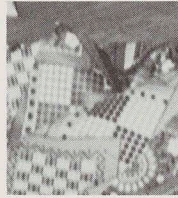
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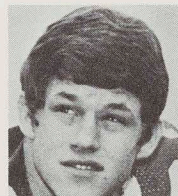

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President George Matthew's Modlin

**ALUMNI AND ALUMNAE DEVOTE A DAY TO THE
HONORING OF THEIR OUTSTANDING
UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT**

Among the speakers honoring President Modlin, none was more eloquent than Trustee Charles H. Ryland, who gave a verbal impression of George Modlin as skillfully done as the magnificent portrait the trustees presented to the university on Alumni Day, May 15.

His audience in the Camp Memorial Theater was part of the more than 700 alumni and alumnae who returned to the campus to express their appreciation of President Modlin, noted for, as Ryland put it, "his devotion to the furtherance of Christian education, his patience and forbearance with the dissent of changing times, and his desire that this institution should be first and foremost one of quality."

University Rector Robert T. Marsh, Jr. served as Master of Ceremonies for the memorable day's program.

Dr. Modlin joins his godsons, George and Cary Booth, who unveiled the dedicatory plaque on the George Matthews Modlin Fine Arts Center.



Ryland led off the first part of the day's program with the presentation of the portrait. He told of Modlin's boyhood in Elizabeth City, N. C. where the future president was "a smart boy and a leader among his generation." He sketched Modlin's high school career as "a high school scholar and athlete who led his class and later a college student at Wake Forest where he managed a Glee Club that made so much money that it was the principal financial support of the athletic department."

After graduate school and teaching at Princeton, he came to the campus to head the Evening School of Business Administration. Of Modlin's career as president, beginning in 1946, Ryland said that Modlin "found a small university and under his administration guided its growth to its present position as one of the foremost undergraduate universities in our land."

In his concluding remarks, Ryland said that "there have been many facets to his presidency in the past quarter century. Foremost among them certainly would be his kindness and his understanding the multiple problems that swirl around the university president of this day and time."

Mrs. Mildred Clinkscales, president of the Westhampton Alumnae Association, followed Ryland at the podium. She thanked Dr. Modlin for his assistance in helping to make a reality the Fanny G. Crenshaw Swimming Pool, long a project of the alumnae.

And then another comment: "From all who have enjoyed the beauty of the campus comes an expression of special appreciation to Dr. Modlin for adhering to the original Collegiate Gothic style of architecture throughout

the continuing building program . . . thus making it possible for the campus of the university to remain one of the loveliest in the country.”

Judge E. Ballard Baker, president of the General Society of Alumni, termed Dr. Modlin “a gifted fund raiser,” and said alumni could be proud that the university has shown a steady growth and continued to provide a challenging and comprehensive academic program in which students may develop their full potential.

A book of letters from Dr. Modlin's former students was presented to him at the close of Judge Baker's remarks.

Rector Marsh concluded the morning ceremony by naming the Fine Arts Building, the George Matthews Modlin Fine Arts Center, and a bronze plaque on the front of the building was unveiled by Dr. Modlin's godsons George and Cary Booth.

Alumni and alumnae crowded into Keller Hall gymnasium for the luncheon ceremony at which Dr. Modlin received more accolades.

Dr. Theodore F. Adams, retired pastor of the First Baptist Church in Richmond, told the audience of Dr. Modlin's work as a Christian educator and Baptist leader.

Chief Justice Harold F. Snead asserted that “no couple has contributed more to the religious, educational, cultural and civic life of this community than Dr. and Mrs. Modlin.” Judge Snead said that it was “not surprising” that the Virginia General Assembly, “in its search throughout the Commonwealth for the most qualified man to serve as the public member” of the newly-created Judicial Inquiry and Review Board, “unanimously elected George Modlin.”

It was Kathy Neal, a slender blonde with a touch of her native North Carolina accent, who spoke for the students. One comment, particularly appreciated by the president, was that “he might have often felt he was the rope in a game of tug-of-war between students and trustees, but he never snapped.” The comment brought sympathetic laughter from the audience.

Miss Neal concluded: “Dr. Modlin has, with honor and far-sightedness, pointed out the opportunities and hopes of the many directions in which our university may now move. The summit of his progress is our future hope, and we thank him for getting us there with his devotion and concern, his persistence, his nobility and his challenge.”

Speaking for the faculty, Provost Robert F. Smart said that “no college or university president ever assumed the responsibilities of his office under more favorable conditions, as far as his faculty was concerned, than did President Modlin.” That confidence was never betrayed, and the president “has exceeded the call of duty in his devotion and service to the university and its faculty.” In recounting the many achievements of President Modlin, Dr. Smart asserted that “concern for the welfare of his faculty has been foremost in his mind since the day he accepted the presidency in 1946. During his administration, though always faced with the problem of a restricted operating budget, there have been 18 general faculty salary increases resulting in a total increase of more than 300 per cent.”

Treasurer Charles H. Wheeler III was the final speaker of the day and spoke on behalf of the university administration. “For 25 years I have

worked daily with George Modlin on the university's problems. It has always been with the spirit of love and the greatest consideration for the feelings and welfare of the students, faculty and alumni that he has approached the problems before him.”

Then Dr. Wheeler expressed his consensus of all the speakers: “We are fortunate that he is still whole in body and spirit and can become a fitting Chancellor for the University of Richmond, a private university that promises to take its place among the greatest in the country.”

Among many gifts received by the Modlins during their day of appreciation were 12 Spode china dinner plates, embossed with the university seal, a check from the board for a well deserved vacation trip, a scroll of appreciation from alumni and alumnae and a book of letters from former students.

In response to the gifts and accolades, Dr. Modlin said he found them to be rather overwhelming—much like his wedding. “I thought,” he said with a twinkling smile for Mrs. Modlin, “that getting Virginia was enough and I was amazed when gifts began to arrive!

“Rather than receive gifts from our alumni and alumnae friends, Virginia and I should give them gifts,” he continued. “So many college presidents bemoan the problems and pressures created by alumni and alumnae. But not I. These associations have been among my happiest.”

In conclusion the retiring president said, with obvious sincerity, “As we look back on a quarter century of happy experiences, great satisfactions and warm friendships, Virginia and I can say, simply, ‘thank you’ one and all for 25 glorious years together with you.”

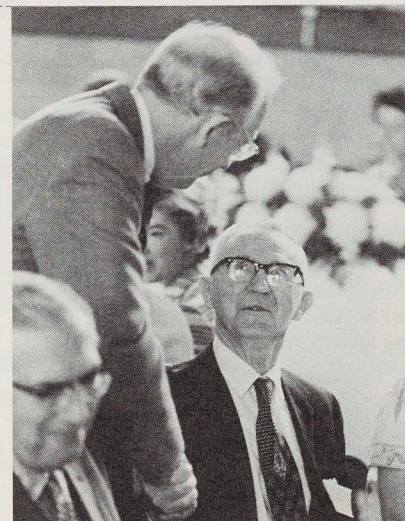
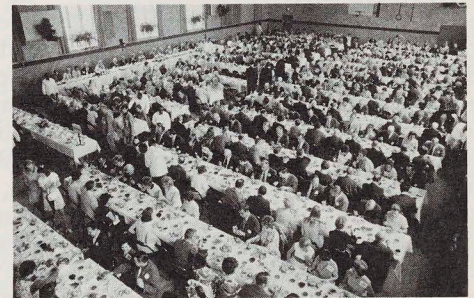

Choir's Trading Stamp Journey is Complete Success

Early last fall there were snickers about the University Choir's campaign to collect S & H Green Stamps for a trip to Europe. On March 22 the snickers had turned to sheepishly smiling faces of envy as the choir's chartered bus left a send-off gathering of 200 at the University and headed for John F. Kennedy Airport in New York.

Thanks to alumni, relatives of the choir members, friends and hard work, Europe was introduced to the University of Richmond.

The choir needed \$32,000 or 16,000 books of stamps for the tour which took them to Belgium, Germany, Switzerland, Luxembourg, England, Iceland, and the Netherlands. With car washes, paper drives, green stamps, donations and an enthusiastic motto—"Only he who attempts the absurd, achieves the impossible"—approximately \$22,000 was raised. The members had to pay \$375 in March, but each will be refunded approximately \$100 from late donations.

The 18-day tour was a whirlwind of hard rolls at continental breakfasts; sight-seeing tours; concerts at historical churches and all-girl schools; moments of disbelief; learning new currency values; and long, hard traveling hours on everything from trains and buses to planes and steamers.

Forty hours after the University send-off, the first hotel and a few hours of real sleep were available. Choir Director James Erb summed up everyone's condition during that 40-hour period and six-hour time change—"unreal and exhausted."

The choir experienced the beauty of Rigi in the Swiss Alps, the fun of a brewery and canal boat rides in Amsterdam, the quaintness of Windsor and Oxford in England, and the depression of the Berlin Wall. The trip to East Berlin and the Wall was the most provocative part of the trip. "It is absurd and unreal that grown men can act that way," said one member, expressing what almost everyone felt.

The first concert at the Twickenham County School for Girls on the outskirts

of London left some of the 500 girls between the ages of 11 and 18 whistling "The Yellow Rose of Texas," and one male choir member was caught signing an autograph.

The small, rural town of Wallingford, England was one high point of the tour because the choir members got a chance to become English for a night. The members were dispersed among the townspeople after the concert and returned the next day with enthusiasm, new friends, and *savoir faire* of the typically English style.

There were complaints about the lack of central heating in the English homes, skinny bathtubs, and scarce hot water. Some members told of hot water bottles which they used to keep their beds warm.

English foods were tried by everyone. Roast beef, Yorkshire pudding, and potatoes composed the most frequent menu. One member told how surprised his host family was when he turned down coffee for tea, but everyone was not completely converted. One member still tried to get into the car from the wrong side when he left.

After the concert at Elgg, Switzerland, the choir was invited to a reception unlike any it had ever experienced. Upon entering the room an American flag could be seen hanging between the Swiss flag and the town's flag. For entertainment a group of yodelers, dressed in native costumes, sang. The mayor said the choir members were "ambassadors of the best of America" and had surprised the residents of Elgg, who "sometimes don't always speak well of Americans."

There was a standing ovation in Amsterdam although the audience was small, and the choir received an invitation to return after doing several selections impromptu in Zurich at Grossmunster, a church which was founded by Charlemagne and where Zwingli preached during the Reformation.

We were told several times that the choir had set a precedent—it was the first time people had clapped in church.

At Berlin the choir sang in the Kaiser

Wilhelm Memorial Church with royal blue stained glass walls as a backdrop. One woman followed the choir to the stairs, continually clapping in appreciation.

Bad weather delayed the choir's flight to Iceland causing the members to rush from the plane directly to the concert without eating, rehearsing, or changing into concert dress. After hearing the choir sing "Shenandoah" our tour guide at Reykjavik, Iceland said, "Hearing you sing that makes me trust in the world and young people."

Rehearsals were conducted in everything from the bus, a synagogue, and a cold, dark cathedral to a 12-foot-square area of a hotel restaurant at midnight.

After one incident when the bus arrived with a University of Richmond Choir sign on the side, the choir's morale rose so high that the few confused plans and all the waiting was worthwhile.

When asked if the tour was a success, everyone gave a resounding "yes!" Discussion of another trip in four years has already begun. One member explained that the trip was an "experience of a lifetime." "I can see how the people are different and form my own opinions why they are," said another.

Erb said before the trip that it "would be more than just a trip to Europe." It will put the University "on the map where it has never been before. It isn't the first time an American college has gone to Europe," he said. "It is the first time anyone has been crazy enough to go on trading stamps."

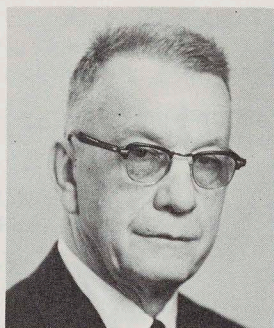
He saw the need to show Europe what Americans really are. So many Europeans view us as "gum-chewing, loud-talking, camera-toting tourists," he explained.

As the bus drove back onto the campus on April 8, Erb sighed and said he felt "relieved."

He wrote some words of appreciation to the people of Elgg which seem to capture what the trip meant to everyone: "What we have experienced here no one—including time, the worst robber—can ever take away from us."

Two Hundred Seventy Years...

at the University of Richmond would be an appropriate title for this salute to nine of the University of Richmond faculty who ended their teaching careers this year.

Their aggregate length of service is 270 years with Herman P. Thomas, professor of economics, and Malcolm U. Pitt, baseball coach and former athletic director, contributing chunks of 44 and 43 years, respectively, to this grand total.

Dr. Thomas came in 1927 from a professorship at Marshall College and a year later Pitt left a coaching job at Fork Union Military Academy to become freshman coach at the University of Richmond.

When Thomas and Pitt arrived, M. Ray Doubles, was already on the job at the T. C. Williams Law School, having joined the faculty the year of his graduation in 1926. He became dean

in 1930 and continued to serve in this post with distinction until his appointment in 1947 as judge of Richmond's Hustings Court, Part II. Upon his retirement from the bench in 1965, he rejoined the law faculty. His total service to the University was 27 years.

Although Thomas, Pitt and Doubles were already U of R veterans when she arrived at Westhampton College in 1933, Marjorie Rivenburg, professor of Latin, can claim the longest association with educational institutions. Gleefully she points out that she was born in a boy's dormitory in a preparatory school—Peddie at Hightstown, N. J. where her father was assistant headmaster. She continued her education at Wellesley College and later at Bucknell where her father was dean and vice president. She won her doctorate at the University of Pennsylvania.

J. Stanton Pierce, professor of chemistry, came four years later from a professorship at Georgetown College in Kentucky.

Hannah L. Coker returned to her beloved Westhampton in 1945 as a member of the music department, later to become music librarian; Spencer D. Albright, professor of political science, came the following year; Mary Jane Miller, chairman of the physical education department at Westhampton, in 1949, and Joseph C. Robert, professor of history, 1960.

Like the mighty S. C. Mitchell, in whose Ryland Hall classroom he taught some of his students, Dr. Robert ended his career as a teacher after serving as a college president, first at Coker College in South Carolina and later at



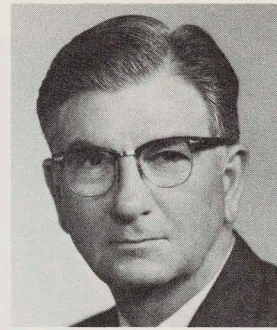

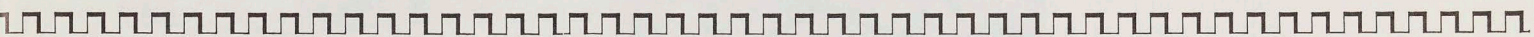

Hampden-Sydney. Now in retirement, he will "get on with the book"—the book being a biography of William Wirt, the nation's attorney general from 1817-29 and author of a biography of Patrick Henry.

Dr. Rivenburg also has some writing to do, after first completing genealogical research into her father's forbears, the Rivenburghs (printer spare that "h"), Dutch settlers on the banks of the Hudson, and the Whites who settled in New England. In addition, she is attempting to "translate" some of the writings of her uncle Milton G. Evans, president of Crozer Theological Seminary from 1913 to 1934, whose theology was more orthodox than his penmanship.

"Retirement" is just a silly word insofar as Dr. Pierce is concerned. He'll be at work in the laboratory at the University of Richmond and later at the Virginia Institute for Scientific Research. His immediate concern is with "surfactants and sequestering." He also plans some research in the pharmaceutical field.

Mac Pitt has Camp Virginia, his home away from home in the Alleghany mountains near Goshen, Va., and Judge Doubles (one of the most versatile members of the University family) has a number of avocations, including painting. Miss Coker is returning to the Paris she found so delightful as a music student.

Not only her colleagues but the flowers at Westhampton will miss Hannah Coker. Music and gardening have been her two loves and the beauty of the North Court garden at

Westhampton, as well as other gardens on the campus, are a colorful tribute to her skill and devotion. The music library, under her care, has grown to 2,500 recordings, an equal number of scores, and some books.

Dr. Thomas will make more frequent trips to his beloved southwest Virginia where his father was a Baptist minister. As a high school student, he had decided not to go on to college—but his father changed young Herman's mind, and hundreds of the University of Richmond alumni are grateful that he did. Dr. Thomas demonstrated that one can be a tough teacher and still win the respect and affection of students. His "money and banking" made even the strongest students tremble.

Both Dr. Thomas and Dr. Albright have had scholarships established in their names—evidence of the esteem in which they are held by their former students. Dr. Albright was a nationally known authority in political science before he joined the University of Richmond. He is the author of several books and articles, among them the volume, "The American Ballot," and two allied works. During his tour of duty with the Army Air Corps in World War II he was one of the writers for the Training Command History for the Army historical record for which he received an official commendation.

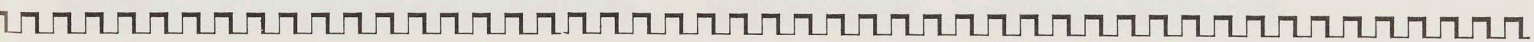
Although the University's mandatory retirement at 70 became effective this year for the first time, both Pitt and Thomas had continued their service beyond this limit. Two of the retiring professors, Miss Miller and Dr. Robert,

elected to close out their teaching careers at the University years short of the mandatory retirement age.

All of the nine will be remembered by students and colleagues for warm personal qualities in addition to their scholarship. Spencer Albright's delightful sense of humor and his infectious laughter; Hannah Coker's broad smile and her eagerness to be helpful; Marjory Rivenburg's ardent championship of women's colleges in an era when coeducation seems to be sweeping the land; Pierce's almost religious devotion to the science of chemistry; Pitt's insistence that his teams win and his equal insistence that when they take their lumps they take them like gentlemen and sportsmen; Mary Jane Miller's quiet efficiency, her friendly and helpful manner.

Students will remember with appreciation Dr. Robert's practice of appointing a secretary to take minutes at each class meeting, with the secretaryship rotating from day to day. The experience was helpful to the students. It also enabled the professor to discover that he had not made abundantly clear some of the things he thought were crystal clear when he was lecturing.

Like precious gems, each of the nine sparkles in his own distinctive fashion. Each had an important "plus" that enriched the life of the University and the community. As President Modlin told the trustees and later the faculty at the final meeting of the year, others will teach their classes and perform their varied duties on the campus, but the nine can never be replaced.

PATCHES

From a Designing Alumnus

Alumnus Robert M. Dills, '68, has set Tazewell, Va. buzzing.

The buzz is from the highly productive sewing machines of area women who are working with Bob in a fast-growing cottage industry, "Patch Blossom Exclusive." Following haute couture's nostalgic turn to the quaint peasant look, the women piece their lovely patchwork designs into garments ranging from hot pants to satin patch ball gowns.

But Bob is not a private businessman who went into the area with a brilliant scheme to make a personal financial killing. In fact, the very idea of the young designer standing over underpaid needlewomen, lashing them to extract better production, is downright laughable. He is there as the Project Director of Neighborhood Service Systems of Tazewell County Development Corporation, which is the local Office of Economic Opportunity.

The project was created to meet the needs of low income women who want to make money to supplement family funds AND become a producing part of the economy. According to Bob, since the women almost all knew how to sew well, out of necessity, and since most of them learned quilting as part of their Appalachian heritage, it was not a difficult task for them to combine the two talents and do work of superior quality. And the timing with fashion's current trend, of course, turned out to be perfect.

An initial showing of the collection was presented on local television; another followed in Roanoke. The First Lady of the State, Mrs. Linwood Holton, espoused the cause. "Jinks" Holton wore the fashions, presented them at coffees and receptions in the Executive Mansion and attended shows staged for invited guests at country clubs. Miller & Rhoads, Julius Garfinkle Co. in Washington, the Jordan Marsh Co. in Boston and Bergdorf Goodman in New York City were quick to see the consumer possibilities and buy. In addition, the collection was seen at benefit fashion shows and was

offered to any club wishing to use it as a money-making venture.

The label, a four-petaled red blossom with blue center bearing a yellow inverted "p" and "B", is now popping up in the best of wardrobes.

Bob, who majored in art at the University of Richmond, is assisted by two outreach workers who serve as sewing supervisors and keep a close check on quality. Since many participants cannot read or use standard patterns and have always created garments by looking at pictures, the supervisors make less confusing plain brown paper patterns for the needlewomen to follow. The sewing is done in the women's homes.

Dan River Mills, in highly endorsing the effort, has made sizeable donations of material or placed the cost well within the means of the participants who are expected to furnish their own material after the O.E.O. supplies the initial need. In this way, the "give away" humiliation is avoided, and the seamstresses become self-supporting and a producing part of the economy.

The clothes are marketed through Patch Blossom Exclusive, Bobbins Ltd. (the budget line) and Designs by Bob Dills (the exclusive label.) The women, not the Tazewell County Development Corporation, realize the full profit of production.

With such intriguing old patterns as Crazy Ann, Double Wedding Band and Heart, Drunkard Row, Butterfly and String Quilt; a collection of hot pants, tunics, knickers, scooter pants, etc. has been a summer success. Wedding clothes are now being produced with a staff member interpreting Bob's designs. Thus, they are working for a continuing industry which will not die with the patch work fad. Soon the designs will take to the skies as aprons for Piedmont Airline's hostesses.

But most important, Tazewell's women are buzzing along with their sewing machines knowing the joy of self esteem as well as money.

The Honors Program

A look at the practical side of psychology

Four June graduates of the University of Richmond who have honors in psychology are down on ivory towers but up on some of the practical aspects of their field.

The phenomenon is caused by experience, and the experience came through the psychology honors program at the university. The four personally grappled with the problems of children with learning disabilities and emotional difficulties and even ventured into the publishing world which is generally out-of-bounds to the undergraduate.

For the college seniors, working at the Virginia Treatment Center for Children and Stonewall Jackson Elementary School was not simply a useful exercise; it provided a clue to their futures.

Susan Stansbury of Richmond, Carole Waite of Fredericksburg, Stephen Rust of Fairfax and Mrs. Faye Inge of South Boston went into their senior year with high grade averages and psychology as their field of emphasis. Following a three-year-old tradition, they were candidates for the honors program.

"The honors program is a reward for doing well during the first three years," said Dr. Kenneth A. Blick, associate professor of psychology and program advisor. "We talk to the student, find out what he is interested in doing and try to arrange it. The honors program has been extremely successful, because area agencies have been very good about taking our students and giving them useful work to do.

"We have had seven honors students in the past three years, and we anticipate that many again in September.

"After a student (who has at least 12 hours in his field and an A or B average) has expressed his preference for a specific project area, we arrange for him to do special research or work at an

agency. The program is unusual in that he earns full academic credit.

"If his project has taken the form of work, he usually writes a report, is examined through a questioning session led by three psychology staff members and, sometimes, he conducts a class of his peers and explains what his experiences have been. If the student has done research, his findings are subject to publication or oral presentation if we can find an outlet."

Though several departments of the university have honors programs, many of the projects are limited to research.

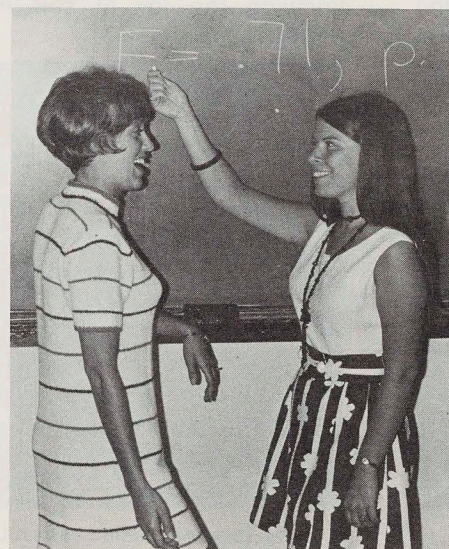
The honors students of the past have published their works in professional journals and presented research papers to the Virginia Academy of Sciences, and several have gained graduate fellowships to well-known universities.

Miss Stansbury worked one afternoon each week during the first semester at the Virginia Treatment Center for Children. "I wrote a case history on one emotionally disturbed child," she explained. "The children are there, out of the family situation, trying to work out their problems with objective, professional help.

"But," she admitted frankly, "I found out that I am not suited to that particular aspect of psychological work. I was too idealistic. I did not have a real concept of what it takes to work with an emotionally disturbed child.

"During the second semester I worked at Stonewall Jackson Elementary School which is for children who have learning disabilities. I found I could approach that work much more realistically. I intend to teach in Portsmouth next year," she said. "And I believe I'll be a much better teacher than I would have been. I feel I'm better prepared, for instance,

to detect a child with a learning disability."

Rust, who has decided to do graduate work at the University of Tennessee, spent his first semester in research and worked at Stonewall Jackson one day a week during the second semester. "I taught a class of about 14 boys between 12 and 15 years old. It was surprising how intelligent they were; all were of average or above average intelligence.

"I learned just how frustrating it can be for children like that to have a learning disability. They can be trying very hard and can understand the material perfectly when it's presented orally, for instance, but may be inadequate in responding to it in written form. Each has his own area of strength—and weakness—and one must work with the child as an individual. If we were stumped, we got help."

Mrs. Inge, who was on the same schedule that semester, agreed. "Sometimes the children with learning disabilities became so frustrated that they developed emotional difficulties in addition to their already present learning disabilities. Students can work well with these children, I believe. It takes a great deal of individual attention to give a child confidence in himself, to help him see that he can learn if he can overcome a particular problem.

Mrs. Inge has become so interested in learning disabilities that she took a graduate course through the university's summer school, in dyslexia, which manifests itself in a variety of reading disorders.

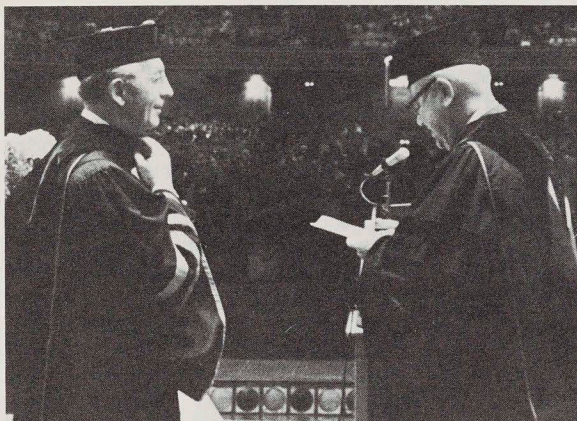
Miss Waite's program was one of research. "I conducted a survey of college students here to determine the memory devices they use to recall a list of words.

"I didn't give them a list. I asked them to describe how they would memorize a list. Eighty-four students in introductory psychology were used." Her findings were published with Dr. Blick as co-author in *Psychological Reports*. The summary of their paper made reference to the comparative popularity of memorization techniques. ". . . by frequency of occurrence: first letter, simple repetition, clustering, personal experience, descriptive story. No significant differences were found between men and women by category . . ."

Miss Waite was one of 14 students in the nation to be awarded a National Science Foundation grant for research this summer. She will do her research at Old Dominion University. In the autumn she will begin study leading to the Master of Arts degree at the University of South Carolina. She, too, found a lead for the future through the honors program.

Dr. Modlin Heads Degree Recipients



The University of Richmond conferred an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws on President Modlin at commencement ceremonies June 7, an official recognition of his achievement as he ended 25 years as the university's chief executive.

He became Chancellor of the University July 1.

Another Richmond university president, Dr. Allix B. James of Virginia Union University, also received the degree of Doctor of Laws at commencement.

Two others also received honorary Doctor of Laws degrees. They are Judge Fred H. Caplan, '41, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Appeals of West Virginia, and Charles H. Ryland, a university trustee and a Warsaw, Va., attorney.

Honorary Doctor of Divinity degrees were conferred on the Rev. F. Lawson Pankey, '48, secretary of the Department of Teacher and Training of the Virginia Baptist General Board; and the Rev. Thomas W. Downing, Jr., '54, pastor of University Baptist Church in Baltimore, who delivered the baccalaureate sermon in the Camp Theater, June 6.

President Modlin delivered the commencement address in which he suggested that "it is time to emphasize the things that are right about our educational institutions." He urged the support of American higher education and particularly private institutions.

He also warned that "any attempt to use the institution for partisan purposes or as an instrument of social policy must be strongly resisted. "Only by maintaining our colleges and universities as objective centers of reason can they continue to be the civilizing force standing at the center of our civilization," he said.

Earlier in his address, President Modlin characterized the current student generation as "more knowledgeable, perhaps more idealistic, more actively interested in political affairs, social problems, and social services." The students of this generation, as Dr. Modlin views them, are "able, ambitious, hard-working young people."

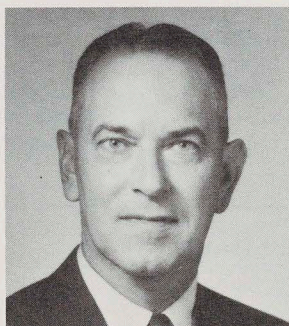
But while praising today's college students, President Modlin suggested that "too often the spotlight is on that small percentage of radical revolutionaries who—though bright, well-read, and articulate before television cameras—seem determined to tear down and thus besmirch the reputation of all students."

He closed the commencement address with a tribute to the parents and grandparents of the graduates, citing gains in economic and social areas, and medical and technical fields, and contributions toward solving the problems of the lesser privileged countries of the world.

President Modlin expressed his confidence in this college generation by asserting that it would accomplish as much in its time.

At the close of President Modlin's address, 594 candidates received undergraduate and graduate degrees.

Heflin New Alumni Trustee

Aubrey N. Heflin, '33, president of the Federal Reserve Bank in Richmond, has been selected alumni trustee by the University's Board of Trustees. He was selected from a slate of three nominees chosen by general election of the Alumni Society. He will serve a four-year term. Alumni representatives are not eligible for reelection.

Heflin played baseball at the University of Richmond; was a member of the Monogram Club, Omicron Delta Kappa leadership fraternity, and Lambda Chi Alpha social fraternity. He received his law degree from the University of Virginia in 1936 and practiced law from the time of his gradua-

tion until he entered the U. S. Navy in 1942.

Following his discharge in 1945, he returned to his law practice and in 1953 became General Counsel for the Federal Reserve. He became first vice-president in 1961 and has served as president since 1968.

Heflin joins C. Porter Vaughan, '40 and Rosalind Allen Barker, '57 who were selected alumni and alumnae trustee representatives last year.

John W. Edmonds, III, '53, L'56, was also elected to board membership at the June 7 meeting. A Richmond attorney, Edmonds, president of the Alumni Council, was a nominee of the Baptist General Association of Virginia.

Seven trustees were re-elected for a four year term expiring June 30, 1975. They are Mrs. Leslie Cheek, Jr. of Richmond; Dr. Ernest L. Honts, '30, Executive Director of the Virginia Baptist Foundation; Mrs. Alois Mayer of Norwich, Vermont; T. Justin Moore, Jr., President of Virginia Electric & Power Co.; Richard S. Reynolds, Jr., Chairman of the Board of Reynolds Metals Co.; Justice Harold F. Snead, '25, L'29, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Appeals of Virginia; and William B. Thalhimer, Jr., President of Thalhimer Brothers, Inc. Re-elected to board membership with a term expiring June 30, 1973 was Dr. R. Clayton Pitts, pastor of Port Norfolk Baptist Church, Portsmouth, Va.

The Development Program 1970-1971 A YEAR OF GROWTH

The Office of University Development at the University of Richmond has been in existence for twenty-two months; it has been located in three different campus buildings during the past year; and several "new" people have been employed in staff positions. Such activity has caused some confusion and aroused curiosity on the part of many alumni, faculty and others as to the purposes and functions of the Development Office.

At the University of Richmond the Development Office encompasses a larger role than just "fund raising". The functions of alumni relations, public information, and general University relations are included as part of the office portfolio of responsibilities.

Just now, however, let me tell you of the activities in the area of University fund raising. Often known as "the development program", fund raising efforts are taking three major directions:

1. Annual Giving—an annual appeal directed to all University constituencies including alumni, parents and other friends. The Annual Giving Campaign seeks the maximum number of unrestricted dollars to support the general University operating budget. The Annual Giving Campaign is run from July 1 to June 30 and the emphasis is on obtaining the greatest possible participation and gifts of cash rather than pledges. This year the "New" Annual Giving Program, under the able leadership of Joseph A. Jennings, '49, National Chairman, surpassed its goal of \$215,000.

The Development Office does not have responsibility nor does it provide staff direction for the Richmond Student Aid Foundation program or the Westhampton Alumnae Fund. These annual fund raising efforts are directed from other University offices.

2. Capital Gifts and Campaigns—During 1969-1970, the Office of Development provided professional staff assistance to the Centennial Fund volunteer organization which raised \$502,315 for an addition to The T. C. Williams School of Law building.

Capital campaigns usually provide resources for "brick and mortar projects" and major pieces of equipment. Emphasis is on obtaining a "substantial" pledge over a period of time.

In this academic year we have been seeking resources for major items of instructional equipment, principally in the natural science departments.

3. Deferred Giving Program—The large endowments of the "prestige" academic institutions have come principally from the bequests of alumni and other friends. The University of Richmond has been fortunate in past years in having a number of loyal alumni remember Alma Mater in their estate planning. To assure our future, *The Bequests and Planned Gifts Program* was launched in January 1971 with the selection of a special advisory committee.


The major purpose of the program is to assure that potential donors to the University of Richmond are aware of all the possible methods of supporting the University, including bequests, trusts, life insurance, and other special programs.

The Advisory Committee will provide technical advice and counsel to the University Development Office in the planning, organization, and direction of the program. Serving on this important Committee are: Forrest W. Brown, Jr., '44, Partner, A. M. Pullen and Co.; Robert L. Burrus, '55, Attorney, McGuire, Woods and Battle; John E. Campbell, '51, Vice President and Trust Officer, United Virginia Bank/State Planters; Carle Davis, '54, Attorney, McGuire, Woods and Battle; Miss Elizabeth Tompkins, '19, Partner, Refo and Tompkins; Clinton Webb, '29, Vice President, First and Merchants National Bank; Guy E. Webb, Jr., Partner, Horsley, Williams and Webb Ins. Agency and John C. Williams, '27, Vice President, Virginia Trust Company.

The University development story revolves around the volunteer. The success of the development program is due to the dedicated and resourceful efforts of hundreds of people—all working voluntarily to make the University of Richmond a better institution. The story of years to come, undoubtedly will depend on volunteer efforts. The challenges in higher education in the next few years will demand more talent, ideas, and efforts.

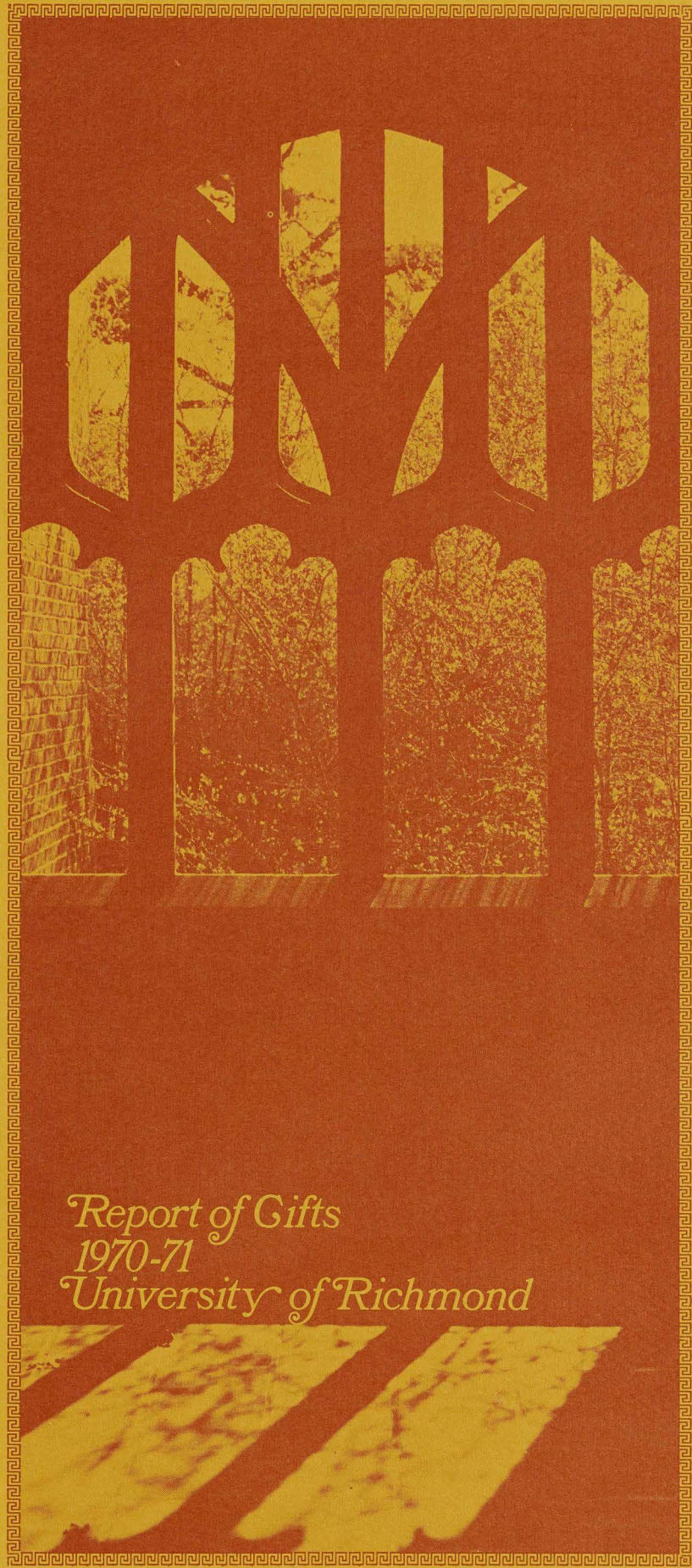

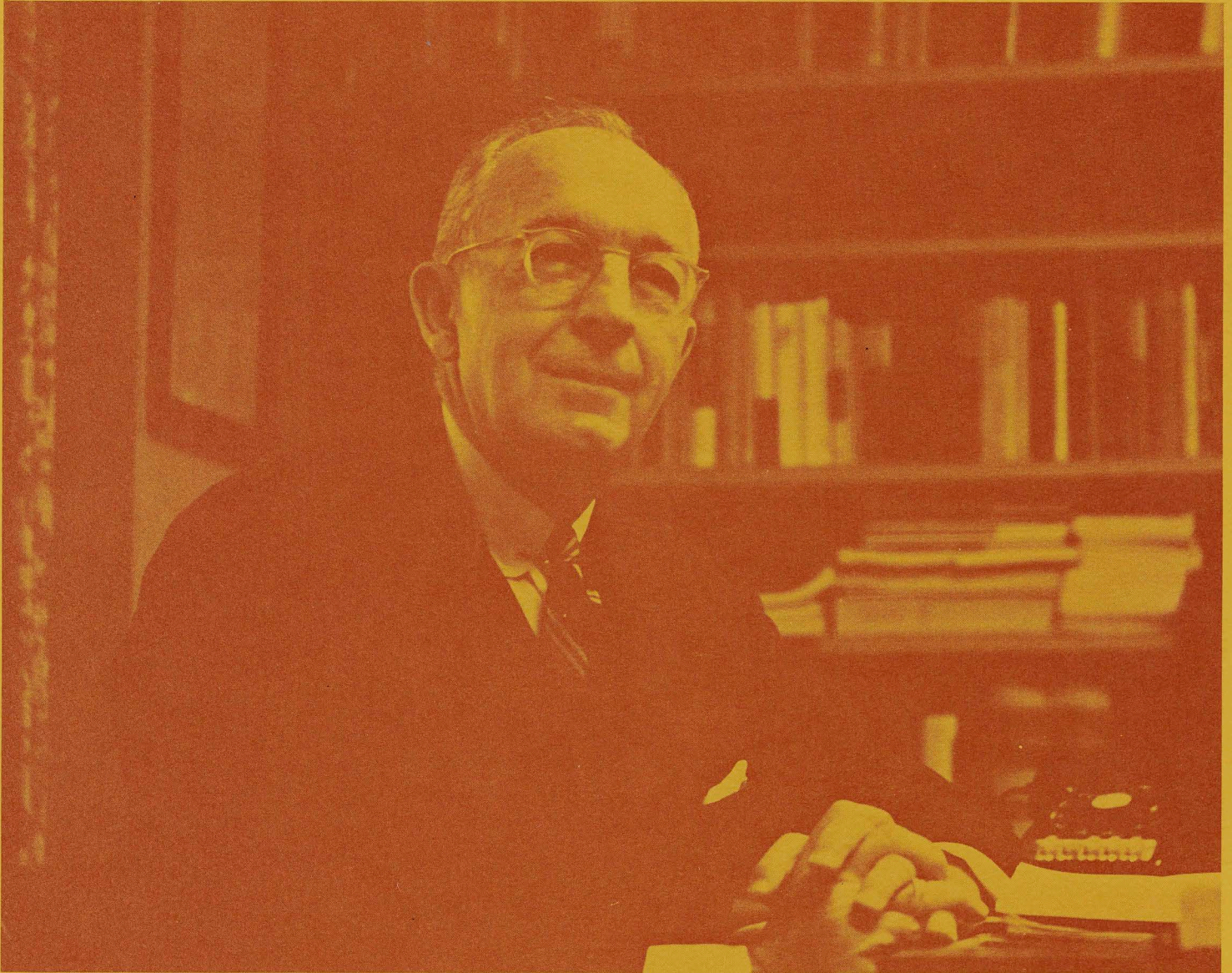

In its recognizable new format the 1970-71 "New" Annual Giving Program was the largest in the University's history, both in terms of dollars (\$228,000) and donors (3,112). Under the dedicated leadership of National Chairman, Joseph A. Jennings, an organizational team of nearly 1,000 people helped make the campaign so successful. However, it was the incentive of the Robins Challenge Grant which provided the campaign with its major thrust. Of the 3,112 donors, nearly 2/3 or 1991 either were new givers or increases over their last gift. This alone resulted in \$129,000 of eligible matching money. 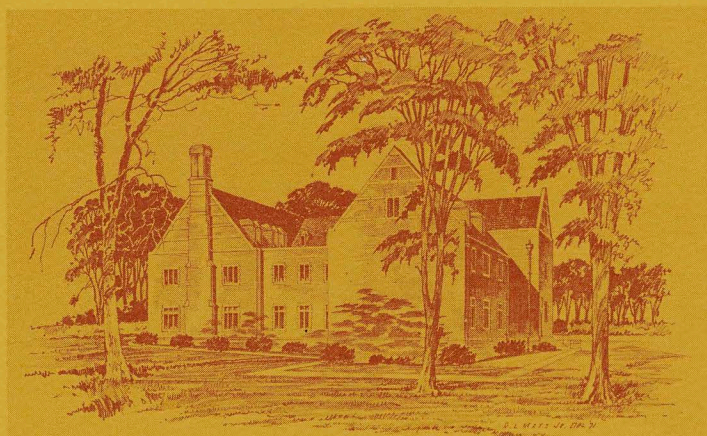

"The Postman Rang Twice"...and again...and again...and again!

And how the mail came in! Whatever else one says about Westhampton women, one has significant evidence that they care about their college and do not hesitate to speak out about their opinions!

Within three weeks, 35% of alumnae answered the April communication from the Ad Hoc Committee on Westhampton within the University (see U. of R. Magazine, Spring, 1971) and still the returns are coming in. Sixty percent of currently enrolled students also responded to a similar questionnaire circulated through the Westhampton Senate by the student life subcommittee. These communications were objectively designed, through consultation with opinion survey experts, to elicit valid and reliable information from students and alumnae about the present status of Westhampton, its strengths and weaknesses, and gains and losses if it considered a structural change. The reaction was excellent—unusual for this sort of survey.

Twenty-seven percent of the total alumnae responses came from the 32% of Westhampton women living in the Richmond area; 35% came from the 29% of alumnae located in the Virginia (non-Richmond) area; and 38% came from the 39% located out of the state and in foreign countries.

Of the 1,540 alumnae whose responses were tabulated in the initial analysis, 45% took the time to make additional comments, suggestions, or ask questions. Comments from the 360 students have been analyzed in similar manner to the alumnae ones so that parallel and diverging opinions may be identified.

At this stage one can appropriately conclude that both students and alumnae are much aware of 1) Westhampton's special identity and personality as a small coordinate woman's college within the setting of the larger university, and 2) that they value this identity highly. Overwhelmingly three factors are mentioned, by alumnae and students, frequently and

in various perspectives: 1) Westhampton's coordinate structure which offers an increasingly rare choice in diversity of patterns of higher education when so many schools are following current trends of coeducation; 2) the small college size conducive to the development of a community of spirit and warm personal relationships at all levels, with peers, faculty, and administrative staff; and 3) Westhampton's high academic standards.

Comments (and open-end answers) were coded for further computer analysis. At press time, the committee was deeply involved in reviewing the analysis of data from both questionnaires.

During Alumnae Weekend, a student panel presented an excellent summary to returning alumnae and exchanged views with them. At the open Governing Board Meeting, May 15, the committee chairman presented a progress report to about 100 alumnae with completion of the full report anticipated by mid-summer. More details of the alumnae and student questionnaire responses will appear in the fall when the report will be available to all alumnae.

Class of '71 Honors Miss Bell

The following is a speech given April 21 at the Westhampton Honors Convocation by Senior Class President Lelia N. Baum, '71.

Like every preceding class of seniors which has been faced with selecting a gift to the school, the Class of 1971 wished to contribute something of lasting value to express its gratitude and pride in Westhampton College. As college educational costs become increasingly higher each year, students and families of students must look to new financial resources to cover these costs. Consequently, we have selected to initiate a scholarship fund as our class gift. All Westhampton students from any of the four classes who have 2.0 average or better will be eligible each year for the scholarship. We have provided for a nominating committee which shall consist of either the Dean of Students or the Academic Dean of Westhampton College, the current four class presidents, and the faculty advisor of the senior class. The president of the senior class will chair the committee.

Our initial principle will be invested, and it is our hope that the fund will accumulate and continue to grow through interest and gifts from alumnae of all classes. At present there is no scholarship at Westhampton for students in financial need.

In providing for a continuing gift to the college, the Class of 1971 wishes to recognize a person who is making an invaluable contribution to Westhampton. We are all appreciative of her personal as well as her professional interest in the members of our academic community. In the fields of education and administration she has performed an admirable service to the college and university as a professor and as registrar. In the realm of human relations, however, she has expressed a friendliness and genuine interest in students for which we have felt especially grateful.

I have the pleasure of announcing the initiation of the Catherine Bell Scholarship Fund sponsored by the Class of 1971 as our gift to our soon to be Alma Mater.

Young Spiders Open Against Tarheels

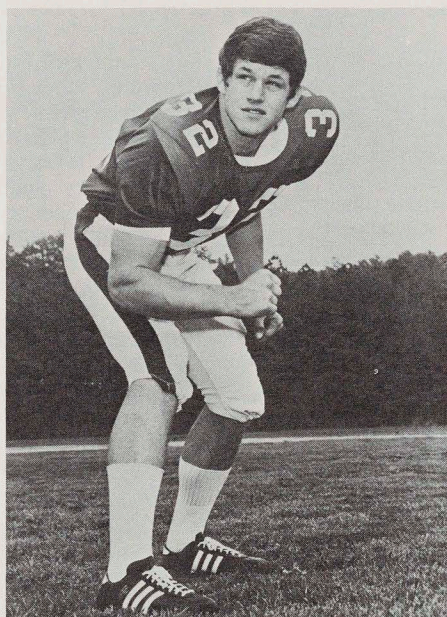
Two things are obvious about this Fall's University of Richmond football team. It'll be a young team because of the loss of 21 lettermen, (six of them All-Southern and 15 of them starters) and the Spiders of Coach Frank Jones have some big hard running backs for the first time which should result in a more balanced attack. The passing game will not be as potent as in the past, although it should be adequate.

The great passing combination of Charlie Richards to Split End Jim Livesay is gone. Livesay was drafted in the third round by the St. Louis Cardinals and Richards was a draft choice of the Los Angeles Rams.

Holdover Quarterback Ken Nichols piloted the White team in the Spring intrasquad contest in which Rich Muscarella, a transfer student from Florida State, guided the Blue squad. The Blue eleven gained 197 yards rushing to 120 by the White and won, 14-11. Sophomore Barty Smith, the big fullback who is expected to be UR's No. 1 ground gainer, picked up 82 yards in 20 tries for the White although playing with an injured shoulder. Billy Meyers, a transfer student from Ferrum Junior College, showed his potential with 121 yards in 33 carries. Another sophomore, Tommy Shiflett, added 57 yards in 14 attempts for the Blue team. Nichols completed seven of 16 passes for 76 yards and Muscarella nine of 16 for 63.

Although Livesay has departed, the Spiders will have good receivers in Flanker Jerry Haynes, who caught 38 for 569 yards and seven touchdowns last season, and newcomers Jay Jones, Joe Sgroi, Drew Tryens and Billy Harris.

Although Richmond lost three-quarters of its starting defensive backfield, look for Senior Cornerback Ray Easterling, to have a great year. He was All-Southern last season, and coaches and scouts alike say he's All-American material. Middle Guard Milt Ignatius and Defensive End John

Nugent are the only other defensive players back who were starters last season but both are worthy of earning All-Southern laurels. Center Bob Conrad and Tight End Ken Popovich are the only starting offensive linemen from last season returning.

The schedule is a rough one although the Spiders will play six home contests, the first three—North Carolina, West Virginia and Boston College—at Richmond City Stadium. Then come East Carolina on the road, VMI and Furman at home, Southern Mississippi away, The Citadel at home and Davidson and William and Mary on the road.

Pitt Retires; Harriers Excell

Coach Mac Pitt's thirty-seventh and final season as the Spiders' baseball coach was a successful one. The team posted a 10-6 Southern Conference mark, just one game behind Co-champions Furman and The Citadel, and were 14-13 overall. A member of the National Hall of Fame, Pitt's coaching record for the Spiders showed 426 victories against 257 defeats. His clubs won 16 state crowns, two Southern Conference titles and tied for the SC title twice.

First Baseman Tom Bondurant was named to the All-Southern team for the second straight year. He batted .330 and fielded in fine style. Outfielder Bruce Wright, who batted .344 and pitched and won six games, also was selected to the honor team as well as Reggie Dunnavant, the talented shortstop who batted .298.

Carl Wood, the brilliant intermediate hurdler, continued his comeback after knee surgery with the sizzling time of 52 seconds in the North Carolina Relays and was third in the Stagg Memorial Relays in Chicago in 52.1 seconds. Freshman Norman Williams broke the school record in the long jump in the same meet with a leap of 25' 2¼". Fred Guest captured the steeplechase in this national meet in 9:32.1.

Campus Briefs

"Mom and Pop" Retire

Two friendly faces that were immediately identifiable to students at some 600 Student Center meetings a year will be missing and missed next year.

Phyllis and Guy Scott, affectionately known as "Mom and Pop" Scott, retired in June from their 10-year position as host and hostess of the Student Center to their home in Lutherville, Md. He has been the director of the center, which is the hub of social and extra-curricular activities at the men's division of the University. She has been—well, she's Mom Scott, concerned and enthusiastic and quick to provide the familial warmth that is missed in dorm life.

"Living on a college campus is a challenge. Naturally, there have been problems," said the silver-blond Mom Scott, "but there have also been many happy occasions. We have survived panty raids, water and snowball battles, fires and bomb scares, but mostly the students have been respectful, kind and understanding. It has been interesting to watch them develop."

Aside from the many meetings they have organized and assigned rooms, the Scotts have been responsible for the punch and cookie snacks following every Friday night movie. Television and reading rooms were always checked for cleanliness, equipment and another vital ingredient—warmth.

"Probably one of our most exciting experiences," said the Scotts during an interview, "was the time a student fell from the fifth floor of Thomas Hall into the basement. He had filled a glass with water to pour on friends below. Both he and the glass fell down the stairwell. Miraculously, the student survived."

Whenever a student was hospitalized, the Scotts visited him, providing comfort, magazines or explanations to the parents—as Pop did in the preceding incident. It was also Pop Scott who often got up in the middle of the night, left their apartment over the dining hall to find and tell a boy personally that his mother had died.

An unprecedented honor came to Pop Scott in 1969 when he became the first staff

member to be tapped into Omicron Delta Kappa service fraternity. He has also been initiated into Alpha Phi Omega service fraternity.

The Scotts described their job as "one that cannot be measured in hours, because not every event falls into an eight or even 10-hour day." But their performance can be measured and remembered for the warmth and friendliness they exuded during their 10-year residence.

During the coming days of fishing, traveling, home-making and playing with grandchildren, "we'll miss our college friends very much. We feel we are leaving a place that has a brilliant future. It has been built upon a firm foundation by capable and dedicated people. Those people are our friends. We WILL miss them!"

Gray Gift Guarantees Westhampton Dormitory

A dormitory for 250 women will be built at Westhampton College; construction is already underway for a \$750,000 addition to the T. C. Williams School of Law, and the physical education building is beginning to take shape (see Photo potporri, page 20).

Rector Robert T. Marsh made the announcement of the new Westhampton dormitory at commencement. Construction of the building will be financed by a gift from State Senator Garland Gray, a trustee of the university. The dormitory will be named in memory of Senator Gray's late wife, Agnes Taylor Gray, a Westhampton College graduate.

The law school addition, to be constructed in red brick with limestone trim to match the existing building, was made possible in part by the more than \$500,000 raised in the university's Law School Centennial Fund Campaign conducted last year.

The groundbreaking of the addition took place on Law Day, April 24, a warm spring day that made it a pleasure for the alumni and friends to gather outside at the site of the new construction. President George M. Modlin, Dean William T. Muse joined former congressman J. Vaughan Gary, general chairman of the Law School Centennial, and Horace H. Edwards, chairman of the Centennial Fund, in turning the first spades of earth.

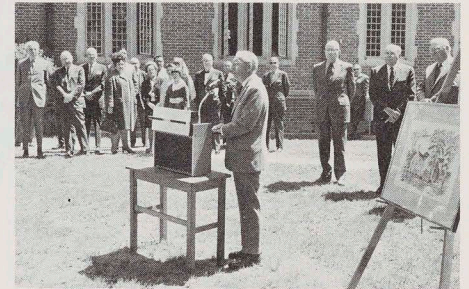
The new structure, termed "urgently needed" by President Modlin, will include a student lounge and recreation room, two classrooms, additional library space, and eight faculty offices. Each classroom will seat 96 students. The entire structure will be air-conditioned.

According to Dean Muse, the new wing will enable the law school to expand library facilities to accommodate present holdings and anticipated future acquisitions. "It will double our reading room space," he said.

The new wing is expected to be completed by June of 1972. The architects are Carneal

and Johnston, and the contractor is Barker Construction Company.

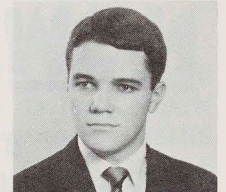
While the foundation is being prepared for the law school wing, construction of the physical education building is progressing, although a plumber's strike, lasting several weeks, has delayed the anticipated completion date to November, 1973.

Straight A Graduate Among Student Award Winners

James Darrell Foster, a political science major from Virginia Beach, became the seventh student in the history of Richmond College to complete four years with a perfect "A" record when he graduated June 7.

Foster, who won the newly established Spencer D. Albright Book Award as the outstanding political science student, was one of 13 graduating seniors to receive medals and prizes at commencement.

James W. Harris Jr. of Richmond received the Garnett Ryland Award as the best graduate in chemistry, and Miss Barbara Rosalie Ryan of Richmond was honored with the Tanner Medal as the student most proficient in Greek.

Mrs. Janet Thornton Rust of Richmond received the Epps Award for achieving the best four-year academic record at Westhampton College.

Others who received awards are Margaret S. Douglas of Kinsale, the James D. Crump Prize as the best mathematics student; James A. Winders of Roanoke, the S. C. Mitchell Award as the best Richmond College graduate in history, and Robert W. Traylor Jr. of Danville, former president of the student government, the Alumni Council Medal.

Three Charles T. Norman Medals were awarded. Thomas T. Palmer of Staunton received a Norman medal as the best graduate in business administration, James H. Chamblin of Leesburg as the best graduate in law, and Benjamin F. Curtis Jr. of Culpeper as the best graduate in English in Richmond College. Mildred M. Cochran of Staunton was awarded the J. Taylor Ellyson Medal in history and Deborah Ann Powell of Laurel, Del. received the Modern Foreign Language award. Gene L. Yoder of Broadway received the Willie M. Reams Award in biology.

A University junior, Steven L. Nock of Norfolk, who will serve next year as president of the student government, was awarded the Thomas B. McAdams Prize as the junior student who has rendered the most outstanding service to the university and his fellow students.



Players Look Toward Ambitious New Season

Diversity and, hopefully, endurance will be particularly noticeable during the upcoming theatrical season for the University Players of the University of Richmond.

Five productions, instead of the usual four, will range from medieval religious drama to a children's classic, "The Wizard of Oz." The players' (and directors') regime will be made yet more rugged by extended playing dates. In fact, the company intends to give up spring vacation in order to make it all possible.

Also, for the first time this year, the department of speech and dramatic arts will sponsor a series of five classic films.

"As You Like It" by William Shakespeare opens the season of live drama in October. Next comes what the students have already dubbed "the extravaganza"—it will be "The Christmas Story" according to "The Wakefield Mystery Cycle." A cast of 70 players and choir members will perform the Christmas section of the 30 medieval religious dramas, complete with live music of voices, trumpets, recorders, bells and chimes. The well-known "Shepherd's Play", one of the first farces in English literature, will be included.

In March the company will do Maxwell Anderson's modern version of the story of Joan of Arc, "Joan of Lorraine."

The April play will be "The Sign in Sidney Brustein's Window" by Lorraine Hansberry.

"The Wizard of Oz" in May will be an all-student production. Not only will this mean student direction and staging and acting, but financial handling as well. The drama group has

elected to do an extra benefit performance for children from depressed areas of the city whom they intend to bus to the James L. Camp Memorial Theater. At the regular performances, children will be seated in the front rows of the theater and adults behind them. Quipped director Dr. John D. Welsh, "Parents will have a double show; they will be able to see the play and their children seeing the play."

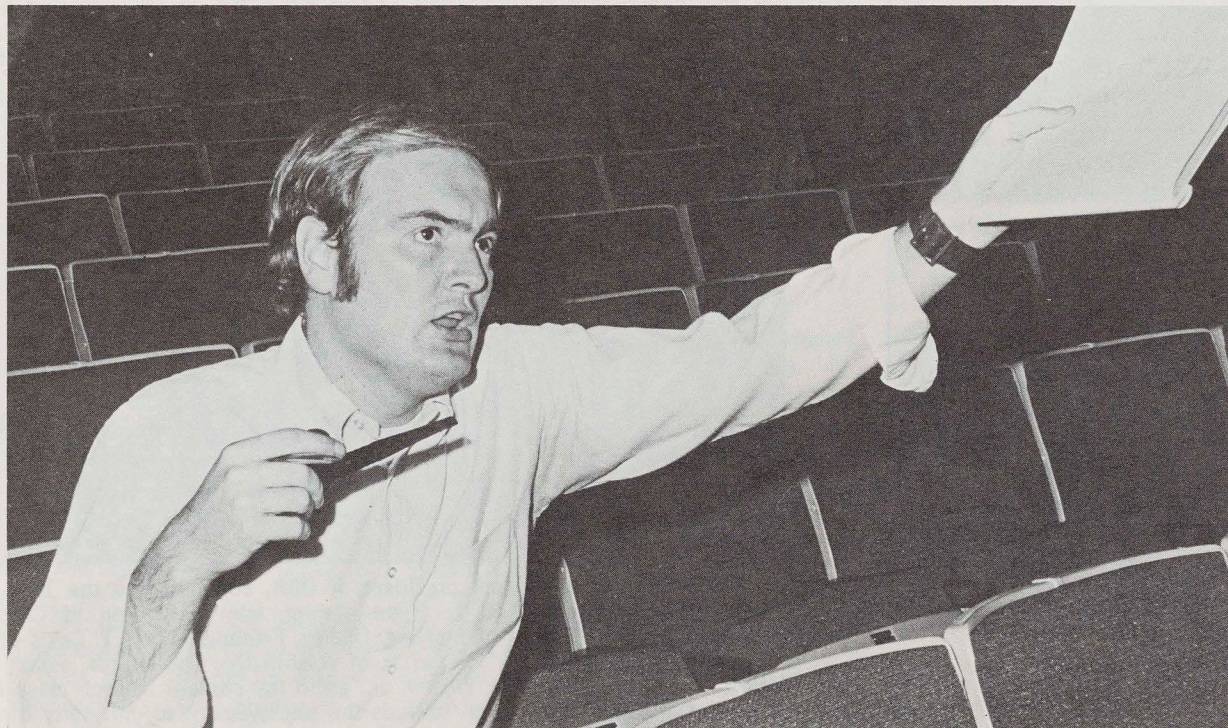
The year, though ambitious in nature, is promising to Dr. Welsh. "Some of our best performers and actors still will be with us, especially the boys. The girls will be augmented by some very promising freshmen talent.

"We have great confidence in the students, especially the seniors who will be in charge of the all-student production, otherwise we could not plan such a full year." (See ticket information on back cover)

The selections for the film series have been chosen on the basis of performers, directors and technical treatments. All will be aired on Sunday evenings in the Camp Theater.

"Requiem for a Heavyweight" by Rod Sterling and starring Anthony Quinn will be aired in September. "Juliet of the Spirits" (November) is a Fellini film which allegedly is a biographical account of the director's wife. "Last Year at Marienbad" (January) is directed by Alain Resnais and is a surrealist statement on the uncertainty of love. Others scheduled are "The Magician" by Ingmar Bergman and "The Red Shoes" which was derived from the Hans Christian Andersen tale (March and April respectively).

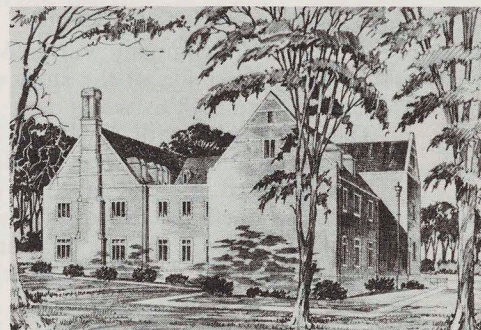
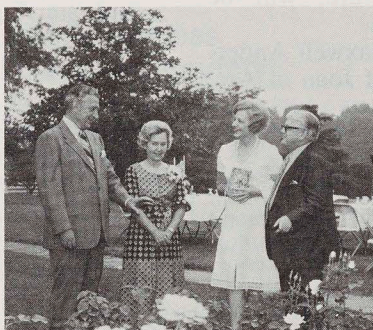

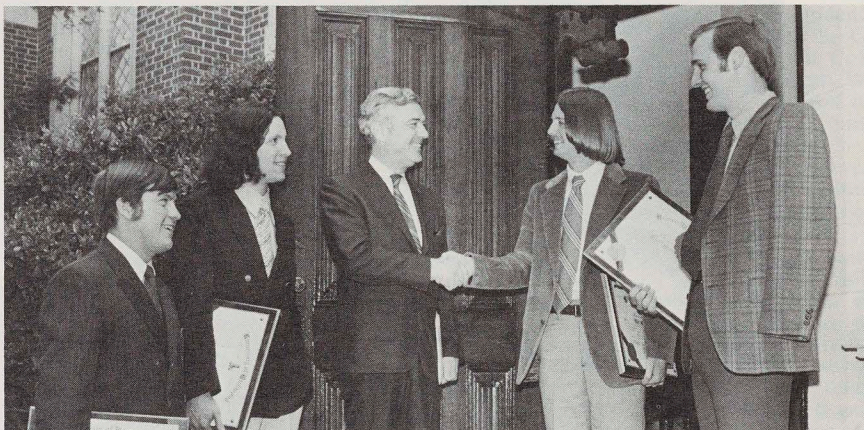

Tombes To Study In France

Dr. Averett S. Tombes, '54, chairman of Clemson University's zoology section, will spend a year of sabbatical leave at the University of Lille in Lille, France studying endocrinology of marine worms. He is a specialist in invertebrate endocrinology, the study of hormones in insects and other backboneless animals. Last year he authored the first complete textbook on the subject ever published in this country.

At Lille he will study the endocrinology of regeneration, or the ability to grow new body parts, in certain marine worms and molusks. The project is a

joint venture with Prof. Maurice Durchon, an internationally renowned invertebrate physiologist and is funded by a special research fellowship awarded Tombes by the French Ministry of Industrial and Scientific Development.

En route to Lille, he will deliver a paper before the 25th International Congress of Physiological Sciences meeting in Munich, Germany.

Roanoke Club Hears Quigg

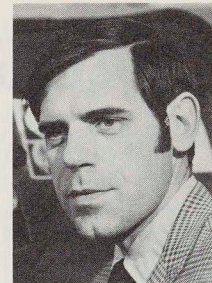

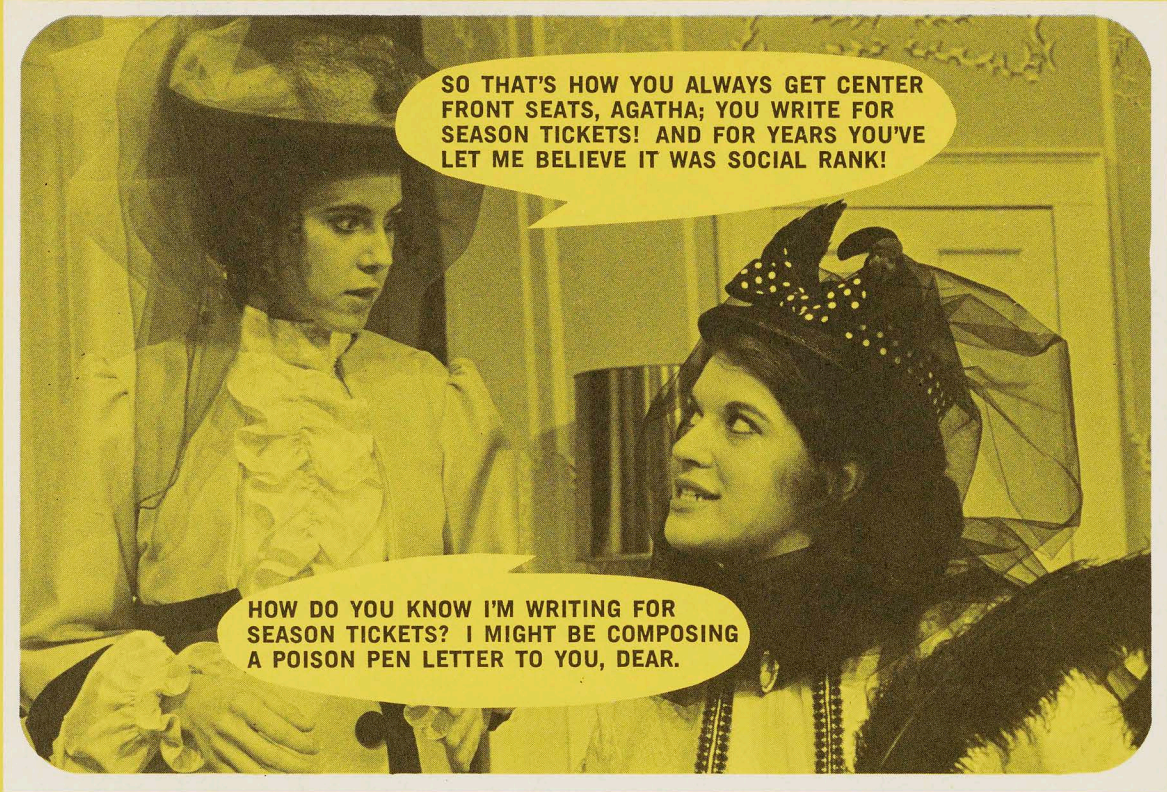
