latest word can be found only in the current periodical. Equally important is their value in studies of the past, for contemporary opinion and record of any given date can be found only in the periodical literature of that time. Source material for comparative studies and for research in both the humanities and the sciences can be found through the endless files of periodical literature available in libraries. To meet such demands from students and faculty Hope College Library acquires annually through gift and purchase some 265 periodicals in the various fields covered by the curriculum and spends some \$2,000

for subscriptions and the binding of these files. At the end of the last school year there were 4,350 bound volumes and uncounted numbers of unbound volumes for consultation through use of the great commercial indexes.

In any consideration of resources of a college library, periodicals and scholarly journals must determine to a large extent the quality of that collection. Actually, a college library needs complete runs of all the outstanding journals in the fields studied there. Unfortunately, many of the files at Hope begin in the nineteen forties. With the increase in the cost of all periodicals it is now impossible to keep up with the present demand and at the same time to fill in the gaps left from a past when budgets were inadequate. There is, besides, a still greater handicap for librarians everywhere: many volumes are now out of print and older issues are rapidly disappearing from all markets. They will be found only in libraries or attics of individuals once interested in that particular field of study.

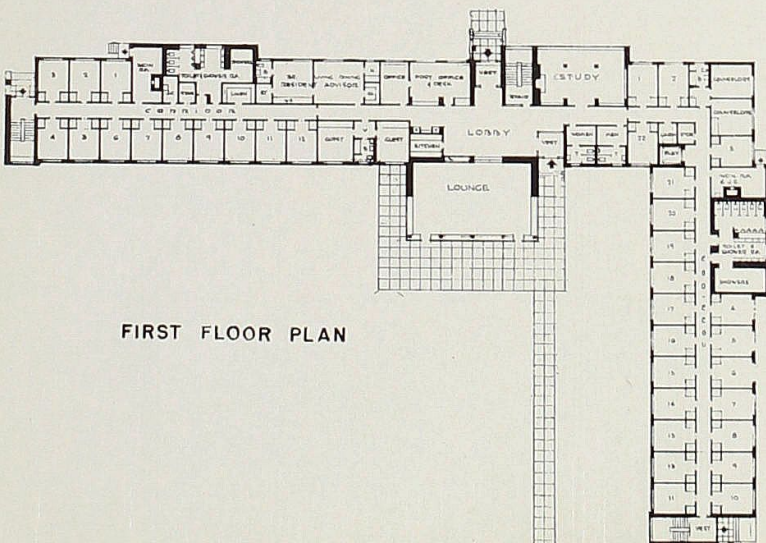

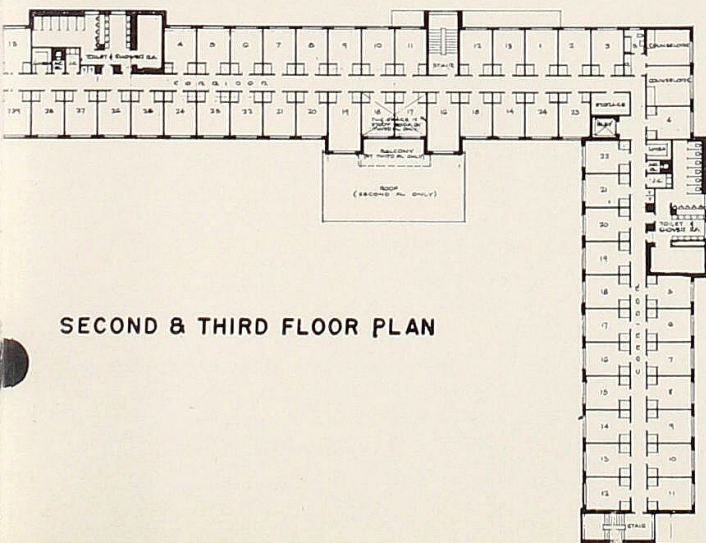
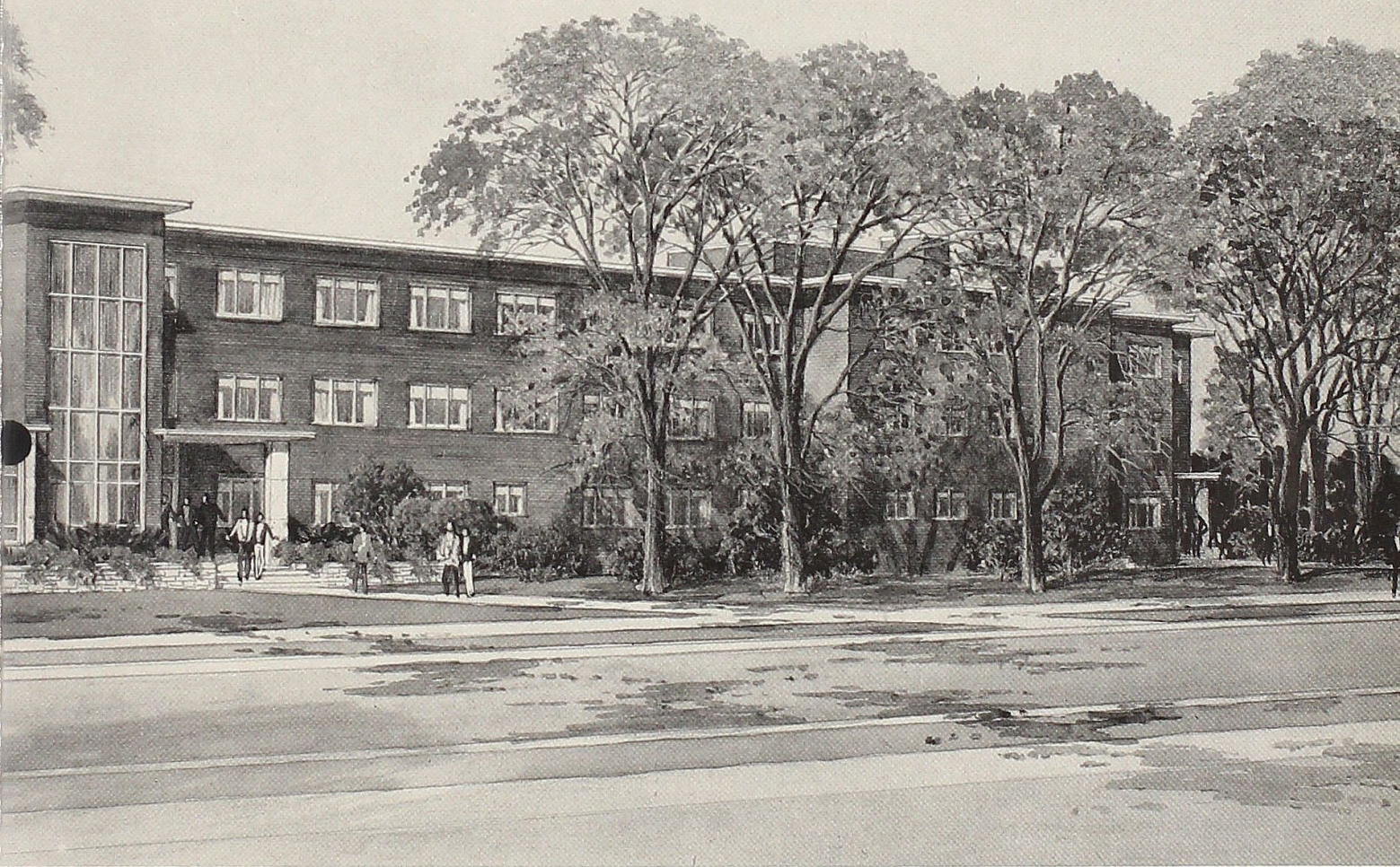


FIRST FLOOR PLAN

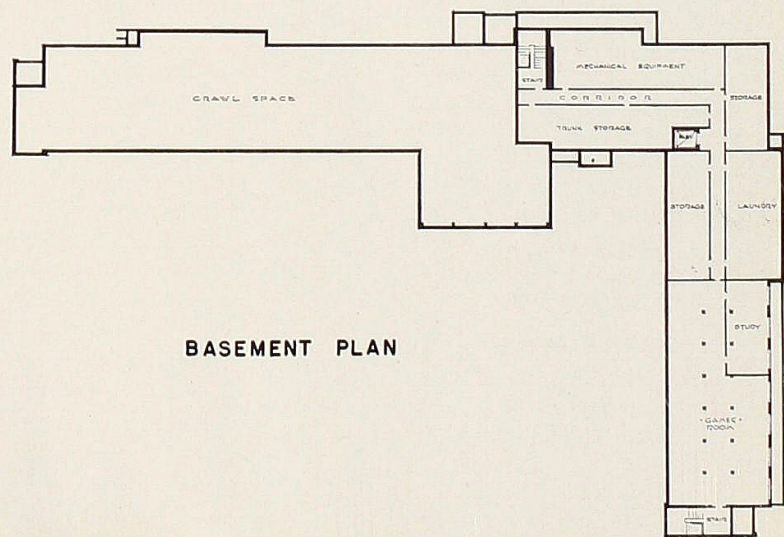
Proposed Men's Dormitory Hope College

MRS. FRANCES GLEYSTEN

Mrs. Frances S. Gleysteen (Fanny Steffens — 1891), wife of the late Dr. Dirk V. Gleysteen (1891) passed away in Long Beach, California on August 19, 1954.

She was the daughter of the Rev. Dr. Nicholas M. Steffens, Professor of Theology at Western Theological Seminary, and Jane Graham Steffens. Her parents, missionaries respectively from Germany and Scotland to Turkey, were married in the latter country but moved to Emden in Friesland, Germany, where their daughter, Frances, was born on February 17, 1871. Five months after her birth they moved to the United States. After short stays in Brooklyn and northern Illinois, the family moved to the Dutch Reformed community in western Michigan, settling in Zeeland in about 1876 and in Holland a few years later. Reverend Steffens preached in both communities in the Reformed Church and joined the faculty of the Theological Seminary in Holland.

All of the eight children in the family attended Hope College. They were Charles, Agnes (Mrs. Peter Holleman), Cornelius, Mary (Mrs. Rokus C. DeVries), Fanny (Mrs. Dirk V. Gleysteen), Belle (Mrs. George Van Hees), John, and Jean (Mrs. Ernest Bergen). Fanny graduated with the Class of 1891, the only girl to graduate in that class.

After graduation, Fanny Steffens taught school in Graftschap, in northern Illinois, and in Orange City, Iowa. In November 1896 she was married to her classmate of Hope College, Dr. Dirk V. Gleysteen, in Dubuque, Iowa. To this union were born two children, Graham in 1898 and Agnes (Mrs. John Fraser) in 1903.

Most of her married life was spent in 6—16273 Steketee-Van Huis — 40-6 Alton, Iowa, and in Lambertton, Minnesota, where her husband practiced medicine. In 1946 she and Dr. Gleysteen celebrated their golden wedding in Long Beach, California, where they lived after his retirement. Dr. Gleysteen died in 1951.

At the time of her death, Mrs. Gleysteen was a member of Emanuel Presbyterian Church in Long Beach. She was the last survivor of the eight children of Dr. and Mrs. Steffens.

MRS. VICTOR BLEKKINK

Mrs. Victor J. Blekkink, the former Agnes Staplekamp '11, died unexpectedly of a heart attack September 28 at her

home in Cohoes, New York. She was 67.

Mrs. Blekkink was a graduate of Northwestern Academy in Orange City, Iowa and Hope College. She lived in Holland and taught in the public schools before her marriage to Rev. Victor Blekkink '09 in 1912. They lived most of their married life in the East where he served several pastorates.

Surviving besides the husband are a sister, Mrs. John A. Dykstra '12 of Grand Rapids and a brother, Judson Staplekamp '23N of Kenosha, Wisconsin.

Funeral services were held in First Reformed Church of Cohoes with Mrs. Blekkink's nephew, the Rev. John Dean Dykstra '40 of Kingston, New York officiating. Burial was in Pilgrim Home Cemetery, Holland, with Dr. John A. Dykstra '09 officiating.

CORNELIUS W. MUILENBURG

Cornelius W. Muilenburg '27 was fatally injured on October 2 when his car collided with a freight truck, in a Pampanga highway, Philippine Islands. He expired at the provincial hospital in San Fernando, Pampanga, an hour after the collision. He reportedly never regained consciousness.

"Corky" and his wife went to the Philippines in 1930 where they both taught in several northern Luzon schools before he joined International Harvester in 1936 as assistant to the auditor. He was eventually made manager of the collection and credit department, a position he held until his death.

In World War II, Corky attained the rank of lieutenant commander and was naval aide to Admiral Carey, commanding officer of Treasure Island, California. He was a member of the U. S. Naval Reserve, Elks club, Polo club and the Manila Golf Club.

He is survived by his wife, Anne, and their two sons, Robert, Hope senior and David, 17, attending Mt. Hennon School, Massachusetts.

Services were held at the Union Church in Manila and the cremated remains were shipped to his hometown, Grand Haven, Michigan, where committal services were held November 10.

Mr. and Mrs. Muilenburg had returned to Manila from a vacation in the United States just two weeks before the fatal accident. The vice president and general manager of International Harvester in the Philippines, said the death of Muilenburg, who was affectionately known as "Corky" by his many friends, was a big

ARTHUR C. CLOETINGH

Professor Arthur C. Cloetingh '16, head of the drama department of Penn State University for 34 years, died unexpectedly November 26 at his home, 717 Foster Ave., State College, Pa. Death followed a heart attack.

Prof. Cloetingh distinguished himself at Hope College while a senior as pageant-master and director of the first "Pageant of Hope" which celebrated the 50th anniversary of the founding of the college.

In 1923 he married the late Evelyn Keppel, daughter of Mrs. A. C. Keppel of Holland.

Prof. Cloetingh established the department of dramatics at Penn State, which was one of the first colleges in the United States to have such a department. He has been a foremost authority on the theater in this country and was internationally recognized as an authority on Hendrik Ibsen. In 1951, he was appointed by the Rockefeller Foundation to visit Norway, Great Britain, Ireland, Holland, Belgium, France and Spain on a six-month study tour of the theater in Europe.

He has been president of several national drama societies and was a pioneer in developing the now famous theater-in-the-round. For several years he represented the state of Pennsylvania in UNESCO.

He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and served for many years as an elder on the church board.

Surviving are the wife; a son Arthur Keppel '50; a daughter, Jean '53N, now Mrs. William Smith of Mt. Prospect, Ill.; two grandchildren; two brothers and a sister in Muskegon and a brother in South Bend, Indiana.

Funeral services were held November 29 at State College.

EDWARD N. FREYLING

Edward N. Freyling II '54N died October 30 at his home in Grand Rapids of generalized cancer. He had been ill 10 days. He was 22.

He attended Hope College one year 1950-51, and since has been working with his father Arend J. '30 at the Freyling & Mendels Florist shop in Grand Rapids.

Surviving him are his wife, the former Nancy Bylenga, a son, Edward N. III; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arend J. Freyling, all of Grand Rapids; a sister, Dolores Freyling '51 Campbell, of Concord, California; his paternal grandparents and his maternal grandmother.

Funeral services were held at Central Reformed Church on November 2, with Burial in Woodlawn cemetery.

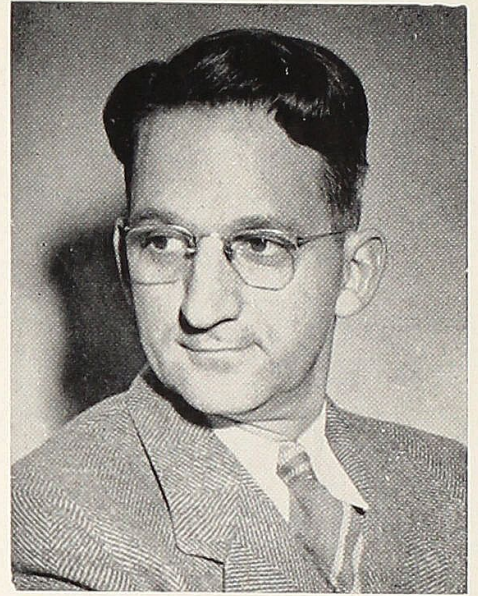

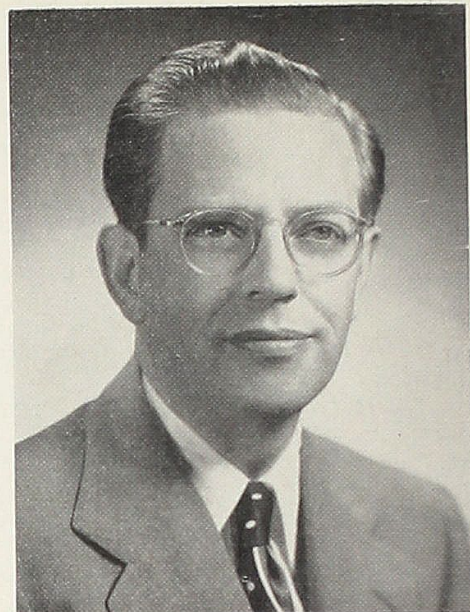

Excerpt from letter from Blaise '42 and Marian '47 Levai, 30, Arni Road, Vellore, N. Arcot Dt. . .

Dear Friends,

Blaise has been especially busy with the newly organized Fort Church. Although there have been weekly services there for over one hundred years, for the first time the work of the Church is extending beyond Sunday worship. In the past month Blaise has started a Sunday Bible Class, a choir, instituted bulletins and begun a campaign to clean up the back yard so that we may use it for outdoor meetings, outdoor religious movies and additional Sunday School classes. We are badly in need of additional space since there is only the worship hall and a tiny office in the church. About 300 crowd inside on an average Sunday morning, and we have had to order additional benches. We are also hoping to start a Women's Fellowship, but it is hard to find a time when they can leave their families. We would like to be able to offer to supervise the little children but again we have no available space for a nursery. It would be ideal if we could rent one of the adjacent buildings in the Fort, but they are all now used for government offices. Since the government is predominantly Hindu, it is not as easy to get assistance for religious work as it would be in the U. S. Please pray that the way may be opened up for us to use the tremendous opportunities before us.

You may be interested to hear of an incident that happened to a Christian who was selling Bible literature in a village near

Vellore. A group of Communists ganged up on him, telling him to stop selling this American religion which they call "Imperialist propaganda." But the lad stood his ground and began to read from the gospel of Matthew about Jesus who was born in Bethlehem of Judea. Slowly he convinced them that Jesus Himself was an Easterner and His religion is universal, knowing no boundaries of nation or race. The crowd quieted down, and a few even bought gospels and wanted to learn more.

At the annual alumni dinner in June 1947, Dr. Otto van der Velde '15 presented the report of a special alumni committee. The proposal of the committee was to encourage alumni gifts to the college for special and general purposes. By establishing a Centennial Fund all alumni gifts are credited to this over-all fund — all gifts made by alumni for whatever purpose. It is the goal of this committee that this fund should reach a Million Dollars by the Centennial year - 1966.

We thought it would be of interest to the readers of the alumni magazine to publish the results of the progress of this fund up to December 1, 1954. At the

time of the proposal of the fund, it was decided that all alumni gifts to the Science Equipment and Library Fund, then in progress should be included which in several cases made it retroactive. To date included in the Centennial fund have been gifts to all funds since 1947 including the Schouten Memorial, Student Share, Century of Service and all other appeals.

The total gifts credited to this fund to date amount to \$118,692.00. The special alumni committee that proposed the Centennial Fund proposed also different degrees of membership. By accumulated gifts or single donations of specified amounts, members would attain different

degrees of membership. Initiates are those whose total gifts amount to \$100,000; Associates have reached the \$500.00 mark; Fellows, the \$1000.00 station and Honor Members \$5,000.00.

We are presenting the list of those in these membership classes, and those who have started on the road to a particular goal. We are presenting the list of donors alphabetically.

Gifts not collected by Hope College such as those to the Roll Call, General Synod, United Advance are not included since the individual donors are not known.

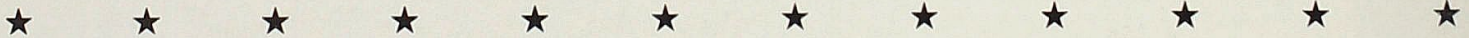
