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Yeltsin Recieves Vote Of Confidence

Voters across Russia gave a firm vote of confidence to President Boris Yeltsin in the highlyanticipated referendum on the country's future.

Russians turned out in large numbers and rallied behind Yeltsin. At the same time, they demanded new elections to the Congress of People's Deputies, which in the past has caused problems for Yeltsin's economic proposals and nearly ousted him from office last month.

The first question of the referendum, dealing with confidence in the President, showed 60 percent of the voters in favor of Mr. Yeltsin. Question #2

on the ballot showed 55 percent of the Russian public in favor of his present economic program.

After the votes were tallied, opponents of Mr. Yeltsin moved quickly to discredit the results. They talked of the minority saying there can be no talk of "overall support" and those that voted against the referendum are also Russian citizens.

Two days after the referendum, Yeltsin called regional leaders to Moscow to receive a draft of a new constitution that would strengthen the presidency. Yeltsin asked the 88 regional leaders to each name two representatives to a constituent assembly. This assembly would aid in the writing of the new constitution that would be along the lines of the present French system.

\$10,000 Scholarship Awarded to Ursinus Sophomore

Jennifer "Skye" Laidlaw, a sophomore chemistry major at Ursinus, has won a \$10,000 scholarship from the St. Andrew's Society of Philadelphia to spend her junior year at the University of Glasgow.

Laidlaw, from North Plainfield, N.J., is the 18th student from Ursinus to win a St. Andrew's scholarship, and the first Ursinus woman ever to win the honor. She is one of only five students from the Philadelphia area who will be spending the 1993-94 academic year in Scotland on St. Andrew's Society grants, and the first ever to attend the University of Glasgow under the program. Additionally, she is the third member of her family to study at the University of Glasgow.

Students considered for St. Andrew's Scholarships must be juniors in the year they receive the grants, be "held in high regard by their peers," have high grade point averages and be active in extracurricular activities.

When asked about spending the year abroad, Laidlaw said "it's going to be a wonderful experience. I'm a little nervous, because there will be 13,000 students. But I hope to represent Ursinus very well."

At Ursinus, Laidlaw ("Skye" to her many friends) is a member of the women's track and field team, for which she is a weight thrower (shot put and discus) and runs hurdles and the 4 x 100. In 1991-92, she was named the team's most valuable player. She also is a member of the Brownback-Anders Pre-Medical Society and the Beardwood Chemical Society.

Global Perspectives

International

--Western Europe continued their hesitation over the Balkan war as they backed off from supporting a proposal to approve air strikes against Serbs in Bosnia and Herzegovina. They felt that only air strikes against select targets would put pressure on the Serbs to halt their offensive against Muslims in the former Yugoslav republic.

--The peace talks in the Middle East have resumed, with the United States urging negotiators to focus on substance. Secretary of State Warren Christopher held meetings last week with Arab and Israeli negotiators asking them to set aside procedural discussions and get to the heart of their 46-year dispute.

--In an effort to help pay for fire damage at Windsor Castle, the Queen has announced the opening of Buckingham Palace to tourists. The public will be charged \$12.50 apiece to tour her state apartments and art gallery.

National

--Hundreds of thousands of gay and lesbian Americans and their supporters rallied in Washington D.C. last week in a continuing effort to free themselves from discrimination. Several speakers, including Massachusetts Senator Edward Kennedy, compared the rally to the 1963 civil rights march on Washington.

--The sparring between President Bill Clinton and former candidate H. Ross Perot is continuing. Just days before Clinton paid a visit to the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, officials ordered the removal of two pictures of Perot from an alumni display. Clinton accused Perot of "rumor mongering," but continually states that he does not want to start arguments.

--Benjamin Terry, convicted of the 1979 beating death of a Graterford State Prison guard, can now be put to death, according to Montgomery County District Attorney Michael Marino. Mr. Marino has sent a letter to Governor Robert P. Casey advising that the state Supreme Court refused to hear Terry's final appeal on February 22.

U.S.G.A. Minutes

The meeting was called to order by President Janene Paist ('94) at 7:30 p.m. in the U.S.G.A. office located on the ground floor of Wismer Center.

Treasurer Eric James ('94) reported the U.S.G.A.'s balance is \$2219.41. The U.S.G.A. will use some of that money to buy a DeskJet printer and a software program to make flyers. All activity groups will be allowed to use these items for their announcements. He also reported that at a meeting of A.F.A.C., the Activities Fee Allocation Committee, U.S.G.A. was allocated \$1200.00 for

Treasurer James, a member of A.F.A.C., also gave their financial report. Their balance stands at \$5246.00. (Their pool for the 1992-93 academic year was \$118,175 - the total amount of total activity fees paid by all students). Money is available from A.F.A.C. to any group on campus with a constitution recognized by U.S.G.A. The group must also have a faculty adviser. Groups may ask for money by submitting a request to the committee. Money remaining at the end of the year may be used to buy a new Stairmaster for the fitness room or pay for equipment repair costs for WVOU, the campus radio station. A.F.A.C. meets in Wismer 103 every Wednesday at noon. Anyone interested in requesting money or just observing are welcome to attend

Next, the U.S.G.A. reviewed a constitution for a new club called the Xenophile Society. The club is for people who are interested in science fiction/fantasy literature. The club will organize so that people interested in this genre can discuss works, share and borrow books, make suggestions for the Myrin Library collection, and sponsor related events such as on-campus events and trips. Pending a spelling correction and revision of Article III, part one, which relates to membership of non-campus members, President Paist asked the U.S.G.A. members for a motion to pass their constitution. Kate Polgar ('96) made a motion to pass the club, and Jenn Helverson ('96) seconded the notion. Treasurer James abstained from the vote since he proposed the group. The group was passed with a 9-0 hand vote.

The next topic discussed was the U.S.G.A. initiated leadership award to be called the Teresa L. Urban Leadership Award. It will be an annual award given to the senior who has exemplified the greatest leadership in the eyes of his/her classmates. The seniors would nominate their choices and a panel of juniors would help decide on a finalist. It was proposed that the winner be given an award valued at 1% of tuition for that year. A book relating to the student's major plus a monetary award (award+book=1% of tuition) will be the prize. This would be the first award given to students by students. There has been progress made to have the award recognized by the Award Committee and have it included in the Commencement programs (which in the past have only included endowments.)

On Monday, May 10th, during exams, the U.S.G.A. will sponsor Exam snacks in the Wismer cafeteria from 9pm-10pm. The exam snacks will be extra fun because they will be SERVED BY FACULTY AND STAFF! Everyone is invited to attend and members of U.S.G.A. are asked to help out in cleaning up (it will take about 15 minutes).

Members discussed Disability Awareness Week. Due to the end of the year "madness and mayhem" that everyone experiences come April, the awareness week did not take off as well as anticipated. Improvements are being planned

for next year. One purpose of Disability Awareness Week is to promote interest in volunteering for Medieval Fest, a wonderful annual Ursinus event for handicapped individuals.

Next discussed was the U.S.G.A. newsletter. The association wants EVERYONE to know what's going on on campus, both for business and pleasure. The Ursinus Student Government Association is the perfect way to get involved. If anything, the group wants to make sure everyone is more aware of what's going on so that the group functions better as a whole. Starting now, the minutes will be printed in the Grizzly and in a new publication, the U.S.G.A. newsletter. Keep your eyes open for it and feel free to at any time discuss concerns with the members in attendance or the executive board.

Class council members for the classes of 1994, 1995, and 1996 were in attendance. No specific business was announced but there was discussion of increasing the influence of class councils by adding "class representatives" for the classes of '94 and '95. There will be elections for class reps next year on Wednesday, September 22, 1993. This will also serve as the date for Freshman Class elections. President Paist brought to the attention of class officers the need for updated constitutions. Brian Riordan, President of the Class of '95 recommended that class councils also outline some goals for their respective classes. A suggestion was also made to consider a "class fee."

The U.S.G.A. Book Sale will be held on the first two days of classes next semester. It is a great way to maximize your payback on the books for which we all pay so much. Resist the temptation to sell them back for measly change this semester. Hold on to them and sell them next year. The sale will be held in the Parent's Lounge. You can name your prices and you can buy books for less than the Book Store sell them. If they do not sell, you can still take them to the Book Store and get a reimbursement there.

At 8:10 pm, President Paist asked people who were interested in looking at the Wismer renovation plans to stay. The plans are incredible. Plans include changing the cafeteria into a modernized dining room much like the ones at Lafayette and Muhlenberg colleges. There are plans for a 24 hr. student union, a convenience store, a bookstore (like the ones at other colleges) in the building, an off-hours restaurant, a mail center, a commuter's lounge, and student activities offices. These plans will begin to take effect in phases as early as next summer. It is a 6 million dollar project and so far the school has received 3 million in endowments to do the job. SPORTS SHORTS

COMPILED FROM SPORTS INFORMATION REPORTS

--SOFTBALL: The Lady Bears won their second Philadelphia Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (PAIAW) championship in the past three years with a 15-2 win over Allentown College on April 21. Ursinus scored 12 runs in the first inning and coasted to the win.

--WOMEN'S LACROSSE: UC beat Gettysburg 7-4 in a non-conference win on April 24. Michelle Derderian had four goals for Ursinus (7-5). But a previous loss to Trenton State, who had won 37 straight games, eliminated the Lady Bears from the MAC playoffs earlier (because Drew had upset Widener). The only hope for postseason play for UC is an at-large bid to the NCAA playoffs. Ursinus has appeared in a national championship game eight of the last 10 years.

-- MEN'S TENNIS: The Bears earned their first MAC Southeast Section victory of the season with a 7-2 decision over Widener on April 23. Ursinus (1-2 in MAC, 6-5 overall) won five of the six singles matches. Senior captain Christian Sockel won by forfeit at number-one.
