VESSELS WRECKED BY OCEAN STORMS

Nova Scotia.

Four Are Driven Ashore by Gale and Another Is Swept Clean of Everything.

REPORTS COMING RAPIDLY.

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 6.-Dispatches oday have been pouring into this city bringing news of vessels wrecked or in distress or of wires prostrated and of damage done by gale and sea along the coasts of Nova Scotia, Cape-Breton, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. 
