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



Wile I know Orange County citrus is bringin a good price at market, it sort uv hurts us here at home to hev to pay the grocer 50 tu 75 cents a duzen fur home gron frute, or tu hav our visitors hav tu pay frum ten cents to a quarter for a haf a grapfrute in a cafe or hotel fur brekfast.

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#### Show-Places Surrounding Orlando

A visit to anyone of the places listed on this page will be well worth the time expended.

Lake Apopka—The second largest lake in Florida. Abounding in bass, trout, brim, pickerel and other members of the finny tribe. Twelve miles from Orlando, by way of Apopka or Winter Garden.

A Fisherman's Paradise.—On West side of Lake Apopka, mile and half beyond county line, Brown's Fishing Camp, awell equipped fishing lodge where one may secure everything necessary for an hour, a day or a week's fishing in the waters of Lake Apopka

Aloma Country Club.—A beautiful section of Winter Park combining club and home-life. Eighteen-hole golf course whose fairways are lined by the homes

of many of its members.

Avalon Groves.—The largest orange grove in the world under one fence, and one ownership. Four thousand acres of citrus fruit trees. Beyond Winter Garden and Oakland. About fifteen miles from Orlando.

Brewer Estate.—Country home of E. H. Brewer (deceased), known as "The Palms." The Natural beauty of the tropical jungle, enhanced by the art and skill of the landscape gardener. Here may be seen in profusion almost every variety of flower, fern, shrub, plant and tree grown in Florida. At Winter Park.

Home of Irving Bacheller. — Widely known writer and philosopher. Beyond Country Club at Winter Park, on Dixie

Highway.

Banana Plantation. — Many acres in bananas, a comparatively new product of Orange County. The luxuriant growth and productiveness of fruit proving the diversity of the soil of Orange County. Pinecastle, on the Orlando-Tampa Highway.

Dubsdread Country Club. - With its sporty 18-hole golf course, is conceded to be one of the finest courses within the

State.

Tropical Arts.—A Sunken Garden, where native and exotic plants and flora abound in profusion under the care of skilled horticulturists. Located in the heart of Orlando, at Magnolia and Colonial Drive.

Howey-In-The-Hills.—Opie Read, world famous author and lecturer, lives at Howey-In-The-Hills. See the world's greatest and largest citrus empire—87,000 acres of hills—200 beautiful lakes—good fishing, hunting and a sporty golf course.

Mount Plymouth.—Known as the Golf Center of the South, with its wonderful sporty eighteen-hole courses, situated among the rolling hills and lakes; just thirty minutes' drive from Orlando. Here at the "Switzerland of Florida" one can enjoy most every known sport.

Orlando Country Club.—Eighteen-hole golf course (par 70), tennis, clear-water bathing, attractive, commodious clubhouse. The rendezvous of the social set. Only one and a half miles from the center of the downtown district.

Rollins College.—A co-educational institution, the oldest institution of higher learning in the State of Florida. Beautifully located on the banks of Lake Virginia, at Winter Park. Dr. Hamilton Holt, its President, is planning Rollins as "the greatest small college in America."

Rock Springs.—True to its name. Located in Kelly Park, a natural beauty spot of 300 acres, the gift of Dr. Howard A. Kelly, of Baltimore, to the Orange County Park System. Six miles north of Apopka.

Superior Nurseries.—Acre after acre of rare and beautiful palms, shrubs, plants and flowers growing for "a more beautiful Florida." On the south shore of Lake Conway, via Conway Road extension, or Pinecastle.

Spouting Well.—An ordinary drilled well which from some unexplainable cause emits a gushing stream of water into the air to a height of from 150 to 300 feet, at intervals of fifteen or twenty minutes. Scientists who have witnessed this phenomenon differ as to its cause. Take Apopka Road, turn left at road to Fairvilla. About three miles from the Orlando business district.

Sanlando Springs.—Palm Springs.— Two clear, sulphur springs with an even temperature around 70 degrees F. the year round. At Sanlando there is an ideal country club-house and golf links mid lakes, and pine covered hills. Near Altamonte, on Orlando-Sanford Highway.

Tinker Field. — Modern baseball field, named for Joseph B. Tinker, famous shortstop of Chicago Cubs, now a prominent citizen of Orlando. Only training quarters in Florida OWNED by a big league team — property of Cincinnati "Reds." This affords the opportunity of seeing many of the famous baseball stars in action during the early Spring.

Wekiwa Springs.—The source of Wekiwa River, a tributary of the St. John's River. A natural gushing spring of thirty-six million galions a day volume, having a uniform temperature of 74 degrees Fahrenheit the year round. Picnic grounds, boating, fishing and swimming. Three miles northeast of Apopka.


