

OTA Students' Perceptions of an Inter & Intraprofessional Level I Experience in Morocco

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Background

- Cultural immersion experiences provide students with authentic, real-life opportunities to engage with clients serving as a powerful tool to enhance students' global perspectives of occupation (Humbert, Burket, Deveney, & Kennedy, 2012).
- Interprofessional & intraprofessional education provides students with an increased understanding of the unique knowledge, skills, scope, function, & roles within their own & among other disciplines (IEC, 2011; Jung, Salvatori, & Martin, 2008).





Objectives

Impressions

- OT/OTA role delineation discussions resulted in a clear understanding of the value of the OT/OTA collaborative relationship.
- Generous exposure to cultural rituals, routines,
 & traditions contributed to expanding cultural competence.
- Activity analysis of non-traditional jobs & occupations expanded global awareness of occupation.
- Co-treatments with OT and Couples & Family Therapy students provided experience that can be translated to many traditional US settings.
- Interprofessional collaboration provided opportunities for professional advocacy & greater insight on scope of practice.





Outcomes

- Enhanced global perspectives & cultural awareness.
- Increased understanding of the role of occupational therapy abroad.



- Promotion of intraprofessional collaboration.
- Expanded interprofessional teamwork.
- Improved cross-cultural, verbal & non-verbal communication skills.
- Increased advocacy for the occupational therapy assistant role.

Conclusions

Participating in an interprofessional & intraprofessional fieldwork experience abroad offered exposure & benefits that may not be found at traditional fieldwork sites. The benefits will translate into our future careers as occupational therapy practitioners.
