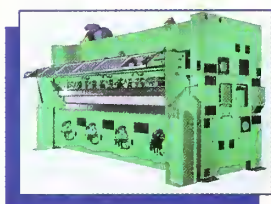

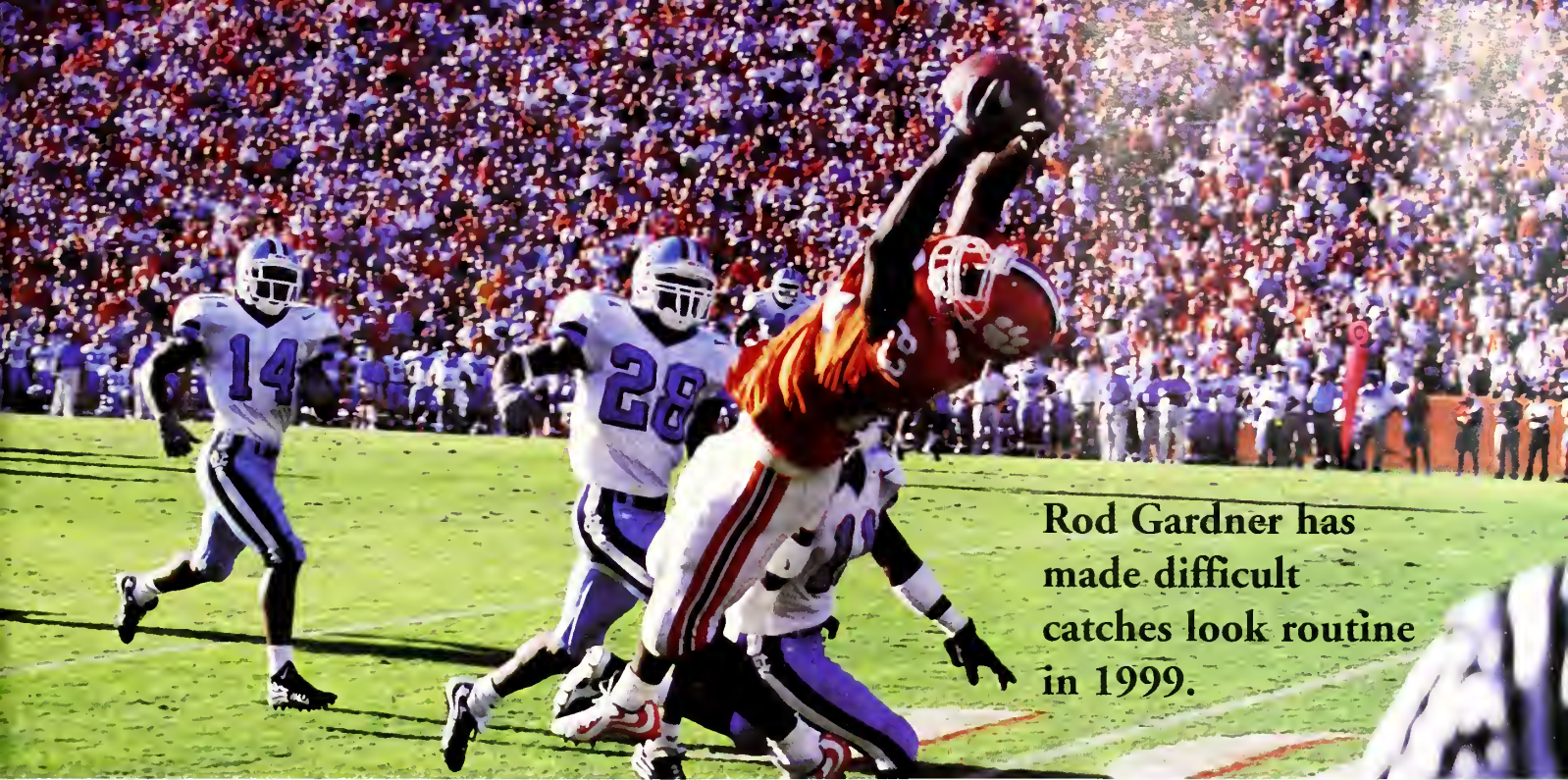

Clemson-Florida State Series

Florida State holds a 10-2 advantage in the series with Clemson dating back to a 38-13 Florida State win in Tallahassee in 1970. Both of Clemson's wins in the series took place in Tallahassee, in 1976 by a 15-12 score and in 1989 by a 34-23 count. Florida State is 5-0 at Clemson and Clemson is 2-5 at Florida State.

In four straight meetings between 1988 and 1993 both teams were ranked in the top 25. Both teams have been ranked in the top 25 in five of the last nine meetings. The Seminoles are ranked number-one heading into today's game, Clemson is unranked by AP or USA Today.

The three meetings between the two teams played between 1988 and 1992, were classics. In 1988, Florida State won at Clemson 24-21, thanks in part to the famous "puntrooskie play", and a 76-yard punt return by Deion Sanders. In 1989, Clemson defeated a Florida State team that ended the season ranked third in the final AP poll by a 34-23 score. That is the only loss by Florida State at home against a non-Florida team in the last 15 years.

In 1992, before over 84,000 fans and a nationally televised audience at Clemson, fifth-ranked Florida State defeated 15th-ranked Clemson 24-20 in Death Valley. Florida State scored the winning TD in the final two minutes of the contest behind the passing of Charlie Ward. Clemson did pick off four passes in the game, including one that James Trapp returned for a touchdown.

In recent years, Florida State has dominated Clemson with its defense in the games in Tallahassee, while Clemson has come very close to victory in the games at Clemson. The Seminoles have allowed Clemson to score just three points in Tallahassee over the last four contests. Clemson has scored 74 points in the last three meetings held at Clemson, including 28 in a 35-28 loss in 1997.

That 1997 game featured one of the greatest duals in the history of Death Valley. Tony Horne, who has returned a kickoff for a touchdown for the St. Louis Rams each of the last two weeks, gained 267 all-purpose yards in the game, while Florida State's Peter Warrick had 372 for the Seminoles, including a 90-yard punt return and an 80-yard pass reception. Horne's all-purpose running total is the second highest in Clemson history, while Warrick's total is the most ever against Clemson.

Highest Ranked Wins

A win for Clemson over top ranked Florida State would be the highest ranked win in Clemson history. The Tigers defeated fourth-ranked Georgia in 1981, 13-3 and that is the highest ranked team Clemson has beaten in Death Valley. The only other time Clemson has beaten the #4 ranked team in the nation also took place in 1981 when the Tigers defeated Nebraska in the Orange Bowl for the National Championship.

Regardless of site, Clemson has eight wins over top 10 teams in its history, three in Death Valley. Clemson played 10th ranked Virginia to a two-point game in Charlottesville last year. If they keep winning, the Tigers will play a top 10 Georgia Tech team in Atlanta on November 13th.

Clemson has had 19 wins over top 25 teams since 1986 and has had least one ranked win in 12 of the last 14 seasons (including this season). The Tigers defeated Virginia, 33-14, earlier this year when the Cavs were ranked 19th (USA Today).

Clemson has never beaten the number-one ranked team in football. This is just the fourth time Clemson has met the number-one team in football and the Tigers are 0-3 in the previous meetings. Clemson first played the nation's top team in the 1959 Sugar Bowl, a 7-0 loss to LSU. Clemson lost at number-one Florida State in 1993, 57-0. The Seminoles were also ranked number-one prior to the 1995 game at Clemson, a 45-26 Florida State victory at Death Valley.

Thus, this will be just the second time in history that the number-one ranked team has come to Clemson. It is also just the second time that the number-one ranked team has played in Death Valley. Even though Clemson won the National Championship in 1981, Clemson never played a game that season as the number-one team.

Clemson Has 24 Wins over Hall of Fame Coaches

The opponent this Saturday is Florida State, coached by future Hall of Fame Coach Bobby Bowden. Clemson has 24 wins and one tie against coaches currently in the College Football Hall of Fame, regardless of site of the game. Bowden is not in the Hall of Fame yet, but he certainly will go in soon after his retirement, along with current coach Joe Paterno of Penn State, who Clemson defeated in the 1988 Citrus Bowl. George Welsh is another current coach who should be in the Hall of Fame some day. Clemson has 12 wins over the current Virginia coach. Clemson will have another shot at a future Hall of Fame Coach when the Tigers meet South Carolina and Coach Lou Holtz in the final game of the regular season.

Bowden vs. Bowden

As everyone knows by now, when Florida State's Bobby Bowden and Clemson's Tommy Bowden take the field Saturday night to coach their respective teams, it will be the first competition of father and son in NCAA Division I history. If that isn't enough, Bobby Bowden will be going for his 300th career victory against his son. Bobby Bowden defeated Clemson 35-28 in 1997 for his 200th victory at Florida State. Bowden is 4-0 against Clemson in Death Valley, the only opposing coach with a perfect record in Memorial Stadium, given a minimum of three games played.

The first meeting between father and son in Division I history was suppose to take place in Tallahassee this year on September 2 when Auburn was scheduled to play Florida State. When that game was scheduled, Terry Bowden was the coach of those Tigers. But, Terry's tenure at Auburn ended at midseason last year and the game was subsequently cancelled by Auburn. When Tommy Bowden came to Clemson last December, it set up another Bowden vs. Bowden, one that will take place every year since Clemson and Florida State are in the same conference.

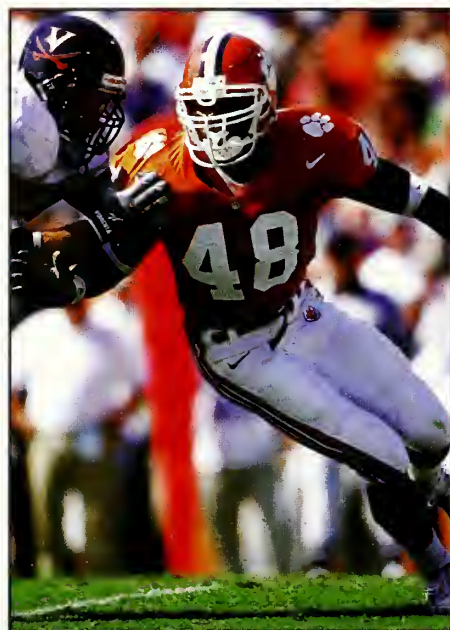
This will not be the first time Bowden's have faced each other across the field, however. In 1991, Auburn, with assistant coach Tommy Bowden, faced Southern Mississippi, with assistant coach Jeff Bowden. Southern Mississippi upset Auburn that day.

There are more and more opportunities for a father and son coaching matchup down the road. In addition to all the Bowden's, Florida Coach Steve Spurrier's son is now in the profession as an assistant coach at Oklahoma. R.C. Slocum, head coach at Texas A&M, has a son, Shawn, who is a Southern Cal assistant. Two prominent head coaches have sons that coach for them. Joe Paterno's son Jay is on his staff at Penn State, while Lou Holtz's son, Skip, is Lou's offensive coordinator at South Carolina.

Like Father Like Son?

*Florida State's record the two years prior to Bobby Bowden's arrival was 4-18. Tulane's record the two years prior to Tommy Bowden's arrival was 4-18.

*Bobby Bowden had Florida State in a bowl game, accumulated a double digit victory total, and a top 15 national ranking in his second year with the Seminoles. Tommy

Bowden had Tulane in a bowl game, accumulated a double digit victory total and a top 10 national ranking by his second season with the program.

*Father and son have both had perfect regular season records in the 1990s. Bobby Bowden's Florida State Seminoles were 11-0 in the 1996 regular season, while Tommy Bowden's Tulane team was 11-0 in 1998. Brother Terry Bowden was 11-0 as head coach at Auburn in 1993.

*Both Coaches won at least two-thirds of their games after their first two years as a Division I Head Coach. Bobby Bowden was 15-7 after two years at West Virginia and Tommy Bowden was 18-4 after two years as a Division I head coach.

*Bobby Bowden has won 80 percent of his games as Florida State head coach (226-53-4). Tommy Bowden has won 75 percent of his games as a Division I head coach (21-7).

*Both Bowdens experienced just one conference loss between 1997-98.

*Tommy Bowden coached under his father as a graduate assistant at Florida State in 1978-79, then between 1981-83 as tight ends coach. Bowden also played for his father at West Virginia between 1973-75.

*In recording an 11-win regular season in 1998, Bobby Bowden's Florida State team outscored the opposition by 20.6 points per game. In recording an 11-win regular season in 1998, Tommy Bowden's Tulane team outscored the opposition by 21.0 points per game.

Clemson-Florida State Connections

There are many connections between Clemson and Florida State in terms of coaching and administrative personnel:

*Clemson wide receivers coach Rick Stockstill was Florida State's quarterback between 1979-81. He passed for 1356 yards as a senior in 1981 and was a two-year starter for FSU. He quarterbacked the 1980 team to an Orange Bowl berth. He has been an assistant coach at Clemson since 1989 and is the only assistant coach in Clemson history to serve under four different head coaches.

*Clemson defensive coordinator coach Reggie Herring played for Florida State between 1977-80. He is a member of the Florida State Athletic Hall of Fame and earned AP All-America honors in 1980. He played in three bowl games in his four years with the Seminoles.

*Clemson Assistant Head Coach and tight ends coach Brad Scott served as offensive coordinator of Florida State's National Championship team of 1993. He served as an assistant with the Florida State program from 1983-93. He was offensive coordinator from 1990-93. He has a master's degree from Florida State in athletic administration, a degree he earned in 1984.

*Clemson Head Coach Tommy Bowden was a graduate assistant at Florida State in 1978 and 1979, then served as tight ends coach of the Seminoles in 1981-82-83.

*Clemson defensive backs coach Jack Hines was a graduate assistant at Florida State in 1985-86. He is married to Robyn Bowden, one of Bobby Bowden's daughters. Hines played for Bowden at West Virginia in 1970 and 1971.

*Florida State defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews served in the same capacity for Clemson between 1976-80 and held the assistant head coach title under Danny Ford in 1980.

*Former Clemson Head Trainer Fred Hoover is a 1953 Florida State graduate who was the head trainer at Florida State in 1952-53 and 1957-58. He saw his streak of 450 straight Clemson games worked end last Saturday when he was unable to make the trip to Maryland. He served his 400th game at Clemson when the Tigers faced Florida State in 1995.

*Clemson punter Ryan Romano has two relatives who played for Florida State. His father, John, was a reserve running back in the 1960s at Florida State. Ryan's older brother Eric was a walk-on tight end on Bobby Bowden teams in the 1980s.

Tigers from Florida

Clemson has 11 players on its roster from the state of Florida. All 11 of the players are on scholarship, but just seven have played in a game this year. Jermyn Chester is out for the year with a knee injury, while Charles Harper and Kevin Youngblood are being red-shirted. Willie Simmons is a backup quarterback who could see action against Florida State.

Florida has obviously been a fertile recruiting area for Clemson over the years. This season, top receiver Rod Gardner is from Florida. Starting defensive back Alex Ardley, starting guard Theo Mougros and both starting kickers, Ryan Romano and Tony Lazzara, are from Florida.

Clemson Attendance Up

Clemson has averaged 75,948 fans for the first three home games of the 1999 season. That is up from an average of 68,312 last year. If Clemson can average at least 75,000 for the season it would be the highest average figure for a season since 1992 when Clemson had a 76,789 average.

The figure will go up when Clemson plays Florida State as a sellout crowd is anticipated. In fact, the record of 85,872 against South Carolina in 1994 could be eclipsed. Clemson drew 79,186 for the opener against Marshall, the third largest opening day crowd in Clemson history. The North Carolina game drew 81,737 and the Virginia game drew 66,922.

If 85,000 fans attend the Florida State game, Clemson would have an average of 78,211 through four games. Should 85,000 attend the Florida State game, Clemson would have to have just 62,155 attend the Duke game for Clemson to reach an average of 75,000 for the season.

Clemson's Improvement on Offense Significant

Clemson has made a significant improvement when it comes to offense this year. A comparison between the first six games of last year with the first six games of 1999 proves this point. Clemson has improved its touchdown total by 54 percent, its passing offense by 42.4 percent, its total offense by 33 percent, its first down total by 58 percent, and its scoring by 48 percent. What is especially interesting is that Clemson has done this with two different quarterbacks, Brandon Streeter, who started the first three games, and Woodrow Dantzler, who has played most of the last three contests. Both quarterbacks have thrived in this offense, as both have had games of at least 350 yards of total offense.

Clemson has been especially productive against its first four ACC teams. The Tigers have scored at least 30 points in each of its first four ACC games. This is the first time since the 1978 team that finished 11-1 had four straight ACC games of at least 30 points and that is the only team to accomplish that. Thus, this Clemson team is just the second Tiger team in history to score at least 30 points in four straight ACC games.

Here is a chart of the respective six-game totals that shows Clemson's improvement over last year:



Sophomore center Kyle Young has been the anchor on an offensive line that has helped the Clemson offense improve tremendously in 1999.

Adams Tied McGlockton's Sack Record

Inside linebacker Keith Adams has been a terror on defense so far. Nicknamed "The Termite" by Clemson defensive coordinator and linebacker coach Reggie Herring, Adams had five tackles for loss in the victory over North Carolina on October 2. Adams had two sacks and three other minus yardage plays, tying the record for a single game held by Michael Dean Perry against NC State in 1987 and by Steve Durham against Maryland in 1979.

It was an outstanding game by Adams, but outstanding has been the norm for the sophomore from College Park, GA. He now has 88 tackles this year to lead the team and the ACC, including 12 in the victory at Maryland. He had a streak of four straight games with at least 16 tackles broken in that game, but he still was at least tied for Clemson honors in terms of tackles. He had 16 stops and four tackles for loss against Virginia, then had a career high 17 and two tackles for loss against Virginia Tech.

Adams had at least one sack in each of the first five games this year, tying Chester McGlockton's record for consecutive games with a sack. McGlockton did it in 1989-90. Adams did not have a sack at Maryland, but he did have a tackle for loss and now has 18 for the year, best in the ACC.

Adams was honored by the league as ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week twice this year, the Virginia and North Carolina contests.

Adams Joining Linebacker Tradition

Clemson has a strong tradition of excellence at the linebacker position. The Tigers have seven former linebackers on NFL rosters this year, including Pro Bowl players Ed McDaniel (Minnesota) and Levon Kirkland (Pittsburgh) and 1997 first round draft choice Anthony Simmons (Seattle). Clemson also has had first round draft choice Wayne Simmons (1992 by Green Bay) in the 1990s and all-time great Jeff Davis, the captain of the National Championship team.

Current linebacker Keith Adams, only a sophomore, is striving to enhance that linebacker reputation by his play so far this season. He is on a pace to have the finest season in Clemson history for a linebacker, never mind just a sophomore. Through six games, Adams has 88 tackles, an average of 14.7 per game. That is just behind the 14.8 tackles per game by Anthony Simmons in 1996. Adams also has 18 tackles for loss and six sacks already this year. He is on pace to break the school record for tackles for loss and sacks, regardless of position or class.

The Clemson record for tackles for loss in a season is 27 by William Perry (1984) and Rob Bodine (1991). The sack record is 10.5 by Adrian Dingle, set last season. Adams is on a pace to record an incredible 33 tackles for loss and 11 sacks.

Florida State Update

Florida State tanks number-one in the nation entering this evening's game. The Seminoles are certainly no stranger to that lofty ranking, they have finished in the top four in the nation each of the last 12 years, the first team in NCAA history to do that. They should make it number-13 this year and it could be a second national championship for Coach Bobby Bowden.

Of course, Clemson would like to derail that aspiration. But, a loss by FSU would not necessarily end the Seminoles championship hopes. In 1993, Florida State lost at Notre Dame, 31-24, on November 13th, yet still won the championship.

Chris Weinke is the starting quarterback and one of many important players on this Florida State team. The junior has completed 127 of 224 passes this year for 1981 yards and 15 touchdowns. He is coming off a career high 354 yard passing performance in a 33-10 victory over Wake Forest last week. His passing efficiency rating of 150.4 is sixth best in the nation.

Peter Warrick leads Florida State in receiving with 36 for 508 yards and four touchdowns. Death Valley is the scene of Warrick's greatest game and the greatest all-around performance by any individual in the history of Death Valley. Two years ago in a seven-point FSU victory, Warrick had an incredible 372 yards of all-purpose running. The effort included a 90-yard punt return and an 80-yard pass reception. Ron Dugans is second on the team in receiving with 23 for 407 and a touchdown.

The rushing game is led by Travis Minor, a gifted all-around back with 540 yards in 110 attempts. He has scored five touchdowns. Nick Maddox is second on the club in rushing with 96 yards in 26 attempts. Florida State has been more balanced in terms of offense in previous years. Coach Bowden's team averages 305 yards passing and 141 yards rushing per game. But, with a 40-point scoring average, who cares how you get to the endzone.

Florida State has had 13 interceptions defensively, led by Derrick Gibson with three. Chris Hope and Tay

Cody and Sean Key all have two apiece. Florida State's secondary was ranked among the best in the nation by many services prior to the season.

Ranked second in the nation in field goal kicking this year with 17 in 21 attempts, Sebastian Janikowski has already scored 81 points this season. He was named the top kicker in the nation last year and should win the award again. Opponents have averaged just 16 yards per kickoff return this year on 11 attempts. In fact, the opposition gets to return kickoffs so infrequently that coaches have claimed they don't put much time into it prior to playing Florida State. It is virtually a waste of time.

Clemson Offense Gains 542 Yards at Maryland

Clemson's offense exploded for 542 yards of total offense in the 42-30 victory over Maryland last Saturday. It was a balanced attack, as Clemson gained 290 yards rushing and 252 yards passing, the second time this year Clemson has had at least 200 yards or each in a game. The rushing total of 290 yards was the most by a Clemson team since the Tigers gained 291 against NC State in 1996.

The 542 yards of total offense was also a landmark total, as it was the most by a Clemson team in seven years. The last time Clemson reached 500 yards in total offense was against UT Chattanooga in 1992, a 606-yard effort by Ken Hatfield's Tigers against the Southern Conference foe. It was Clemson's first 500-yard total offense game in an ACC game since 1991 when Clemson had 511 in a tie against Virginia. The 542 at Maryland last Saturday was also the most by the Tigers in an ACC game since 1984 in a win over Duke when the Tigers had 547.

The 542 yards at Maryland also ranked as the fourth highest total in history in a road game. Clemson had 615 at Georgia Tech in 1903 (all rushing), and had 563 in a 1981 win at Duke. Clemson had 550 at Wake Forest in 1978, but that is it for the other top total offense games on the road.

The second quarter was an offensive explosion for the Tigers. Clemson gained an incredible 245 yards total offense in that period and had 495 yards heading into the fourth quarter.

Clemson Near Record Pace Offensively

Clemson is on or near a record pace in terms of total offense through six games this year. The Tigers are averaging 395 yards of total offense so far and only two teams in Clemson history have been higher for the course of a season. The 1978 Clemson team quarterbacked by Steve Fuller and featuring future NFL players Jerry Butler, Dwight Clark, Joe Bostic, Jeff Bostic and Steve Kenney, holds the record with 427.8 yards per game. That is the only team in Clemson history to accumulate 5000 yards in a season. The 1991 Clemson team averaged 404 yards per game. Those are the only Tiger squads above the 395 per game mark of the Tigers of 1999.

In terms of passing yardage, Clemson is far ahead of the record pace. Clemson's 1997 team holds the record with 191.6 yards per game. So far this season, Clemson has averaged 256 yards per game through the air. This Clemson team averages 22.3 completions per game, ahead of the season record of 15.7 completions per game in 1997. This year's 64.1 percent completion percentage is also ahead of the 60.5 mark set by the 1997 Tiger team. Current Clemson quarterback Woodrow Dantzler was a first year freshman who red-shirted that season behind Nealon Greene and Brandon Streeter.

Zachery Has Five TDs last Two Games

While Travis Zachery will be the first to credit the improved blocking of Clemson's line, but quick offensive line, the sophomore from Georgia has done his part. In the last two weeks, Zachery has five touchdowns, two at NC State and three at Maryland. He now has seven for the year, more than the four touchdowns he had last year when he led all Clemson running backs in that area.

Zachery now averages 76.6 yards per game on the ground in his five games. He had 24 carries for 95 yards at Maryland. His longest run was 13 yards and he also had a pair of receptions for four yards. For the season Zachery has 12 catches for 127 yards. When he scored three touchdowns at Maryland he became the first Clemson running back to score three rushing touchdowns in a game since 1995 when Emory Smith rushed for four scores at Wake Forest.

Dantzler Dazzling against Maryland

Woodrow Dantzler had the game of his life, and the game of any Clemson quarterback's life at Maryland. The sophomore from Orangeburg, SC gained 435 yards of total offense in that game, breaking one of the oldest records in the Clemson media guide. The previous single game total offense best was 374 yards by Bobby Gage against Auburn in 1947. That was a 52-year-old mark.

Dantzler completed 16 of 23 passes for 252 yards and no interceptions or touchdowns. What was even more impressive was his running ability. Dantzler gained 183 yards rushing in 22 attempts, shattering Louis Solomon's Clemson record for rushing yards in a game by a quarterback. Solomon had 159 against Wake Forest in 1994 for the previous record.

Dantzler has completed 50 of 85 passes this season and his 137 passing efficiency figure ranks 21st in the nation, not bad for a backup quarterback. In two games as a starter, Dantzler has completed 39 of 64 passes for 536 yards with two touchdowns. He has also rushed the ball 36 times for 186 yards. For the year he has completed 50 of 85 passes.

Dantzler gained 213 yards of total offense, 131 passing and 82 on the ground against North Carolina in a relief effort when Brandon Streeter broke his collarbone. In three quarters he took the Tigers to 31 points against the Tar Heels. His performance included a 49-yard scoring pass to Rod Gardner and a 56-yard touchdown run. His total offense was the highest total by a Clemson player in relief since Dexter McCleon gained 229 as a reserve quarterback against Virginia in 1993.

President James Barker

James F. Barker, a Clemson University graduate and former dean of the university's College of Architecture, Arts and Humanities, was named Clemson's 14th president on October 4, and will take office officially in December.

Barker earned his bachelor of architecture degree from Clemson and his master of architecture and urban design degree from Washington University in St. Louis. Before coming to Clemson in 1986 to serve as dean of the College of Architecture, he was dean of the School of Architecture at Mississippi State University.

He is a recipient of the National Distinguished Professor Award of the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture and served as president of that association. Barker was named Fellow of the American Institute of Architects. He also has been a partner in an architectural practice.

At Clemson, Barker co-founded the S.C. Design Arts Partnership to support community design outreach projects, initiated the Charleston Architecture Center, and established the university's "Arts in April" program. In 1995, he became dean of the new College of Architecture, Arts and Humanities, which was created after a comprehensive reorganization and has received national attention as a new model in education.

During his interviews for the presidency, Barker outlined a 10-year vision for Clemson, which is to become one of the top 20 public universities in the country. Currently, **U.S. News & World Report** rankings have Clemson tied for 38th. Specifics of the 10-year plan include:

- Increasing funded research to \$100 million a year;
- Setting the standard in public service for all land-grant universities in the U.S. by engaging the whole campus in service and our reach, becoming much more focused and becoming very good in selected areas;
- Completing the current capital campaign and a subsequent one, exceeding goals in both;
- In athletics, winning another national championship in football and two other sports, and making it to the final four at least twice in basketball;
- Sending the University Chorus to perform at least once at Carnegie Hall;
- Establishing a thriving Phi Beta Kappa chapter;
- Seeing at least two Clemson students win Rhodes Scholarships;
- Continuing to excel in teaching.



"I have had the wonderful opportunity to visit 120 classes during the last few years as part of teacher evaluations in my college," he said. "I have a very good feel for what we're doing in the classroom, and I'm very proud of what we're doing. But we can never take good teaching for granted. We have to nurture it, encourage it, support faculty development, to make ourselves worthy of a university that has a top 20 ranking."

As for immediate priorities, Barker wants to focus significant attention on funding for the library, saying "a university can only be as good as its library." Other short-term goals will be contin-

uing to implement the recommendations of the Commission on the Future and increasing Clemson's international perspective, which he sees as aligning closely with South Carolina's economic development needs.

And then there's one major commitment: completing the class he is teaching this fall. "I think it's important that a president never lose touch with the classroom. I intend to complete my class. I owe it to my students. Whether I'll be teaching in the same way or not, I want to stay engaged in the classroom and in my own research as much as I can. I think that perspective is an important one to have," he said.

Expectations are that the Barker presidency will focus on the holistic education of students, a sense of community, developing our international activities, and inter-departmental collaboration. That has been his hallmark as dean, particularly after a comprehensive university restructuring created a new college. Faculty credit Barker with turning an organization of unrelated departments into a true college by finding common ground, creating platforms for collaboration, and communicating.

The Barkers — Jim and Marcia — have two sons: 15-year-old Britt, a freshman at Daniel High School, and Jacob, 25, who graduated from the University of North Carolina, attending on a baseball scholarship, and is now enrolled in Graduate School at Clemson.

Barker expects to take office officially in time to shake the hands of graduates at the December graduation. A national search will be held to find his successor as Dean of the College of Architecture, Arts and Humanities.

Head Coach Tommy Bowden

It hasn't taken long for Tommy Bowden to have an impact on the Clemson program. The combination of his 19 years of experience as an assistant coach, and his unconscionable two-year resume of accomplishments at Tulane has Clemson fans buzzing.

In the first six months since his December 2, 1998 appointment as Clemson's 23rd head coach there have been many testimonies to the excitement surrounding the Clemson program. First, executive suites at Memorial Stadium sold out by the end of February, the earliest sellout of the premium-priced, 100-suite, 3000-seat area in school history.

Second, the Spring Game attracted a record crowd of 16,500 on April 10th. The record crowds continued on the IPTAY meeting circuit in May. In Charleston, 500 people were expected to attend and 800 showed up. Season tickets are over 50,000, up nearly 5,000 over the previous year. On July 1, IPTAY membership reached a record 21,000 and IPTAY donations reached \$9.4 million for the first time ever.

An exciting style of play and an undefeated 1998 season certainly has a lot to do with the recruiting success and fan support for his Clemson program. As current Clemson sophomore quarterback Woodrow Dantzler put it, "The numbers they put up in two years at Tulane were amazing. It makes you gasp for air."

The numbers are truly breathtaking. Bowden inherited a Tulane program that had not been to a bowl game since 1987, had not

been ranked since 1979, had not finished a season in the top 20 since 1973, had not won a conference championship since 1949 and had not posted a perfect season since 1931. He reached all of those goals in just his second year as the Green Wave's head coach.

In the two seasons he was the head coach at Tulane, he took a team that had been 4-18 in the two years previous to his arrival, and emotionally and numerically reversed the team's fortunes with an 18-4 record, posted an 11-1 conference mark and finished the 1998 season ranked seventh in the nation by both polls. Tulane and Tennessee were the only undefeated teams in college football in 1998.

How did he accomplish so much in so little time? A major factor was the productive, thrilling offense that had fans and opposing defensive coordinators on the edge of their seats. His Tulane team had a 22-game average of 39.7 points, 5.1 touchdowns, 463 yards of total offense, 270.5 yards passing, and 192.6 yards rushing. The Green Wave averaged 6.34 yards per play, and converted on third down 47 percent of the time. His 22-game offensive averages would be Clemson all-time season records in 12 different categories.

Some say the most telling statistic in terms of wins and losses and the most telling statistic when it comes to coaching ability is turnover margin. The Green Wave ranked fifth in the nation in turnover margin each of his two seasons at Tulane.

It didn't take Bowden long to put Tulane back on the college football landscape. In his

first year, Tulane was picked last in the preseason polls of Conference USA. But, he led the New Orleans based school to a 7-4 record, a second-place conference standing with just one league loss, and set 33 school records in the process. The five-game improvement was second best in the nation for the 1997 season.

Tulane's accomplishments on offense were noteworthy in 1997, but their offensive charts reached uncharted areas in 1998. Tulane stood as the only school in the nation that averaged over 300 yards per game passing and 200 yards per game rushing. The team ranked fourth in the nation in total offense (507.1 per game) and second in scoring (45.4 points per game). They were 13th in passing and 23rd in rushing.

The Green Wave scored 40 or more points in eight contests last season, including each of the last seven games. In one game the Green Wave scored 72 points and rolled up 704 yards of total offense. They converted 52 percent of their third-down opportunities for the season and had just 11 turnovers in over 800 plays.

The 1998 season saw Tulane post a perfect 11-0 regular season under Bowden, its first perfect regular season since 1931. The Green Wave won Conference USA, its first league title since Tulane won the SEC in 1949.

Bowden's team ranked seventh in the final AP poll and was a mainstay in the polls beginning with the third week of the season. Tulane had not been ranked at any time since 1979 and had not been ranked in a final poll since

1973. After Bowden accepted the job at Clemson, Tulane defeated BYU in the Liberty Bowl, 41-27.

At season's end, Bowden was a finalist for the Bear Bryant Coach of the Year Award, and just about every other award afforded to Division I coaches. His 11-0 record was just the 17th perfect regular season in college football in the decade of the 1990s.

A look at that list reveals two other coaches named Bowden. His father, Florida State Head Coach Bobby Bowden, had a perfect regular season in 1996, while his brother, Terry, posted a perfect regular season in 1993. Obviously, The Bowdens are the first family of college coaching and this "Wonder Years" environment had a lot to do with Tommy Bowden's decision to enter the coaching world.

The fatherly influence of a college coach who is about to reach 300 career wins, also had an influence on other members of the family. Terry has been a head coach at Sanford and Auburn, posting a 45-20-2 record at the latter. Terry will serve as an in-studio commentator for ABC's college football package this year. Jeff Bowden is in his fifth year as wide receivers coach at Florida State.

Tommy Bowden began his college football experience as a walk-on wide receiver at West Virginia. He played for his father between 1973-75 and then for Frank Signetti during the 1976 season. As a junior he caught 15 passes for 189 yards and one score.

Bowden remained at West Virginia for the 1977 season and began his coaching career, serving as a graduate assistant on Signetti's staff. His interest in coaching only became more intense after that first year as a GA. His father then hired him as the secondary coach at Florida State for the 1978 season.

That experience confirmed to Bowden that he was in a profession that would be his life's work. The Seminoles posted a 19-4 mark in his two seasons at Florida State, incredibly similar to his 18-4 record in his first two years as a head coach at Tulane.

In 1980, Bowden joined the staff at East Carolina, where he coached for the Spring practice session of 1980. That spring, he moved to Auburn and served as the Tigers running backs coach for the 1980 season. Among the players he coached was James Brooks, who went on to a 13-year NFL career and is still second in Auburn history in rushing.

In 1981, Bowden returned to Tallahassee as the tight ends coach. In three more years at Florida State, the Seminoles posted a 23-12 mark and played in a pair of bowl games. The 1982 team ranked 13th in the final poll and claimed a 9-3 record and a Gator Bowl championship. In Tommy's five years as an assistant coach under Bobby Bowden at Florida State the Seminoles were 42-16.

In 1984, Bowden accepted his first job as a coordinator. He served under Steve Sloan at Duke as the Blue Devils quarterbacks coach



and offensive coordinator. It was as the Duke offensive coordinator that Bowden made his first trip to Death Valley as a coach. Among the players Bowden tutored was Anthony Dilweg, who went on to an NFL career.

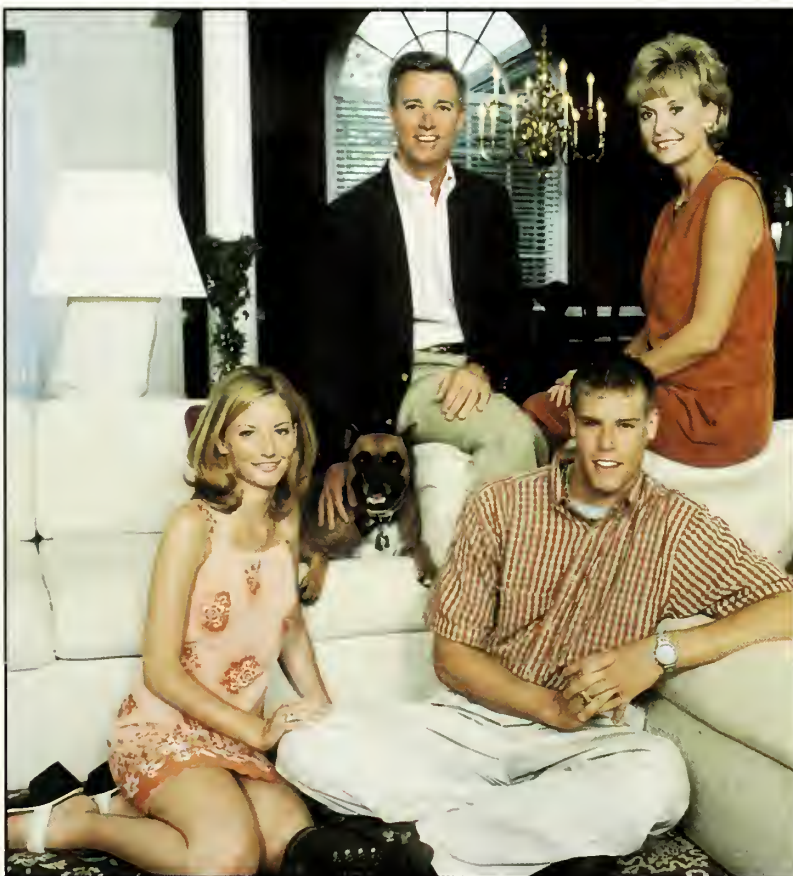
After three years at Duke, Bowden became the wide receivers coach at Alabama under Bill Curry. It was at Alabama that Bowden refined his offensive coaching prowess under noted offensive mind Homer Smith, then the Alabama Offensive Coordinator.

In 1990, Bowden returned to a coordinator position, serving Kentucky as its offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach. That season he helped the Wildcats to their first upper division SEC finish since 1984.

In 1991, Bowden joined Pat Dye at Auburn. He would remain with the SEC Tigers for six years, his longest stint as a college assistant coach. During his tenure, Auburn was a combined 46-20-2, including a perfect 11-0 season in 1993. Auburn had four Associated Press top 25 seasons, including a number-four ranking in 1993 and a number-nine in 1994. The Tigers were 20-1-1 in 1993-94 combined. Bowden served under his brother Terry Bowden for his last four years at Auburn and the Tigers had a 36-9-1 record with both Bowdens on the staff.

After 19 years as an assistant and nine address changes, Bowden's patience paid off with his selection as Tulane's head coach on December 11, 1996. With 18 wins, over 10,000 yards of offense, and nearly 50 school records later, he became the head coach at Clemson.

Born on July 10, 1954, in Birmingham, AL, Bowden is married to the former Linda Joan White, who he first met when the two were in school together at Morgantown High in West Virginia. The couple has two children, Ryan (17), a tight end on the Daniel High School team in Clemson, and Lauren (14) also a student at Daniel.

Stadium Information

SEASON TICKET HOLDERS/OTHER VISITORS: Season ticket holders and other visitors to the stadium are requested to enter Gates 1, 5, 9, 11, or 13. Persons with top deck tickets must enter the stadium via the ramps, which are located behind the North and South Stands. Ramp entrances are adjacent to Gates 1 and 13 on the South side and Gates 5 and 9 on the North side.

HANDICAPPED: Special entrances have been provided at Gates 1, 5 and 13 for the handicapped.

WILL-CALL: Will-call tickets can be picked up at the ticket office at Gate 9.

PASS-OUT HAND STAMPS: Pass-out hand stamps will be available at Gates 1, 5, 7, 9, 11, and 13 and the top decks. Any person leaving the stadium other than with a team pass must have his or her hands stamped, as well as admittance stub, to be readmitted to the stadium.

Gates 4, 6 and 8 are closed prior to the games and are opened for exit purposes only.

TELEPHONE: Pay telephones are located at the stadium ticket offices at Gates 1, 5, 9, 13, top decks.

PUBLIC ADDRESS SYSTEM: The public address system is intended primarily for spectators' information concerning the game. Please do not request the use of the public address system to make social contacts.

RESTROOMS: Ladies' and men's rest-rooms are located between the stands and can be reached by exit from portal.

LOST & FOUND: If any article is lost or found, please report it to the Gate 1 or Gate 10 information booths.

CONCESSION STANDS: Concession stands are located beneath all stands and can be reached from any portal.

PROHIBITED ITEMS: The following items are prohibited in Memorial Stadium: umbrellas, folding chairs, chaise lounges, food and beverage containers of any type, alcoholic beverages, thermos jugs, and ice chests.

NOTICE: Solicitation for any purpose is prohibited at an athletic contest in Clemson Memorial Stadium.

EMERGENCIES

First Aid stations are located at the following places: South Side—Under Section J; North Side—Under Section T; North Top Deck—Under Section K; South Top Deck—Under Section E.

Trained nurses are on hand during each game. Should a doctor be needed, ask any usher, who knows the seat location of doctors. Ambulances are located at Gates 1, 5, 8, and 13.

WHAT TO DO IF EMERGENCIES ARISE: Please step back and give the organized EMS personnel room to work. Well-intentioned attempts to help by untrained persons interfere with the efficiency of the EMS system.

Most emergencies occurring at the stadium result from pre-existing medical conditions. Bring your medical identification card or wear medical identification jewelry.

INSECT STINGS: Common at outdoor events. Treat immediately with ice and seek medical advice. If allergic, carry a kit from your physician with you.

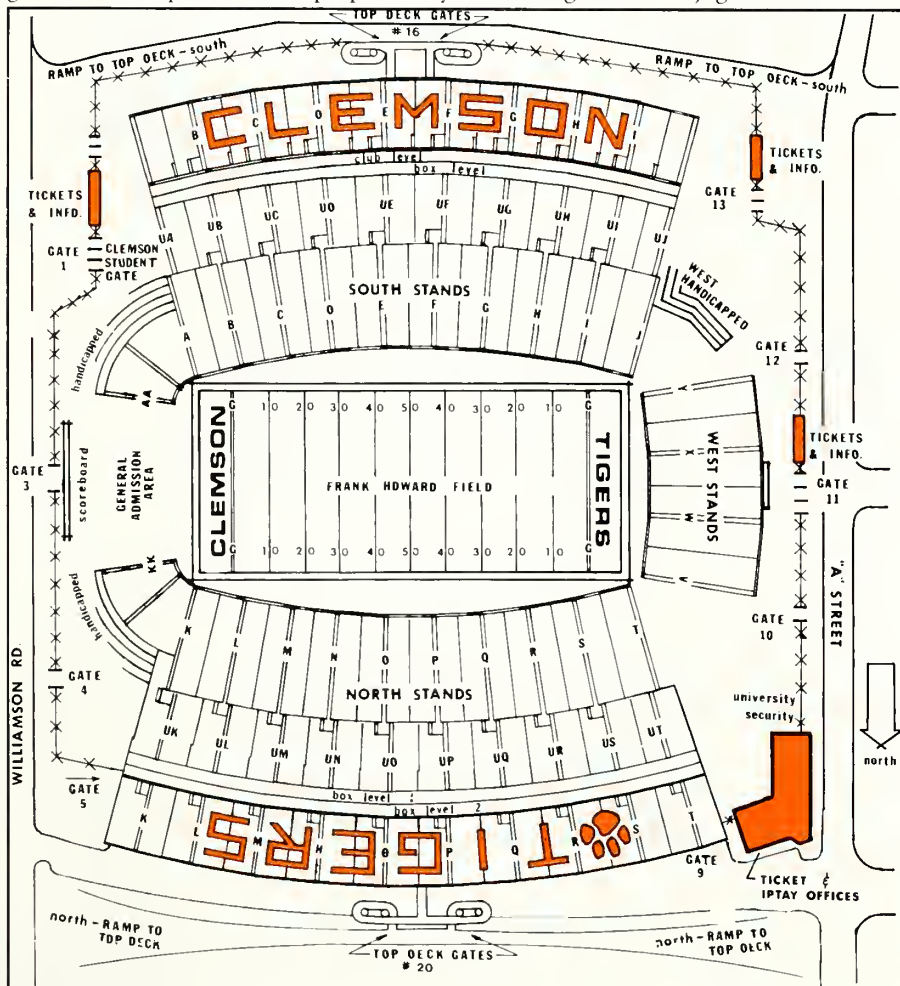
HOW TO RECOGNIZE A HEART ATTACK: The symptoms of a heart attack vary, but the usual warning signs are:

1. Uncomfortable pressure, fullness, squeezing or pain in the center of your chest lasting for two or more minutes.
2. Pain spreading to the shoulders, neck, jaw, arms, or back.
3. Dizziness, fainting, sweating, nausea, and/or shortness of breath.

EXPECT A DENIAL: Frequently heart attack victims deny they are having a heart attack. The event is frightening or they don't want the embarrassment of a false alarm. Therefore, they delay getting help by ignoring their symptoms or rationalizing, "It's just indigestion." New therapies have been developed that can minimize heart damage and save lives if treatment begins within the first few hours of symptom onset. "Time is muscle." Get help or get to a hospital immediately.

RUNNING DOWN

What has been described as, “the most exciting 25 seconds in college football from a color and pageantry standpoint,” actually started out as a matter-of-fact entrance, mainly because of necessity.

The first 20,000 seats in Clemson Memorial Stadium were built and ready for use before the 1942 season. Less than a year before Pearl Harbor was bombed and the United States was at war.

The shortest entry into the stadium was a walk down Williamson Road from Fike Field House’s dressing rooms to a gate at the top of the hill behind the east end zone. There were no dressing facilities in the west end zone—only a big clock where the hands turned, and a scoreboard, which was operated by hand.

The team would dress at Fike, walk down Williamson Road, come in the gate underneath where the big scoreboard now stands and jog down the hill for its warmup exercises. There was no fanfare, no cannon shot fired, no tiger paw flag, no Tiger Rag played...just the team making its entrance and lining up to do the side straddle hop.

That’s pretty much the way things went for the next 25 years.

Either in 1964 or 1965, S.C. Jones, a member of the Clemson class of 1919, made a trip to California. He stopped at a spot in Death Valley, CA, and picked up this white flint rock.

He presented it to Coach Frank Howard as being from Death Valley, CA, to Death Valley, South Carolina.”

The rock laid on the floor in Howard’s office in Fike for a year or more. One day Howard was cleaning up his office and he told Gene Willimon, who was the executive secretary of IPTAY, to, “take this rock and throw it over the fence, or out in the ditch...do something with it, but get it out of my office.”

Willimon didn’t think that was the way a rock should be treated. After all, it had been brought 3000 miles by a very sincere Tiger fan.

By the mid-sixties, Memorial Stadium was pretty well living up to its moniker, Death Valley, because of the number of victories that had been recorded there. Actually, the name was first used by the late Lonnie McMillian, head coach at Presbyterian College in Clinton in the 1940s.

McMillian and the other Blue Hose coaches before him used to open the season each year by coming to Clemson. Seldom scoring (24 shut outs in 39 games) and with only three wins and four ties to show for it, his teams were getting killed by the Tigers regularly. In 1948 McMillian made the comment to the press that he was taking his

team to play Clemson in Death Valley.

An occasional reference to Memorial Stadium by that name could be heard for the next three or four years, but when Howard started calling it 'Death Valley' in the 1950's, the name took off like wildfire. The Tigers celebrated the 50th season in the 'valley' in 1991.

But getting back to Howard's rock.

The rock was mounted on a pedestal at the top of the hill. It was unveiled September 24, 1966, on a day when Clemson played Virginia. The Tigers were down 18 points with 17 minutes to play and came back to win (40-35) on a 65-yard pass play

from Jimmy Addison to Jacky Jackson in the fourth period. That was quite a spectacular debut for that rock.

The team members started rubbing the rock prior to running down the hill September 23, 1967, a day when Clemson defeated Wake Forest, 23-6. Prior to running down the hill that day, Howard told his players: "If you're going to give me 110 percent, you can rub that rock. If you're not, keep your filthy hands off it." Howard told of the incident the next day on his Sunday television show and the story became legend.

When Hootie Ingram succeeded Howard

as head coach prior to the 1970 season, Ingram decided that the team would make its final entrance on the field out of the dressing room in the west end zone. In all home games in 1970 and 1971 and the first four of 1972 when the Tigers did not run down the hill, their record was 6-9. The team decided it wanted to come down the hill once prior to the South Carolina game in 1972. The result, in a cold, freezing rain, was a 7-6 victory when Jimmy Williamson knocked down a two-point conversion attempt which preserved the win.

The Tigers have made the entrance for every home game since 1942, except for the seasons mentioned above—268 times heading into the 1999 season.

After Clemson's final warm-up, the team goes back into its dressing room under the west end zone stands for final game instructions. About 10 minutes before kickoff the team boards two buses, rides around behind the north stands to the east end zone and debarks to the top of the hill behind Howard's Rock.

At the appointed time, the cannon booms and led by a high-flying tiger paw flag, the band forms two lines for the team to run between and strikes up 'Tiger Rag'...The frenzy starts in all sincerity...and usually lasts two and a half to three hours.

It is a tradition that has inspired Clemson players for many years.

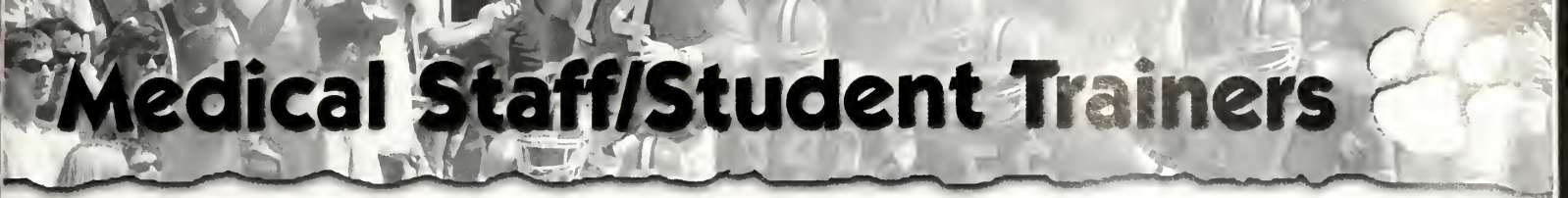

IPTAY is widely regarded nationally as the father of Athletic Fundraising. It all started in 1934 and from a private meeting of a small group of Clemson supporters has sprung into an organization that raised a record \$9.5 million last year. The organization plays a major role in ensuring that all 19 of the varsity sports at Clemson are given the maximum amount of scholarships offered by the NCAA.

The organization also has helped finance facilities that contribute to the well-being of student-athletes on and off the field. Vickery Hall is a 27,000 square foot facility that houses the tutoring and advising programs for student-athletes. It is a major reason Clemson student-athletes have had their highest cumulative GPA on record for five consecutive semesters.

While IPTAY is primarily concerned with athletic fundraising, the mission of Clemson University has not been overlooked. The IPTAY Academic Scholarship Endowment was created to help meet the need for more academic scholarships for non-athletes who are highly qualified academically. The IPTAY Academic Scholarship Fund is presently the largest scholarship endowment of its kind at Clemson, currently helping over 30 students at Clemson.

IPTAY Executive Director George Bennett has continued to keep Clemson among the best in the nation in terms of fund-raising by the establishment of the IPTAY Endowment Program. In April of 1994, he kicked off the beginning of the endowment of positions program at the 85th birthday celebration for former Clemson Coach Frank Howard. The endowments are secure with a \$100,000 donation paid over a five-year period.

"This is a chance to broaden the horizons of IPTAY," said Bennett. "It gives an individual or a group of people an opportunity to endow a position that meant something during their college days, or to honor a person at a position. The money being endowed is going to secure our future as the interest is used to carry on our program forever."

The first endowment was for the head football coach position to honor the legendary Frank Howard. Howard coached football at Clemson 39 years, 30 as the head coach. During his tenure the Tigers won 165 games, 100 of which were against conference foes. "Former players and friends of Coach Howard

made donations over the cost of attending the celebration program and that was enough for the endowment. Their gifts were a way of permanently thanking Coach Howard for all that he did for Clemson.

"Following Coach Howard's birthday party we began to look for an individual to help us support and promote the program and Bill Hudson's name came up. He was an outstanding player at Clemson who has been equally successful in the business world. We went to him and explained the program and its goals and that we were looking for his leadership to help get the program going, and he accepted."

Hudson, a 1956 graduate, was a three-year letter winner at tackle who played professionally for the Montreal Alouettes, the San Diego Chargers, and the Boston Patriots. He earned Pro Bowl honors in 1962. Mr. Hudson sees this program growing into a large part of Clemson's athletic funding. "When other people see information on the endowment program and learn what it is about, this program will grow. Success builds on success. People who are looking to honor a friend or family member now have a great means to do that."

Besides the Hudson's family endowment four other football endowments were made and one manager's position in the first year. Now there are over 70 positions endowed. The goal of the program is to get every position endowed. "From the free safety to the number-three player in women's tennis, we hope to have every position endowed," said Bennett.

"We will likely use the Avenue of Champions as a physical place to honor these people further for the positions they have endowed. That will have plenty of space, so we will be working to have as many endowments across all of our sports.

"The personal satisfaction that they helped Clemson University, specifically the Athletic department, and that they are securing its future are the main reasons for becoming involved."

And with more involvement Clemson will have a very secure future for generations to come.

Thomas Green Clemson believed that South Carolina needed an institution of higher education dedicated to science and agriculture. With his belief came the foundation that was laid for Clemson Agricultural College. On April 6, 1888, Thomas Clemson died, leaving most of his estate to the state of South Carolina with the purpose of establishing a college that would teach scientific agriculture and the mechanical arts to the young people of South Carolina.

The college formally opened its doors in 1893 with an enrollment of 446 students. As an all-male military school, the college quickly became recognized across the nation as an important part of the national system of state universities and land-grant colleges. In 1955 Clemson became a civilian co-educational college. As the school expanded its academic offerings and research pursuits, the state Legislature renamed the college Clemson University in 1964.

Today, Clemson is much more than Thomas Clemson could have ever envisioned. The campus is located on 1400 acres of beautiful rolling hills on what once was the plantation of former U.S. Vice-President John C. Calhoun. Memorial Stadium-Death Valley



Clemson Memorial Stadium has been held in high esteem for many years. Whether it be players from the 1940s and 1950s, opposing players from the 1970s and 1980s, or even professional players in the 1990s, the ambiance of this special setting is what college football is all about.

This year the storied edifice will add to its legend when the first meeting of father and son head coaches (Bowden Bowl I) takes place before a sell-out crowd of over 84,000 fans.

In the 1970s, 1980s and 1990s, various publications have named top 10 stadiums in college football and Clemson Memorial Stadium, affectionately known as "Death Valley," has been a common denominator on those lists.

The facility's mystique is derived from its many traditions, which date to its opening in 1942, the legendary games and players, and Clemson's corresponding rate of success. Clemson has won 199 games in the previous 57 years there (199-78-7) and has won over 70 percent of the contests. Twenty-eight times since 1983, crowds have exceeded 80,000.

The stadium has definitely been good to the Tigers who call it home, but the stadium was constructed against the advice of at least one Clemson coach. Just before head coach Jess Neely left for Rice University after the 1939 season, he gave Clemson a message. "Don't ever let them talk you into building a big stadium," he said. "Put about 10,000 seats behind the Y.M.C.A. That's all you'll ever need".

Instead of following Coach Neely's advice, however, Clemson officials decided to build the new stadium in a valley on the western part of campus. The place would take some clearing-there were many trees, but luckily there were no hedges.

The crews went to work: clearing, cutting, pour-

ing, and forming. Finally, on September 19, 1942, Clemson Memorial Stadium opened with the Tiger football team thrashing Presbyterian College, 32-13. Those 20,000 seats installed for Opening Day would soon grow; and grow and grow. This year Clemson celebrates its 58th year in this outstanding facility.

When the original part of the stadium was built in the early 40's, much of the work was done by scholarship athletes, including many football players. The first staking out of the stadium was done by two members of the football team, A.N. Cameron and Hugh Webb. Webb returned to Clemson years later to be an architecture professor, and Cameron went on to become a civil engineer in Louisiana.

The building of the stadium did not proceed without a few problems. One day during the clearing of the land, one young football player proudly announced that he was not allergic to poison oak. He then commenced to attack the poison oak with a swing blade, throwing the plants to and fro. The next day, however, the boy was swollen twice his size and had to be put in the hospital.

There are many other stories about the stadium including one stating that Frank Howard put a chew of tobacco in each corner of the stadium as the concrete poured.

Howard said that the seeding of the grass caused a few problems. "About 40 people and I laid sod on the field," he said. "After three weeks, on July 15, we had only gotten halfway through.

"I told them that it had taken us three weeks to get that far, and I would give them three more week's pay for however long it took. I also told

them we would have 50 gallons of ice cream when we got through. After that it took them three days to do the rest of the field. Then we sat down in the middle of the field and ate up that whole 50 gallons."

Howard said that on the day of the first game in the stadium, "the gates were hung at 1:00 pm and we played at 2:00 pm." But that would be all of the construction for a while. Then in 1958, 18,000 sideline seats were added and, in 1960, a total of 5,658 West end zone seats were added in response to increasing attendance. With the large end zone, "Green Grass" section, this expansion increased capacity to about 53,000.

Later, upper decks were added to each side of the stadium as crowds swelled-the first one in 1978 and the second in 1983. This increased capacity to over 80,000 which makes it one of the 10 largest on-campus stadiums in the country.

The effect spiraling inflation has had in this century can be dramatically seen in the differences in stadium construction. The original part of the stadium was built at a cost of \$125,000 or at \$6.25 a seat. The newest upper deck was finished in 1983 at a cost of \$13.5 million, or \$866 a seat.

Through the years, Memorial Stadium has become known as "Death Valley." It was tagged this by the late Presbyterian coach, Lonnie McMillan. After bringing his P.C. teams to Clemson for years and getting whipped, McMillan said the place was like Death Valley. A few years later the name stuck.

On November 16, 1974 the playing surface was named Frank Howard Field for the legendary coach because of his long service and dedication to the University.

Luckily, the stadium wasn't built behind the Y.

Clemson Traditions

FIRST FRIDAY PARADE

The Clemson football season kicks off each year with the annual First Friday Parade. The once a year event takes place on the Friday afternoon prior to the first home football game. Floats from various fraternities and sororities and other campus organizations are represented in the parade that rolls down highway 93 in front of the President's house in Clemson. The parade culminates at the Amphitheater in the middle of campus where the first Pep Rally of the year takes place.

The Grand Marshall of the Parade is featured at the Pep Rally. Recent Grand Marshals have ranged from former PGA professional Dillard Pruitt, to College Football Hall of Fame legends Jess Neely and Frank Howard, to noted television announcers Brent Musburger and Ara Parseghian.



HOMECOMING

Clemson holds a classic homecoming every year. Displays by fraternities and sororities that are months in the making, are built on Bowman Field the week prior to Homecoming weekend. It is an event that draws alumni and friends of Clemson from all over the country.

The Friday evening prior to the game, Tigerama is held in Death Valley, which is an event that attracts over 35,000 fans. It is widely known as the largest pep rally in the world. The Homecoming Queen and her court are presented in addition to Homecoming skits, a pep rally, and a large and loud fireworks display.

The first homecoming game played at Clemson took place on September 30, 1922 when Clemson met Centre. Clemson has a 54-18-3 record on Homecoming games over the years, a .740 winning percentage, and has outscored the opposition 1,578-976 in those previous 75 games. The average margin of victory is 21 to 12. Clemson has been especially successful on Homecoming in recent years, posting a 24-2-2 record since 1970.



ORANGE PANTS

The tradition of the Clemson team wearing orange pants is new according to tradition standards. The Tigers first wore the all orange uniform for the final game of the 1980 season against South Carolina. Clemson upset the 14th ranked Gamecocks and Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers, 27-6. The victory set the stage for Clemson's National Championship run of 1981.

Overall, Clemson is 32-9 in orange pants since that 1980 game, including a 19-2 record in games played in the month of November. The Tigers had an eight-game winning streak in orange pants snapped in the 1996 Peach Bowl against Louisiana State. Clemson has nine wins over top 20 opponents when wearing orange pants, including the 22-15 National Championship clinching win over Nebraska in the 1982 Orange Bowl.

ROCK, HOWARD'S

When the Clemson team gathers to run down "The Hill", the players first rub Howard's Rock because of the mystical powers it is supposed to give Clemson players. The rock is mounted on a pedestal at the top of the hill and was given to Coach Frank Howard by a friend (S.C. Jones '19) who picked it up in Death Valley, CA. The Rock was first placed on the pedestal at the top of the hill on September 24, 1966, for a game Clemson won 40-35 over Virginia. In that game, the Tigers rallied from 18 points down with 17 minutes to play. The team started rubbing the rock for the first game of 1967, a 23-6 win over Wake Forest on September 23, 1967.



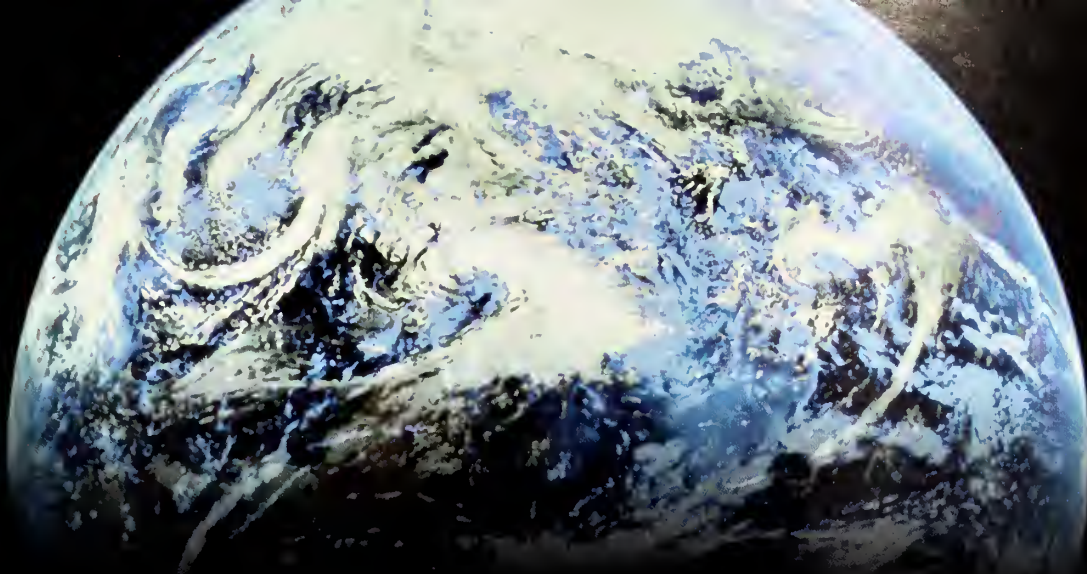
THE TIGER PAW

The Tiger Paw logo has become synonymous with the University's athletic teams since its invention by John Antonio. Antonio was an innovative account executive with Henderson Advertising in Greenville, and prior to the 1970 season, unveiled the Paw as Clemson's new logo. It has shown up all over the country on items owned by Clemson fans from shirts to hats to the now famous "two-dollar bills". Many institutions with a feline as a mascot have used the logo, or an impression of it.

Antonio also came up with the phrase, "Fly the friendly skies of United," when he worked for the Leo Burnette Agency in Chicago. "I've never had a logo or an emblem copied as much as the Tiger Paw," said Antonio, now 69 and living in Greenville.

Antonio still remembers the day he made the presentation of the Tiger Paw to Frank Howard, then the Clemson Athletic Director. "He wasn't saying much at all," recalled Antonio in an article in the Greenville News by Alyce Atkinson on Feb. 16, 1997. "I kind of thought I was losing this fight." At this point Antonio pulled out an orange football helmet with a tiger paw painted on the side.

"Coach Howard's eyes got as big as saucers and he smiled. From there it was downhill. Coach Howard wanted that helmet." Those Tiger paws are still on the Clemson helmets today.

Robert Carswell

James and Roberta Carswell have always been positive role models for their son, Robert. From the time Robert was a young man, they served as a guiding light through the challenges of daily life. That light was never so bright in February of 1997 when Robert was pondering his decision as to his future as a college student-athlete.

Courted by nearly every major school in the nation, including recent National Champions Nebraska, Florida State and Tennessee, Carswell narrowed his decision to Clemson and Notre Dame. He had spent much of his youth in Gary, IN, just a few miles down interstate 80 from the Golden Dome. As a youngster, he dreamed of the day he would touch the "Play like a Champion Today" sign in the Notre Dame home locker room, and run through the famed Notre Dame Stadium tunnel in a gold helmet.

But, Carswell's high school years were spent in Lithonia, GA, just a few miles down interstate 85 from Clemson, SC. A recruiting visit to Clemson, SC made touching Howard's Rock, and running down the hill into Death Valley in an orange helmet very attractive.

"On signing day I brought two national letters of intent to school," recalled Carswell. "I had one from Clemson and one from Notre Dame. When my coach came to get me in homeroom, I still had both letters of intent in my hand. I walked into the library where we were making the announcement and looked at my parents.

"I knew if I signed with Notre Dame they might only see me play in person four times in four years, but if I came to Clemson they could see me play almost every week. That was very important to me. My parents had always come to my games from the time I was little. I remember times when it was raining and we were losing 48-0, but they were still there rooting for me on every play."

The positive influence of his parents is prevalent in all aspects of Carswell's life. Off the field, he is perhaps the most active high profile student-athlete at Clemson in terms of community service. That has been the case since his freshman year.

In his second semester as a Clemson Tiger (winter of 1998), Carswell drove to Anderson, SC on Monday afternoons to spend time at an alternative school where he would meet with teens who had trouble adapting to adolescence. "I would just go over there and hang out with them," said Carswell.

"They were some youngsters who had gotten in trouble and needed some guidance. I just tried to let them know there are positive aspects to life, a right and wrong way to do things and a path to success. In general, I just tried to convey a positive message to them about life. They weren't

bad people, they just needed something positive in their life."

While Clemson has a successful and rewarding community service program through the leadership of Bill D'Andrea and the staff at Vickery Hall, this was an extraordinary demonstration of community involvement, especially for a freshman.

"Robert Carswell showed great interest in this program and leadership qualities at a very early stage," said D'Andrea. "We could see he had a keen interest in this program, so he has been very involved. We have a lot of student-athletes who give their time to community service, speaking to groups. Very few put in as much time as Robert Carswell."

Carswell has continued his work in this area. Whether it is speaking to a church group, or high school class or an elementary school, Carswell has been a positive role model for the youngsters and a positive representative of Clemson University.

His time spent in this extra curricular activity is so extraordinary that he was named to the American Football Coaches Association Good Works Team for 1999. He was one of just 11 Division I football players in the nation named to this team, the first time a Clemson player has been selected. The team honors student-athletes who show exceptional dedication to community service and to the betterment of the communities in which they live.

Carswell speaks to an array of groups, and he gives a different message to each. "With the little kids you can only talk a few minutes because

they don't have a long attention span," said Carswell with a chuckle. "I bring them posters and tell them about football and usually read a short book to them. With the older students I try to stress the value of an education. I tell them to stay in school as long as they can and listen to and respect their teachers."

The graduate of Stone Mountain High School enjoys visiting schools and that is a good thing because he is a secondary education major. His older brother, a former football player at Presbyterian, is a secondary school teacher in Atlanta. Robert hopes to join him professionally as a teacher and eventually as a principal when his playing days are over.

But, the way he has played in his first three years at Clemson, it might be a while before he sits behind a desk. Carswell, who has switched from strong safety to free safety this year, is the leading tackler among defensive backs in the ACC this year and ranks among the top three in the league overall. He has been in the top 30 in the nation in interceptions since he picked off two passes at Virginia Tech. A preseason candidate for the Jim Thorpe Award (top defensive back in the nation), Carswell has lived up to his preseason billing.

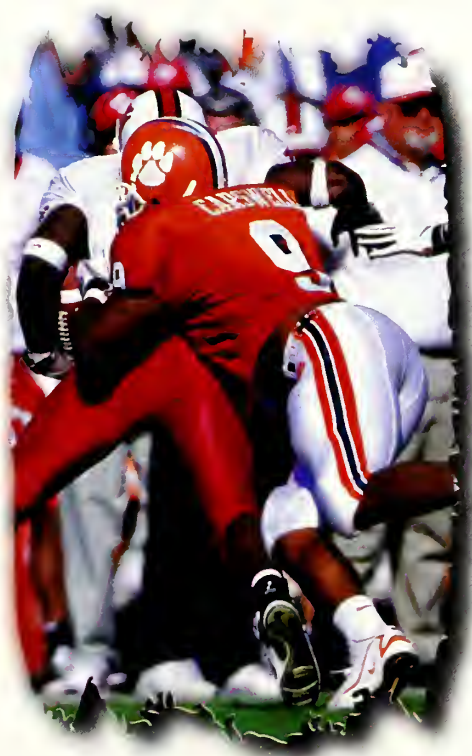
"Robert Carswell is everything you want in a free safety," said Tiger Head Coach Tommy Bowden. "He is an outstanding tackler, our last line of defense. Many times this year he has made touchdown saving tackles. Plus, he has been solid on pass coverage. He is capable of making the big hit and also capable of making the big interception. He has been one of the leaders of this team since I arrived."

With the position switch has come more responsibility for Carswell. But, as a starter since the sixth game of his freshman year, he relishes the challenge. "I have always liked to be in the middle of the action," said Carswell. "It is a challenge to cover all of that territory out there, but in our defense the free safety has to make a lot of big plays and that is the way I like it."

Carswell was at his best this year at Virginia Tech when he recorded a career high 16 tackles in 68 plays. He also had the first two interceptions of his career. Both thefts took place in the shadow of the Clemson goalpost, prohibiting Virginia Tech touchdowns or at least field goals. For his efforts he was named ACC Defensive Back of the Week.

Tonight, against Florida State he will face his stiffest test. No matter who the Seminoles line up at wide receiver, Carswell will have his hands full covering the fleet of future NFL wideouts on Bobby Bowden's roster, or tackling the fleet-of-foot Florida State running backs.

No matter what the result, Carswell will give his all on every down. And, James and Roberta Carswell will be in attendance cheering for him on every down as well.

Men's Tennis

Clemson Head Coach Chuck Kriese compares his 2000 men's tennis team to a volcano waiting to erupt.

With the nucleus returning from a team that finished 21-12 last season, he has every reason to be optimistic.

Kriese is in his 25th year at the helm of the Tiger program, and over his career at Clemson he has compiled a staggering 503-290 record. In 1995, he became the ACC's winningest coach for total wins. He has won 10 regular season ACC titles, 10 conference tournament titles, has been ACC Coach-of-the-Year six times, and National Coach-of-the-Year twice.

"To be successful in college tennis you have to have depth, excellent doubles, and good internal team leadership. I really feel like this year's team has all three of these elements."

Kriese has built this year's team with extreme patience and precision. "In order to persevere through hard times you have to have patience. We have not just thrown this team together in one year. After we won the conference in 1997, we brought in four very talented freshmen. In 1998 we red-shirted two seniors so those four freshman could play. We finished the 1998 season 11-18, but we did make it to the NCAA Tournament. In 1999, we finished third in the conference, made it to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, and were ranked 30th in the country."

"Of course we want to win the conference every year, but I feel like it has been a logical progression for us. This year, those guys that were freshmen in 1998 are now juniors and they have not missed a beat."

The four juniors that Kriese is referring to are Josh Goffi, Darren Knight, Brad Emendorfer, and Joey Hopke. "When I recruited those guys I knew that I was getting four great athletes and four great tennis players. All four of them are sincere people that are definitely striving towards their goals on and off the court."

Last season, Goffi won the conference at number-three singles. He finished with a 31-19 record in singles and went 27-13 in doubles. Both of these win totals led the team. Knight finished the 1999 season with a 12-3 singles record.

Earlier this fall, the doubles team of Goffi and Knight set the tone for the upcoming season by finishing second at the National Intercollegiate Clay Court Tennis Championships in Pikesville, MD. The Clemson duo began the tournament unseeded, but with their performance jumped to a top-

five team in the country.

"What Josh and Darren did at the Clay Court Championships was very impressive. We have needed players to step up for us and that is what they did. They have really made a big jump. They have climbed the mountain and it is now time for the other guys to follow. When they returned from the tournament Brad Emendorfer gathered the team together and told the rest of the guys that if Josh and Darren could step it up, then everyone else needed to step up as well."

In 1999, Emendorfer finished 23-20 in singles while Hopke was 12-8. "Joey and Brad have each made a big run. They have improved tremendously from last year and I really look for them to have good seasons."

Kriese is also counting on his three seniors, Luis Garcia, Tomasz Boniecki, and Sandon Barth to contribute early and often.

Garcia finished 28-17 in singles last season and according to Kriese, "is capable of playing number-one singles this year."

Last year Boniecki won the conference at number-four singles, but has been slowed this fall by a knee injury. "Last year I kept Tomasz on the back burner in order to develop him slowly. With his injury this fall, his position on the team is still a little uncertain. If his knee responds well then he is capable of being as good as anybody on the team."

For leadership on this year's team, Kriese will look to Barth. "Sandon started off as a walk-on and now he has become the leader of

this team. What he does from a leadership standpoint is very important. Having him on the team is almost like having another coach. I would count on him with my life and he is the glue to our team."

Colin Atkinson, Marko Gojanovic, and Tyler Manning are now sophomores, and Kriese hopes these three will be able to provide needed depth to the team. As a freshman, Gojanovic was tied for third on the team with 24 doubles wins. "Marko is a tough kid. He has a great game but he just needs to show it on a more consistent basis. Colin has great hands and a great mind. He just needs to get stronger. I am really counting on he, Marko, and Tyler to help the team."

Red-shirt freshmen Jimmy Poole and Eric Cohn are the players that Kriese feels like have improved the most from last season. "I red-shirted those guys last year because they needed another year to grow and work on their game. They were both excellent basketball players in high school and with their tremendous athletic ability, I look for them to really catch on and do well."

The two newcomers to the 2000 team are Lee Porter and Damiisa Robinson. "Lee and Damiisa are both excellent athletes that are becoming excellent tennis players. They are growing like weeds right before my eyes and they are getting better every day. Their work habits are so good simply because of the things they have been taught by the older guys."

In 2000, the Tigers will face a very difficult schedule, but Kriese would not have it any other way. "This year for our spring trip we are going to the West Coast and play six top 20 teams. I feel that in order to be the best, you have to play the best. That is the approach I have taken, and this year our schedule is loaded."

For now, Kriese's biggest challenge of the upcoming season is getting his players to believe in themselves. "Once these guys experience success then hopefully it will catch on. The bar was set for Clemson tennis a long time ago, and we have a very high expectation level. From 1978-1990 we lost only two ACC matches. We need to get back to that kind of dominance. Everything is in place for this team, but now they just need to realize their potential. I really get excited when I see players get better in front of my eyes."

With the spring season approaching, it is easy to see why Kriese is so enthusiastic. He has all the ingredients for a special season in 2000, but in the end he knows that it will be up to his players to ensure that Clemson returns to the forefront of college tennis.

Men's Basketball

For the record, this is Larry Shyatt's second year as Clemson head coach and his fifth year with the Tiger basketball program overall. But, excuse him if he feels like he is in his first days with the program. After four years of familiarity with his personnel, Shyatt will have six new faces, over 50 percent of his roster, and just one starter returning from last year's 20-win squad.

Gone are four seniors who were the corps of a class that won 79 games over the last four years, the second winningest senior class in Clemson history. For the first time in nearly 130 games, there will be no Terrell McIntyre running the show and leading the offense, no Tom Wideman defending the post, no Tony Christie to hit a deep three-point goal and no monster dunk from Harold Jamison.

"We have lost four terrific seniors and terrific young men from last year's team. Plus we lost three other players who were contributors much of last year. We return just five players who have ever played in a game for Clemson and just one senior (Andrius Jurkunas), one junior (Adam Allenspach) and one sophomore who has ever started a game (Will Solomon)."

With such a young team, this will be a season to determine if Clemson's program can stand the test of time. Clemson has been to a postseason tournament seven consecutive years, including three NAAs and one NIT in the last four years. That is the longest postseason streak in Clemson

history. Only Wake Forest and North Carolina have also been to postseason play seven consecutive years among ACC teams.

To continue Clemson's run of postseason appearances, Shyatt will have to receive leadership from untapped areas. "Any coach can choose a captain, but no coach can choose a leader, they evolve. Right now, the leaders are by class, by virtue of the numbers. Andrius Jurkunas and Adam Allenspach are the leaders of their classes, they are the only ones in their respective groups."

Shyatt's top returnee in the backcourt is sophomore Will Solomon. The 6-2 native of East Hartford, CT averaged 6.3 points per game in 34 contests last year. He started six contests and had some brilliant performances against top-flight competition. In his first college start, Solomon scored 19 points and handed out three assists against number-one ranked Duke. A week later, he had a season high 20 points at Georgia Tech. "Will enjoyed some quality minutes last year and right now he would be considered our lead guard. He has the versatility to play both guard positions and he certainly will be a big asset to the other young guards."

Also returning in the backcourt will be sophomore letterman Dustin Braddick. The Charleston area native also had a breakout game against the Blue Devils with a season high 10 points. For the year, Braddick averaged 2.6 points and 1.7 rebounds in 23 games off the bench. He had eight points and six rebounds, including five offensive, in just 12 minutes in the victory over Florida State at Littlejohn Coliseum.

That is the rundown of returning letterwinners in the backcourt, just 272 total points and 61 assists in 1998-99. Shyatt will obviously count on major minutes from freshmen Ed Scott and Pasha Bains. Scott appears to be well suited for the point guard position, although he played the shooting guard with scoring distinction his sophomore and junior years. In 1998-99, Scott averaged 17 points and five assists for Lower Richland High. He led the team to the South Carolina State 4-A championship and finished with a record of 28-3 and a number-15 final ranking in *USA Today*.

Bains is a newcomer, but he has more experience with the Clemson program than the other newcomers. The native of Canada transferred to Clemson from Wyoming last January and was able to take part in some limited practice after a shoulder injury healed. A Shyatt recruit to Wyoming originally, Bains averaged 38 points and eight rebounds per game in high school.

Clemson has three returning veterans in the frontcourt. Jurkunas is the unmistakable leader of the Clemson team. The fifth-year senior started 24 games at small forward last year and finished the year third on the club in scoring with a 7.6 average. He was back to his old self when it came to shooting the three-point goal, hitting 51 of 135 for a 38 percent accuracy. He is

Clemson's returning leader in scoring, rebounding, blocks, free throw percentage, steals and three-point goals.

With the departure of Tom Wideman and Harold Jamison for the professional ranks, Jurkunas' role might change a bit this year. "Andrius will have to be more of an inside guy," said Shyatt. "He will have to spend some additional minutes in the post compared to the past. But, that is where Andrius is so effective, he can do both."

Adam Allenspach is a 7-1 center with two varsity letters on his resume. He is a veteran of 66 games, 10 as a starter. His 4.8 scoring average could double this year along with his minutes. He is the top returning field goal percentage shooter on the team connecting on 54 percent of his attempts last year, including 59 percent against the ACC. He also pulled in 3.5 rebounds and shot 68 percent from the foul line a year ago. "Adam really came on strong the last third of last year. His maturity level and his intellectual level are his biggest assets. You talk about the ideal Tiger when it comes to the game of life and the academic world, Adam has great balance in his life."

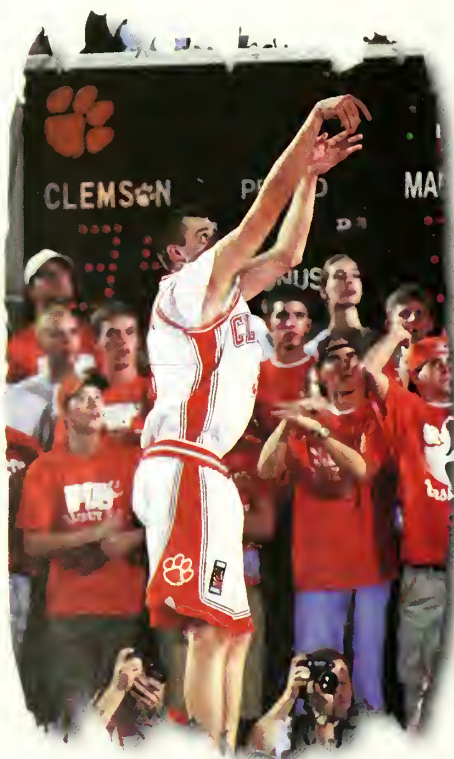
Chucky Gilmore played in 27 of the 35 games last year and scored 29 points and pulled in 46 rebounds, including 19 offensive. A post defender and rebounder as a first-year freshman, Gilmore will play more than the six minutes he played per game a year ago.

Like the backcourt, three newcomers will have an opportunity to play quality minutes in the frontcourt this year. The largest and most experienced of the group is Arturus Javtokas. The 6-10, 260-pounder is a junior college transfer from Western Nebraska Junior College where he played for former Clemson assistant Soupy Campbell.

Javtokas averaged 15 points and nine rebounds a game last year and also made 55 percent of his field goal attempts. Joining him upfront will be first-year freshman Ray Henderson. The native of Charlotte, NC averaged 16 points and 15 rebounds for East Mecklenburg High. Henderson suffered a knee injury this fall, but should be in top physical form by the beginning of the season.

Tomas Nagys is a younger version of Jurkunas. Like Javtokas and Jurkunas, a native of Lithuania, Nagys averaged 14 points and 14 rebounds a game last year at Catholic High School in Montgomery, AL. He is 6-9 and 215 pounds, the same physical stature Jurkunas had when he entered Clemson five years ago.

Clemson does not have a returning double figure scorer and in fact, just 30 percent of its scoring from last year returns. Shyatt realizes his team will probably be picked near the bottom in the ACC preseason polls. "There is not a player on our roster that anyone in our league is concerned about. We just have to hope that we have a Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid type of team. When we leave at the end of the night we hope the opposition asks, 'Who were those guys?'"

Women's Basketball

With the departure of four starting seniors, the first thought that comes to mind is rebuilding.

However Clemson Head Coach Jim Davis refuses to use the word rebuilding, but instead stresses the axioms of character, team concepts, and unity to the seven returning letterwinners and a cast of talented newcomers.

The 1998-99 team demonstrated these elements last year and won the Atlantic Coast Conference Championship and advanced to the NCAA Tournament's Final 16.

"There is no doubt, we have some question marks going into this season," said Davis, who will be entering his 13th season at Clemson. "We have several young ladies who were very successful in backup roles who will assume starting roles in 1999-00. Obviously, we were hit hard by graduation and with those seniors went a large percentage of our scoring and rebounding. We are going to forge a team from a talented group of athletes who will have to compete each day and help each other improve each day in practice. I think we will come together and become a team that can defend our ACC Championship."

Clemson won a school record 26 games last year and advanced to the ACC Tournament's Championship game for the fourth year in a row and won the school's second ACC crown in as many years.

Frontcourt - "I think once again, we will be strong in the front line with good size. We have some veteran players who are winners in every sense of the word. Obviously coming off a championship year, they know what it takes and I think those veterans will lead the way in our efforts to repeat as champions."

Backcourt - "The backcourt will be very deep and possess speed and quickness. This will probably be the most athletic backcourt we have ever had in my years at Clemson," said Davis.

Three-Point Shooting - "Angie Cossey, Amirah Leonard, and Nuria Fornis all proved that they are capable of having big nights beyond the three-point stripe. Krystal Scott also has the potential of having a big night behind the three-point line. Freshman Heather Crowe and Yoneko Allen are also quality three-point shooters."

Free-Throw Percentage - "We take pride in being one of the league leaders in free throw shooting. I expect this team to excel in this area as well. As coaches, we make it a priority to recruit shooters. I feel we will be a good free throw shooting team again this season."

Rebounding - "Erin Bath should be our most dominating rebounder this season. Joanie Mungro is a master at establishing rebounding position. With our overall athleticism, we will be quick to the ball which should enable us to get second chance opportunities."

Offense - "We can be a good transition team this season. Amirah Leonard and Scott demonstrated last year their ability to get out quickly on the break. The skill of our post players to run the floor is a definite plus. I think we have the ability to score in a lot of ways. We can punish people inside and out perimeter game should be good as well. We can score on transition and burn our opponents with the three. Our aggressiveness in rebounding to gain second chance points will be stressed."

Defense - "Once again, defense. I think our atti-

tude of giving our best effort defensively is our battle cry. I believe Bath is the best post defender in the country. Our goal is to have every opponent work hard to score any basket. Gaines, probably the best athlete on our team, certainly has the ability to defend the opponent's toughest perimeter player."

The frontcourt will feature two seniors and two juniors. The seniors include Datishella Byrd and Mungro, while Bath and Fornis are the juniors. These young ladies should provide a solid frontcourt foundation.

"We may have some question marks at the start of the season, but I am confident that by midseason, these questions will be answered in a positive way.

"Our frontcourt players run very well and have a great deal of jumping ability and have the determination to succeed."

Byrd played in 26 games last season and averaged 6.8 minutes per game. She averaged 1.3 ppg and 1.9 rpg.

"Byrd makes up for her lack of size with tremendous effort. She has very good quickness and becomes a very difficult matchup because of her three-point shooting ability."

Mungro started 11 games for the Lady Tigers last season and played in all 32 games. She averaged 16.8 minutes per game and averaged 4.6 ppg and 4.4 rpg. She was fifth on the team in rebounding and finished the season with more offensive rebounds (76) than defensive boards (66).

"Mungro is a blue collar player. She comes to work every day in practice and games with a tremendous attitude and smile on her face. She is strong enough to compete with the best post players in the ACC."

Bath was Clemson's starter at center last season and missed five games due to a knee injury. She made a courageous comeback and was a big factor in Clemson winning the ACC Championship last sea-

son. She finished the season averaging 7.6 ppg and 5.0 tpg. Bath averaged 21.0 minutes per game.

"Bath has the potential to be as good as any post player we have ever had in my tenure. She has size, speed, strength, skills and most importantly determination.

"Fornis has worked hard at becoming bigger, stronger, and faster through our strength-training program. She is a very good three-point shooter and her most marked improvement has been her ability to shoot off the dribble," Davis stated.

Clemson added Jamine Moton to the roster. The 6-0 sophomore is a ACC shot put and discus champion on the Lady Tiger track squad.

One of the strengths of the 1999-00 Clemson women's basketball team is depth in the backcourt.

Clemson will be led by seniors Angie Cossey and Amirah Leonard. Cossey played in 28 games last year and averaged 10.6 minutes per game and 2.4 ppg. Leonard played in all 32 games and averaged 10.4 minutes per contest while scoring 2.8 ppg.

"Both Cossey and Leonard came to us from the JUCO ranks and made significant contributions in their first year at Clemson. They will be given early looks at the point and shooting guard positions.

"Cossey can score, period. She can break a game wide open with her three-point shooting. She has a quick first step, which will enable her to break down defenses and get to the free throw line where she is really deadly.

"Leonard is best in the open court. She converts so quickly and she too made some big three point baskets for us last year. She takes a lot of pride in her defensive play," said Davis.

Junior Andrea Gaines, who went out for track last spring as a triple jumper, has shown marked improvement according to the coaching staff. Gaines saw action in 26 games and averaged 2.8 ppg.

"Gaines will play almost exclusively at the shooting guard position. She has shown flashes of brilliance during her career and will always give a great defensive effort. When she develops consistency, she will be vying for lots of minutes."

Krystal Scott played in 27 games as a freshman and averaged 1.3 ppg. She averaged 5.7 minutes per game.

"Scott is the biggest and strongest of our perimeter players. She has the ability to score over people and the quickness to beat the defense with the dribble drive. I believe she can overpower a lot of guards from opposing teams. She is versatile enough to play all three perimeter positions."

Clemson signed three talented freshmen from South Carolina, Heather Crowe, Yoneko Allen and Chrissy Floyd. All three players were named All-State as voted by the South Carolina Basketball Coaches Association. Allen and Floyd led Laurens High School to back-to-back state 4A championships and Crowe starred at Wren High School.

Floyd averaged 16.6 ppg, and 7.5 rpg her senior season at Laurens HS in Laurens, SC. Allen averaged 18.7 ppg and 5.6 rpg at Laurens HS. Crowe averaged 20.5 ppg and 10.4 rpg her senior season.

Courtney Wittstuck is a newcomer as she transferred from San Jose State University.

"We are very deep in the backcourt and can play with many different combinations. We will have lots of looks at people and I think we will create matchup problems for our opponents," said Davis.

Bowden Bowl I

Prior to Clemson's game at NC State, Clemson head coach Tommy Bowden had a visitor stop by his McFadden Building office. She was Rachel Alexander, a writer from the **Washington Post**. Alexander didn't come by Bowden's office to discuss the upcoming contest against the Wolfpack. Nor did she stop by to talk about the Maryland game, which was scheduled for the following week, even though Maryland is followed regularly by the Post due to the close proximity of the school to the paper. This visit was for one reason and one reason only. The same reason that most of the college football world will have its eyes on Clemson, SC tonight. Alexander was there to discuss Bowden Bowl I.

Bowden Bowl I, the first ever meeting between father and son head coaches in college football history takes place tonight on Frank Howard Field. Bobby Bowden, the legendary coach at Florida State in his 24th year at the helm of the Seminole program, versus his son Tommy, an upstart coach who burst on to the national scene by leading Tulane to an 11-0 mark in 1998. An achievement that later helped him land the Clemson job.

Alexander's visit puts into perspective the national scope of this game. She came through Tigertown two weeks prior to this evening's contest. Her visit with Tommy was sandwiched between visits with Tommy's brother, Terry, in Auburn, AL, a day earlier and with his father in Tallahassee the following day. There are more media here today than ever before at a game in Memorial Stadium. Even more than the NFL game that featured the Carolina Panthers, an expansion franchise in 1995, and that year's defending Super Bowl champion San

Francisco 49ers.

The following is a look at this historic game through the eyes of Tommy Bowden. Thanks to the cooperation of Alexander, who let us sit in during her interview, we got a chance to see the 45-year old's insight into the game. He discussed everything from growing up in one of college football's most famous families to the rules of recruiting against his father. We'll also see the dos and don'ts of conversations between Bobby and Tommy since the latter was named head coach at Clemson. In this story, fans will get a chance to feel the significance of the game according to Tommy.

The Original Bowden Bowl I

Bowden Bowl I was originally scheduled to take place at Tallahassee, FL on September 2, 1999. The game was designed to pit Bobby versus his third-oldest son Terry, then the head coach at Auburn.

"When I was at Auburn coaching with Terry, they reached that agreement for Auburn to play Florida State. I was an assistant and had been an assistant for a long time. I thought, gosh, maybe if Daddy coaches long enough I can get a head coaching job and do it," said Tommy Bowden. "I was reserved to the fact that was going to be the first. Those two (Daddy and Terry). If I did go get a job, it looked like I might eventually get to play him, but that would be three, four, five years down the line. If he coaches that long."

"I didn't think about it (facing my father), even at Tulane. We were in different conferences and probably were not going to play." Predicting the moves of coaches in the college football profession is similar to the job the National Weather Service does when it tracks a hurricane. Forecasters can look at the conditions of the storm and past storms before it, but in the end nobody really knows what is going to happen.

Midway through the 1998 season, Terry Bowden resigned as head coach at Auburn. Two months later on December 2, Tommy was named head coach at Clemson. With the announcement, the Bowden Bowl changed directions and shifted northeast just like a hurricane.

Facing Dad

So this is it. Tommy gets the chance to beat his 'old man'. According to Tommy this will be one of the most enjoyable games he will coach all season. Why? Because he feels no pressure.

"I'm fortunate this year in the fact that all the pressure is on him. I will be a lot more relaxed that week than I am other weeks," Tommy said. "I am more evenly matched in other weeks. It's a mismatch when we play because he is a preseason favorite to win the national championship. He has all of the good players. He is supposed to win the game.

"I am supposed to eventually within my contract close the gap. I'll enjoy the game. It will be a great game for me to watch this year."

Don't worry, Clemson's new head coach is not

losing his competitive edge, but he is able to put this game and future games between the two institutions into perspective. "Now as the pressure mounts and I am supposed to close the gap and next year and the year after that and the year after that, I can't enjoy it as much. This year the pressure is on him because he is supposed to win and should win. It'll be a great game," Tommy added.

Thoughts on Dad I - Staying on Top

For the past 12 years the Florida State football program has been a model of consistency under Bobby Bowden. A measuring stick for football programs across the nation. The facts and numbers speak for themselves. Twelve straight seasons ranked among the AP top-four, 12 straight seasons with 10 or more wins, and a national championship in 1993. This is one of the things that Tommy admires most about his dad.

"Obviously consistency. He has NCAA records for consistency. Of course I have never been on top for a long period of time. From what I understand it is harder to stay on top than it is to get to the top. You knock people off, you're the underdog and then you get there. Maintaining that level for as long as he has to me is the most impressive," Tommy stated.

Thoughts on Dad II - Self Made Coach

In all professions, contacts are the name of the game when it comes to landing highly sought after jobs. "It's who you know, not what you know." The coaching profession is one of the best examples of that statement. A phone call from the right person can either make or break a coaching career.

Bobby Bowden's Florida State Seminoles have won at least 10 games each of the last 12 seasons and 15 of his 23 seasons at the school.

However, Bobby Bowden is not a good example of that concept.

"The fact that he is a self-made coach is impressive to me. He did not play for a Bear Bryant. If you play for a Bear Bryant or a Rick Pitino, those guys can pick up the phone and say 'hire this guy'. Dad never played for any of those guys, he is a self-made guy. He went to Howard (now Samford), then he went to a junior college. Then he got on at Florida State as an assistant and went to West Virginia as an assistant. He never had anybody that could pick up the phone and make that call for him."

Sly Like A Fox

"When we would vacation when I was at Alabama, Terry was at Samford, Jeff was at Southern Miss, and dad was at Florida State, those were heavy football conversations. It was philosophy, play calling, X's and O's. What are ya'll doing? It was a lot more football. Then Terry and I went to Auburn and dad and Jeff were at Florida State. It was less football because there were only two schools," said Tommy.

"Terry got out and I came to Clemson. Now we are playing each other. I talked to Daddy yesterday about how long they were practicing and how much hitting they were doing. It had nothing to do with schemes. So now the conversations are a lot more generic. He is sly like a fox, he might try to bait you, but I know him too well. The football talks we used to have are no more at this point in time."

* Bobby Bowden is in search of his 300th career win tonight. This fact adds another ingredient to an already great recipe for a special game. "I am an asterisk one way or the other. I have either prevented him from winning his 300th or he defeated me for his 300th. Either way I am going to be an asterisk."

Learning From Someone Else's Mistake

The name of the game in college football is recruiting. For coaches, recruiting is just as competitive as playing the games on fall afternoons. Games, seasons, and the consistency of maintaining a successful program hinge on the coach's ability to recruit.

During the decade of the 90's, the paths of the Bowden family coaches have passed many times. Bobby recruiting for FSU, Terry for Auburn, and Tommy for Tulane and now Clemson. For the younger Bowdens each passing year is added ammunition to use against their dad in recruiting. Bobby is nearly 70-years old and nobody knows how many more seasons he will be pacing the Seminole sidelines. So it is very tempting to walk into a recruit's home and point this fact out. Sometimes in life, there is a big difference between doing the easy thing and doing the wise thing.

"The last time Terry said that about him at Auburn, he told the prospect, 'listen he (Bobby) might not be there that long son. They're going to change coaches and the new coach might not run what you want. You might as well come here.' Well Daddy heard enough of that and finally told the

prospect, 'I will be at Florida State longer than Terry will be at Auburn'. And he was right. So I'm not saying that I'm not going to say he will be gone in three or four years."

Credit Cards

Who is Ann Bowden pulling for in this contest? Does she pull for her husband of over 50 years or her second oldest son?

"My mom is going to root for him, I think she has already made that public." Why? "He's got the credit cards, she likes to shop," Tommy said jokingly. But seriously Tommy later said, "the ramifications of the game are for him to win the national championship and get his 300th win."

Bankers, Lawyers, and Coaches?

Football coaching in the Bowden family is truly a family affair. Three of the four Bowden sons have entered the coaching profession, with only the oldest son, Steve, choosing to do something else. "Steve never had the desire to coach. He is managing Daddy's money." However, the youngest son, Jeff, did catch the coaching bug in college and is coaching here tonight. Jeff is in his sixth season as Florida State's wide receivers coach.

"Jeff worked with Terry, then he worked at Southern Miss with Jeff Bower and then he had the opportunity to go to Florida State. There are bankers and lawyers whose sons work for them in a law firm or in a bank. That happens in a lot of other professions and it is a shame that it doesn't happen very often in this profession (coaching). Back when I was at Florida State, there was a nepotism law in the state of Florida, which I think has been changed. But why not learn from one of the best if you have

that opportunity. Jeff has been afforded that opportunity for a long time," said Tommy.

Humbling Profession

In 1991, Tommy Bowden got a call from Pat Dye, then the coach at Auburn. The two had originally worked together at Auburn in 1980. Dye wanted Tommy to be his offensive coordinator.

Tommy was poised for the job because he felt he had worked his way up in the profession. The next logical step after being a coordinator at a big name school is to become a head coach.

However, Auburn fell on hard times in Tommy's first two seasons at the SEC school. The Tigers finished the 1991 season with a 5-6 record. The following year was not much better as Auburn finished 5-5-1. Dye left the school after that season.

Auburn's head coaching search ended with a Bowden, only it wasn't Tommy. It was his younger brother Terry, the head coach at Division I-AA Samford. Discouraged and disheartened, Tommy could have left Auburn to accept assistant positions at two other schools, one in the west and the other in the northeast, but he stayed.

"You know I had worked 15 years as an assistant at places like Auburn, Alabama, Florida State, Duke, and Kentucky. He had been at Salem and Samford. Your younger brother gets the head coaching job and you have to work for him. I didn't work 15 years to work for my younger brother. Anybody would feel the same way," Tommy said.

To make matters worse, Terry came in and took the offensive coordinator title away from his older brother. Terry did not mean harm by doing this and he did it to actually protect his assistants. His feeling was if somebody was going to be blamed for bad play

calling, it might as well be the head guy. "In that case you have two options, you either stay or leave. We had just built a house. We weren't interested in leaving. I wanted to stay there and be successful. Maybe have an opportunity somewhere down the line.

"And that is what happened. Stayed there and we went undefeated and a couple of years later I got the Tulane job. It turned out really well for me professionally, but it really was a humbling experience to be there and then your younger brother gets the job. It was the lowest point of my career professionally, the highest point for him. Six years later I went undefeated and he is unemployed. If you stay in this profession long enough, you will be humbled, as my father was in 1974 at West Virginia. You just have to weather the storm."

Tommy's referring to a season in which his father's squad finished 4-7 after four straight winning seasons. West Virginia fans hung Bobby Bowden in effigy that year. The following season the Mountaineers bounced back with a 9-3 mark. The next year Bobby Bowden began his head coaching career at Florida State.

Tommy and Terry Today

Since leaving Auburn, Terry Bowden has moved on to become a color analyst for ABC's College Football. Tommy Bowden noted, "I'm not a TV expert, but he seems to be doing a pretty good job. He was born to do that type of thing."

Terry still maintains his residence in Auburn, AL. On the weekends he flies to New York and is picked up by a limo to take him to his new occupation.

However, during the week, he still finds time to talk with his older sibling.

"I still talk to him probably once or twice a week," Tommy said. "He watches our games. He has all of those monitors at ABC. Football is still fresh enough in his mind that he can still give you some pretty good advice. We actually talk X's and O's more so than I do with my father. He is not going to go and tell dad what we talk about."

Historical Perspective

More times than not, predicting the exact time and date of a historic sports moment is nearly impossible. For example, on September 6, 1998, anxious baseball fans filed through the turnstiles of Busch Stadium in St. Louis. Fans possessing tickets to that game versus the Cincinnati Reds hoped to witness a piece of baseball history. They hoped that St. Louis Cardinal first baseman Mark McGwire would hit his 61st homerun of the season to tie Roger Maris' single season homerun record. He had hit number 60 the night before.

Fans on September 6 left disappointed, as that night's boxscore read next to McGwire's name: 0-for-3, one run scored, one walk and one strikeout. The next night McGwire launched a ball 430 feet to left field. Number 61.

Tonight in Clemson is different. Fans holding tickets to this game are guaranteed to witness a part of college football history. Father vs. Son. Bowden vs. Bowden. Maybe Bobby Bowden's 300th win. Hopefully everyone in attendance will be able to do as Tommy Bowden will be doing. Just enjoying it.

Reggie Herring

"When coach Reggie Herring gets fired up, everyone can hear him," said linebacker Chad Carson of his defensive coordinator and position coach. "The players hear him on the sidelines and the fans directly behind us can hear him in the stands. He gets everyone fired up. He is the most intense person I have ever met."

Herring's intense style first surfaced as a player at Florida State where he was a three-year starter at linebacker for Bobby Bowden. As evidenced by Carson's quote above, that intensity continues today as he works for another Bowden, Clemson's Tommy Bowden.

In 1981, Herring earned a B.S. degree in criminology from Florida State. During his four years at Florida State, the team posted a 38-6 record and made two trips to the Orange Bowl and one trip to the Tangerine Bowl.

"It was a tremendous experience for me to have the opportunity to play for a coach of his stature," Herring said of Bobby Bowden. Herring is extremely proud of his class, of whom he said, "along with Rick Stockstill (current Clemson wide receivers coach), we set the foundation for what that program is today. We put Florida State on the map and gave coach Bowden his jump start."

The 1979 and 1980 teams finished the season ranked sixth and fifth respectively, presenting Bobby Bowden with his first two top-10 national finishes. Herring was selected an AP All-American for the 1980 season. In 1989, he was

honored for his athletic achievements at Florida State by being inducted into the school's football Hall of Fame. Herring said, of his induction into the Hall of Fame, "It's such an honor to be recognized along with my peers, to be such a small piece of the puzzle with so many great athletes."

Some of his greatest memories as a player include playing in back-to-back Orange Bowls, going undefeated in the 1979 regular season and 10-1 in 1980, and beating some very tough competition. "We beat a Nebraska team on the road that was undefeated when we [Florida State] were a no-name team, and Pitt with Dan Marino, who was also undefeated." However, his greatest and most memorable experience as a player is being voted a permanent team captain by his Florida State teammates. "To be recognized in that way by my peers - that probably meant more to me personally than any other honors that I have received."

Herring's coaching experience began with a five-year coaching job at Oklahoma State working with linebackers. He then coached linebackers at Auburn from 1986 to 1991. He was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach for two years at Texas Christian, before coming to Clemson in 1993 as an inside linebacker coach. In 1997, Herring took over the position of defensive coordinator for the Tigers. As a coach, Herring has been a part of 13 bowl games, including four, the 1993, '96 and '98 Peach Bowls and the 1996 Gator Bowl, with Clemson.

In his first year as defensive coordinator, Herring's defense finished 16th in the nation in total defense. For the past two seasons, Herring has coached the Clemson defense to a top-15 national ranking for rushing yards allowed.

After losing six of last season's defensive players to the NFL draft, Herring is working with a young and fairly inexperienced defense. However, his aggressive, attacking defensive philosophy remains the same. He recalls a valuable defensive motto he learned from a former coach. "Kill a fly with an axe," he says, "that's all there is to it."

"That's his style," Tommy Bowden said of his defensive coordinator. "If you saw him as a player, if you saw him as a coach, that's his style. That's why he's running the defense."

"The major difference between us now and last year is that we are attacking

up front rather than reading," said Herring. "There's nothing wrong with reading up front. There's nothing wrong with attacking up front. That just happens to be what our personality is and what we're going to do."

The attacking style of the Clemson defense this season has already generated improved stats in one area of concern Herring had coming into 1999. Last year, Clemson only picked off seven passes, through six games this season the Tigers have 10 interceptions.

Before this season Herring said, "It (interceptions) has to be a priority for us. I think how we can improve defensively should be in the secondary because they're older. We should get more interceptions." And the Tigers have done just that.

Herring has learned many great lessons from his experiences with the Bowdens. "Both Bobby and Tommy Bowden are very competitive, discipline-oriented coaches, who do a good job raising people in all aspects of life." Coach Herring feels extremely fortunate to have had the opportunity to play for and coach alongside two "very well-rounded coaches that are tremendous competitors."

"Coach [Bobby] Bowden taught us that with hard work and not necessarily the most talent, you can achieve great things." He also credits Bobby Bowden for the solid foundation he has as a player, a coach and a person. From their shared coaching experience, Herring recognizes that "Tommy Bowden is almost a mirror image of his father at a younger stage. He is just as structured, disciplined and hard-nosed as his father."

Herring has developed his own coaching style and defensive strategy using what he has learned from his former coaches. "As a whole, I've been exposed to a lot of tremendous football coaches. I've tried to take the good and the bad and mold my own philosophy which best suits my attitude and personality." Herring says that although he has learned many valuable lessons, both as a player and as a coach, there are two concepts that continue to stick out in his mind. The first, "He who hesitates is lost, in other words, 'keep it simple, stupid,' which is Bobby Bowden's philosophy, and the second, being a defensive coach, "the kill a fly with an axe mentality is one that will always apply."

Herring says that the best thing about being a coach is winning. "There are so many ups and downs in the coaching profession. There's always a win that ends up being more important than the last one." He says, of his greatest coaching experiences, "It is very fulfilling and gratifying to watch the kids that you've coached be successful. Considering the amount of hard work that we [coaches and athletes] put in, every win is a celebration."

"As a coach," Herring says with certainty, "any time we win I'm fired up." And coach Herring likes to get fired up.

Brad Scott

When it comes to football, Brad Scott's experience speaks for itself. Over the years he learned the game as a player, an assistant coach, and also a head coach. His resume includes an undefeated record in 12 bowl games, coaching a Heisman Trophy winner, and winning a national championship. Now as assistant head coach and tight ends coach at Clemson, Scott can include coaching his son to his growing list of accomplishments.

Scott attended DeSoto County High School in Arcadia, FL and then went on to play college football at Missouri-Rolla College.

After finishing at Missouri-Rolla, he returned to Florida where he got a B.A. in science education from the University of South Florida in 1979. In 1982, Scott was hired as head coach at his old high school.

For the past five seasons Scott served as head coach at the University of South Carolina. In 1994, his first year with the program, Scott led the Gamecocks to their first ever post-season bowl victory with a win over West Virginia in the Carquest Bowl. That same season, South Carolina won four road games, the most in school history.

Before taking over at South Carolina, Scott served as an assistant coach under Bobby Bowden at Florida State for 11 seasons (1983-1993). During his first two seasons with the Seminoles, Scott coached the tight ends while he pursued a master's degree in athletic administration.

Ironically, it was the departure of current

Clemson coach Tommy Bowden from the Seminole staff that opened the position for Scott. "I had been in contact with Coach Bobby Bowden for many years trying to get hired as a graduate assistant. I used to joke around with him and say that I would never get a chance to coach at Florida State because he had so many sons there. When Tommy Bowden got hired as tight ends coach at East Carolina, I finally got my chance."

During the next five seasons at Florida State, Scott worked as recruiting coordinator. He became known as one of the best recruiters in the nation as two of his five recruiting classes, 1985 and 1989, were ranked number one in the nation. "Recruiting is one of the aspects about college coaching that I enjoy the most. I really enjoy watching the student-athletes that we recruit have success on the football field and in the classroom." Scott said.

Because of the limitations placed on head coaches in the area of recruiting, Scott feels fortunate to be an assistant coach at Clemson. "Being an assistant coach here at Clemson has allowed me to become more involved with recruiting than when I was a head coach. I am recruiting very heavily in the state of South Carolina and Florida simply because I know many of the schools and coaches in these states."

During his last five years at Florida State, Scott worked as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach of the Seminoles. During those years, Florida State's combined record was 44-6. In a single game against Maryland in 1992, the Seminole offense exploded for 858 yards of total offense, the most in Florida State history.

In 1993, the Florida State offense under Scott averaged 548 yards a game, the second highest average in team history. Also that year, quarterback Charlie Ward won the Heisman Trophy and led the Seminoles to the National Championship.

After experiencing a National Championship at Florida State, Scott truly believes that this coaching staff under Tommy Bowden is prepared to bring another title to Clemson. "The Florida State team that we are playing here tonight is the team that you have to beat if you want to win the National Championship. If we can continue to improve our facilities and sign high caliber players

then it is a very realistic goal."

After coaching under Bobby Bowden for 11 years, Scott has developed a reputation for being a master of the trick play. He was on the Seminole staff for the famous punt-rookie play against Clemson in 1988. "I was working with the punt team that year at Florida State and I knew it was coming. That was one of the big plays in college football that year and the memory of that play will probably live on forever."

Prior to this year's game against Virginia Tech it was Scott that suggested to Tommy Bowden that the Tigers might be able to run a fake field goal against a swarming Hokie defense. Scott studied his archive of videotapes and he later helped design the play that pulled Clemson within three points of Virginia Tech late in the fourth quarter. "Over the course of my career I have tried to remember or keep clips of certain trick plays that have been successful. In our first year here at Clemson, most of the other teams that we play will have more talent. We go into every game with a handful of plays that we can use to try to equalize their talent."

Even with Scott's impressive resume, probably the biggest highlight of his career has been being able to coach at Clemson where his oldest son Jeff is a freshman wide receiver. "In all my years of coaching I have tried to treat my players like they were my own son, but nothing could have prepared me for how special it would be to coach Jeff. At practice I often catch myself looking across the field to watch him run a route or two," said Scott.

While he and Jeff share a common passion on the football field, the time the two are able to spend off the field is just as important to Scott. "It is great being able to walk off the field with Jeff after practice and then being able to eat dinner with him at the training table. I talk to him about not only football, but also about his classes and all the other important events that are going on in his life."

Scott's youngest son, John, currently attends Daniel High School in nearby Central and is a member of the Lion football team.

Teaching his two sons about the outdoors is something Scott takes great pride in. "Having two sons and having the opportunity to grow up in a small southern town are things that I feel very blessed for. My dad always took me fishing and hunting and those are memories that I cherish even still today. No matter how busy I get with coaching, I always try to find time to teach my boys how to enjoy and appreciate the outdoors."

Maybe sometime in the future Jeff will help add another championship to his dad's already impressive resume. For now, though, Brad Scott is simply enjoying the time that he is able to spend with his oldest son both on and off the field.

Rick Stockstill

It's not often that a coach remains on the staff when a new head coach is hired. And it's even more rare that a coach is retained through three head coaching changes.

Rick Stockstill has persevered through the changing times in Clemson football and come out with a passion to take Clemson back to national prominence. Stockstill's coaching philosophies, recruiting talents, and dedicating spirit have enabled him to help lead the Tigers into a new era of football.

Stockstill's passion for football was a foregone conclusion considering the family he was born into. "My dad was a high school coach and college coach, so I grew up in a coaching family," said Stockstill. The time and effort that his dad put into coaching was witnessed by Stockstill, which enabled him to understand the demands of the coaching profession.

"At an early age in high school, I decided I wanted to go into coaching and I owe a lot to my dad for laying down the values and foundation," said Stockstill.

However, Stockstill was not sure if he wanted to be a high school or college coach because all he knew was high school coaching. The decision was made during his years at Florida State, when he became aware of what college coaching is all about.

As a member of Bobby Bowden's first recruiting class, Stockstill earned three letters at quarterback, made three bowl trips, was selected to play in two all-star games after his senior season, and

was named honorable mention All-American by the **Sporting News** in 1981. Stockstill fondly recalls victories over Ohio State, Notre Dame, Nebraska, and Pittsburgh, and he helped FSU to a pair of top-10 final rankings.

While at FSU, Bobby Bowden reinforced Stockstill's dad's philosophies of coaching. "Coach Bobby Bowden to me was the greatest motivator I've been around. He had the unique ability to make an average player think he was a good player and make a good player think he was a great player," said Stockstill.

In 1983, after graduating from Florida State with a B.S. in physical education, Stockstill followed in his father's footsteps, accepting a job at Bethune-Cookman where he was offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Two years later he moved to Central Florida to become the assistant head coach and wide receivers coach.

Stockstill took very little time developing into a successful college football coach. In 1989 he came to Tigertown as the quarterbacks coach. However, the "Stockstill" name was not new to Tiger fans. The name was posted on the back of a Tiger paw jersey for four years as his brother, Jeff, played for the Tigers from 1979-82.

In his first year at Clemson, Stockstill helped lead the Tigers to a single-season record for completion percentage (60%). He also helped coordinate the #3 offense in Clemson history in 1995. In his first year as recruiting coordinator, Clemson had a top 20 recruiting class.

Stockstill is in his 11th consecutive season at Clemson as an assistant coach. His contributions, in terms of on-field coaching and recruiting, are

significant reasons Clemson has been to bowl games in seven of his 11 seasons with the program. Since being at Clemson, Stockstill has recruited some of the school's best players in recent memory. In past years seven Clemson players recruited by Stockstill have been selected in the NFL draft including: Raymond Priester, Trevor Pryce, Patrick Sapp, Brian Dawkins, O.J. Childress, Rahim Abdullah, and Donald Broomfield. This year, Stockstill also helped land one of the nation's top freshman quarterback prospects, Willie Simmons.

"There is no secret about recruiting, it's just a matter of how hard you work at it. You have to uncover every stone, pick up every rock and look under it. You can outwork other schools if

you put in the time and effort," said Stockstill. He believes that Clemson has a good product to sell, such as Vickery Hall, which contributes to landing these All-American players.

All coaches have philosophies they try to instill in their players. Stockstill influences his players to compete at the highest level in everything they do. "I encourage the players to do the best they can whether on the football field, in the stadium, in practice, in the classroom, or as a person everyday of their life," said Stockstill.

His greatest satisfaction as a coach is when the players carry on what they did in practice to the game field and they have success. The bottom line to Stockstill is winning. "This profession is about winning and when you are successful, the players you coach are happy," said Stockstill.

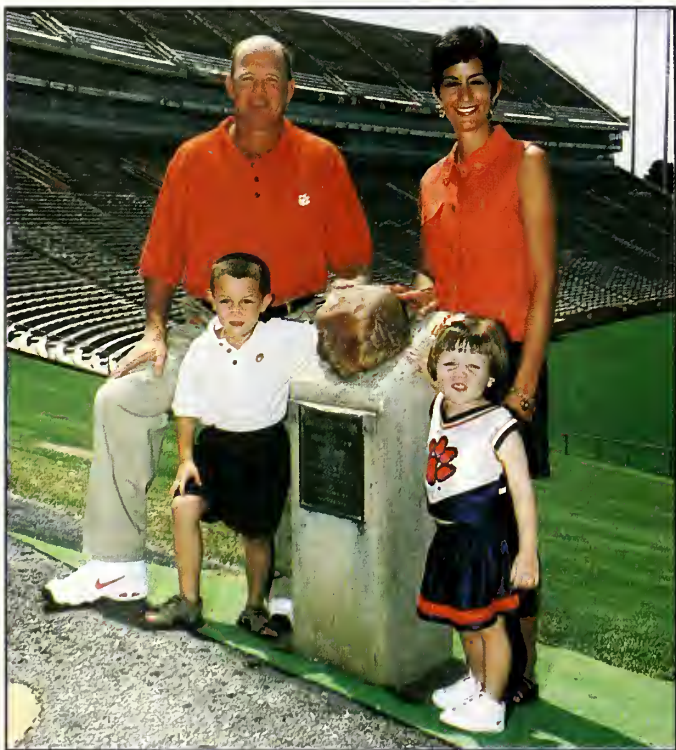
As wide receivers coach, Stockstill is responsible for players that can change the course of a game with a diving catch or spectacular move and run. This season, Rod Gardner, Brian Wofford, and Mal Lawyer have become a consistent receiving trio for Clemson. Through six games, the three wideouts have a combined 94 catches for 1217 yards and four touchdowns. The 1217 yards amounts to 51 percent of Clemson's total offensive yardage in 1999.

"Rod Gardner is a big strong kid that catches the ball well. He has been very dependable. Brian and Mal are solid, hard working, competitive guys," said Stockstill. He is happy for these players because they have put a lot into the football program at Clemson. These Tiger receivers are well on their way to establishing new records in most of the school's receiving categories.

At Clemson, Stockstill is now under his fourth head coach, Tommy Bowden. "Coach Tommy Bowden is doing a phenomenal job with the team as far as motivating them, pushing them, and giving them confidence that they can go out there and compete with anybody," said Stockstill.

Stockstill sees similarities in son Tommy Bowden and father Bobby Bowden. "They are very similar, positive, optimistic, and have a confidence about them. They'll do anything or call any play to give you a chance to win," said Stockstill. This heir of confidence was seen in Clemson during the Virginia Tech game when the Tigers converted a fake field goal into a touchdown to pull within three points during the fourth quarter. Stockstill remembers the early days at Florida State when Coach Bobby Bowden ran more trick plays than regular plays.

Stockstill has a bright future ahead of him and will look back one day on his career as a coach and realize the impact he has made and the success he has had. In the future, Stockstill hopes to be a head coach, but if it doesn't work out he will not be disappointed. "I would like to be a head coach someday, but if it doesn't happen I'm not going to look at myself as unsuccessful in this profession. My number one priority right now is to help Clemson be the best team it can be."

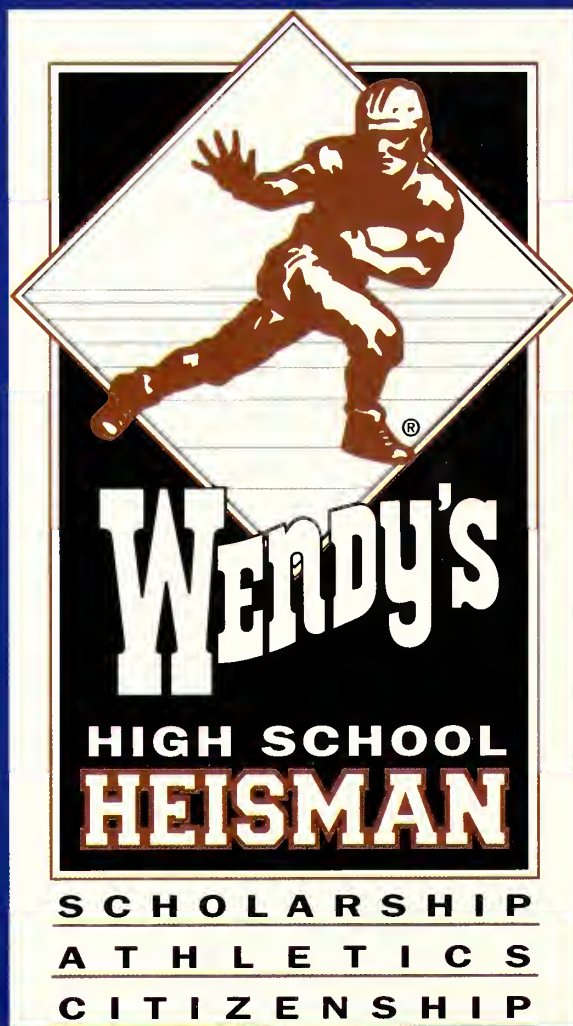

International Connection

For Michelle Burgher, a Clemson track athlete from Jamaica, it's the Clemson campus that's surprises her. "It's huge," she said. For Skye Frost, a Tiger volleyball player from Australia, it's the 80,000 fans at the football games. "We never see that amount of people at home." For Alejandro Dubreuil, a Tiger swimmer from Peru, it's the landscape that impresses him, "I think South Carolina is really pretty. We don't have these huge pines and the lakes like you do here."

But for all of Clemson's international athletes, their reason for being at Clemson is the same as generations of student-athletes that have come before them: opportunity. An increasing number of international athletes are coming to Clemson to pursue their education and improve their athletic skills.

Clemson women's tennis coach Nancy Harris said Clemson and the international athletes benefit when the international athletes come to Clemson. "We're providing the education; they're providing their skills to help our teams perform better," she said. "It seems to be a win-win situation for both sides. Our country has always been about opportunity. I think that as an American, I want to share my country with other people. What greater way can we be ambassadors to the world than to help educate it."

Burgher said an athletic scholarship to an American university is a great opportunity for young track stars from Jamaica like her. "At home to go to college is like a dream," she said. "If your parents don't have a lot of money and the means to send you to college, you just go to work."

"We take track and field very serious in Jamaica. We look at going to an American university as not

only a way to better ourselves athletically, but as a way to further our education."

Carmina Giraldo, a Tiger tennis player from Colombia majoring in language and international trade, believes her time at Clemson will have lasting benefits. "I'm getting my education, and I know that's a guarantee for my future," she said.

Many Tiger coaches have international recruiting contacts, just like they do across South Carolina and across the US. Those coaches use those international contacts to find out about talented athletes around the world.

Most international athletes first think of coming to America when they excel in sports at the high school and junior level. "My coach in Australia used to always talk about America," said Frost. "My junior team won the Australian national title and then came to play in America in the Midwest. After that, I said I was interested in coming over here to play."

An Australian recruiter promoted Frost to American colleges, and after that, Frost got a few letters, e-mails and videos from some US schools, including Clemson. However, her decision to attend Clemson was a little different than most students as she never visited Clemson until she came as a student. "I only saw it through videos," Frost said. "And my coach's brother lives in America and he knew Clemson was quite a good school. I said, Why not? There's an opportunity. Why not take it."

Dubreuil, from Lima, took the more traditional route to Clemson with a visit. "When I visited Clemson the first time, I really liked it a lot," he said. "I liked the guys on the team. I liked the coaches."

Burgher first attended George Mason University in Virginia before looking to transfer to another school. "I wanted to go somewhere that not only fostered good athletics, but also where the academic program was good and that had good academic facilities," she said. "That's how I got involved with the Clemson people."

Clemson professors impress Burgher and Frost. "Teachers are willing to help more than at home," said Frost.

"The student/teacher ratio in the classes is small, and I like that," said Burgher.

Burgher said her classes aren't harder than in Jamaica but the amount of schoolwork is greater. "The workload is a lot," said the psychology major. "But I think it can be accomplished if you have your priorities straight and have a balanced schedule."

Clemson's coach Harris says international athletes traditionally do well academically in the US. "My experience has only been a plus," she said. "International athletes tend to be good students and tend to be well educated. They have always done well for me as students, as competitors and as people."

Giraldo finds Clemson's size to be beneficial for her to get her education and improve her tennis game. "It's a small town so you can be focused on your sport and focused on your studies," she said.

Dubreuil, who speaks perfect English, says reading his textbooks takes extra work, especially when he first started at Clemson. "I think school-wise the biggest problem initially was the language," he said. "It was hard for me to get use to taking notes in English instead of Spanish. Whenever I read, it took two or

three times for me to get it. The main problem was retention."

Athletically, Clemson's top-notch facilities and coaches help the athletes reach their potential. "At home we don't have a lot of good facilities, good gyms or a weight program," Burgher said of Jamaica.

Like some Tiger athletes, Burgher and Dubreuil hope to make their countries' Olympic teams next year. Both have competed for years on some of their countries' international teams and junior national teams. Dubreuil barely missed making the 1996 Peruvian Olympic team.

Traveling the US through their sports while at Clemson is something all of the international athletes enjoy. "I've been to Maine, and I loved that," says Frost. "Chicago, Texas, St. Louis. The traveling is great."

Being away from home is difficult for the international athletes. "I still go back every summer," said Dubreuil. "I miss it a lot. I would like to go back to Peru and work there." Giraldo said her mother visited her at Clemson recently from Colombia. "She really liked it and she was very, very happy," Giraldo said.

Frost tries to go home to Australia every summer and sometimes during the Christmas holidays. "It costs a lot of money, but when you want to go home, you want to go home," she said. If the Tiger volleyball team can make the Final Four in Hawaii this year, Frost's family will meet her in Hawaii for the championships.

Missing out on home cooking can be tough. "Oh, yeah," said Frost. "The meat tastes different, and things like American sausage and spaghetti taste a little different than in Australia."

Burgher brings the taste of Jamaica to Clemson. "I can cook normal Jamaican foods," she said. "Things like curry chicken and rice, rice with peas and chicken, boiled dumplings." Burgher entertains her friends sometimes. "They love Jamaican food, especially curry chicken."

Like many other college students, the international athletes aren't completely sure what they want to do after college. Giraldo, a sophomore, might try professional tennis. "If I feel like I want to play some tournaments, I will try. I would then like to go to Europe. I don't want to go back to Colombia. The situation is a little tense there. I really don't feel connected to my country."

Burgher plans to enter graduate school at Clemson. Dubreuil says he will return to Peru if he can find a good opportunity. He thinks his Clemson degree will help. "For business, companies really appreciate if you have an American university title," he said.

Frost, a senior in visual arts, says she might go to graduate school in graphic communications or she might go home after getting her undergraduate degree. "There's a lot of opportunity back in Australia."

Wherever they end up, the international athletes say they are glad they came to Clemson. Frost, a senior, will look back on her days at Clemson with fond memories. "I've just had a great time. I've seen a lot of places, which is wonderful. And I've made so many great friends." Burgher said, "The people here are very friendly. This is a very good place."

Knowing the Rules

10.3 GAMBLING ACTIVITIES

Staff members of a member conference, staff members of the athletics department of a member institution and student-athletes shall not knowingly:
(Revised: 4/22/98 effective 8/1/98)

- Provide information to individuals involved in organized gambling activities concerning intercollegiate athletics competition;
- Solicit a bet on any intercollegiate team;
- Accept a bet on any team representing the institution;
- Solicit or accept a bet on any intercollegiate competition for any item (e.g., cash, shirt, dinner, that has tangible value; or (Revised 9/15/97)
- Participate in any gambling activity that involves intercollegiate athletics or professional athletics, through a bookmaker, a parlay card or any other method employed by organized gambling. (Revised: 1/9/96, 1/14/97 effective 8/1/97)

MEN'S SOCCER

Trevor Adair
Lock Haven State '82

- 59-22-6 at Clemson in four years, he has an overall mark of 71-44-11 including his years as a head coach at Brown.
- Coached the Tigers to the ACC regular season title and a first-place finish at the ACC Tournament in 1998.
- Led the Tigers to the NCAA quarterfinals in 1998, and had number one ranking for much of the fall, including the final regular season poll.
- As ACC Coach of the Year he defeated seven top 25 teams.
- Coach Adair guided Clemson to a top five finish and the second round of the NCAA Tournament in his first year with the program in 1995.
- Wojtek Krakowiak was the top player in the nation last year, winning the Hermann Award as the National Player of the Year.

ACC Football

- The ACC had the nation's best record (8-4) against non-conference AP ranked teams in 1998.
- The ACC won more games (13) against BCS conference opponents than any other league and played more games against BCS conference opponents than any other league.
- Eight ACC players earned first-team All-America honors in 1998, including Clemson defensive back Antwan Edwards. Fourteen ACC players were first, second or third-team All-Americans. Clemson has had at least one All-American 21 of the last 22 years.
- Five ACC teams won seven or more games for the seventh time in the last eight seasons.
- Seven former ACC players were on NFL Pro Bowl rosters after the 1998 season, including former Tiger linebacker Ed McDaniel.
- A total of 163 former ACC players were on NFL rosters during the 1998 season.
- Twelve Division I teams had at least eight players taken in the 1999 NFL draft and three were from the ACC. Clemson, North Carolina and Virginia all had six players drafted apiece.
- Over the last two years, only eight Division I schools have had at least 10 players drafted. Florida State (13), North Carolina (12) and Clemson (11) are three of those eight schools.
- Clemson (6) and North Carolina (5) led the nation in defensive players drafted after the 1998 season.
- The ACC has had at least one first-round selection in 11 consecutive NFL drafts and in 20 of the last 21. Florida State leads in first-round se-

lections with 21, while Clemson is second with 19. The Tigers have had 174 players drafted in history, including six in 1999.

- The ACC had five of the first 15 players and seven of the first 19 taken in the 1998 NFL draft. The seven first-round selections were the second most in league history.
- Over the last three years, 16 ACC linebackers have been selected in the NFL draft, including nine within the first three rounds.
- For each of the last three years, the ACC placed 29 former players in the NFL Pro Bowl. Only the Pac-10 had more Pro Bowl selections than the ACC. Clemson has had eight of those 29

- Pro Bowl selections over the last three years.
- The ACC is the nation's winningest conference in bowl games over the years. The league has a combined .535 winning percentage (81-70-5) in bowl games. Over the last nine years the ACC is the only conference in the country to have each of its member schools play in a bowl game.
- Georgia Tech, Clemson and Florida State all rank among the top 15 schools in the history of the game in bowl winning percentage (given a minimum of 15 appearances).
- In the decade of the 1990s, ACC teams have posted the nation's second best non-conference winning percentage. The ACC is 197-104-4 against non-league foes since 1990.
- The 1997 season marked the 10th straight year that the ACC has had at least four teams participate in bowl games.
- Twelve times in the last 19 years an ACC member school has claimed the CFA Academic Achievement Award, which is awarded to the CFA institution with the highest graduation rate among members of its football team.
- Ninety percent of ACC football games involving conference teams are on television. Clemson has averaged nine televised games per year to rank among the national leaders in that category.

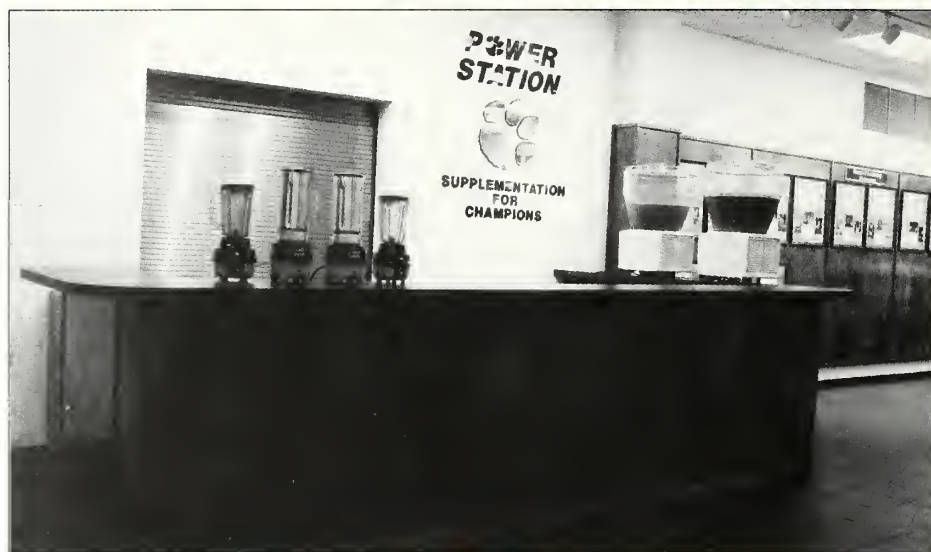
Strength Training

Clemson fans look forward to seeing tough, hard-nosed football when they come to Death Valley or travel to other schools to watch their Tigers in action. But some of the Tigers' most intense competition and action doesn't take place on autumn Saturday's and it doesn't take place on a field. Take a peek into the Clemson Strength Training Room at almost any time of day, almost any day of the week, at any time of the year, and you will see the Tigers building the foundation for their pursuit of a championship.

Perhaps the most impressive characteristic of the facility is its size. Several years ago, it was enlarged to an astounding 11,000 square feet, making it one of the largest in the nation. Two years ago, it was expanded to 14,000 square feet. The facility boasts two full lines of Nautilus machines and over 12 tons of weights. The large number of machines and free weights allows the weight room to be used by athletes from several other sports at the same time, without anyone having to wait in line at a particular station.

Within the last two years the dumbbell area and leg development areas were expanded as well as the nutrition and hydration area known as the Power Station. The Power Station features the energy and recovery drink to aid each athlete's recovery from intense training.

The plush atmosphere pro-

vides an interesting contrast to the physical exertion that takes place in the facility. When an athlete enters the etched glass doors, he is greeted by plush, wall-to-wall carpeting, walls lined with mirrors, ceiling fans, and music from a 26-speaker sound system - a worthy backdrop for well over \$500,000 worth of state-of-the-art equipment.

Color television monitors are also positioned throughout the facility. These monitors are used for training and instruction, as Tiger strength coaches film the athletes and work with them on form

correction.

The strength training staff spends long hours working around the various schedules of each sport and even takes the facility on the road when the Tiger football team plays in a bowl game.

The large staff of four full-time strength coaches, four graduate assistants, numerous student assistants, and volunteers ensures that each football player receives proper instruction on the fundamentals of strength and speed development. Training programs at Clemson are position specific and designed to meet the needs and demands of each athlete. Also, each position is appointed a full-time strength coach that serves as a personal trainer for that particular athlete throughout his career.

Hard core training and competition in the weight room and the annual Ironman Classic will help each athlete reach optimal levels in strength and speed development. The Tiger Strength Training and Nutrition Program helps each athlete to become a complete player.

Student-Athlete Enrichment Program

Since its inception in 1991, the five-faceted Student-Athlete Enrichment Program has provided its student-athletes a continued commitment to excellence. Our approach is to address the total student-athlete, and we are committed to **coaching our student-athletes to success (C.A.T.S.)** not only in the athletic arena but in the academic, personal growth, career, and service arenas as well. As an original member of the NCAA Life Skills/CHAMPS Program, we provide opportunities and services to address the changing needs and skills of student-athletes in the years during college and after graduation.

Clemson University's commitment to provide its student-athletes with the very best of facilities is evident in many ways. From the soaring upper decks of Memorial Stadium, to the state-of-the-art strength training facility, young men and women from all 19 of Clemson's varsity sports have the very best in facilities for training and competition. Vickery Hall is no exception, as the \$3 million structure is as impressive aesthetically as any of the other facilities. But the importance of Vickery Hall to the Clemson University Athletics Department is not found in the structure itself, but in the many programs that the building houses.

Vickery Hall opened in the spring of 1991 and was the first support facility in the country built solely for the all-around education of student-athletes. The two-story, 27,000 square-foot building is open throughout the day and into the evening to accommodate the extended schedules of student-athletes.

The mission of the Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs is to monitor, guide, and encourage student-athletes to fulfill their long-term goals, and to achieve their academic and career potential.

Vickery Hall focuses on five primary areas to meet the student-athlete's needs.

ACADEMIC COMMITMENT

The academic commitment aspect of Clemson's Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs has provided one of the best academic support and advising programs in the nation.

The proof is in the statistics. A record 181 Clemson student-athletes made the academic honor roll in 1999. The student-athletes had a record 2.71 GPA in the spring of 1999, just .07 from the overall student body GPA of 2.78. Records were also established for number of President's List and Dean's List students.

In the spring of 1999 the Clemson

football team posted a team GPA of 2.38, highest on record. Thirteen players were named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll for 1998-99.

The Academic Counselors perform a variety of duties to track academic progress. These duties include providing assistance in registration and priority scheduling, contacting faculty, personally checking classes, recording information, counseling sessions with student-athletes, providing diagnostic testing, and directing career aspirations.

One of the most prestigious programs that has received recognition essential to the growth of Vickery Hall is the tutorial program.

Of the 160 programs certified by CRLA, the Clemson Student-Athlete Enrichment Program is one of three student-athlete programs in the country to be granted a Level 1 certification from the College of Reading and Learning Association, International Tutor Certification Program.

Having tutor certification allows student-athletes to be provided the highest quality of academic assistance possible. Approximately 80 tutors are hired to provide academic support in the many subject areas offered.

Many post-graduate scholarships and internships are also available to student-

athletes continuing their education through postgraduate studies. Our student-athletes are provided timely information regarding these opportunities and the resources necessary to assist in the application process for either scholarships or internships.

The Department of Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs has recognized the need for students to have access to high-quality computing equipment and has made a commitment to provide the student-athletes at Clemson with one of the largest computer labs in the country. Located on the first floor of Vickery Hall is the Microcomputer Laboratory. The lab is open seven days a week, for 16 hours on Monday through Thursday, and a limited time on Saturday and Sunday. During exam periods the lab hours are extended.

The lab staff has a full-time computer manager, and also graduate students, many of whom are pursuing advanced degrees in computer science. Lab staff members are available for tutoring of any Computer Science course, as well as the many management, engineering, and business courses that deal with personal computers.

The Department of Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs is committed to providing state-of-the-art computing facilities. New computers have recently been purchased bringing the lab to a state of the art facility. Over 40 computers are available for student-athletes.

All computers are fully connected to the internet allowing access to computers throughout the world for research and communication.



PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITMENT

One of the most important programs that helps student-athletes reach their full potential and engage successfully in this college experience is the Personal Growth and Development Program.

One of the key components of this program is the first-semester freshman transition class designed to assist the student-athlete in making a successful transition into his/her university and athletic life. All first-semester freshmen attend a semester-long series of workshops targeting the transitional issues of time management, organizational strategies, health and wellness issues, athletic issues, diversity issues, career orientation, and service training. Throughout the academic year, all student-athletes are required to attend four large-group programs, which focus on pertinent social, health, and athletic issues.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT COMMITMENT

The Career Assistance Program provides student-athletes an opportunity to fulfill career aspirations by participating in various career seminars offered by the staff at Vickery Hall. The philosophy of this program is to provide student-athletes with job searching skills and strategies, internships, practical experience, and summer employment. These programs are designed to address specific career opportunities and acquire information about the student-athletes for each year.

By using the resources available to the University, Alumni Center, and the Athletic Department, the staff is working to establish a network of businesses, companies, and executives who will help assist with the Summer Employment Assistance Program. The program's main goal is to provide the student-athletes with job experience and a work history, which he or she can apply to his or her academic discipline.

The Career Assistance Program is coordinated from the academic colleges, the Placement Center, and through the Athletic Department contacts. This program is designed to better prepare the student-athlete for full-time employment and focuses on resume writing and interview techniques.

SERVICE COMMITMENT

Providing community and outreach service to student-athletes and the surrounding community by engaging the student-athletes in hands-on interactive programs is an important aspect of the Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs. The staff of SAEP coordinates various activities each year to engage student-athletes in community outreach projects



along with academic programs.

Another aspect of the service commitment is that of community service. The purpose of community service is to allow the student-athletes to become involved with the happenings of the community while giving back at the same time. Each year every team is required to perform at least two community outreach projects. Recently implemented was a new community service program entitled Success Away From the Game. The purpose of this program is to combine athletes of different sports in community outreach programs. By doing this, each outreach program participates, thus creating a diverse group of athletes with new and different ideas. At the end of each year, six student-athletes who have demonstrated outstanding commitment and contributions to the community are recognized as the Top 6 by the ACC.

LIFELine, another aspect of community service, consists of chosen football players who work together in specific community outreach projects. LIFELine has approximately 20 members along with a president, vice president and secretary. Once a month, these young men meet to discuss future projects. To date, they have sponsored Hi-Five Day, planted a garden at Helping Hands Children Shelter, and held reading programs at elementary schools. These young men have vital roles in both the community and the athletic arena.

To assist our student-athletes in becoming effective service leaders and communicators we provide service and speaking training, which anticipates the demands placed on a student-athlete when he/she might be speaking with a group of young people or also speaking with the media.

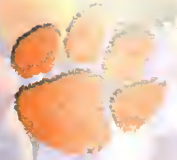

Rowing

In its inaugural season last year, the Clemson rowing team won the Atlantic Coast Collegiate Regatta and placed fourth at the Central Region Regatta. "I was very pleased with the successes in the inaugural year," said Clemson head coach Susie Lueck, who is now in her second season with the Tigers. "We overcame a lot of challenges to have a successful spring racing season."

Last season's Novice 8+ completed an undefeated spring season with a win in the Grand Final of the Central Region Regatta. "The undefeated novice season showed what our program was capable of," said Lueck. "The novice races were our first-year rowers competing against the first-year rowers from other schools, so it was on a level playing field."

In all 34 athletes return from Clemson's inaugural team, including six of the eight rowers from the Novice 8+ and six of the eight rowers from the top varsity boat. "All 12 of those returning athletes will be fighting for positions in our top boat, so it should be pretty competitive," said Lueck.

The Tigers have added 29 new athletes to the team this season. "These athletes have the potential to be great rowers," said Lueck.

The team has shown great improvements on the ergometer (rowing machine) already this fall. Each athlete is tested monthly from August to February in preparation for the spring season. "In September everyone on the team made huge improvements from their August tests, and 10 people had their best score ever," said Lueck.

Because of their training over the summer, Lueck feels the team is ahead of where it was last year at this time. "We had a lot of athletes who worked out really hard over the summer and came back in great shape, so we didn't have to start over at ground zero," she said. "They trained seriously in the summer and are excited about the possibilities of this year."

The first collegiate race on the east coast was held

in September, and although the Tigers did not compete in the race, the results gave the Clemson coaching staff of Lueck and assistant Kelly Lynch a good idea of where this year's team stands. "We have a good idea of who is showing speed already," said Lueck. "In the Women's Varsity 8+ race, 13 of the top 15 schools are in our region."

Clemson's season is broken up into a nontraditional fall season and a traditional spring season. The fall schedule consists of time trials over a three-mile course, while the spring season consists of head to head competition between teams on a one and one-quarter mile straight course.

The Tigers' fall season begins today when Clemson travels to the Head of the Tennessee. "Our season starts out with an opportunity for us to get our feet wet while having a race close to home," said Lueck.

Next Saturday the team returns home to compete in the Clemson Crew Fall Classic, sponsored by the Clemson club team on Lake Hartwell. On Sunday the Tigers will dedicate their new boats, which will be followed by their annual Class Day Regatta on Lake Hartwell.

"Our first opportunity to race other ACC teams will be at the Head of the Chatahoochee," said Lueck. On November 6-7, the Tigers will travel to Lake Lanier in Gainesville, GA, to race against several top crews, including North Carolina, Duke, Miami, Tennessee and Texas.

The Rivanna Romp, held November 14 on the

Rivanna Reservoir in Charlottesville, VA, will conclude the Tigers' fall season. "The Rivanna Romp is going to be an incredibly challenging race," said Lueck.

In Charlottesville, Clemson will face Virginia, who tied with Brown for the national championship last year, and Princeton, who placed third at last year's national championship regatta. Ohio State, North Carolina, Duke and Miami will compete in the event, also. "The results of this fall will show what we need to achieve by spring in order to make it to the NCAA Championships," said Lueck.

The spring season begins March 18 when the Tigers will race in the Augusta/Aiken County Spring Regatta on Langley Pond. The following weekend the

team will hold the Clemson Invitational on Lake Hartwell. During the first weekend of April the team will compete in the Clemson Sprints, sponsored by the Clemson club team on Lake Hartwell.

The Southern Intercollegiate Rowing Association (SIRA) Championships will be held on Melton Lake in Oak Ridge, TN, April 15-16. The Tigers won the Women's Novice 8+ race at the event last year.

Clemson will race against Michigan State and Washington State on Ovid Lake in Lansing, MI, on April 22.

The first official ACC Championship Regatta will be held April 29 on Lake Monticello just outside of Charlottesville. Clemson, Duke, North Carolina and Virginia will compete for the league title. The course is a two-lane course, so the top seeded team will face the fourth-seeded team, then seeds two and three will race. The winners of the two races will compete for the title.

"We're looking forward to the first official conference championship," said Lueck. "We're excited to race Virginia, who tied for the national championship last year, and we are looking to be competitive with Duke and North Carolina. All four programs are strong contenders, so it will be exciting competition."

The Central Region Championships will be held on Melton Lake in Oak Ridge, TN, May 13-14, followed by the NCAA Championships on the Cooper River in Camden, NJ, May 26-28.

Now that the team has a year of experience, Lueck is looking forward to the possibilities for this year's team. "This fall we're going to be able to be competitive, and that is what's exciting, versus last year at this time everyone was just learning how to row."

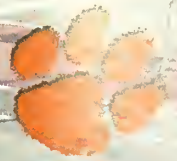

Women's Tennis

With the return of four starters from last season's squad and the addition of several newcomers, Clemson head women's tennis coach Nancy Harris is cautiously optimistic about the upcoming season.

"We're bringing in some new people that are going to add the much-needed depth for our team," said Harris. "But with newcomers, especially freshmen, you just don't know how they are going to perform in competition."

The Tigers had consistent performances last season from Carmina Giraldo at number one singles, Catherine Galvin at singles flight three and Cecilia Hincapie at number four singles. "All three of those athletes were meeting the demands of our schedule, which is a top 20 schedule, and we were always winning one doubles point, so we lost some big matches 5-4," said Harris.

Clemson defeated then 18th-ranked Brigham Young 5-4 early in the season and beat then 34th-ranked Georgia Tech 5-4 to end the regular season last year. "We showed the potential to play at the level of our ranked opponents, but we lacked the depth at the bottom of the lineup," said Harris. "This year the athletes at the bottom of the lineup are juniors and have a lot more experience. Hopefully they are going to stay injury free."

Once again Harris is looking for a strong performance at number one singles from sophomore Carmina Giraldo, who recorded a 12-7 overall record and a 7-2 conference record to earn All-

ACC honors last season. She won 10 of her last 14 matches and defeated 11th-ranked Mariel Verban of Wake Forest in the first round of the 1999 ACC Tournament. Giraldo represented the Tigers at the NCAA Tournament last year, where she dropped a 7-5, 7-6(5) decision to Georgia's Marissa Catlin.

"Her win over Verban was a significant win at the conference championships," said Harris. "I look for Carmina to have another good year."

Senior Catherine Galvin also returns in the top half of the singles lineup. Galvin earned All-ACC honors two years ago and had a 11-10 overall record and a 6-3 conference record at number three singles last season. "Catherine has had two solid years, and I think that she will be a winner for us again this year," said Harris.

Juniors Christina Oldock and Cinny Clausen played in the lower half of the singles lineup last season, but both have struggled with injuries throughout their careers at Clemson. "They were at the bottom of the lineup, and that's where we were having a difficult time winning," said Harris. "Every week they were giving us everything they had, but they just couldn't physically keep up with the demands of a top 20 schedule."

Oldock had surgery in the fall and will hopefully return to action in January or February. "Hopefully this surgery is going to give her the freedom to return to the game without pain and without worrying about taking care of her injury," said Harris. "Christina has always had the potential to be a great college player," said Harris. "We just haven't seen it yet because of her injury."

Clausen has been plagued by a hand injury and has not been able to endure the pain of holding a racket. "We're trying a lot of different things, but until she's 100 percent physically, we're never going to know what she can do," said Harris. "Clausen was one of America's top juniors, but we've never seen her at what I believe is her potential. These past two years have been difficult because she's been in and out of the lineup due to her injury, so she's never really been able to show what she's capable of."

Several newcomers are expected to complete the Tiger lineup. Freshman Sunnie Harmon of Greenwood, SC, was the state champion in 1998 and earned a number four ranking among all South Carolina players last year. "Sunnie is a player that we feel in time will be able to develop," said Harris, "and we're delighted to have someone from the state join the ranks of a South Carolina school."

"We have two other new players that we are very excited about, freshman Laurence Jayet and transfer Anna Savitskaya," said Harris.

Jayet was formerly one of France's elite juniors. She was the country's number one player in the 13s and 14s and has been a consistent top junior for France. "We are so excited to add Laurence to our lineup, because she's not only one of the best singles players, but also one of the best doubles players in the country," said Harris.

Savitskaya, of St. Petersburg, Russia, was

ranked sixth in Russia and ninth in the Independent States as a junior. "Every day Anna has gotten better and better and we're really looking forward to her singles and doubles performances," said Harris.

Despite the loss of seniors Cecilia Hincapie, Kate-Maree Mair and Meredith Chandler from last year's team, Harris has high expectations for this season. "We have lost some key players, but I think this season is going to be the best we have had since I have been at Clemson," she said. "The newcomers are going to add a lot. We're going to be much stronger in doubles this year, and I think that will be a significant factor for us."

"This is my third year here, and the spirit of this team is the best I have seen yet. That's a wonderful element that you can't always count on when you bring several new people together."

As always, the Tigers will play a tough schedule, facing eight teams that are ranked among the top 20 in the country. "We are going to be in a better position to face that competition than we were last year, certainly with the added depth," said Harris.

Out of Clemson's 19 dual matches, only seven will be on the road. Harris is hoping to capitalize off the home court advantage. The Tigers have also added Miami and South Florida to the lineup, replacing Notre Dame and Indiana, to give the team an advantage next season when it travels to Florida.

"By playing a few more Southern schools, we will be able to play more matches on hard courts outdoors, instead of playing indoors," said Harris. "Since the national championship is played on hard courts outdoors, I would much rather be playing on this type of court during the regular season. We consistently played well against the Midwestern schools at home, but did not play as well on the road because the indoor courts are very slick and fast. Moving away from that schedule is going to help us at the end of the season."

The ACC will again provide top level competition for the Tigers. "The ACC is getting tougher and tougher all the time," said Harris. "I think you are going to see over the next 10 years that the place to be in women's collegiate tennis is the ACC."

Seven of the nine ACC teams finished among the top 50 in the final ITA poll last year, including four teams in the top 30. Duke finished the season ranked third nationally, and Wake Forest was 17th in the final poll. "All of the conference schools moved up in the rankings last year, some of them as many as 20 spots, and the conference is only going to get stronger and stronger," said Harris.

Harris feels this year's team is up to the challenge. "To be the best you have to play the best, and to attract the best recruits you have to have a tough schedule," she said. "Our players really appreciate the challenging schedule, and they want to play the best teams, so I think it's positive to have such a tough schedule."

Top 25 Clemson Players of the Century

This past summer we asked 28 former Clemson players, coaches, administrators and fans to select their top 25 Clemson football players of the 20th Century. All of the panel members have followed Clemson football for at least 20 years and some for over 50 years. A first place vote received 25 points, second-place vote 24 points, and so on.

Each home football program we will announce five new players, in descending order. Today we announce players 6-10.

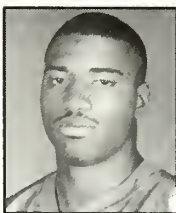


#10 Michael Dean Perry (1984-87)

There are two Perry's in the top 10, both featured in our list announced today. When William Perry (see number 7) was a freshman and sophomore, Tiger fans in his hometown of Aiken, SC said, "If you think he is good, wait until you see his brother." Clemson had the fifth best record in college football in the decade of the 1980s and the Perry brothers had as much to do with it as any two players.

From the time Michael Dean was a freshman, when he had 15 tackles for loss starting alongside his brother William, until his senior year when he was a first-team All-American and Outland Trophy finalist, Michael Dean was a leader. He concluded his career by leading the Tigers to a top five ranked defense and to a 10-2 overall record and ACC Championship in 1987. He was named ACC Player of the Year that season and concluded his career with conference records for tackles for loss (61) and quarterback sacks (28). Ironically, both records were held by William and he broke the marks by just one in each area.

At the conclusion of his career, Perry's height (6-1) was a question mark among pro scouts, so he wasn't drafted until the 50th selection of the 1988 draft. The previous 49 selections were mistakes, because Perry went on to a NFL career with the Cleveland Browns and Denver Broncos that might be considered the best ever among former Tigers in the NFL. He was a six-time Pro Bowl selection, more than any other former Tiger. This fall **Sporting News** selected all-time teams for NFL franchises and Perry was chosen as one of the starting defensive linemen on the Cleveland Browns all-time team.



#9 Anthony Simmons (1995-97)

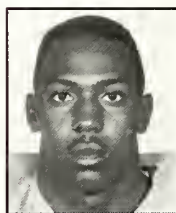
Our ninth greatest Clemson player of the 20th century made an impact on the Clemson program from day one of his freshman year. It took about 10 days of pre-season practice for Anthony Simmons to move into the starting lineup. By season's end he was a third-team AP All-American and UPI National Freshman of the Year. He was the first defensive player in history to win that national award.

Simmons was a precocious linebacker who combined speed and power with a keen knowledge of the game. It is safe to say he had the finest (true, not red-

shirt) freshman season in school history, regardless of position. Possibly regardless of sport. He posted 150 tackles that year to lead the team.

The rest of his career was just as stellar. He accumulated a school record 178 tackles in 1996 as a sophomore, again an All-America season for the native of Spartanburg, SC. He was a model of consistency throughout his career. He was Clemson's leading tackler in 28 of the 36 games he played and had a streak of 17 straight games with at least one tackle for loss, another Clemson record. He concluded his career with 486 tackles, second in Clemson history. He went pro after his junior year or would have shattered Bubba Brown's record had he returned.

Just the second ACC player in history to be named an AP All-American in three different seasons, Simmons was a first-round draft choice of the Seattle Seahawks in 1998 and is the starting inside linebacker for the club this year. There are many more honors ahead for Anthony Simmons.



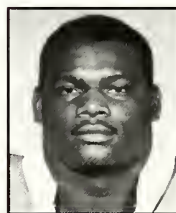
#8 Levon Kirkland (1988-91)

Levon Kirkland might rank as the most popular Clemson football player in recent history. A three-time All-ACC first team selection and two-time All-American, Kirkland was a mainstay of four straight seasons in which Clemson lost just two games. The Tigers were 39-8-1 in his four years, as he teamed with classmate and linebacker Ed McDaniel to make Clemson one of the most feared defenses in the NCAA.

Like Simmons, Kirkland was an impact player from his freshman year. When Clemson clinched the ACC Championship in 1988 at Maryland, Kirkland had one of the finest games of his career, collecting a career high 13 tackles, including three for loss, a sack and a caused fumble. In 1989 as a sophomore he was the MVP of the Gator Bowl victory over West Virginia as he chased Heisman Trophy candidate Major Harris all over the Jacksonville facility.

In 1990, Kirkland was a defensive demon of the only Clemson unit in history to lead the nation in total defense. Kirkland, a virtually unrecruited player out of high school, was a finalist for the Butkus Award, the only underclassman on the list. The 1991 defense, again with Kirkland leading the way, led the nation in rushing defense. Kirkland was a semifinalist for the Lombardi Award that year.

Kirkland concluded his career as one of just three Clemson players in history to be named first-team All-ACC. Like Michael Dean Perry, Kirkland was a second-round NFL draft choice who has gone on to a celebrated career. Two years ago he was a first-team All-Pro selection who started in the Pro Bowl. He also led the Steelers in tackles in the 1996 Super Bowl.



#7 William Perry (1981-84)

While he patrolled the middle of the Clemson defense from 1981-84, William Perry was perhaps the most feared defensive player in the South.

Opposing defensive coordinators had to make special plans, sometimes triple teaming assignments for Clemson's 320-pound anchor of the line.

Perry, who came to Clemson as a then unheard of 310-pound freshman, held legendary status at Clemson. All the stories you heard about "The Fridge" are all true. From the time he once blocked the opposing team's punt by shoving the upback into the punter, to Perry Tuttle taking him to lunch at a McDonald's and spending \$22, Perry was a superhuman almost fictional character. He was also a sportswriter's dream. "Even when I was little I was big," said Perry, perhaps the Yogi Berra of Clemson football from an interview standpoint.

On the field, he was a three-time All-American, joining Anthony Simmons as the only Tigers who could make that claim. In 1984, he led the nation in tackles for loss with 27 and he tied the Clemson single season sack record with 10. He was a finalist for the Lombardi Award that season and was the ACC Player of the Year in 1984, the second defensive player in league history to win the honor.

In 1985, Perry was a first-round draft pick of the Chicago Bears. As a freshman at Clemson he started on the Tigers National Championship team. As a rookie in the NFL he started on the Bears Super Bowl Championship team, the first of his nine NFL seasons.



#6 Fred Cone (1948-50)

The most unusual recruiting story on our list of top 25 greatest Clemson players of the century belongs to Fred Cone. In the summer of 1947, Coach Frank Howard was informed by his sister, who lived in Mississippi, that there was a terrific athlete related to her next door neighbor. When Howard turned in the names of his scholarship players for the fall of 1947, he had one spot left, so he added Fred Cone to the list, sight unseen.

Had he wanted to watch Cone play high school football he could not have done it. Cone did not play football in high school. Howard's sister was simply impressed with his athletic ability diving into the neighbor's pool.

By his sophomore year, 1948, Cone was leading the Tigers to an undefeated season, Clemson's first perfect year since 1900. Cone had 635 yards rushing and seven TDs, leading Clemson to the Gator Bowl, where Clemson downed Missouri 24-23. His second-effort run on fourth-and-three for a first down in the final minutes allowed Clemson to run out the clock and claim the landmark victory.

Two years later, Cone was leading Clemson to another undefeated season and he garnered first-team All-Southern honors. He scored 15 touchdowns and gained 845 yards in 1950 and concluded his career with 31 touchdowns, a record. After his Hall of Fame career at Clemson, Cone went on to a Hall of Fame career with the Green Bay Packers. He led the NFL in field goals in 1955.

In 1997 he was inducted into the Clemson Ring of Honor, a distinction he richly deserves. Not bad for someone who never played high school football.
