Over the last two weeks Clemson fans and players can see why Tiger Head Coach Danny Ford talks about turnovers so much. In the first four weeks of the season the Tigers had 18 turnovers and ranked last in the nation in turnover margin. In those four weeks Clemson lost three games, but over the last two Saturdays Clemson has had only three turnovers and two victories have resulted. That probably will be the key to today's Textile Bowl game with N.C. State at Memorial Stadium.

N.C. State coach Tom Reed would certainly agree with that statement. In many areas his Wolfpack outplayed intra-state rival North Carolina last week, but five turnovers for the Pack against just one for the Tar Heels led to a 21-14 North Carolina win. Turnovers have been the major reasons for both teams early season problems this year.

Ford has the stats to back up his feelings that turnover margin is the most important item on a stat sheet. When Clemson won the National Championship in 1981 Clemson had a + 17 turnover ratio (committed 17 less turnovers than the opponent over the course of the season, and the worst vear he has had at Clemson, 6-5 in 1980. The Tigers had their worst turnover margin (-12). Additionally, Clemson has an incredible 34-1-1 record under Danny Ford when Clemson commits fewer turnovers than the opposition, but an 11-14 record when the Tigers commit more turnovers than the opposition.

Clemson has improved its attack in all areas, especially in the offensive line, the area that gets the least amount of attention. It has proven to be the most important area, however, as the people in the trenches have improved by leaps and bounds over the last two weeks. Returning All-ACC guard Steve Reese has graded in the high eighties the last two Saturdays, as has senior center Jeff Lytton. Lytton was injured in the Duke game, but overall he has been the most pleasant surprise on the offensive line this year. He was leading the team in knockdown blocks with 30 heading into the Duke game

and had the highest overall average grade.

The Tiger tailbacks have been the beneficiaries of the crisp offensive line play. Tiger tailbacks have averaged about 210 yards a game over the last two weeks, including an even 200 last week at Duke. Kenny Flowers has had back-to-back 100-yard games from the tailback position, including his third straight 100-yard game against Duke.

Stacey Driver missed the Duke game with an elbow injury, but he should be back in action this week. He had 121 yards against Virginia two weeks ago, the second best total of his career. And, Terrence Flagler, the flashy runner from Florida, had a season high 79 yards in 13 carries, including a 27yard touchdown run at Duke as he exceeded his total yardage figure of the first five games combined.

Ray Williams has an interesting string going heading into the N.C. State contest. The fleet wide receiver who doubles as a star on the Clemson baseball team now has three straight 100yard games in terms of total performance. Total performance is the sum of a player's receiving, rushing and return yardage and three weeks in a row Williams has gone over the 100-yard mark, including a high of 161 yards at Kentucky. He leads the team in receiving yardage with 237 and one of these days he is going to break Clemson's kickoff return jinx (774 straight without a touchdown).

At quarterback, Rodney Williams has started each of the last two Clemson contests and run the offense with dexterity. Williams has completed 54.5 percent of his passes so far this season and he had 44 yards rushing last week a high for a Clemson quarterback in 1985.

While the offense has gotten all the publicity for Clemson's improvement, the Tigers' bend-but-don't-break defense has also come through in the clutch. The Tigers gave up 26 points at Kentucky, but the Wildcat offense had just one touchdown. Two weeks ago Virginia scored 24 points, but the Cavs got just 30 yards in total offense in the fourth quarter and last Saturday Duke's offense tallied just one time with a six-pointer.

The "Berlin Wall" has been Clemson's leader in the first line of defense this year. Steve Berlin, the ever improving senior from Pennsylvania, has 58 tackles so far this season and leads the team in tackles for loss with eight. With five games to go he could end the season with more tackles than All-American William Perry had last year.

Henry Walls (there's that Wall theme again) is the top tackler on the club with 90 and he stands to challenge the 150 mark for a season if he keeps up his current pace. The junior who is the only freshman to make All-ACC in Clemson annals, had 18 stops last week, his second highest total of the season.

Kenny Danforth is coming off his best game as a Clemson Tiger as the red-shirted senior had 12 tackles against N.C. State for his career high in the hitting area. He also had a tackle for loss and two passes broken up. Physical phenomina A.J. Johnson (5-10,

190) is the leading tackler from the secondary with 68 tackles as he has been in double figures in tackles in every game this season. The free safety from Charleston is well on his way to breaking Terry Kinard's tackle record for a Clemson defensive back.

The Clemson secondary will be active this afternoon as N.C. State quarterback Erik Kramer has averaged 235 yards per game passing. The junior college transfer from California has already tied the N.C. State single season record for TD passes with 10 and he is 131-245 for 1645 yards for the season. He threw two TD passes last Saturday against North Carolina.

His top receiver this season has been flanker Phil Brothers who has caught six TD passes, one short of setting a new N.C. State record. He now has over 1,000 yards in receptions at N.C. State and a 90-yard TD reception against Pittsburgh earlier this year certainly helped his total.

The Wolfpack rushing game has averaged just 92 yards per game, but running back Vince Evans has picked up 72.7 yards a game. He has 114 carries for 509 yards, more yardage than anyone on the Tiger team currently. Evans led State in rushing against Clemson last year with 63 yards in 14 carries.

Injuries to the offensive line have hurt N.C. State this season, it was to be one of their areas of strength. Joe Milinichik is still a healthy 6-5, 302pounder at right tackle and is one of the best in the business at that position. But, five regulars have been hurt at one time or another in the offensive line for N.C. State and the Pack has not started the same offensive line in two games this year.

Defensively, Kelvin Croomes is the top tackler at an inside linebacker slot with 98 stops, including 54 solos. These are incredible stats considering he is only 5-10. He might be the only player in America under 5-11 who is leading his team in tackles. Mark Franklin, another 5-10 linebacker, has 64 tackles and will be remembered by Clemson fans who attended the contest in Raleigh last year. Franklin intercepted a Tiger pass and raced 81 yards for a score in Clemson's 35-34 win last season.

As has been the case in most contests this year, turnovers will be the important item in this game today. So, throw the other numbers out the window because when Clemson and N.C. State battle for the Textile Bowl an

unusual, but exciting game takes place. Although the Tigers have won the last four meetings, every game has been a struggle. The National Championship team defeated N.C. State by just 17-7, one of the more difficult tasks of the 1981 season. Two years ago at Clemson, State led the Tigers heading into the fourth quarter before Ray Williams and Mike Eppley turned the game around on the way to a 27-17 Clemson win. And, last year's game was just plain wild.

Congratulations are in order for the Ford family, who welcomed Danny Lee Ford II into their family on October 17. It was Danny and Deborah's first boy and a welcomed sight to the Clemson football team. You see, Tiger football

teams have had troubles winning under Ford when his wife is pregnant. We are not sure why, but Deborah brought the subject up and she was right when she said that Danny's teams just didn't win as much when she was carrying a baby.

A quick check of the records showed that when she has been pregnant Clemson has only an 8-8 record, a 50 percent winning mark. But, since Danny has been the head coach at Clemson the Tigers are 47-10-2 when she is not pregnant, an 84 percent winning mark. The theory did not hold (or should we say break) water when Danny was an assistant, however, When Deborah was carrying Jennifer during the 1972 season, Danny was an assistant at Alabama and the Tide had an undefeated regular season, and went to a major bowl game.

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The fear of most coaches about redshirt seniors is that, despite having an extra year of experience, the player will suffer from what many call "senioritis", an ailment that afflicts the concentration and enthusiasm of the victim. Clemson's Kenny Danforth has never had this ailment and probably never will.

Danforth credits his enthusiasm to his first year at Clemson. "When I first came here, my best friends were Jeff Bryant, Jeff Davis, Homer Jordan, and

Terry Kinard. I looked up to them to the point it was crazy, but being with them taught me a lot of things about attitude.

"That was the year Bryant and Davis got drafted. I remember being in the lounge at the dorm eating pizza and playing backgammon with Bryant when he got the call that he had been drafted. Davis didn't go until the fifth round, and he said, 'Well, I'm just going to have to do that much more to make sure I get the job done.' I learned how important the right attitude is from those guys."

Danforth said that his early friends hadn't gotten senioritis and he just uses the same preventative measures that they used." "Some classes don't apply themselves, and bad things happened to them. Homer (Jordan) had some bad times, but he kept his head up. I've had some bad times, too, but it doesn't do any good to just sit around and feel sorry for yourself — you've got to get out there and make things happen.

Secondary Coach Don Denning said, "Kenny Danforth is the epitome of what patience, steady play, and the right attitude will do for a player. He plays with the enthusiasm of a sophomore. The way he has his mind set on playing strong safety was as big a pleasant surprise as I've had in 25 years of coaching."

Danforth is a red-shirt senior from Aiken. A high school teammate of William Perry, Danforth is one of five active players who played on the National Championship team in 1981. He made history by being the first Clemson football player ever to score a touchdown the first time he touched the ball in a varsity game and he has been making history ever since. The 22-yard interception return against Virginia was just one of many bright spots in a late-blooming career.

Danforth has made those things happen this year. In the first six games, he has made 45 total tackles, including a career high 12 tackles at Duke. Danforth picked off a pass against Virginia at the Tigers' Homecoming and returned the interception 10 yards. Furthermore, in that timespan, Danforth caused two fumbles and recovered one more. He has done that in a position that Denning considers the most difficult in the secondary.


"A strong safety needs quickness, toughness, and agility," said Denning, "but, above all, it takes the quickest mental and visual reaction. The strong safety must see the whole picture and adjust, or else he'll get burned."

Danforth said, "We go through the routines during the week. I try not to think too much about the actual game, but rather just keep my mind clear and concentrate on the actions. I start thinking about the game about Thursday night or Friday morning, that's when I get fired up. You can't get up too early. By the end of the week it is time to put your mind into it."

"Kenny is just a great guy and he works hard," said Denning. I feel comfortable when I look out on the field and see him playing, because I know that he's going to do what needs to be done. Coaching is a pleasure when you're coaching someone like that."

Off the field, Danforth is a friendly person with a smile that reminds football fans of Tony Dorsett. He's the same way on the field — if you're wearing Tiger paws. But, a warning to the opponent, Kenny Danforth likes a challenge. Whether the threat is on a pass or a fumble or a sack, whoever is up against Kenny Danforth is up against more than just a person, he is up against an ideal — an ideal to be the absolute best one can be.

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Every year the NCAA holds national meetings of its over 700 members to set policy and guidelines for the coming year. It is a forum by which member institutions trade ideas and experiences that will formulate the future of intercollegiate athletics. Many of the ideas that are proposed are the result of studies and brainstorming by the respective schools athletic councils. Clemson has one of the more active athletic councils in the south, and its decision making and policy formulating activity has had a direct impact on university life.

The Athletic Council is composed of 21 voting members and 10 non-voting ex officio members. Dr. B.J. Skelton, Clemson's faculty representative to the NCAA and the ACC, chairs the committee. Skelton is responsible for dissemination of the athletic rules and policy changes involving Clemson's governing bodies.

The Athletic Council administrates "institutional responsibility and control of intercollegiate athletics" and ensures accountability of the Athletic Department to the University as required by the constitution of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, the Atlantic Coast Conference, and Clemson University. The Council is also involved with recommending policy on intercollegiate athletics to the University President through the Vice President of Student Affairs. But, the key objective of the Council is to ensure that Clemson University complies with the rules and regulations conferred by the NCAA and the ACC.

The 31-member Council is currently in the process of conducting their NCAA required self-study report. Ex officio Council member and Athletic Director Bobby Robinson, outlined the requirements of this report. "NCAA-member schools are required to conduct a selfstudy of its intercollegiate athletics program at least once every five years. The subjects that we must cover include: institutional purpose and athletic philosophy, the authority of the chief executive officer in personnel and financial affairs, athletics organization and administration, finances, personnel, sports programs, recruiting policies, services for student-athletes and student-athlete profiles."

But, the Council's duties are not entirely focused upon NCAA legislation. On September 18, 1985, the Council announced its intentions to apportion a percentage of athletic revenues generated by the football and men's basketball teams to an academic scholarship and fund. The university will place 10 percent of all football and basketball television revenues and 10 percent of all net revenues from postseason play in the school's Athletic Academic Endowment Fund, which supports academic scholarships.

Interim University President Walter T. Cox announced, "This should add between \$200,000 and \$300,000 to the fund this year. But, the exact amount will depend upon how many of our games are televised in the 1985-86 season and on whether we are invited to participate in any post-season bowls or tournaments."

The income from the Endowment provides academic scholarships for

students who are not intercollegiate athletes. The recipients are selected by the university's Scholarships and Awards Committee.

Secretary of the Athletic Council, Dr. James A. Turner of the university's accounting department stated that Bobby Robinson deserves much of the credit for the plan. "Bobby was a key person in developing and recommending this concept. Bobby's efforts have led to one of the most significant steps we've taken to boost our academic scholarship fund in quite a while," said Turner.

Every student, faculty member and administrator has a stake in the success of the university's programs. Under this plan, when the athletic program does well the academic program benefits, also.

"I think this is a great concept," Robinson said. "This is a way to use the successes that we have in athletics to help meet one of the unversity's most pressing academic needs. It fits right in with our overall philosophy that the athletic program is here to complement and support the academic program."

Victory Peal C Symbolic of Clemson's Progress













If the Tigers win the game today, listen for the Victory Peal resounding over the campus in celebration.

In June, the first six bells of a proposed 47-bell carillon were installed in Tillman Tower, where they chime the hour and play the Victory Peal, the first four notes of the Westminster Chime.

The peal, which will ring at graduation and other campus celebrations, is symbolic of the progress Clemson University has made in the past year. For example:

• Students, faculty and staff found a new best friend with LUIS, a computerized library system that allows them to check the status of library holdings from anywhere on campus.

• After a successful fund raiser in Washington, D.C., groundbreaking ceremonies from the Strom Thurmond Institute were set for fall 1985, with Vice President George Bush scheduled to attend.

• With the addition of two new microscopes, Clemson's \$1.6 million electron microscope lab became one of the best of its kind in the country, allowing users to magnify images more than 300,000 times.

• In competition with 152 other college units from across the country, the Air Force ROTC detachment marched away with the No. 1 ranking in the nation.

 Helene M. Riley became the first female department head at Clemson when she was named head of the department of languages.

• The South Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station dedicated its new \$4 million Pee Dee Research and Education Center near Florence, and construction began on the new \$9.5 million chemistry building behind Sirrine Hall.

• Under a program approved by the state Commission on Higher Education, Clemson became the only institution in the state to offer a Ph.D. in computer engineering.

• In May, the university conferred 1,492 degrees — including the first Ph.D. in forestry — to the largest graduating class in Clemson's history.



This has been a special year in the life of Walter Cox. Fifty years ago he enrolled at Clemson as a freshman after graduating from Belton (SC) High School. It is fitting that in his golden jubilee academic year with the University that he has become interim president of Clemson University.

Cox has served Clemson over the last five decades in a number of capacities on the academic side and the athletic side of life, and Clemson has become a lot better place because of his presence. Cox received his bachelor of science degree in June of 1939, then remained for another year to pursue graduate work. In February of 1940 he began his association with the University as a full-time employee as he became a line coach on Frank Howard's first team. He held the assistant coaching position until 1950. During this period he also served as the head baseball coach and as athletic ticket manager.

Cox gained his knowledge on the gridiron from Jess Neely and Frank Howard, two Hall of Fame Head Coaches. Cox played on the Clemson varsity football team between 1937 and 1939 and was an all-state selection in 1939. He was a member of Clemson's first bowl team, an eleven

that downed Boston College in the 1940 Cotton Bowl. Cox earned three letters in football and the team had a 20-6-2 record during his career.

In 1942 Cox was called into the Armed Forces and served with the rank of lieutenant in the Fiji Islands, New Caledonia and Guadalcanal with the 147th infantry Regiment of the 37th Division.

In 1950 Cox moved on to the other side of campus as he brought his excellent administrative dexterity and knowledge to university administration. Between 1950 and 1955 he served as Director of Public Relations and Alumni Affairs and as an assistant to the vice president.


In 1955 he moved up to the position of Vice President for Student Affairs and Dean of Students, a position he had held the last 30 years until his most recent appointment on July 2. He has had a stellar career as University Vice President and has directed many programs that have benefited the overall quality of life at Clemson University.

During his three decades as Clemson's first vice president for student affairs and dean of students, Walter Cox guided the campus through a population explosion from 2,700 students in 1955 to more than 12,500 today, a span of years that includes such milestones in the University's development as the enrollment of women and the peaceful desegregation of the institution. Under his leadership the programs and functions of the student affairs division have steadily expanded and improved to meet the changing and increasing needs of this dynamic student body.


Through the offices and departments of admissions and registration, student life, student health services, the University Union, housing, intramurals, intercollegiate athletics, bands, student financial aid, counseling and career services, university canteens, and the bookstore, the student affairs division that Cox has assembled performs essential student services to support and complement Clemson's academic mission. It provides students with special opportunities for intellectual, moral, cultural, spiritual and physical growth.

The success of the comprehensive and progressive approach Cox took as vice president for student affairs is evident in such services as the Counseling and Career Planning Center, which provides individual counseling and group programs on topics ranging from academic and personal concerns to time management and assertiveness training; the University Union. through which students devise, produce and participate in more than 800 varied activities each year; and Fike Recreation Center, a half-million-dollar complex of modern intramural sports and physical training facilities.

Walter Cox has an illustrious and honored history at Clemson University. He is one of only a handful of graduates to be selected to the Clemson Athletic Hall of Fame and to also win the Clemson Medallion (1984) and the Distinguished Alumni Award (1963). He has truly run out of awards to win, but he still has the motivation to climb more mountains as an active university president. After 50 years of serving a university, most alumni retire to private life. Not Walter Cox, he serves his university from the highest level.

Athletic Director Bobby Robinson

Few Athletic Directors in the country have moved up the ladder as fast as Bobby Robinson. This past March the 39-year-old native of Columbia culminated a 12-year steady progression up the administrative steps to the position of Clemson Athletic Director. He succeeded Bill McLellan on Friday, March 8, 1985.

Robinson came to Clemson in 1970, not in athletics, but in the housing office. After three years he moved across campus to serve as an administrative assistant in the athletic department. "I started at Clemson in the housing office, but I came to Clemson to work in athletics," said Robinson. "No opening existed at the time so I had to wait until one opened up."

After serving the athletic department in every imaginable manner, he became business manager in 1975. Two years later he was named assistant athletic director and in 1980 he became associate AD. He held that title four years, but his responsibility moved to an area of strength in regard to the football and basketball programs in 1982.

While serving his administrative duties

with vigor, he also coached the Clemson golf team between 1975 and 1983. During his time as the head coach Clemson won its only ACC title in golf and three times the Tigers participated in the NCAA tournament. In 1983, his final season as the head coach, he guided Clemson to a numberfive national finish. Clarence Rose was one of three All-Americans to play for the Tigers during his tenure. Rose is now a successful member of the pro tour.

Thus, it is easy to see why Bobby Robinson is most qualified for the position of athletic director at Clemson University—he has done it all. He has been an administrator at all levels, he has worked in other areas in the University, he has been a head coach and he has handled the budgetary aspects needed to run an 8.5 million dollar program.

Robinson has done everything in the Clemson athletic department, but he concedes there is a big change between associate athletic director and athletic director. "I no longer can just look at what we could do in a situation, it has changed to 'what will we do'. The area of facilities is

something I will be more involved in also. We have some of the best facilities in the nation and we want to continue to rank favorably in that area." Robinson already has formulated a 10-year plan for facilities as he has a keen interest in all sports at Clemson. Changes in the soccer facility and tennis facility are planned for the next few years.

All of these factors have allowed him to come to grips with what is necessary to be a leader of a national program such as the one at Clemson. "Our philosophy will always be the same. We're going to be as good as we can be and give our coaches and athletes the opportunity to compete and be successful. That is the primary goal from an athletic point of view.

"From the University point of view, we have to be as good as we can be, yet operate within the rules and be a force within this University. As long as we are within the University structure, we do report to people and we are not different from anybody else—we can be a very positive factor for this University. Our importance is no bigger than that of the English or math department."

Robinson has confidence in his staff, his athletes and the facilities at Clemson University. "We have a solid base in all areas and we are a very solvent athletic department. But, we need to get better, take everything that we have and broaden it. We can't stand still. We will look ahead within the framework of the University and work to expand our horizons. We want to be as good as we can be and be a vital part of this University and represent the State of South Carolina in a positive manner."

Robinson was born in Columbia and attended A.C. Flora High School. During his high school career he was a point guard for the basketball team and a third baseman in baseball. He also played a good bit of golf during his younger days and was a scratch golfer at one time. He did not play any high school sports as a senior because of a heat stroke suffered in the summer of 1963. He graduated from A.C. Flora in 1964 and enrolled at Furman.

Robinson graduated from Furman with a B.S. degree in business and political science in 1968. He was a member of the varsity golf team and was the president of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity chapter at Furman. He worked in his family's real estate business for two years after receiving his degree from Furman.

Clemson football fans owe Auburn some favors. Each of the first four football coaches in Clemson history came from Auburn, including John Heisman, the Hall-of-Fame Coach who laid the groundwork for the Clemson football tradition in the early years of this century.

In contemporary times, Clemson fans owe Auburn another favor, stemming from a friendship between Danny Ford and Pat Dye. Ford, Clemson's head coach since the 1978 Gator Bowl, was a player under Dye when the latter was an assistant coach under Bear Bryant at Alabama. The two became good friends and it was Dye who convinced Ford to pursue the coaching profession.

"Pat Dye and I were good friends when I was in my senior year in college and I was wondering what I was going to do with my life," said Ford. "Coach Dye was the one who pushed me to ask Coach Bryant about a graduate assistantship. He put me on the staff and I have been in coaching ever since." Clemson fans are certainly happy Ford entered the profession because he has brought a solid program to among the finest in the nation. Now in his seventh full season at Clemson, his record of 52-15-2 (.768) is the fourth best winning percentage in college football among active coaches.

In the last four seasons Clemson has a 37-6-2 ledger, the fourth best winning percentage in America. The class of '84 was the third winningest in ACC history in terms of winning percentage, and no ACC class in the 32-year history of the league ever won more games in a four-year period.

Ford has been a part of three ACC championship teams and one national championship team at Clemson. In 1978 he was offensive coordinator for the 11-1 team that won the Gator Bowl over Ohio State, 17-15. The Gadsden, AL native was more than just the offensive coordinator in that game however, as he had become the head coach of the Tigers on December 10 after Charley Pell had already left to go to Florida. The 30-year-old Ford made quite a cel-

ebrated beginning to his head coaching career with that victory over the Woody Hayes coached Buckeyes. The nationally televised Clemson victory helped put the Tigers on the national football map and it began Clemson's climb to among the elite of college football.

In 1981 Ford became the youngest coach in the history of the game to win the National Championship. At the age of 33, Ford surprised the college football world by taking the unranked Tigers to three wins over top 10 teams and a perfect 12-0 record. Clemson handed Herschel Walker the only regular-season loss of his Georgia career, downed North Carolina in Chapel Hill in the only showdown of top 10 teams in ACC history, then defeated former champion Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.

That obviously is the highmark of Ford's brief, but eventful career at Clemson as he was named national Coach-of-the-Year by UPI, the College Football Writers of America, the Walter Camp Foundation and the Football Coaches of America.

A review of Ford's football past should help us understand why he has been so successful as a head coach. Another in a long line of former Bear Bryant players that have gone on to greatness in coaching, Ford played for the Bear between 1967 and 1969. He was Kenny Stabler's sophomore tight end as a starter in 1967, played that position in 1968 and moved to offensive tackle in 1969. Ford started all three years, was all-conference in 1969 and played on three teams that went to bowl games. In 1969 he was also a member of the All-SEC academic team, and served as the captain of the Alabama team.

After Dye's coaxing. Ford remained at Alabama as a graduate assistant for the 1970 and 1971 seasons. He had already earned his B.S. degree in industrial arts and earned his master's degree in special education in 1971. Ford became a full-time aide for Bryant in 1972 and 1973. The Tide went to four bowl games while Ford was an assistant coach.

Clemson's current head man then accepted a position as an assistant coach under Jimmy Sharpe at Virginia Tech. He remained in Blacksburg for three seasons (1974-76) before coming to Clemson as offensive line coach in 1977. And, just 23 games later he was named head coach of the Tigers at the age of 30, the youngest active division I coach in the country.

Few people climb to the top five of their profession by the age of 37. Pat Dye gave Danny Ford some sound advice back in 1969 and Clemson fans are glad he took it.

Assistant Coaches



Miles Aldridge is the newest member of the Tiger coaching staff, as he joined Clemson on June 28, 1985. The native of Kansas City, MO will coach the inside linebackers and recruit in the lower part of South Carolina. A 1971 graduate of Gardner Webb College,

he is in his 15th year of coaching. He began his collegiate coaching career at East Tennessee State, after which he moved to Wichita State, Tulsa, and then Mississippi. His most recent stint before Clemson was at Duke, where he served as linebacker coach for two seasons.



lina. The Mooresville, N.C., native earned his B.A. in secondary education from Clemson in 1975.

Lawson Holland was a reserve quarterback for the Tigers from 1970-73, which makes him the only current coach who played Clemson football. In his seventh year, Holland is in charge of receivers and recruiting Virginia, Washington, D.C., and central North Caro-



Nelson Stokley has been the Tigers' offensive coordinator for the past five years. He came to Clemson on January 18, 1980 after serving as offensive coordinator for Virginia Tech. The 1968 graduate of LSU was the school's starting quarterback from

1965-67 and then served the fine southern institution as an assistant coach from 1968-75. Stokley still holds many LSU passing records and he was the SEC Sophomore of the Year in 1965.



Don Denning is in his fifth season with the Clemson staff. The deep secondary coach and north Georgia recruiter joined the Tigers on July 1, 1981. He has previously served Westem Carolina as defensive coordinator and assistant athletic director, Memphis State as

assistant head coach, and Delta State University as head coach. Denning graduated from Presbyterian College in 1960 and received a master's degree from Westem Carolina in 1969.



physical education degree. He then received a masters degree in health, leisure and sports from the University of West Florida in 1977.

Woody McCorvey is in his third year of coaching the tight ends. He came to Clemson from Alabama A&M where he was the defensive coordinator for four years. The 1972 Alabama State graduate lettered four years in football at the school before earning his



Larry Van Der Heyden has coached some fine offensive linemen during his six years at Clemson and is a major reason why the Tigers' ground game has been so successful. The offensive line coach joined the staff on January 5, 1979 from Memphis State

where he was offensive coordinator for three years. He has also served stints at lowa State, Drake, Indiana State, East Carolina and Virginia. He earned his B.A. and masters degrees at Iowa State and lettered three years in football and baseball.



Tom Harper, the Tigers' assistant head coach, came to Clemson from Virginia Tech's coaching staff on Feb. 2, 1981. The native of Piqua, OH served as the defensive coordinator for Virginia Tech, North Carolina, Iowa State and Wake Forest, where he was head coach

in 1972. Harper graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1955 and received his master's degree at the same school in 1958. Nine of his former players have signed pro contracts in the last four years.



Chuck Reedy has coached Clemson's running backs for the last seven years. The St. Augustine, FL., native also recruits for the Tigers in southeast South Carolina, south Georgia and Florida. He earned two letters in football from Appalachian State where he gradu-

ated in 1971 with a degree in health and physical education. He came to Clemson from Kentucky on July 5, 1978.



Tommy West coaches the defensive and bandit ends and also recruits middle and south Georgia for the Tigers. He is in his fourth year at Clemson, he came from Appalachian State University on July 10, 1982. The Gainesville, GA, native earned his B.S. de-

gree in health education from the University of Tennessee in 1975 after lettering three years in football and baseball for the Volunteers. A fine all-around athlete, he was drafted out of high school by baseball's Chicago Cubs. 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
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


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

For the sixth time in the last seven years the Clemson all-around sports program has been ranked in the top 15 in the nation. The survey, conducted by the Knoxville Journal, takes into account national rankings in selected sports. Women's sports are not included in this poll, which has been in existence since 1971.

This poll is a good index of Clemson's athletic success in recent years. Clemson first made the top 20 in 1975-76 with a number-20 finish. The Tigers had four top five finishes between 1980 and 1983, one of only two schools in the nation to do that during this time period.

The 1984-85 academic year was another outstanding season for Clemson sports as nine teams were ranked in the top 30 of their respective sports. Five male sports teams and four female sports teams were in the top 30, highlighted by the soccer team's national championship. Three other individuals were lauded as national champions as Richard Matuszewski and Brandon Walters won the NCAA indoor doubles national title, while Tim Krebs won the 1500 meters at the NCAA indoor track meet in Syracuse, NY.

The Clemson University Athletic Department provides the following for your safety and emergency medical needs:

- Advanced cardiac life-support stations in four locations. (North stands, Upper North deck, South stands, Upper South deck.) These units are staffed with skill-care nurses, physicians, cardiologists, internists, paramedics, and EMTs.
- Mobile units of EMT's and paramedics are strategically located throughout the entire stadium.
- Ambulances with life-support equipment are available in North stand and South stand areas and have prearranged routes for evacuation to local hospitals.
 - Learn to recognize these personnel and facilities.

WHAT TO DO IF EMERGENCIES ARISE

Please step back and give the organized stadium EMS personnel room to work. Well-intentioned attempts to help by untrained persons interferes with the efficiency of the EMS system. If you have basic or advanced training in specific life-support methods, make your qualifications known and offer your help. Untrained personnel can be frequently more harmful than helpful.

MEDICAL ADVICE FOR FANS


If you have a pre-existing medical or health problem, please check with your personal physician and obtain his advice before attending games. Many emergencies occuring at the stadium do so because of prior existing conditions. Use common sense in dressing, eating, drinking and physical exertion. Be certain that you have identification on you as to the diagnosis and what medications you are currently taking.

Be aware of warning signs of heart attacks: chest pain, chest tightness, shortness of breath, sweating, palpitations, fainting, nausea and vomiting.

Recognize that our most common serious medical problem at football games are heart attacks and allergic reactions to insect stings. Be aware that insect stings will continue to always be very frequent at outdoor sporting events and should always be treated with immediate ice until advice can be obtained. If you have ever had a reaction to bee or other insect sting, check with your personal physician as to whether you should carry a kit.

IPTAY, in its 52nd year as Clemson's athletic scholarship fund-raising club has continued on its long and successful journey. From a modest beginning in 1934 with only 162 members, IPTAY has grown to include 20,000 loyal Tiger supporters. IPTAY, "I-Pay-Thirty-A-Year," is recognized as the number-one group of its kind in the country

During the 1984-85 academic year, IPTAY continued to grow and expand with the addition of three features. The IPTAY Athletic Academic Endowment was established during the fall of 1984 for recruiting scholarships for academics. The basic principle behind the endowment is that money donated by matching gift companies is earmarked for a separate scholarship just for academics.

IPTAY also introduced the Tiger Life program in late 1984. With Tiger Life, the Clemson IPTAY Club is the owner and beneficiary of a whole life insurance policy on a participant's life. The contributor makes comparatively small annual gifts for a maximum of eight years. Contributions go directly to Clemson University Tiger Life and all donations to Clemson and IPTAY are, of course, tax deductible. With this program, the member creates a sizable capital asset without impinging on the funds destined for his family. In effect, it creates a \$100,000 endowment fund in the contributor's name.

During the past year IPTAY also adopted the *Orange and White* as the official publication of IPTAY. The *Orange and White*, which is published weekly from mid-August to March and monthly during April, June and July, began exclusive distribution to 20,000 IPTAY members in early September.

Listed above are just three features that IPTAY has implemented in order to continually attain new heights of success. But, the determining factor that has allowed IPTAY to flourish for over 50 years, is the undying dedication of its members.

The reason is people—people who are committed to a successful program at Clemson University, both on and off the field. Professors, athletes, administrators, managers, trainers, alumni, and friends all play a part in this success. The results which have been produced are something Clemson people can all be proud of in this search for excellence at Clemson University

The on-going search for excellence in the academic area at Clemson University has resulted in the awarding of the 1984 Fulbright Scholarship for graduates to study overseas to six of six Clemson applicants. In addition, a Guggenheim Scholarship was awarded to another Clemson graduate. Of the 320 valedictorians in South Carolina 120 were accepted to Clemson



University Furthermore, a building program is being instituted on campus that will include a new chemistry building, as well as the expansion of several other departments.

That search for excellence is further exemplified by the efforts of the 20,000 IPTAY members who contributed \$118,000 more in 1984 than the year before. These monies enabled over 440 athletes, managers, and trainers to receive scholarship aid to attend Clemson.

These athletes also have the strong commitment to excellence that Clemson supporters both deserve and desire. The Tiger football team has the fourth best four-year record in college football. In December 1984, the soccer team became the school's second national champion by defeating defending champion Indiana. Soccer, men's cross country, women's cross country, men's tennis and women's tennis were all Top 20 teams, while the men's and women's tennis teams were conference champions. Swimming and wrestling enjoyed their best seasons ever. There were 19 All-Americans and 60 all-conference performers competing for Clemson, in addition to six athletes that took part in the Olympics. There is no doubt that Clemson athletics enjoyed one of its best years ever

IPTAY certainly was a major reason for these accomplishments. But, what is IPTAY other than scholarships? And how has Clemson University benefited from these 51 years of service? The

Clemson IPTAY Club has a board of directors led by President Lawrence Starkey. Vice President Jim Patterson, and Secretary-Treasurer Eddie Dalton.

Under the direction of these men, the main purpose of IPTAY continues to be raising monies for athletic scholarships, and thanks to the foresight of athletic department officials and the support of the Board of Directors, many improvements have taken place on campus which are of benefit not only to athletes and fans of athletes, but to the academic area of the University as well.

Specific areas of improvement in recent years include installing lights on Riggs Field, building a new baseball facility (with lights that were added this spring); funding Tiger Band travel; donating over \$200,000 to the President's Fund, and developing the East Beach area enjoyed by all Clemson students.

The attitude of Clemson people, especially those associated with IPTAY, is "success is a journey, not a destination." The search for excellence continues at Clemson and, thanks to the continued support of 20,000 IPTAY supporters, the excellence in athletics will continue. As IPTAY continues its service to Clemson, one may only wonder what the future holds.

After 23 consecutive years of record-breaking support, there is no doubt that Clemson will remain number-one

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What if the Tigers made their famous run down the hill today wearing uniforms of red and black? Chances are you'd be puzzled and confused, wondering: "What in the heck is going on here?"

In fact, chances are you'd react somewhat differently if your team showed up in ANY other color than the usual "Clemson orange." Researchers in the science and psychology of color say you would be modifying your behavior to reflect the change in your team's color scheme.

Color. Can it really affect your mood and behavior?

Studies reported in *Science Digest*, seem to suggest that it may. For instance, bubble gum pink rooms have been used to calm delinquents and criminals in correctional institutions; some dental clinics use gradations of blue on their walls to ease patients' fears; and, according to some studies, when you look at warm hues — such as red, yellow and orange — your blood pressure rises, brain wave activity increases, respiration is faster and perspiration is greater.

Could it be that the bright orange you see all around you, besides merely serving as a symbol of Clemson's colors, has a tendency to excite your sensibilities?

"Perhaps," says Clemson environmental psychologist Jeff Burroughs. "There is something called the 'hueheat' hypothesis, which holds that warmer colors, such as yellow, orange and red, may heighten or arouse the senses."

The "saturation" or intensity of hue

may also affect your behavior, says Burroughs, citing a study performed on some test floor carpeting in an art museum. An electronic measuring device was installed under carpeting of two colors — chocolate brown and light beige. The study, he says, revealed more activity and movement in the more heavily saturated area of the chocolate brown carpet.

This saturation experiment may help explain why, when you go to buy Clemson memorabilia, you usually find a bright, vivid or highly saturated orange, rather than the true Clemson burnt orange. "The bright orange is definitely more eye-catching," says Burroughs.

Burroughs warns, however, against drawing firm conclusions about color research tests. "Such tests are interesting," he says, "but there are really too many variables to draw any real conclusions."

Still, color ranks as the number-one most influential factor when we go to make our purchases, whether they be Tiger paraphernalia, clothes or cars.

Frederick T. Simon, a Clemson color scientist in textiles, says, "Color is absolutely the first thing that influences your choice of an item. The image you project can depend in part on the colors you choose. If you want to project a dynamic image, you choose vivid colors."

Simon, a former director of the textile lab at the Good Housekeeping Institute in New York, says that it is you, the public, who decide color trends.

"Stylists determine what's available in color, then the public makes their choices from that."

The recent emphasis on color coordination in the fashion world and the exciting array of bold, vibrant colors we have to choose from reflect the mood of our nation, says Simon.

"With all the vibrant colors we're seeing now, you could say we're a rather happy, self-satisfied society."

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
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
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
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
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
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




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




























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
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
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As Danny Ford traveled the IPTAY banquet circuit last spring he told the captive audience of Clemson fans that he was most concerned about the Tigers' kicking game for 1985. Afterall, he had the best kicking combination in America in 1984 in Donald Igwebuike (placekicker) and Dale Hatcher (punter). Both were drafted into the NFL, and are now starters and bordering on stardom.

Ford told the audiences that he had recruited a lot of punters and placekickers, but none had decided to come to Clemson. It looked as if some walk-ons would have to handle the punting and the placekicking. Ford did not paint a pretty picture when it came to the Clemson specialty teams. The pessimism was taken as a challenge by one Clemson football player, however, and Clemson fans are glad he did.

"All last spring I listened to the coaches say how they were recruiting a punter, but that they could not sign one," said Andy Newell, Clemson's punter for 1985. "Everyone talked as if they were going to let me do it because we had no one else. I took that as a challenge and wanted to prove myself to them and my teammates."

Newell had punted twice in 1984 as Dale Hatcher's backup. He had a 51yard average for the two punts, but two punts does not make an experienced punter, not in front of 81,000 people, or a national TV audience. The native of Hemingway, SC came to Clemson in the fall of 1983 as a junior college transfer from Spartanburg Methodist. Newell played baseball at the JUCO up the road, but the school does not even field a football team.

"I played football for three years in high school and some smaller schools recruited me," said Newell. "I had family go to Clemson and that is where I wanted to go, but after some initial recruiting Clemson did not show much interest in me. So I went to Spartanburg to play baseball. But, I knew I would end up at Clemson sooner or later and I had planned to walk-on the football team.

"When I got to Clemson I went to see coach (Don) Wade. He gave me all the papers to fill out, but he told me, 'you know Dale Hatcher is still on the team don't you.'" Not one to be discouraged and a person who certainly is a fine



planner, Newell knew exactly what the situation was going to be like.

"I knew Dale Hatcher was a great punter and that I would not beat him out, but I figured I could red-shirt a year, then be his backup and then hopefully start. So far that is exactly what has happened."

Through five games Newell had a 41.0-yard average, the best figure in the conference. At one time this year he was 31st in the nation in punting and he had averaged over 41 yards a boot in three of the first five games. He and placekicker David Treadwell have surprised even head coach Danny Ford.

"I'm almost afraid to say anything about the way Newell has punted, I might jinx him," said Ford. "I am afraid to brag on him because of that, but obviously we are very happy with the way Andy has punted this season. He has come up with some outstanding punts under pressure."

Another coach who has been involved with Newell's punting career is now affiliated with Clemson's chief rival. The summer before Newell's junior year of high school he attended a football camp at South Carolina. Harold White, currently South Carolina's academic adviser, but then in charge of the Gamecock's kicking game, convinced Newell to work on his punting. "I had been working on placekicking and other areas, but coach White thought I had a future as a punter so I went back to Hemingway and worked on it."

Pressure seems to be a watchword for Newell because it motivates him. His best game of the year might have been against Georgia in a nationally televised contest. He had seven boots for a 43-yard average in front of the CBS cameras. Another pressure packed game was the Virginia Tech thriller, his first as a starter. Newell responded with a 41.3 yard average.

"I guess you could say I do much better under pressure. It is strange, but I punt better in games when I am punting from inside our 20 or from the endzone. But, in practice I don't do well at all from there. In a couple of preseason scrimmages I did not do a very good job at all (33-yard average in the last scrimmage), but when it came time for the first game I did well."

One of the reasons he has done well is that he followed the advice of his mentor, Dale Hatcher. Instead of foolishly being wrapped up with trying to beat him out when he first came to Clemson, Newell took advice from the current Los Angeles Ram, and it has helped. "I learned how to drop the ball from Dale," said Newell, who was leading the ACC in punting five weeks into the season. "I used to grab it at the bottom with my thumb at the top of the ball. Dale taught me to hold it from the top and drop it. It is very important to be comfortable and that technique is best for me.'

It has been a style that has been effective as Newell is technically sound. He has had only two punts blocked in his career at any level, ironically present teammate Lawrence Brunson is the only person to block a Newell punt. "We played against each other in high school and he blocked both of them, but fortunately we still won the game.

"I don't ever think about having a punt blocked, I just concentrate on the ball and my drop and getting a good 40-yard punt with no return."

Clemson is certainly getting a large return from Andy Newell this season. Tiger coaches have changed their tune of six months ago when they felt the kicking game would be an area of weakness. A player who won a job by the process of elimination is now one of the most reliable pressure players on the team.







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

Today Clemson and N.C. State will do battle in the fifth annual Textile Bowl game. Not only are these two schools known in the athletic community, but also in the textile industry, as both schools possess renowned schools of textiles and make solid contributions that are felt in the textile world.

Just like a machine weaves together yarn to make a fabric, so has the orange machine of Clemson woven together some impressive wins to manufacture a successful day, October 26, in Clemson football.

1901—Eighty-four years ago today Clemson displayed an unusual combination of speed and power and rolled up five touchdowns enroute to a 29-5 win over Georgia in Athens. E.J. Decosta scored four touchdowns, while Bill Snead a right tackle on this 1901 squad, scored the other. This game saw the Tigers hold out three of their best players in preparation for the Virginia Tech game five days later.

1916—Five-thousand onlookers witnessed an excellent show of offense by Clemson as the Tigers defeated arch-rival South Carolina 27-0 at the annual South Carolina State Fair. Clemson's scoring assault began when C.S. (Dopey) Major pitched the ball to Stumpy Banks, who dashed for 25 yards and a touchdown. In the third quarter, Major scored for the Tigers after a 20-yard sprint to the end zone. He also was responsible for another Tiger score when he tossed the ball to F.L. (Fish) Witsell who fell into the endzone.

1922—Eight thousand spectators received their money's worth and more as Clemson won a thriller at the expense of South Carolina, 3-0. If at first you don't succeed, try, try again was the rule rather than the exception in the Tigers' effort to score.

Late in the fourth quarter, Clemson, on a series of passes, worked the ball deep into Carolina territory. On second down, with the ball resting close to the Carolina goal line, Charley Robinson of Clemson attempted a field goal but it was blocked. After a mad

scramble Robinson recovered the ball for the Tigers. On third down, Robinson dropped back to the 20-yard-line and drop kicked the ball through the goal posts for three points to give the underdog Tigers a 3-0 win.

1939—Clemson, without the services of its' stalwart, Banks Mc-Fadden, defeated Navy 15-7 before 20,000 spectators. McFadden did not make the trip because of an infected foot that came as a result of a bruise he received when breaking in a new pair of football cleats.

Clemson drew blood first when Navy runningback Monty Whitehead was driven back in the Navy endzone and tackled for a safety to give the Tigers a 2-0 lead. A few minutes later the Tigers' Charlie Timmons went off tackle for 11 yards where he found himself in the grasp of some Navy defenders. Timmons then lateraled to Shad Bryant, who dropped in behind excellent blocking to score the touchdown. In the third quarter, current Clemson president, Walter Cox intercepted a Navy pass to set up another touchdown march.

1963—Across our nation, many college presidents are very loyal and dedicated to their respected colleges and universities and are willing to give a helping hand when called upon. Former Clemson President Dr. Robert C. Edwards gave a new meaning to the word loyal, as he served as the spotter for the Clemson radio network at the Virginia game 22 years ago.

Clemson was suffering through a 0-4-1 start and for several weeks, Edwards had been asking sports information director Bob Bradley and others what he could do to help get the Tigers on track. At Charlottesville, VA, the Clemson Radio Network needed someone to spot for play-by-play announcer Jimmy Coggins and color broadcaster Ed Osborne. Dr. Edwards wanted to do it. This must have changed the Tigers' luck as Clemson rolled over the Cavaliers 35-0 to give the Tigers their first win of the season. After the game he was offered the regular fee for spotting by Coggins.

"No Jimmy," said Dr. Edwards. "I don't want the money. Those 35 points were good enough for me."

1974—Clemson and Tennessee both can testify that football is a game of inches and close plays as the winning points in this game came as a result of a last second desparation play that was inches from becomming a sack or an incomplete pass.

With Clemson leading 28-21 the Volunteer's Stanley Morgan scored from eight yards out to make the score 28-27, with 1:13 left in the game. Tennessee decided to go for the two-point conversion and the win. Quarterback Condredge Holloway dropped back to throw. He was chased back to the 22 vard-line and was headed for a sack when he threw the ball toward the endzone. The ball went sailing into the air inches over the 5-10 body of Clemson's Jim Ness, into the hands of the 6-4 Larry Sievers. The extra height advantage made the difference in the pass completion, and the Volunteers pulled out a 29-28 win.

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
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On a hot muggy August day in 1934 within the town of Clemson, Dr. Rupert H. Fike wrote a letter to Clemson football coach Jess Neely which began, "Coach last night we had a little meeting at our house and organized the IPTAY Club (I Pay Ten A Year)." Since that "dog day" in 1934, IPTAY has revamped its name to I Pay Thirty A Year and become one of the largest athletic scholarship clubs in America. Two years ago, the IPTAY Board of Directors decided to widen their scope to enable Clemson loyalist the opportunity to make significant contributions to Clemson Athletics through eight affordable annual payments.

If only Dr. Fike could see how many individuals have benefited from his creation of the IPTAY program, he would be proud.

The TIGER LIFE PROGRAM is Clemson's deferred giving program which was launched in 1984. The program is based on contributing to Clemson athletics through whole life insurance policies. Bert Henderson, associate executive secretary of IPTAY says of the young program, "TIGER LIFE gives a family the opportunity to make a sizable commitment much earlier in life than might otherwise be possible. The donor and the family can enjoy all the benefits of participating in TIGER LIFE while we in the Clemson athletic department can show our full appreciation." With this type of a policy, TIGER LIFE will insure sound financial footing for the athletic department in the future.

"With TIGER LIFE, members are able to create a sizable gift for Clemson without putting undue pressure on the family budget," states Henderson. "With this, the annual contributions will be credited to an individual's total cumulative giving records."

The cumulative giving total will be used for assigning ACC basketball tickets, bowl game tickets and away football game ticket opportunities. All TIGER LIFE members will have their name engraved on the TIGER LIFE wall display in Jervey Athletic Center.

Effective July 1, 1985 the IPTAY Board decided to enable the first 200 people that join TIGER LIFE the privilege to pass on their ticket priority to a designated heir.

There has been in excess of \$2,000,000 assigned to the Clemson Athletic Endowment through the TI-GER LIFE PROGRAM thus far. "We have just created a \$250,000 policy to go along with our \$50,000 and \$100,000 policies," Henderson said. "Also an inquiry has been made concerning a \$1,000,000 policy which we hope to be able to announce soon."

The TIGER LIFE funds are deposited to an endowment so that the money will be available to the Athletic Department as needed in future years to meet annual budget requirements. With the rising cost of funding athletic programs the TIGER LIFE PRO- GRAM enables the member to know that the future of Clemson athletics is secure and will be able to field competitive teams in all the non-revenue producing sports and meet all requirements of Title IX.

Provident Mutual Insurance Company was selected as the underwriter for the TIGER LIFE PROGRAM. They have created this unique structure of the policy strictly for charitable giving and are being used widely by other universities. The policy has the ability for Clemson University to receive cash flow each year so that the premium is paid to help cover expenditures.

"We're still trying hard to maintain the highest standards which our founders started," Henderson said. "We believe that someday TIGER LIFE will experience the same success as IPTAY."



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


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
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


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
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Coach Annie Tribble begins her 10th year of service at Tigertown with perhaps her youngest group of cagers to date. And, she has the formidable task of merging five veterans with seven newcomers in time to challenge one of Clemson's most ambitious schedules ever.

"I don't really want to say youth will be a weakness for us this year," the 10th year head coach said, "but I don't see how we can get around the youth factor, because it is a fact that we will have so many underclassmen. I feel real good about this year's recruiting class. We haven't played yet, but I think from all that I've seen, this is a quality class, and I'm real excited. By far, it is the best recruiting class on paper we've ever had."

Tribble does not have the luxury of working with many game-tested veterans as only five players return from last year's 18-9 club. Two seniors, two juniors, two sophomores, and six freshmen comprise the 1985-86 roster.

A particularly awesome task for the coaching staff will be to find replacements for departed graduates Sandy Bishop and Peggy Caple. Caple left her mark in the record books as only the second Lady Tiger ever to score over 1,000 points and 1,000 rebounds, while Bishop, who played for the Tigers only two years, was the club's outstanding defensive player, top rebounder, second leading scorer and second-team All-ACC selection in 1984-85.

Tribble's reconstruction job will center around a couple of seasoned veterans in seniors Janet Knight and Melinda Ashworth. Knight, an All-ACC performer and certain all-star candidate, is one of only five returning Division I players who averaged 20 points or more while shooting 50 percent from the field and 80 percent from the free throw line in 1985. Ashworth, the team's most improved player last year, will be a viable candidate to earn allconference honors at the shooting guard slot, where she averaged 13.6 points and 4.1 rebounds.

Cheryl Nix, a 5-7 sophomore, was last year's Lady Tiger Rookie-of-the-Year as she played in every game, contributing 51 points or a basket an appearance. She will be used at the point or the wing and gives Clemson a definite plus defensively.

Nickey Lynch is the only transfer on this year's team as she joins the Tigers after a stellar career at Anderson Junior College. The 5-9 junior averaged 18 points an outing and the coaches are hoping she will give the Tigers immediate help. A talented trio of rookies, Becky Hollaway, Ramona O'Neal and Elizabeth Drew, is expected to bolster Clemson's attack in the backcourt. The 5-9 Drew is coming off arthroscopic knee surgery last summer but should be ready by the season opener, Nov. 25.

Hollaway, a 5-7 freshman from Lilburn, GA, is an excellent passer and shooter as evidenced by her 22 points and 6.5 assist average an outing. O'Neal is a 5-8 rookie from Dublin, GA and is a great defensive player.

In the frontcourt junior Julie Larson returns with the most experience in the pivot as she has played in 53 games and has a career average of 7.8 points. The 6-3 Sumter, SC, native has a career field goal percentage of .532. Sophomore Tracy Korbutt is back for her second season following an injury-plagued rookie campaign. Although the 6-1 center saw action in 19 of the 27 games a year ago, her playing time was limited due to an assortment of injuries.

Clemson will have as many new people in the frontcourt as the backcourt, as freshmen Louise Greenwood, Karen Ann Jenkins and Jena Barnett have joined the Tiger contingency. Greenwood, a 6-3 center from Aiken, SC, averaged 26 points and 14 rebounds and six blocked shots per game as a prepster. She is a very versatile athlete as she was named to three South Carolina state all-star teams — volleyball, basketball and softball.

Jenkins was the state Player-of-the-Year in South Carolina and the MVP of her conference and the state tournament last year. She scored 30.9 points and 26.7 rebounds per game as a senior. She should provide ample depth in the frontcourt as well as on the wing.

Barnett, who at 5-11 played center in high school, was a **Street & Smith** honorable mention All-American. She averaged 28 points per game and scored over 2800 points in her prep career.

A member of the Clemson Class of '43, Gallman earned his degree in Textiles Engineering and serves as the Vice President in charge of manufacturing at the M. Lowenstein Corporation in Lyman. Timmerman is the current president of the Sirrine Foundation. A member of the Clemson Class of '41, Timmerman earned his degree in Textiles Chemistry and now lives in Aiken. Ms. Solesby recently earned the title of South Carolina Manufacturing Association Employee-of-the-Year.

During the pregame show, both schools will be recognized as Gallman will present a \$1,000 scholarship check to Ryan Amacher, Dean of the Clemson University College of Commerce and Industry, to which the School of Textiles belongs. Ed Schrum, president of the North Carolina Textiles Manufacturers Association, will present a like check to Dame Hamby, Dean of the North Carolina State University School of Textiles.

Tiger Band will offer its rendition of "You're

A Grand Ole Flag" and "America The Beautiful" to continue the pregame show. These selections will be directed by Dr. Richard E. Goodstein and accompanied by the Clemson University Chorus. Dr. Bruce F. Cook will then direct Tiger Band's playing of our national anthem, followed by the Clemson University Alma Mater, directed by William W. Campbell. The invocation will be offered by the Reverend Steve Plonk of the University Lutheran Church, and the colors will be presented by an ensemble from Pershing Rifles, Company C-4, Kerry Graham, Color Guard Commander. The opening salute to the textiles will conclude as Clemson makes its famous run down the hill.

The North Carolina State University Wolfpack Marching Band, under the direction of Dr. Frank Hammond, will open today's halftime show. Following their presentation, Tiger Band will then perform with appreciation to the textiles industry by presenting their halftime show, "Crafted With Pride In The USA." Fans may be reminded of last summer's Victory Tour when Tiger Band opens with the Jacksons' hit "Torture," arranged by Dr. James Sochinski of Virginia Tech.

"Trooper Salute," a song dedicated to the troopers of Wyoming, will continue the show. The number was arranged by Jay Bocook, and Barry Reese arranged the percussion. The final number of Tiger Band's halftime show features the percussion section and was arranged by two Clemson students. Stachelek, 21, should be a leading contender for ACC Swimmer-ofthe-Year during the 1985-86 season. He was a threetime individual ACC champion last year, as he captured the 50 (20.7), the 100 (44.7) and 200

freestyle events (1:38.6). Stachelek's performance helped the Tigers to a secondplace finish at the meet and a finish of 26th in the country. Clemson's top returning sprinter has been a finalist in the conference meet each of his three years and was a 1984 and 1985 NCAA qualifier. Schuler, 20, is one of four juniors on Coach Wayne Norris' much-improved volleyball team. By mid-season the Lady Tiger volleyball team had equalled their win total of a year ago and Schuler had played a key

Clark, 19, is a sophomore on Coach Larry Penley's Tiger golf team. The Waterloo, IA product will always be remembered for his record-setting 63 in the second round of the '85 ACC tournament

at Greensboro. The round, which included seven birds and an eagle, set the all-time ACC tournament record by three shots, broke the Clemson mark of 64 set in 1981 by Tony Nimmer. He was one of two freshmen to break into the starting lineup and is one of only four Tiger freshmen linksters ever to play in the NCAA tournament. In the fall, Clark won the Riverbend Intercollegiate in a playoff. He is a former Iowa 4-A state high school champion and he finished in the top 10 in the national PGA junior tournament in 1984. The 5-11, 160pounder is pursuing a degree in administrative management.



Melinda Ashworth Anderson, SC

Ashworth, 21, is one of two seniors on Coach Annie Tribble's 10th Lady Tiger basketball team. The 5-7 guard has been a regular starter her first three seasons but is coming off her finest year. In 1984-85

she was the Tigers' third leading scorer (13.6) and assist specialist (100) and fourth best rebounder (4.1). She more than doubled her point production a year ago and now ranks 15th among Clemson's all-time scorers with 611 points. For her outstanding year Ashworth was named the Lady Tigers' most improved performer. Heading into her final campaign, Ashworth has an opportunity to add to her 342 career assist total, which already has her among the top five career leaders. She is the former Melinda Hall and is the only married member of the '85-86 team as she became the bride of Mark Ashworth in July of 1984. Born 12-10-63, Ashworth is wrapping up her final year of studies in recreation and parks administration.

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Dick Landgren Louisville, KY

Landgren, 20, is a junior midfielder for Coach I.M. Ibriham's defending national champion soccer team. A walk-on in 1983, Landgren quickly proved his worth as he has been a starter in 93 percent of the games season this fall, he

he's played in. By mid-season this fall, he had started every game and was the Tigers' third leading scorer with 15 points on 5 goals and 5 assists. He is well ahead of exceeding his single season high of 21 points attained in 1984, a mark which made him Clemson's fifth-leading scorer and placed him in the ACC's top 20 in overall scoring. During Clemson's champi-onship season, the 5-11, 160-pounder had game-winning goals against Davidson, Tampa and UCLA in the national semifinals. Landgren lists Louisville, KY as his home, but he grew up in Europe, where he was a member of the Swedish Junior National team and was selected to the Stockholm All-Star team and played on the Swedish National Championship team. A liberal arts major, Landgren was born 12-14-64 in Jarfalla, Stockholm (Sweden).



Lisa Bobby Clifton, NJ

Bobby, 21, is the only senior on Coach Andy Johnston's Lady Tiger tennis team. Since arriving in Tigertown in 1983, Bobby has helped Clemson to three straight ACC team titles, two NCAA tournament ap-

pearances, and three top 20 finishes. Along the way, Bobby collected one ACC singles crown and a pair of doubles titles, including joining Pam Menne to capture the number-one doubles flight in 1985. In Bobby's three-year tenure at Clemson, the Lady Tigers have gone 73-34 in overall matches and 19-1 against ACC competition. Bobby was a double ACC winner her rookie year, as she triumphed the numberfour singles flight and teamed with Jody Trucks to claim the number-two doubles title. That year the Lady Tigers wound up ranked seventh in the nation after going 30-5 overall and undefeated in the ACC. Entering her final season with the Tigers, Bobby has a career singles record of 72-52, for a winning percentage of nearly 60 percent. Born 8-3-64, Bobby is a recreation and parks administration major.



If one wasn't wearing the right color of shoes, there was no use to come to the prom when Clemson and N. C. State played in Death Valley in 1967.

The Wolfpack had had a fabulous year, defeating their first eight opponents. After defeating Virginia in Charlottesville in the eighth game, Penn State and Clemson remained, both on the road.

Before the Nittany Lions game, there was talk that N. C. State had the Sugar Bowl wrapped up provided there was as much as a split in the last two games.

The 'Pack had become nationally famous in 1967 with their defense wearing white shoes. Every other football team in the nation, plus State's offensive team, was still wearing the black shoes.

Penn State came from behind late to down Coach Earle Edwards' State team, 13-8, but it was still heavily rumored that the Wolfpack would play in New Orleans New Year's Day if they beat Clemson and ended 9-1.

"Our team had heard about their white shoes," former Clemson coach Frank Howard recalls. "Our boys came to me the week of the game and wanted to paint our shoes orange. Herman McGee, our trainer, went down the street somewhere and got some brushes and some orange paint. Our boys sat around Friday afternoon and all of them painted their shoes orange. As it ended up, we had quite a game," Howard remembered.

A wind coming out of the west that day and termed by Howard as "probably the worst wind any team of mine ever played in" was to play a big part in the outcome of the game, although the Clemson players had their confidence in the orange shoes.

N. C. State had Gerald Warren, an outstanding field goal kicker, and two second-quarter three-pointers (37 and 47 yards) with the wind to his back gave the 'Pack a 6-0 halftime lead.

N. C. State had the option the second half and took the ball. "Naturally, we took the wind," Howard said. "The wind was so strong that when you kicked off, the ball would go out into the street. Kicking against the wind, a two-yard punt was a long punt.

"We kicked off to them and forced a punt. Their kicker (Jim) Donnan got off a real boomer (28 yards) and it put us in pretty good (field) position," Howard continued. "We (Jimmy Addison) threw a pass to (tailback) Buddy Gore and I think that was the only (scoring) pass Buddy Gore ever caught in his life. He kinda fought the ball. If someone handed it to him, he could run like the devil, but he wasn't a very good pass receiver."

Clemson went ahead 7-6 as Arthur Craig kicked the extra point. And after giving N. C. State another possession and holding, the Tigers got the ball back after a 24-yard Donnan punt at the 'Pack 43 and went in to score again and an eventual 14-6 win.

The Wolfpack did get knocked out of the Sugar Bowl bid by those two late-season losses to Penn State and Clemson. But they did receive a Liberty Bowl bid and defeated Georgia 14-7. Clemson ended up 6-4 by defeating South Carolina the following Saturday and the Tigers were Atlantic Coast Conference champions (6-0), but their four losses were to Georgia, Georgia Tech, Auburn and Alabama, all ranked teams at one time or another that year.

"I always had a lot of respect for Earle (Edwards)," Howard said. "He was kinda quiet, never did say much, but he was tough on that sideline. But after we beat them down here when he took the ball instead of the wind, I had to change his nickname." Howard's first moniker for Edwards was "Midnight." Howard said he tagged him with that name because when they would go to the coaches' convention at different places around the country, he'd never see Edwards until after midnight. "I don't know where he stayed the rest of the time, but he'd always show up in the lobby after midnight," Howard recalled.

However, when Edwards had the choice and took the ball, Howard thought "Westwind" would be a more appropriate name following that 1967 game.


Howard looked back on some of his battles with N. C. State recently and recalled just how tough some of them were. "He had some good teams up there (five outright or shared conference championships). I remember he had (Roman) Gabriel. But one thing about Gabriel, I don't believe he ever blew that horn when we were playing him. (Clemson shut out N. C. State 23-0 Gabriel's sophomore year and 20-0 his senior year. The two teams didn't play his junior year).

"People used to ask me what kind of defense we used and I told 'em it was just the same ole defense we'd always used. I told (Don) Chuy and some of those other linemen to just go get Gabriel's horn because I didn't want to hear it blow . . . and they did."



Clemson wore orange cleats when it upset N. C. State in 1967.


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
