

This is the sociology department graphic developed by UMaine Marketing using our new department slogan recently adopted at a department visioning retreat.











Visiting Speaker Jeanne Flavin comes to UMaine



UMaine was one of the lucky recipients of a grant from Sociologists for Women in Society to bring Jeanne Flavin, the 2013 recipient of the SWS Feminist Activism Award to UMaine. Dr. Flavin is a Professor of Sociology at Fordham University whose scholarship examines gender, crime, and reproductive justice. She is author of the award-winning *Our Bodies, Our Crimes: Policing Women's Reproduction in America* (NYU, 2009), co-editor of *Race, Gender, and Punishment: From Colonialism to the War on Terror* (Rutgers, 2007), and author of more than two dozen other scholarly publications. She accepted a Fulbright research award in 2009 to study gender, family, and crime in South Africa.

While at UMaine, October 16-17, 2014, Professor Flavin gave talks for sociology and honors students, the sociology faculty, and she spoke for a very receptive crowd at the Mabel Wadsworth Women's Health Center on the topic "Punishing Pregnant Women who use Drugs: Defying Science, the Law, and Common Sense." It was a great treat to have Professor Flavin with us.



Markides' Sabbatical 2015

Professor Markides is using his sabbatical leave in Cyprus during the Spring 2015 semester to work on a book related to the theme of the secularization of Western culture. It is a theme that is widely accepted among the cultural elite in Europe and America, that is, that modernity irreversibly paves the way towards, as Max Weber put it, the "disenchantment of the world." It simply means that as rationality and science advance, religious beliefs recede. Since the nineteen sixties, however, the opposite view has been emerging in the work of a minority of leading scholars in the sociology of religion and related disciplines. They have argued that the modern world is not becoming more secular but more religiously pluralistic, more radically diversified. In addition, some of them went further

and claimed that modern science, far from being "the enemy of religion," has in fact created conditions for the support of a higher form of religiosity that integrates the best of religion with the best insights of modern science. That in fact we are moving towards a world that may witness the termination of the warfare between religion and science that has been going on since the time of the Enlightenment. Professor Markides is a proponent of the latter hypothesis. Using qualitative methods, he explores these ideas through, among other things, the analysis of relevant historical developments of the last seventy or so years and through personal, autobiographical experiences and vignettes that will make the work accessible to the general reader. Once published it will be Professor Markides's tenth book.

This year's Marcia Smargon Kornetsky Sociology Prize winner is Mary "Molly" Hunt '15. With an impressive record of a sociology GPA of 3.97 and a cumulative GPA of 3.955, Molly is a standout in sociology and at the university more generally. A member of the Honors College, Molly has been inducted into Phi Beta Kappa, the most prestigious national honor society, UMaine's All Maine Women, and Alpha Kappa Delta, the international sociology honor society. In 2013, she was selected to participate in the Maine NEW Leadership Summer Institute. In that same year, the sociology faculty, wholly impressed by

Molly's intellectual curiosity, academic accomplishments, and leadership potential, nominated Molly for participation in the American Sociological Association's Honors Program.

Molly is becoming a researcher in her own right; her creative and independent honors thesis is a carefully crafted piece on how religion impacts stigma consciousness among childfree women and men. She served as a research assistant on Professor Huisman's Maine Mother-Daughter Project where she assisted with data collection by conducting interviews and helped organize the Project's community events. Supported by a CLAS Undergraduate Research and Creative Activity Fellowship, Molly also worked under Professor Steve Barkan's direction to examine the relationship among young women between sexual orientation and alcohol abuse using data from the National Longitudinal Survey of Adolescent Health. Molly presented the results from her work with Professor Barkan at the annual meeting of the Eastern Sociological Society as well as the UMaine Center for Undergraduate Research Showcase.

In addition to her academic accomplishments, Molly has been involved in two campus singing groups, Renaissance and University Singers, since her first

campus singing groups, Renaissance and year on campus, and was also involved in the campus Symphonic Band her first two years. This year, she is Co-Music Director of Renaissance. She has served as a teaching assistant and/or research assistant for faculty in three academic units: the Honors College and the Departments of Psychology and of Sociology. That Molly is in such high demand for her teaching and research assistance speaks mightily to her intelligence and personal qualities. Congratulations to Molly on this achievement!
