Real World Experiences

DSU students often complete internships or supervised professional practices in a variety of locations to gain real world experiences related to their chosen majors.

This summer there were 13 health information management students who completed 21 supervised professional practices (SPPs). These experiences may be completed at either a “traditional” or “nontraditional” site. Practicum experience in an acute care hospital is described as a “traditional” site and other health care facilities are referred to as alternate or “non-traditional” sites. The students were primarily located in South Dakota from the Spearfish, Yankton, Pierre and Sioux Falls areas. Illinois, Minnesota, Oregon, and Colorado also supported our HIM students for one or more supervised professional practices. DSU would like to give a big shout out to all the healthcare centers for supporting the HIM supervised professional practices as these are invaluable experiences for our students.

In the business, computer information systems and computer science programs there were 39 interns in SD as well as 12 other states (CO, FL, GA, HI, IA, IL, LA, MD, MN, NC, ND, and NJ) completing their experiences this summer. These internships were in a variety of industries, including software, banking and finance, energy, government, law and legal system, healthcare, manufacturing, insurance, education, and more.



FBLA-PBL National Leadership Conference

Seven DSU PBL students were qualified to compete in the FBLA-PBL national leadership conference in San Antonio, TX this year. CONFERENCES & PROFESSIONAL EVENTS

AMCIS

Three DSU research papers were accepted for the Americas Conference on Information Systems (AMCIS) 2019 event held in Cancun, Mexico in August. These papers included one authored by Information Systems Ph.D. student Kevin Callies titled “Employee Acceptance of Employer Control Over Personal Devices,” regarding research as part of his dissertation work with Dr. Cherie Noteboom, associate professor of management information systems and coordinator of the Ph.D. in information systems program; Dr. Daniel Talley, professor of economics and undergraduate coordinator for business; and Dr. Yong Wang, associate research professor. A second research paper titled “What Social Media Can Tell Us About Opioid Addicts: Twitter Data Case Analysis,” resulted from a collaboration of Dr. Yong Wang, associate research professor, Dr. Omar El-Gayar, professor of information systems; and Tareq Nasrallah, Dakota State student. The third research paper was accepted in the emerging research category which allows paper authors to present and receive feedback on research-in-progress or research ideas. For this category, Dr. Omar El-Gayar, professor of information systems, Dr. David Bishop, associate professor of information systems; and Christopher Simpson, current Dakota State student, collaborated on the research paper “Automated Deployment of Cybersecurity Labs in Cloud Computing Environments.”



Brookings Area Workforce Conference

Dr. Jack Walters collaborated with Dr. Austin O’Brien to make a presentation at the Brookings Area Workforce Conference hosted by the Brookings Economic Development Corporation. They spoke on the topic of “AI & Technology – Implications for HR”.

MWAIS

Several faculty members and students from Dakota State University contributed to papers that were shared at the Midwest United States Association for Information Systems (MWAIS) conference in May. Those presenting at the conference, held at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, included Andrew Behrens, instructor of information systems and Ph.D. information systems student, who was author on two papers – “What are Healthcare Providers’ Perceptions of Health Information Technology Project Training?” and “How can Health Technology Project Communications be Improved in a Hospital?” Behrens worked with fellow faculty Dr. Cherie Noteboom and Dr. Dave Bishop on the papers, and Ph.D. student Kaushik Ragothaman also contributed to “What are Healthcare Providers’ Perceptions of Health Information Technology Project Training?” Dr. Noteboom also worked with Dr. Pam Rowland on a paper titled “Adolescent Girls’ Influencers in Cybersecurity Education and Activities” that was accepted for presentation at the conference. Information Systems Ph.D. student Kevin Callies authored the paper “Employee Acceptance of Employer Control Over Personal Devices,” with the help of DSU faculty Dr. Noteboom, Dr. Daniel Talley, and Dr. Yong Wang.

HITB Security Conference

Dr. Josh Stroschein and Dr. David Bishop took 13 DSU students to Amsterdam in May for the 10th annual Hack In The Box cyber security conference. The event included technical training sessions followed by a multi-track conference with presentations on cyber security topics, competitions and a massive technology exhibition (HITB Haxpo). The DSU participants also assisted with setup and operations during the conference.

Assembly on Education

Julie Wulf Plimpton attended the American Health Information Management Association's Assembly on Education Symposium/Faculty Development Institute that was held in Atlanta, Georgia this summer. The conference is attended primarily by leaders of health information associate, bachelor and masters degree educational programs throughout the United States. Adapting HIM Education for the Next Generation: Everything from Y to Z, AHIMA Associate and Bachelor Curriculum Competencies updates, Course Design, and Research were just a few of the educational opportunities available to participants. One of the most significant presentations was an update on the new 2018 accreditation standards from the Commission on Accreditation for Health Informatics and Information Management Education (CAHIIM).

Faculty Professional Development Training

In May, Dr. David Bishop attended a 2-day training in St. Paul, MN provided by grant funding received from the National Security Agency (NSA). Topics included Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) and Industrial Control System (ICS) cybersecurity curriculum, intrusion detection and prevention systems, penetration testing, and software exploitation.

ETOP 2019

Dr. Zixing Shen collaborated with Dr. Songxin Tan of SDSU on a paper titled "A survey on hybrid problem-based learning in a digital image processing course" which was presented in Quebec, Canada in May at the Education and Training in Optics and Photonics (ETOP) International Conference.

SD ACTE

Dr. Deb Tech was invited to present at the South Dakota Association of Career and Technical Education (SD ACTE) conference in Michell in July. Her presentation, titled "The Impact of Disruptive Technologies in Industry and Curriculum" provided an overview of four disruptive technologies: Artificial Intelligence (AI), Internet of Things (IoT), Virtual/Augmented Reality (VR/AR), and Blockchain Technology. She provided a brief description of each technology as well as an update of their uses in industry and concluded with a focus on implementation in curriculum. Dakota State University also had a booth at this event to share information about our programs.

STEAM Camp

Dr. Chris Olson presented a session titled "Telepresence Robots, Assistive Tech, and Accessibility Checkers" at DSU's STEAM Camp for Teachers. This was a 1-day symposium in which attendees learned about hands-on activities they can use to teach STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, and mathematics) in their classrooms. He gave a demonstration of his robot named Cosmo and then provided an overview of assistive technology tools that can be utilized by students, including voice recognition software and text-to-speech apps.
