Dear Sir:

Replying to your favor of the 15th inst., I have pleasure in sending you, under separate cover, a copy of the College catalogue for 1903-1904, in which you will find detailed information regarding conditions of admission, courses of study, equipment, etc. of this institution. You will observe by the catalogue that the only charge for tuition is an entrance fee of \$5.00, and sometimes an incidental fee for materials used in the laboratories and shops, which never exceeds \$2.50 a term or \$5.00 a year. Board and room, including electric light and fuel, may be obtained at the College Dormitory for \$13 to \$15 a month, and with private families for \$3.00 to \$3.50 a week.

Very many students earn part of their expenses by doing some work around the College. It is impossible at present to say just how much work there will be, but I shall be glad to help your sond

in this connection in every way I can.
