Dear Sir:

Again we are compelled to call your attention to the notes due July 27th, 1903, for \$35.00 and Nov. 10, 1903, for \$200.00 given by John A. Widtsoe on your authority, neither of said notes having been paid to date. On Jan. 30th we received a communication from Mr. Widtsoe stating that he had delayed handing the secretary his expense account for his eastern trip, for lack of one of the proper receipts of part of his transportation, but expected to receive same in a few days, and then promised to take up his notes. Since then we have received nothing from him. You understand as well as we do that there is no excuse for the non-payment of these notes, and such delays only work hardships on others who expect to receive this kind of advance. Our president and your president does not justify us in doing this, but you are well aware we aim to be accomodating in these matters, but feel in this case we are being imposed upon. Expect you to take this matter up at once and bring it to a conclusion, as it is not very agreeable to us to write to you or any one else in such a vein.
