My dear sir:

We have your inquiry of January 29th concerning the teaching of domestic science and art ⁱⁿ of this state. We advise you as follows:

There is no legal provision for instruction in the public schools of the state on the subject of domestic science. There is a department in our State Agricultural College in which domestic science is taught. For the full information as to the plans and success of this department, we respectfully refer you to President E. R. Nichols, Manhattan, Kansas. There is no course of domestic science in the State Normal School. Outside of the Agricultural College, if any work of this kind were done it would be provided for otherwise than by public funds.
