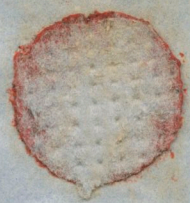

My Dear Sir,

I write you these few hurried lines to say that Messrs. Coffin & Pringle, the factors of Col: Pickens, have paid in on your account the amt of his Note to you for \$1200, with the interest amounting together to \$1434.20. deducting therefore an account due by you to Col: Pickens, say \$94.65 leaving to you a credit of ~~\$1200~~ \$1339.61; which we have this day remitted to Mr. Easton of the Bank of Commerce, Philadelphia in the apt of Messrs. Lang, Cadger & Co for \$1334.61 which is 3% present sum ----- 5.00
making to a credit the above named sum \$1339.61

We understood Messrs. Coffin & Pringle to say that Col: Pickens had stated to them that you did not require any payments on the other Notes of his, which you hold -
