Dear Sir:-

I write to inquire if you will kindly let me know whether there is an opening in your Institution in the Department of Romance Languages. It is my intention to leave Yale in June, having spent the last three years here studying Spanish, French and Italian, and I should like to know as soon as possible my future location.

For three years (193 to 196) I studied Spanish and French daily under able instructors at Tangier, Morocco, where my father was United States Consul General, and acquired a thorough knowledge,

both literary and colloquial, of these languages.

I graduated from Bethany College, W. Va., in 1898, in the classical course, with the honors of my class. I studied for three years ('99 to '01) at Cornell University, receiving due credit for my work there, and was granted an A.M. degree at Bethany College in 1902, for work done there and at Cornell in course.

I taught French and Latin for two years ('99 and 1900) at Hamilton College, Lexington, Kentucky, and Greek and Spanish for

two years ('01 and '02) at Bethany College.

An A.M. degree was conferred on me by Yale in June 1903, with Spanish as my major study, having specialized in that language. I am now working on a Spanish text for publication, the intro-

duction to which is to be my thesis for a Ph.D.

I am 30 years of age and married. I can send you testimonials from President B. C. Hagerman of Hamilton College, Lexington Ky., from General Joseph Wheeler of Alabama; from the present President, T. C. Cramblett, of Bethany College, W. Va., and his predecessor, for both of whom I taught, and from my professors at Yale or others, if you so desire.
