# Consider the following...

- ❖ A man is about to eat his one loaf of bread. Before he starts eating, he meets a homeless man who is completely devoid of food. He can either:
  - Split the bread half and half (interest of others).
  - Ignore the man and keep the bread for himself (Rand).

# Ethical Egoism

- ❖ Ayn Rand's "In Defense of Ethical Egoism"
- ❖ Objectivism = My self-interests > Your self-interests
  - "Pursuit of happiness" - rational
  - Sacrificing for others - irrational

“Every man is an end in himself, he exists for his own sake, and the achievement of his own happiness is his highest moral purpose” (Rand).

# Ayn Rand's Arguments

- ❖ Volitional choice- either-or
- ❖ Morality versus immorality
- ❖ Person's motives for service.
  - Love and guilt

## Rand's Either-or:

- ❖ You can either serve your own self-interests or serve the interests of other people...
  - But is this a valid point?

- ❖ Not an either-or decision!
- ❖ Martin Luther King, Jr.
  - “Life’s most persistent and urgent question is, What are you doing for others” (Martin Luther King, Jr.)?
- ❖ Elizabeth Cady Stanton
- ❖ Rand’s self-contradiction
  - Serving us
