Proceedings of the Annual Meeting Held at Del Monte, California

September 20 and 21, 1927

Tuesday, September 20, 1927—First Session

The regular annual meeting of the American Institute of Accountants was called to order at 10 A. M., in the Assembly Room at the Hotel Del Monte, Del Monte, California, President William H. West presiding.

Invocation was offered by Msgr. R. S. Mestres.

Minutes of the annual meeting of 1926 as printed in the year-book were approved.

H. Ivor Thomas, president of the California State Society of Certified Public Accountants, extended a welcome on behalf of the society to the members of the Institute and their guests.

Edward E. Gore, Chicago, replied to the address of welcome.

Msgr. Mestres delivered a brief historical address of the Spanish missions on the California coast and extended a general invitation to visit the mission of Carmel, of which he is the pastor.

The report* of the president was read and accepted.

The report* of the council was read and accepted.

The chairman introduced H. Percy Edwards, president of the Dominion Association of Chartered Accountants, who expressed his appreciation of the privilege of attending the meeting and extended congratulations of the Dominion Association of Chartered Accountants and of the Ontario Institute of Accountants. He invited members of the Institute to attend the next meeting of the Dominion Association to be held in Toronto in September, 1928.

Upon motion duly seconded it was unanimously resolved that the acts of the council and of committees during the past year be approved.

The meeting proceeded to consideration of the report of the committee on by-laws. The report of the committee recommended that article II, section 4 (a) be amended by inserting after the first word the words "in practice." The section would then read:

"Associates in practice who shall have been in practice on their own account or in the employ of a practising public accountant for five years next preceding the date of application."

The committee also recommended that article II, section 4 (b) be amended by insertion of the words "in practice" after the first word. The section would then read:

"Accountants in practice who shall present evidence of preliminary education satisfactory to the board of examiners and shall have been in practice on their own account or in the employ of a practising public accountant for not less than five years next preceding the date of application, including at least one year of practice in the United States of America."

The recommendations of the committee were unanimously approved.

The report* of the auditors was presented by M. E. Peloubet and upon motion unanimously accepted.

The meeting proceeded to consideration of the place of meeting for 1928.

It was announced that invitations had been received from chambers of commerce and similar bodies in many cities.

A motion that the next meeting be held in Washington, D. C., was not seconded.

H. T. Cuthbert of Phoenix, Arizona, invited the Institute to hold its meeting in that city.

John R. Ruckstell, California, proposed that the next meeting be held in or near the city of Buffalo, New York, and reminded the meeting that the next meeting of the Dominion Association of Chartered Accountants would be held in Toronto. He said that it might be possible to hold joint sessions of the two organizations if the Institute meeting were held in a city near that selected by the Dominion Association.

The meeting was called to order at 2:10 P. M., President West presiding.

Robert H. Montgomery, New York, presented a paper entitled Accountants' Limitations.*

Discussion of the paper was led by W. Sanders Davies, New York, and the following members participated: M. E. Peloubet, New York; Edward E. Gore, Illinois; W. Q. Sharp, Mississippi; John B. Niven, New York.

The chairman on behalf of the Institute extended cordial thanks to the author of the paper.

The meeting adjourned.

WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 21, 1927—FIRST SESSION

The meeting was called to order at 10 A. M., President William H. West presiding.

The first business was the election of officers.

The report† of the committee on nominations offered the name of John R. Ruckstell, California, for president.

It was moved that the nominations be closed and that the secretary cast one ballot for the election of Mr. Ruckstell. The motion was seconded and carried unanimously.

The ballot was cast and the president announced the election of John R. Ruckstell as president of the Institute.

The chair appointed Edward E. Gore, Illinois, and W. Sanders Davies. New York, to escort Mr. Ruckstell to the chair.

The chairman welcomed Mr. Ruckstell and handed over to him the gavel of office. Mr. Ruckstell in accepting the gavel said:

"I am filled with considerable emotion on the present occasion, and I doubt if any of you placed in a similar position would be

prepared to make a speech. However, I want to thank each and every one individually and collectively for the support you have given me and the cordial method in which I am inducted into office.

"One of the considerations which is most serious to me is the coming year. The head of the American Institute of Accountants has much to think of and a great deal to do if he is going to do in a general way what is best for the Institute. My predecessors have been eminent men. They have put the Institute on a pedestal. They have conducted their office so that each term has seen large results from their presidency. It is almost too much to hope that I can add greatly to what has been done by my predecessors, but I shall feel very well satisfied if I can follow the policies outlined by Mr. West and keep up the prestige of the Institute as he and his predecessors have done.

"Instead of saying much at this time my thoughts go forward to a year hence, and I think it would be better for me to concern myself from the present moment with what my valedictory will be, based upon the accomplishments of my term of office. I hope and feel assured of the cooperation of the entire membership to make my year a success and I know that I shall receive that coöperation."

The committee on nominations proposed the names of M. E. Peloubet, New York, and Leon E. Vannais, Connecticut, as auditors of the Institute.

It was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed and that the secretary cast one ballot for election of the nominees.

The motion was unanimously carried, the ballot was cast and the chair announced the election of Messrs. Peloubet and Vannais as auditors.

The committee on nominations proposed the names of F. B. Andrews, Illinois; H. W. Hennegin, Arkansas; W. P. Hilton, Virginia; Walter Mucklow, Florida; L. B. Smith, Texas; J. E. Sterrett, New York, and William Jeffers Wilson, Pennsylvania, as members of the council for five years.

It was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed and that the secretary cast one ballot in favor of election of the nominees.

The motion was unanimously carried, the ballot was cast and the chair announced the election of Messrs. Andrews, Hennegin, Hilton, Mucklow, Smith, Sterrett and Wilson as members of the council for five years.

The committee on nominations proposed the name of J. M. McConahey, Washington, as member of the council for three years.

It was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed and that the secretary cast one ballot for election of Mr. Mc-Conahey.

The motion was unanimously carried, the ballot was cast and the chair announced the election of Mr. McConahey as member of the council for three years.

The committee on nominations proposed the name of F. H. Hurdman, New York, as member of the council for one year.

It was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed and that the secretary cast one ballot for election of Mr. Hurdman.

The motion was unanimously carried, the ballot was cast and the chair announced the election of Mr. Hurdman as member of the council for one year.

The secretary announced that on account of the death of Henry C. Magee, Pennsylvania, there was a vacancy in the council for the term of three years.

Lewis G. Fisher, chairman of the committee on nominations, placed in nomination the name of C. O. Wellington, Massachusetts, to fill the vacancy.

It was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed and that the secretary cast one ballot in favor of the election of Mr. Wellington.

The motion was unanimously carried, the ballot was cast and the chair announced the election of Mr. Wellington as member of the council for three years.

The secretary announced a vacancy in the council for the term of one year caused by the non-attendance of a member of the council.

Lewis G. Fisher, chairman of the committee on nominations, placed in nomination the name of George M. Clark, Tennessee, to fill the vacancy.

It was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed and that the secretary cast one ballot in favor of the election of Mr. Clark.

The motion was unanimously carried, the ballot was cast and the chair announced the election of Mr. Clark as member of the council for one year.

Upon call for nominations for the committee on nominations for the ensuing year, Edward E. Gore, Illinois, proposed the following names: Charles B. Couchman, New York; John P. Dawson, Oregon; G. E. Hutchison, Illinois; A. G. Moss, Texas; and W. A. Musgrave, Connecticut.

It was moved and seconded that nominations close and that the secretary cast one ballot in favor of election of nominees.

The motion was unanimously carried, the ballot was cast and the chair announced the election of Messrs. Couchman, Dawson, Hutchison, Moss and Musgrave as members of the committee on nominations.

Annual Meeting, 1927

The meeting adjourned.

A paper entitled What Is the Matter with Accounting* was presented by Henry Rand Hatfield, dean of the school of commerce of the University of California.

Discussion of the paper was led by J. Hugh Jackson, and the following members participated: Peter S. Barton, Pennsylvania; F. H. Hurdman, New York; Carl H. Nau, Ohio; and W. Sanders Davies, New York.

William H. West, New York, moved that a vote of thanks be extended to the committee on meetings and to the California State Society of Certified Public Accountants for the arrangements which had been made for the entertainment of members.

The motion was seconded and unanimously adopted.

The meeting adjourned sine die.

The annual banquet took place at the Hotel Del Monte, Del Monte, California, at 7:30 P. M., Wednesday, September 21, 1927. Edward E. Gore, toastmaster, introduced the following speakers: John R. Report of the President of the American Institute of Accountants

The occasion of our convening in this beautiful and historic spot is not only that we may receive and consider the reports of the year now closing, and organize for the year about to open, but also that we may commemorate in appropriate manner the completion of forty years of the life of this body which, though changed in name and form, perpetuates and promotes the aims of that band of pioneers, the first in the history of our country to organize for the common good of practising accountants and for the upbuilding of the profession to which we belong.

It is true that for some years after its formation in 1887 the American Association of Public Accountants, as our body was then named, developed but slowly. Increasing demands, however, made upon the profession by the marked industrial development throughout the country toward the close of the last century and the stimulating influence of the congress of accountants, held in St. Louis in 1904, infused new life into its being, and from that time forward the American Association grew both in membership and influence.

This development brought in time new problems in its train, and, as a result, those men charged with the direction of the Association's activities became convinced of the need for a more compact and effective form of organization control; and voice was given to this conviction by President Joplin in 1915 at the annual convention in Seattle. Thence evolved, in 1916, our present organization under a new name: The American Institute of Accountants.

It is not my purpose to recite the history of the past; to others, so much better qualified, I leave that privilege. It is pride in our Institute and its expanding influence which prompts this brief reference; and in this pride I know you fully share.

In the past year the Institute has continued to make quiet but encouraging progress in its own widening sphere. Its support and coöperation are being increasingly sought by governmental

agencies, by public organizations having as their aim improvement in business procedure and in the avoidance of economic waste, by the banking fraternity both in its commercial and investment branches. This increased recognition comes naturally, I am sure, as a result of the growing participation of our members in the public life of their communities, and also, as a matter of course, from improvement in professional service and accomplishment.

Encouraging also is the increased interest our members have shown in the work of our committees and bureaus. I refer to the many helpful replies which have been received to the questionnaires sent out during the year. There were three of these. One related to the report of the committee on education, presented at the last annual meeting; another, to information sought by the committee on federal legislation, and a third, to the request of the bureau of information for greater enlistment of members in its service. The several committees to which these replies were referred will reflect their use in the reports which will be presented later. In all, upwards of 700 replies were received. This is indicative of the fine spirit of cooperation inherent in our membership. And this being so, may I not take this opportunity of repeating the suggestion heretofore advanced by the committee on publication, that you engage more actively in the support of our official organ by contributing to its columns. The Journal of Accountancy is your magazine; it ranks high in the field of technical literature; admission to its pages is a credit to the contributor.

The report of the council, which will be offered later, will present in extended form the history of the year's activities; and the reports of the respective standing and special committees will furnish much that is interesting and instructive. Again I would urge your close study of these reports.

As in the preceding year, so in this I have had the pleasure of attending the regional meetings of the Institute. It has also been my privilege to represent the Institute at various special meetings throughout the country: in October, the annual meeting, at Montreal, of the Dominion Association of Chartered Accountants; in November, a special meeting, in Toronto, of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Ontario, and this spring, the 30th anniversary of the New York State Society of Certified Public Accountants, the 30th anniversary of the Pennsylvania

Institute of Certified Public Accountants, and the spring meeting of the Virginia Society of Public Accountants, at Virginia Beach.

The regional meetings attended were that of the Ohio region held in Pittsburgh in November, and the meeting of the mid-west region held at Kansas City in June. Fewer regional meetings were held this year, due apparently to the difficulty of selecting in the several regions places of meeting other than those which had recently taken their turn at entertaining. Possibly, also, attendance upon two such meetings in each year, as has been the custom in some regions, and, in addition, attendance at the annual meeting of the Institute, demand more time and effort than it is practicable for many to spare. It is my conviction, strengthened in these two years, that regional meetings are of great value in stimulating and holding the interest of members in our organization. They also add to the prestige of the Institute where held. Particularly are they valuable in the personal friendships they create and foster. For all these reasons their continuance and development are much to be desired.

At the Montreal meeting of the Dominion Association of Chartered Accountants, to which I have already referred, consideration was given to the subject of reciprocal relationships with American professional bodies. More recently in a letter received by me from one of their prominent members, the thought was advanced that, if we deemed it practicable, the appointment of an Institute committee to confer with a like committee of the Association upon this matter would be appreciated. It would be a courteous step for us to take, and would result, I believe, in further enhancing the goodwill now so strong between the two nations.

The Institute has suffered a severe loss this year in the death of its librarian, Miss Louise S. Miltimore. Since the inception of the endowment fund, under which the library functions, Miss Miltimore had had immediate charge of its operations. Its growth in scope and size had been greatly furthered by her devoted interest. That important adjunct of the library, the bureau of information, had reached its present stage of usefulness largely through her efforts. We shall greatly miss her efficient aid.

And now, at the close of my term of office, let me say to you and to the many members of our Institute, who, for business and

other reasons, have not been able to avail themselves of the privilege of meeting with us here on this occasion:

From my close association with the Institute's affairs in the past two years; from my knowledge of the work undertaken and carried through by your boards and committees; from my many conversations with our members in all parts of the country, I am more than ever impressed with the depth of interest shown, with the willingness to serve, with the loyalty to our standards so resolutely maintained. I know of no other organization in which so great a proportion of the membership contributes in service to the common cause.

My warmest thanks I extend to the members of the executive committee for their valued counsel and support throughout the year. May I record also my sincere appreciation of the loyal and efficient services of our secretary and his staff.

I am deeply grateful to you men of the Institute for the honor of serving as your president in the two years now at an end. I can wish for my successor no greater boon than that he may experience such sympathetic coöperation as I have received at your hands.

To the Council of the American Institute of Accountants:

Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit the following report for the fiscal year ended August 31, 1927:

A little more than forty years ago the American Association of Public Accountants was founded for the purpose of building a profession. On September 22, 1887, the organization obtained a charter from the state of New York. Radical changes in structure were made in 1905 and in 1916, and today at the end of its fourth decade of corporate existence the association under a new name and with substantial accretions of power, financial strength and influence continues to carry on its original purpose with an unbroken record of progress and achievement. From a small group of men not widely known to a national and even international membership of more than 2100; from resources of insignificant proportions to total net assets of \$313,232.68; from activities in a narrow field to a rank in the van of the great national societies of professional men—these are developments which are not astonishing in days of tremendous progress, but it is a remarkable and inspiring fact that concurrent with advances of material prosperity and good repute the organization has adhered steadfastly to the faith of its fathers—and it has built a profession.

But the labor is not yet ended. The foundations are secure, course upon course has been laid, the plans for higher building are drawn, but, fortunately the superstructure is still to be finished. There is work for the architect and artisan for many years to come.

Nevertheless at the end of forty years it is a splendid accomplishment which stands in view and there is in it and through it all a consistency of design of which all who have wrought upon it may be justly proud.

The profession has its place in the world, and, although it is proper to remember the growth of the association which

has done most of the construction, it is even more important to keep in mind the extraordinary changes which have taken place in the profession—in its scope, its strength, its effect upon the world of business and the security of the people.

The older men in the profession today can remember the time forty years ago when there was no history and they had only a faint hope, not quite an expectation, that great things were ahead. Now there is a history and the future looms very bright.

The American Association of Public Accountants is now the American Institute of Accountants and its name is known wherever there is accountancy. The Institute continues to build. It is not concerned so much with the builders as with the building. While that distinction remains its future is safe.

The international friendships and influence of the Institute are increasing year by year. Accountancy can not be confined by political boundaries. Whenever an attempt is made to set up barriers the profession is in danger of becoming a pale prisoner without prospect or perspective.

The accountants of Canada are ready to work with those of the United States. This year, for example, the Dominion Association of Chartered Accountants arranged the dates of its annual meeting to make it possible for many of the Institute members to attend the convention in Winnipeg on the way to their meeting at Del Monte. The British societies are in constant and cordial communication with the Institute. Australian societies coöperate fully and frequently.

While the secretary of the Institute was in the Orient on leave of absence from office he found an unexpected interest in the work which the Institute is doing for the profession here. As an illustration, it may be mentioned that he was invited by a minister of the Indian government to make suggestions based upon American experience for changes in the bill then before the parliament at Delhi to regulate the practice of accountancy in the Indian empire.

National friendships are not the first consideration of the Institute, but their maintenance is well worth while and it may be

salutary to remember that accountants of other countries are looking this way.

The Institute has stood firmly for high ideals, consequently there have been differences of opinion among the members. Ideals are largely individual and what is right in one man's eyes may be wrong in another's. Consequently there has been and probably always will be accountants who disagree with the will of the majority. An organization which can not arouse a vigorous spirit of opposition is dead. But the steady growth in membership in spite of increased severity of rules of conduct indicates a lasting vitality. There is always in every group of people a small number who will do the work while the rest contemplate, with interest and approval or without, the labors of the few. This is true, of course, of the Institute and it is much regretted that there is not a larger active membership. There is always opportunity for every member to work for and with the Institute. The difficulty is to find the willing members.

During the year which ended August 31st there were several noteworthy events in the development of accountancy with which the Institute was intimately concerned.

In the early summer representatives of the Investment Bankers Association approached a member of the Institute and suggested that a committee of each society should be appointed to confer on questions of common interest to the two bodies. An informal meeting was arranged and as a result of the discussions at that meeting and of communications between the president of the Investment Bankers Association and the president of the Institute the investment bankers at their meeting on September 28, 1927, will be asked to authorize the appointment of a special committee to cooperate with a similar committee of the Institute. This follows precedent set in the relationships between the Robert Morris Associates and the Institute which have done more than anything else has ever done to bring about a true understanding between bankers and accountants. The cordial coöperation between the Institute's committee on coöperation with bankers and the Robert Morris Associates committee on cooperation with public accountants has continued throughout the year with increasing satisfaction to both parties. In addition to the interchange of questions and answers which has

marked the relations of these committees in past years there is a probability that in the near future the Institute committee and the Robert Morris committee will make a united effort to encourage corporations and other business concerns to adopt the natural business year. This is a movement which has great possibilities and the joint efforts of bankers and accountants should be productive of greater results than could be expected from the endeavors of one group only.

At the beginning of the year an effort was made to enter into closer relations with the New York stock exchange for the purpose of assisting to bring about requirements for more comprehensive financial reports from companies whose securities are listed on the exchange. Following the publication of several articles in magazines condemning the lack of explicit detail in financial statements of certain companies there was a general demand by stockholders and other investors for better financial statements. The demand continues and the effort, which has not yet borne fruit, to assist the stock exchanges of the country is not abandoned, and it is hoped confidently that in the near future there will be a greater inclination on the part of exchange authorities to assist accountants in their attempts to insist upon an opportunity for full and frank exposition of financial facts.

A decision rendered by the supreme judicial court of Massachusetts in the case Ipswich Mills vs. William Dillon, et al. is the most important contribution to legal precedent governing the practice of the profession that has ever been rendered in this country. All members are familiar with the substance of the decision, which definitely accords to the accountant the right of possession to his working papers and incidentally recognizes without equivocation the professional status of accountancy. The appeal to the supreme court was made in the name of William Dillon, a member of the Institute, and prosecuted by the Hon. J. Harry Covington, counsel for the American Institute of Accountants, assisted by Robert G. Dodge of Massachusetts. The executive committee of the Institute recognized the importance of the case and assumed on behalf of the Institute the expenses of appeal. The contentions of Judge Covington on behalf of the accounting profession were unanimously upheld.

The board of examiners during the year conducted examinations in coöperation with a majority of the states. The list of states employing the Institute's questions has been increased by the addition of one.

The bureau for placements which was established a little more than a year ago has become an important factor of the Institute's usefulness. Most of the colleges and universities of the country have expressed interest in the work of the bureau and applications for positions with accounting firms have been received from 116 colleges and universities.

The bureau for public affairs has been inactive during the year largely because of a serious accident which befell the chairman in November, 1926.

The committee on federal legislation requested that a questionnaire be sent to all members and associates asking for suggestions relative to amendments of the tax laws. The large number of replies received indicated a general interest in this important question. The replies are now in the hands of the committee and the substance of the recommendations which are approved will be presented to the joint committee of the senate and house of representatives.

Louise S. Miltimore, librarian of the Institute, died April 22, 1927. The loss which the Institute suffers in her death is almost irreparable. She had been librarian from the creation of the library in 1917, and it is largely to her efforts that the success of the library is due. The secretary has received a great number of letters from members of the Institute and other persons expressing their keen sorrow at Miss Miltimore's death.

As a successor Miss Helen M. Johnstone has been engaged as librarian. She comes to the library with a record of experience in the library of one of the large accounting firms and in the library of a university.

The operations of the library and bureau of information continue to increase in importance and scope. It is gratifying to record that the income from the investments of the endowment and the Foundation are more than sufficient to pay the running expenses of the library and bureau of information and to leave a margin for investment in books and greater facilities for the use of members.

The codification of the by-laws, approved by the Institute at its annual meeting in 1926, was ratified by mail ballot in accordance with the requirements of the former by-laws and was declared by the president effective December 4, 1926.

Many state legislatures have been in session during the vear and as usual a great many attempts have been made to alter or to abolish the C. P. A. laws. In some cases these efforts were defeated by the closest margin and it is evident that it is always necessary to maintain careful watch lest adverse legislation be enacted. This year there has been no serious damage done, but a law enacted in Illinois creating a new class of public accountants, without interfering with the existing law for the certification of certified public accountants, is not unanimously approved by the profession. The law has not yet been in operation long enough to know whether it will be desirable or undesirable. The legislature of Florida enacted a law with rather severe restrictive clauses but not weakening the position of the profession in that state. Following the passage of the new law in Florida the state society there was reorganized under the name of the Florida Institute of Accountants.

The circulation of *The Journal of Accountancy* at August 31st, was 11,113 and of the *Bulletin* on the same date 3,629. These figures compare with 11,274 and 3,471 at August 31, 1926, showing little change in the total circulation of the two publications but some decline in the circulation of the *Journal*.

There has been remarkable increase in the number of subscriptions to *The Journal of Accountancy* from students. The subscription rate for students is somewhat less than the ordinary rate and therefore from a financial point of view the results are not altogether satisfactory. On broader grounds, however, it is desirable that there should be a constantly increasing number of students reading the mouthpiece of the Institute.

Total sales of other publications of the Institute and its subsidiary organizations since 1916 have been as follows:

Report of Council

To the American Institute of Accountants:

Gentlemen: Your council reports that the Institute's year ended August 31, 1927, was in general a period of steady and important progress. The growth in membership has been of about the same percentage that has prevailed for many years past. No great increase in membership is expected or perhaps desired in any year, for it is the policy of the Institute to attract members without making extraordinary efforts to compel people to come in. There has been a heavy death toll during the year, but the loss in membership by non-payment of dues and resignations has been comparatively small. At the close of the fiscal year the Institute consisted of 1685 members and 413 associates, an increase of 21 members and 13 associates as compared with the membership at August 31, 1926.

The meeting of the Institute to which this report will be rendered marks the fortieth anniversary of the formation of the American Association of Public Accountants, and it is the third occasion on which the American Association or its successor, the American Institute of Accountants, has met on the Pacific coast. The first far-western meeting was held at San Francisco in 1911, the second at Seattle in 1915, with a special supplementary session at San Francisco, and this, the third, meeting will be ever memorable not only for the fact that it is the fortieth anniversary, but also because it is held in one of the most beautiful parts of the United States.

One of the noteworthy features of the year past is the increasing evidence of public recognition that the Institute speaks for the entire accounting profession, both members and non-members. The reports which have been presented at the meeting of council held today are evidence of steady and substantial growth. These reports, of course, will be published in the year-book of the Institute, but the following extracts from some of the reports are presented here for the information of the members in meeting assembled.

The consolidated balance-sheet of the Institute and its affiliated organizations shows total assets of \$411,218.73. The actual liabilities amount to \$97,986.05, of which \$70,000 is the outstanding obligation on account of the bonds of the 135 Cedar Street Corporation. Income from all sources during the year amounted to \$128,116.76, and the expenses to \$124,174.10, which left an addition to surplus of \$3,942.66.

The relations between accountants and bankers are developing satisfactorily and a better feeling of understanding exists between these two classes of men than has ever existed in the past.

One of the most important events of the year was the success which attended the Institute's efforts to obtain an authoritative ruling from a court of competent jurisdiction upon the subject of ownership of the accountant's working papers. The decision in the Dillon case, with which

all members are familiar, is perhaps the most important pronouncement by an American court of last resort upon a subject primarily of accounting interest.

The board of examiners during the year examined 43 candidates for admission, of whom 21 passed, 2 were conditioned and 20 failed. Forty-eight other applicants who had passed the Institute's examinations in states coöperating with the Institute were recommended for admission, and in addition 29 applicants were recommended for election on the strength of other accounting examinations which the board of examiners considered adequate. Thirteen associates were recommended for advancement to membership. Under the plan of coöperation with state boards of accountancy the Institute's board supplied papers to practically all the coöperating states. The list of coöperating states and territories has been increased by one.

The board of examiners recommended that the Elijah Watt Sells scholarship, which is available for special awards to applicants receiving the highest grades in the May examinations of each year, be not granted during the last year. The board believes that this award should not be given unless some one candidate gives evidence of exceptional ability.

At the meeting of council held today a list of 17 applicants for admission as members, 16 for admission as associates and 4 for advancement to membership was approved, and if protest is not received these applicants will be declared elected.

The bureau for placements is performing a highly important function. Many applications have been considered and the best applicants have been recommended for positions. Evidence of interest in the work of the bureau has been expressed by 116 colleges and universities. The bureau has been financed by special contributions from a few firms and no charge for services has been made either to employer or employed. The question, however, will arise in the near future whether this activity is to become one of the Institute's budget responsibilities or not. The firms which have contributed have not indicated any unwillingness to continue, but there is a question of principle involved with which the council doubtless will be required to deal.

The bureau of public affairs has been inactive chiefly because of the serious accident which befell Carl H. Nau, its chairman. There has not been any evidence of great interest in the perpetuation of the activities of the bureau, but the council believes that a modified programme of activity might be inaugurated and carried forward at small expense and with considerable effect.

At the annual meeting of last year a report of the committee on education recommending a general classification of accounting services was referred to the executive committee with instructions to obtain expressions of opinion from the entire membership relative to the general desirability of such a proposal. The executive committee was empowered to take such action as might seem necessary after receipt of the opinions of the members. Three efforts to elicit such opinions produced replies from only approximately 10 per cent. of the membership. In view of the

apparent lack of interest the executive committee authorized the appointment of a special committee to analyze the replies which had been received and to report to the executive committee. The special committee has not yet completed its labors.

A questionnaire was sent to the members asking for suggestions for amendments of the federal income-tax laws. The replies which were received have been considered by the committee on federal legislation which will now be in a position to present a number of constructive suggestions to the joint committee of the senate and house of representatives which is soon to meet.

Louise S. Miltimore, librarian of the Institute, died April 22, 1927. The loss to the Institute is great and the council desires to record its sense of appreciation of the splendid work which Miss Miltimore did and to express deep sorrow at her passing.

The library and bureau of information increase in importance year by year, and the financial support supplied by the endowment fund and the American Institute of Accountants Foundation will make it possible to serve the profession more and more.

The codification of the by-laws which was approved at the annual meeting in 1926 and subsequently ratified by mail ballot became effective December 4, 1926.

The committee on state legislation was called upon for an immense amount of labor during the year. Many efforts to amend existing laws or to abolish them altogether were made. Nearly all undesirable legislation was defeated. The most important new laws enacted were those of Florida and Porto Rico, providing for the certification of accountants. A new law in Illinois creates a class to be known as "public accountants" but does not interfere with the existing C. P. A. law of 1903. The model C. P. A. bill which was prepared by the committee on state legislation was approved by the executive committee and published in January, 1927.

The committee on publication reports that the circulation of *The Journal of Accountancy* was approximately the same at August 31, 1927, as on the corresponding date of the preceding year. The slight decline which the figures show is compensated by an increase in *Bulletin* circulation.

The report of the committee on nominations has been received and is referred for the consideration of the Institute.

The council reports with great regret that Ernest Reckitt, Illinois, has felt compelled to resign his membership on the council and consequently his chairmanship of the committee on professional ethics. This decision was made because Mr. Reckitt had undertaken work outside professional practice which occupied his time fully.

The resignation of Homer S. Pace, New York, from the council occurred during the year. Mr. Pace's resignation was based upon personal reasons.

Nominations to fill the vacancies caused by these resignations are included in the report of the committee on nominations.

The report of the committee on budget and finance estimates the revenue and expenses for the coming year as follows:

The same committee in preparation of a budget for The Journal of Accountancy, Incorporated, estimates the revenue at \$57,100 and the expenses at \$56,880; and for the 135 Cedar Street Corporation a revenue of \$16,400 and expenses of the same amount.

Two amendments to the by-laws proposed by the committee on by-laws will be presented for consideration of the Institute. These amendments do not involve any change in principle, but are simply intended to clarify the meaning of two sections.

The executive committee, in order to obtain a complete summary of information relative to members and associates, sent out questionnaires to the entire membership asking for details of partnerships, employment, etc. Replies have been received from about 87% of the members and associates. It had been suggested that this information might be published in the year-book, but the council at its meeting today resolved that this should not be done.

A suggestion has been received from E. van Dien of the International Accountants Congress suggesting that the next meeting of the congress be held in the United States in 1928 or 1929. The council considered this matter at its meeting today and resolved that the executive committee should be empowered to take steps to call an international meeting in 1929 and that state and other societies of accountants should be invited to assist the Institute in preparing for such a meeting.

The council records with profound sorrow the death of Henry C. Magee, Philadelphia. Mr. Magee had been a member of the council for two years and for many years prior to election to membership on the council had been an active and loyal member of the Institute.

Report of Executive Committee

TO THE COUNCIL OF THE AMERICAN INSTITUTE OF ACCOUNTANTS:

GENTLEMEN: The executive committee has held eleven meetings since its election by the council on September 23, 1926.

The Institute, at the 1926 annual meeting, referred to the executive committee the report of the committee on education containing a proposed classification of accountancy service. The committee was instructed to ascertain the opinions of the entire membership of the Institute as to the desirability of the proposed classification and the manner in which it might be used to the best advantage. Accordingly, the committee caused the report of the education committee and the classification to be printed and distributed to the membership with a request for opinions. A disappointing number of replies was received and a second circular letter was sent out making a similar request. The number of replies received was still too small, the executive committee felt, to warrant taking any definite action on the matter. A third appeal was made. The total responses to the three letters included slightly over 10 per cent. of the Institute membership, and the opinions expressed were so divergent as to make any definite action impossible without an exhaustive study of the replies. Accordingly, the executive committee empowered the president to appoint a special committee of men whose previous experience on Institute committees rendered them peculiarly well qualified to make a special study of the comments and to report their findings back to the executive committee. The special committee appointed consists of two members of the committee on education, two members of the special committee on cooperation with bankers, one member of the 1916-17 special committee on federal trade commission and one member at large. The matter is at present in the hands of this special committee.

The model C. P. A. bill which had been the objective of the efforts of the committee on state legislation for several years was presented to the executive committee without inclusion of a restrictive clause, in accordance with the vote of the council in September, 1926. The executive committee approved the bill and permitted it to be published for the information of those who might be interested in legislation for accountancy. The bill was published in the January, 1927, issue of the Institute Bulletin and subsequently was reprinted in pamphlet form.

A case in Massachusetts, Ipswich Mills vs. William Dillon, et al, involving the ownership of accountants' working papers was taken to the supreme judicial court on the report of the justice of the superior court who had originally tried the case. The matter was brought before the higher court at the instance of the Institute. Judgment was rendered July 5, 1927, and resulted in complete vindication of the Institute's claim that the working papers of an accountant are the property of the accountant. This case was of the utmost importance to the profession and a precedent has

now been established which should avoid all future question as to the ownership of working papers.

In the prosecution of the appeal in the Dillon case it was necessary to engage the assistance of Robert G. Dodge, Massachusetts attorney, and the committee authorized Judge Covington to make such arrangements as were required.

The committee undertook on behalf of the Institute to assume payment of the legal expenses involved. A bill amounting to \$1,107.58 from Storey, Thorndike, Palmer & Dodge has been paid and the committee requests the approval of council for this payment.

A communication from a member of the Institute with reference to the action of the department of internal revenue in disallowing credit for earned income of a partner of an accounting firm was referred to the counsel for the Institute and a reply has been received from Judge Covington asking for full information. It is hoped that the case can be presented before the board of tax appeals by Judge Covington so that it will establish the right of accountants to earned-income credit to which the law seems clearly to entitle them.

The committee received a letter from George O. May drawing attention to the opportunity which seemed to have arisen for the coöperation of the Institute with stock exchanges and similar bodies for the purpose of making adequate information as to the financial status of corporations available to shareholders and prospective investors.

The committee authorized the president to appoint a special committee which might confer with a committee of the stock exchange. Communications with the New York stock exchange ensued, but it was found that at the present time it seemed impracticable to make any definite progress.

The New York State Society of Certified Public Accountants informed the committee that the legislative committee of the society had resolved that it saw no necessity for revision of existing C. P. A. regulation in that state at the present time and further that the New York state society would not support any bills whose purpose was to alter the present accountancy law. The society requested the support of the Institute in this matter. The executive committee replied that the Institute was substantially in agreement with the views expressed by the society; that the Institute would not be in favor of any bill introduced in any state which would tend to lower existing professional standards, but that the Institute would reserve its opinion on any specific bill which might be introduced until the committee had had an opportunity to examine it.

The committee resolved that it would be well to have in the files of the Institute complete information relative to each member's partnership affiliation, employment or other status, and a questionnaire was sent to all the members asking for the information desired. A fair response was received to the first request and a second request was sent to those who had not replied. At the present time replies have been received from all but 274 members. The question as to whether or not this information should

be published in the year-book is one that the committee refers to the council. One member has expressed strong disapproval of the publication of information of this kind. It may be difficult to obtain information from those who have failed to reply to the two requests.

Several complaints have been received by the committee with reference to alleged misrepresentations by agents of a correspondence school. These complaints were generally to the effect that agents of the school had announced to prospective students that the courses of the school were endorsed by the American Institute of Accountants. The president of the school in question is a member of the Institute and he has been advised that if further complaints are received the matter will be placed before the committee on professional ethics and such action as may be required will be taken.

A report from that committee with reference to charges against a member made it necessary for the executive committee to summon the member to appear in answer at a meeting of the trial board held in Washington, D. C., April 11, 1927.

Charges against another member were received from the committee on professional ethics, but before the case could be heard the accused was dropped for non-payment of dues and consequently no further action was required.

A simplified invoice form submitted by the National Association of Purchasing Agents was approved by the committee.

A letter from E. van Dien of the International Accountants Congress suggesting that the next international congress be held in the United States in 1928 or 1929 is referred to the council for consideration.

The national committee on management week invited the Institute again to act as one of the sponsor organizations of management week which is to be held this year in October. The invitation was accepted and the executive committee authorized the payment of the usual subscription. Cecil S. Ashdown, who represented the Institute on the 1926 committee, consented to act in the same capacity this year and subsequently was unanimously elected chairman of the 1927 national committee on management week.

The committee reports with profound regret that Henry C. Magee of Philadelphia, a member of the council, died August 23, 1927.

Ernest Reckitt, chairman of the committee on professional ethics, having expressed a wish to resign from membership of council because of leaving professional practice, the committee accepted the resignation to be effective at the end of the fiscal year. The executive committee accepted this resignation with great regret and feels that the labors which Mr. Reckitt has performed for the Institute and for the profession as a whole are worthy of highest praise.

On April 22nd Louise S. Miltimore, librarian of the Institute, died after an illness of several months' duration. The executive committee thereupon adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the executive committee of the American Institute of Accountants has learned of the death of Louise Salisbury Miltimore, and, Whereas, for 10 years past Miss Miltimore has been the librarian of

the Institute, and,

WHEREAS, during the entire period of her relationship with this organization her faithful and brilliant work has contributed substantially to the progress of the accounting profession and of the Institute in particular, and,

Whereas, the executive committee is endowed with the powers of the council of the Institute between sessions of the council,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this committee record the Institute's deep sense of loss in the death of Louise Salisbury Miltimore and that the sympathy of the executive authority be extended to her family.

The executive committee was advised that it might be necessary for the California State Society of Certified Public Accountants to request financial assistance by the Institute in combating proposed undesirable legislation in California. It was resolved that the council be requested to make a special appropriation of \$500 for the purpose of assisting the California Society in its legislative difficulties if such assistance was desired.

Subsequently advice was received from the California State Society of Certified Public Accountants thanking the council for the appropriation but reporting that there would be no necessity to draw upon the appropriation as the expenses had been met by local contributions.

Under the provisions of the E. W. Sells scholarship fund it is customary to award a prize to the applicant to the Institute who receives the highest grades in the examinations of May each year. This year the board of examiners recommended that no award be made because no applicant had passed with special credit. This recommendation was approved by the executive committee.

Several long-outstanding accounts against members of the Institute for books purchased, etc., have been reported to the committee and the members concerned have been notified that if these accounts are not paid promptly it will be necessary to invoke the provisions of article V, section 2 of the by-laws relative to the automatic termination of membership when obligations to the Institute remain unpaid.

The committee on meetings for the 1926 annual meeting in rendering a financial statement of its receipts and expenditures reported a surplus of slightly over \$200.

The collector of internal revenue required the Institute to file a bond covering the amount of federal taxes previously assessed against The Journal of Accountancy for which exemption has been claimed. The matter is at present before the board of tax appeals.

The dues of several members who were in ill health or whose advanced years made them somewhat inactive have been paid out of the appropriation of the executive committee.

The committee did its utmost to ensure the payment of dues of members so that membership might not be terminated under the automatic provision of the by-laws. In spite of these efforts 13 members and 2

associates were dropped from the rolls at the end of January, 1927, for non-payment of dues.

Report of Committee on Professional Ethics

To the Council of the American Institute of Accountants:

GENTLEMEN: During the past year your committee has dealt with forty-nine separate complaints and inquiries, which may be summarized under the following captions:

- 1 Complaint due to suspension from practice before the treasury department. This case came before the council, sitting as a trial board, at its April meeting, and the member was found "not guilty."
- 1 Complaint arising through dissolution of partnership. This case is still pending.
- 1 Complaint against a member for defalcation, and commitment to the state prison. This member was found, however, to have been dropped from membership just prior to the receipt of the complaint,

- 1 Complaint against a firm for gross negligence in certifying to a balance-sheet, which was later found to contain an essential misstatement of facts. This case is still pending.
- 1 Complaint against a member for the solicitation of clients of another member of the Institute. In this case the evidence was not sufficient to warrant any action on the part of the committee.
- 1 Inquiry whether advertising by a group of accountants containing statement in respect to value of the services of accountants generally was or was not in conformity to our rules of conduct.
- 1 Complaint against a member of misstatement in a circular which was sent out to a large number of certified public accountants.

 This statement seriously reflected against the American Institute of Accountants.
- 13 Complaints in respect to improper advertising and the issuance of circular letters.
- 15 Requests for information and advice on interpretation of the rules of conduct and professional ethics.
- 14 Miscellaneous.

Some comment in respect to the above matters will probably be of interest. In the above statement you will note we refer to the trial of a member held last April. This trial would never have taken place were it not for the fact that the member in question absolutely ignored all letters written to him, asking for information as to the circumstances which led the treasury department to suspend him. In this correspondence your committee had stated that it would be glad to assist him to secure reinstatement if, in the opinion of the committee, he had not been guilty. Even so, the member in question made no reply or defense and, bearing in mind the old maxim that "silence gives consent," your committee could do nothing else but recommend that charges be brought against this member. The council, sitting as a trial board, found this member "not guilty." Your committee believes that if, in the future, any member similarly ignores the committee on professional ethics, he should at least be reprimanded by the council and the facts should be published in *The Journal*.

Your committee has received a number of complaints during the past year in relation to improper advertising and the issuance of circulars by various members of the Institute. In all such cases, except one which is still pending, your committee has been able to persuade the offending member to amend his ways. No doubt this situation is better than it was several years ago and we believe that one important factor in this improvement is the fact that a member now realizes that he makes himself ridiculous, not only in the eyes of his fellow members but also in the eyes of the business public, by attempting to obtain clients in an unethical manner. It is, however, extraordinary how some accountants permit themselves to be persuaded to adopt certain types of publicity.

As an illustration, there is a certain pamphlet to which we will give the name of "Add & Subtract," which, of course, is not the real name. The concern that issues this kind of literature seems to have done quite a considerable business among accountants and probably your committee hears of only a few cases. This pamphlet consists of four pages of printed

matter, each page being about 9 inches by 6 inches. At the top it states that it is a monthly bulletin sent by —, and then appears the card of the accountant who mails out such bulletins, after which appear matters which are supposed to be of general interest to the business world, together with other paragraphs which attempt to be jocose. The whole pamphlet is gotten up so as to try to make it appear as the work of the accountant who mails it out to his clients and to others, for the purpose of keeping his name before his clients or for obtaining new clients, and apparently without regard to the dignity of our profession or of his own standing.

The credulity of the accountant using this type of publicity is demonstrated by the facts that clients are held only by the character of the work performed by the accountant and not by the client's receiving circulars such as "Add & Subtract." It would also seem extremely doubtful whether any new clients can be obtained in this way, as any intelligent business man would immediately appreciate the character of the advertisement which he thus received. The publishers of this pamphlet have had the temerity to insist that the use of their pamphlet is not an infringement of our No. 11 rule of conduct, quoting that portion of rule No. 11 which reads: "Cards permitted by this rule when appearing in magazines, directories and similar publications, cards shall not exceed one quarter page in size."

Your committee desires to call your attention to a situation which it believes must be of considerable interest to all practising accountants, for while the matter referred to is technically a breach of our rules of conduct, yet in the opinion of the committee, some way should be worked out by which the type of advertising referred to could be encouraged. A group of ten accountants in one of the larger cities in the middle west inserted in one of the leading daily papers an advertisement measuring 8 inches by 7 inches, which was headed in large capital letters—"CERTI-FIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANTS AS A SAFEGUARD TO MODERN BUSINESS." Below this heading appeared the following written matter:

"An investigation by the federal trade commission of 22,000 commercial failures showed conclusively that ninety-one per cent. of such failures were due to poor accounting and nine per cent. to other causes. Further amazing evidence of lack of scientific, or even conservative, management in business is the conclusion of the federal trade commission that only ten per cent. of American business enterprises know definitely the cost of their products by the operation of well planned cost determining system, while forty per cent. of the enterprises merely estimate their costs of output and fifty per cent. guess at such costs.

"It is also noteworthy among corporations that an investigation by the federal trade commission involving 250,000 corporations showed that of that number 40% or 100,000 companies have no net income, while 36% or 90,000 companies show profits of less than \$5,000.00 a year, and that only 24% or 60,000 companies earn more than \$5,000.00 a year. These facts are appalling and indicate the imperative necessity of the expert assistance of the CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT as a safeguard against losses or insufficient net profit.

"The early engagement of an auditor, prior to the busy season,

insures maximum benefits."

Below this appeared the names of each of the firms of accountants paying for this advertisement.

As stated above, this advertisement was a technical breach of our rules of conduct and your committee does not recommend this form of advertising, since if ten accountants can do so, why not two accountants? It does, however, appear to your committee that the various state societies might very well adopt this plan of publicity and your committee recommends that the various state societies be encouraged to do so.

Finally, your committee recommends a slight change of rule No. 11 of our rules of conduct, by striking out the two words "or otherwise" appearing on the fourth line of this rule. These two words do not appear to serve any purpose, but on the other hand might cause all sorts of interpretations to be placed thereon.

Report of Committee on By-laws

To the Council of the American Institute of Accountants:

GENTLEMEN: Two minor amendments are submitted by your committee on by-laws, which seem to be desirable because of a possible ambiguity in the present phraseology.

Inasmuch as the proposed amendments do not change the purpose or intent of the by-laws but simply tend to absolutely clear definition, your committee recommends

That article II, section 4 (a) be amended to read:

"Associates in practice who shall have been in practice on their own account or in the employ of a practising public accountant for five years next preceding the date of application."

That article II, section 4 (b) be amended to read:

"Accountants in practice who shall present evidence of preliminary education satisfactory to the board of examiners and shall have been in practice on their own account or in the employ of a practising public accountant for not less than five years next preceding the date of application, including at least one year of practice in the United States of America."

Report of Committee on Publication

To the Council of the American Institute of Accountants:

GENTLEMEN: During the year now closing the activities of the Institute as to publications have been restricted to *The Journal of Accountancy* and the *Bulletin* of the Institute.

The following comparative figures of circulation of *The Journal* of *Accountancy* indicate that the falling off reported in the two preceding annual reports has been substantially arrested.

The circulation among non-members of the Institute amounted at August 15, 1926, to 9,081 and had decreased to 8,872 at August 15, 1927, a loss of 209 or slightly over two per cent.

The circulation of the *Bulletin* showed an upward tendency during the latter part of the year, but during the first nine months was somewhat below last year. The high point in the current year was reached at August 15, 1927, with a total of 3,574 against a total on the corresponding date last year of 3,411 and a high point last year of 3,737 on March 1st. The circulation among non-members at the close of the year thus shows an increase from 1,316 to 13,362 or three and one half per cent.

Reports of Committees

A further increase is to be noted in the proportion of special articles comprised in the subject matter of *The Journal*, which this year is nearly forty-four per cent. against forty-two per cent. last year. There were, however, only 37 articles contributed by 35 authors this year against 41 last year. The contributors fall under the following classifications:

Of the decrease of six in the number of contributors, five are in the classification of members and associates of the Institute.

Eleven of the thirty-seven articles published were papers and addresses prepared by the authors for presentation before meetings of accountants or other bodies. It will thus be seen that only twenty-six articles were written specifically as contributions to *The Journal*.

An expression of appreciation is due to the conductors of the regular departments of *The Journal* and to the contributors of book reviews (of which forty-three appeared during the year), as well as to the writers of the special articles referred to above. Our thanks are again due also to our editor and his staff.

Report of Committee on State Legislation

To the Council of the American Institute of Accountants:

GENTLEMEN: During the past year the legislative assemblies in most of the states have been in session, and, according to reports received by the committee, nineteen states and the territory of Alaska have given some consideration to C. P. A. legislation. In most cases the result has been the introduction of bills containing the objectionable waiver clause. These bills were vigorously opposed by the local accountants and, with one exception, failed to pass. In Illinois, a bill containing many objectionable features became a law. It does not, however, repeal the C. P. A. law of 1903, and contains many of the features of the 1925 law which was held to be unconstitutional. Accountants will be interested in learning the results which may follow the attempt to operate under the two laws. In Indiana an amendment to the existing law was passed, and it is believed will result in clearing up an unsatisfactory condition which existed in that state. Florida enacted a new law containing some unusual provisions, but it was the result of much painstaking effort on the part of the local accountants and is on the whole satisfactory to them.

As the Bulletin has reported in its current issues the legislative activities in the various states, an extended report at this time seems unnecessary, but a summary of such activities is appended and forms a part of this report. One has only to read the bills as submitted to be convinced that their main purpose is to provide an opportunity to obtain the C. P. A. certificate through the operation of a waiver clause.

Your committee has corresponded at some length with the local accountants in those states in which C. P. A. legislation was under consideration, and is ready at all times to render any assistance possible. Its action can be, of course, only advisory, and it is gratifying to note that as a result of increased interest and better organization, the state accountants are as a rule doing all that can be done to secure the enactment of proper legislation and to defeat that which fails to safeguard the interests of the business public and of the accounting profession.

At the last annual meeting the committee submitted to the council for its approval a model bill which it was hoped might serve as a guide in the preparation of state laws. This bill contained the restrictive and accompanying waiver clause. In view of the doubt as to the constitutionality of the restrictive clause, the bill was referred back to the committee with instructions to eliminate the restrictive clause. This has been done, and the model bill now has the approval of the Institute. Printed copies are now available for distribution, and it is hoped that it may prove helpful wherever new legislation is found desirable. The committee believes that some of the bills recently drawn are unnecessarily long and contain detailed provisions that are likely to prove a hindrance rather than a help in the administration of the law, and that the present model has, at least, the merit of brevity.

RECAPITULATION OF STATE ACTION

1927

ALABAMA: The committee corresponded with accountants interested in forming a new law and forwarded a copy of the model law. It was decided not to make any attempt to change the present law.

ARIZONA: Bill containing some undesirable features and not approved by accountants in the state was introduced and defeated.

ARKANSAS: The existing law was amended as affecting the organization and conduct of the state board.

CALIFORNIA: The committee corresponded at some length with California accountants in regard to a bill containing objectionable features which had been introduced in the legislature. The bill failed to pass.

CONNECTICUT: A bill introduced amending charter of the city of Williamntic and providing for annual audit by certified public accountants. The committee is not advised as to its final disposition.

FLORIDA: A new bill sponsored by the state society was introduced in the legislature and was the subject of some little correspondence with the committee. The bill which finally became a law contains some unusual provisions but is, on the whole, satisfactory to the Florida accountants.

IDAHO: The introduction of a new bill received some consideration but the committee is not advised that any action was taken.

ILLINOIS: As the result of an action brought by Illinois accountants, the accountancy law passed in 1925 was declared unconstitutional. A new law was passed providing for the registration of all practising accountants as "public accountants," but leaving in full force the C. P. A. law of 1903. It contains many of the provisions of the 1925 law which was held unconstitutional.

INDIANA: An amendment to the C. P. A. law was introduced in the legislature and passed. This amendment was sponsored by the state society and will result in a material improvement in the regulation of practice in that state.

Kansas: Three bills were introduced in the legislature. They were entirely local in character, but extended further official recognition to certified public accountants. One passed the house but was defeated on the floor in the senate. The other bills died in committee. An opinion of the attorney general states that no individual and no firm may practise in the state of Kansas as certified public accountants unless such individual and each partner of such firm be the legal holder of a Kansas certificate.

MARYLAND: Two bills introduced in the house of delegates were wholly objectionable and opposed by the state society. Neither bill was reported out of committee.

MASSACHUSETTS: The state society was active in connection with improved legislation of a local character.

MINNESOTA: The committee corresponded at some length with local accountants in regard to proposed legislation. A new bill was drawn but not introduced. A bill providing for further official state recognition of certified public accountants was introduced and passed the house. The committee is not advised whether or not it finally became a law.

MISSOURI: A bill repealing the C. P. A. law was opposed and defeated by the Missouri certified public accountants.

New YORK: An attempt was made to put through the bill defeated at the previous session by introduction of the Gedney-Sheridan bill. This bill was opposed by the state society and was defeated.

NORTH CAROLINA: Some correspondence was had with accountants interested in the operation of the state law, particularly as affecting accountants whose headquarters are without the state. The assembly adjourned within a few days after the matter was brought to the attention of the committee, and no action was taken.

NORTH DAKOTA: A bill repealing all C. P. A. legislation was indefinitely postponed.

OKLAHOMA: A C. P. A. bill was introduced and passed the senate, but the committee is not advised as to its final disposition.

OREGON: At the request of the state society, the committee protested by wire and mail against the passage of a bill proposing to reopen the waiver clause. As a result of the well organized effort of the state society, the bill was indefinitely postponed.

TENNESSEE: A bill introduced in the legislature providing for an amendment of the present law failed to pass.

West Virginia: A new bill containing some objectionable features was introduced in the legislature but failed to pass.

WYOMING: A bill generally opposed by the accountants of the state was introduced and indefinitely postponed.

ALASKA: A bill amending the present C. P. A. law was introduced in the legislature but failed to pass.

PORTO RICO: At the suggestion of a member of the Institute, the committee wrote to the president and secretary of the Porto Rico Institute of Accountants, offering any assistance they might desire in connection with proposed legislation. Porto Rico has no C. P. A. law, and the bill introduced was reported defeated.*

^{*}Subsequent to the preparation of this report advice was received that the C. P. A. bill in Porto Rico had passed the legislature and had been signed by the governor. It is now in effect as law.

Report of Special Committee on Administration of Endowment

To the Council of the American Institute of Accountants:

Gentlemen: In any report of the endowment committee for the year just ended reference must first be made to the great loss sustained through the long illness and sad death of Miss Miltimore, who had served as librarian since January, 1918. During that period Miss Miltimore devoted herself to the work of the endowment fund with an insight, enthusiasm and devotion which greatly enhanced the value of the fund, but at the same time we fear seriously undermined her own health. This committee desires to express its recognition of the great debt which the Institute, and in fact the whole profession, owes to Miss Miltimore and its appreciation of her loyalty and whole-hearted coöperation in the work of the fund.

It was inevitable that the work of the library should suffer during the long illness of the librarian and it is not surprising that the statistical record of its progress shows in some respects a break in the previously unbroken record of continuously increasing service to the members. Miss Helen M. Johnstone, who has been appointed to succeed Miss Miltimore is now busily engaged in putting into shape for distribution the material which has accumulated, and the committee hopes that in the current year the lost ground will be rapidly recovered.

During the year only one special bulletin has been issued, but during the coming year there should be several editions containing the most interesting material which has been collected by the bureau of information.

It is worthy of note that the use of the library for reference purposes has increased steadily each year. In the year ended August 31, 1919, the number of references to the library was 572 and in the year just ended 5,221.

The circulation department which was inaugurated in 1924 has grown from a total in that year of 1146 to 2073.

The total number of publications in the reference collection is now 11,129, an increase of 609 over the year ended August 31, 1926.

The librarian has supplied the current literature department which appears in every issue of *The Journal of Accountancy*.

The interest outside the profession in topics which are particularly important to accountants has developed in a very marked way during the year just ended. The committee has kept in touch with the developments and while matters have not in any case progressed to a point where an announcement can be made, it believes that during the coming year it will be able to announce interesting new developments in which the Institute will be cooperating.

The committee desires to record its cordial appreciation of the splendid assistance which has been rendered by many firms and individual

accountants to the bureau of information which continues to render a service of the utmost value to the entire profession.

Report of Special Committee on Coöperation with Bankers

To the Council of the American Institute of Accountants:

GENTLEMEN: The activities of the special committee on coöperation with bankers during the past year have been confined largely to answering questions and criticisms which have been brought to it by the bankers, particularly the Robert Morris Associates committee on coöperation with public accountants. In several instances, statements which have been certified by members of the Institute have been criticized by the bankers in communications reaching your committee through Mr. Whitney, the chairman of their committee. These criticisms have all been disposed of.

Furthermore, many questions have been raised and decided by oral communications between the chairmen of your committee and the bankers' committee.

Reports of Special Committees

The work which your committee is doing on the question of the meaning which may rightfully be attached to an auditor's unqualified certificate to statements presented to bankers for credit purposes is still in abeyance, since there must first be disposed of the report of the committee on education, presented to the last annual meeting of the Institute. As you are aware, this report is now being considered by a special committee, to which it was referred.

The report of the Robert Morris Associates committee on coöperation with public accountants was printed in the June 15, 1927, issue of the Institute *Bulletin*. Your committee quotes the following two paragraphs from that report:

"In some of our previous reports we have referred to the efforts being put forth by committees of the American Institute of Accountants to develop a general service classification for audits and uniform certificates to accompany them. Some of the details of a preliminary report which came to our attention indicated a series of classifications which to our minds would serve only to involve rather than simplify the present conditions and exact upon the reader of a financial statement a knowledge of accounting methods which he could hardly be expected to possess. We feel confident that a special committee, which is now giving this subject earnest attention, realizes that if their efforts are to be regarded as successful by all interests concerned, it is necessary that their recommendations should be concise and readily understandable by the layman.

"We want to take advantage of this opportunity to advise our members again of the cordial cooperation we have been receiving at all times from the committee on cooperation with bankers of the American Institute of Accountants, and the same spirit has been displayed by the various accounting firms when we have discussed with them individually various matters that have been brought to our attention."

The Institute committee again wishes to express its appreciation of the spirit in which it has been met by the bankers' committee in dealing with the various problems which have been presented.

Report of Special Committee on Definition of Earned Surplus To the Council of the American Institute of Accountants:

GENTLEMEN: Your special committee on the definition of earned surplus would respectfully report as follows:

An examination of the statutes of the states governing the payment of dividends indicates that at the present time there is neither uniformity in the legal requirements nor exactitude in the definition of the sources from which dividends may be paid. With two exceptions, however, all the states have certain express statutory provisions with respect to the payment of dividends. Some of these statutes provide that no dividends shall be declared or paid while the corporation is insolvent or the payment of which would render it insolvent; some provide that no dividends shall

be declared or paid while the capital of the corporation is impaired or which would be effective to impair its capital; and some provide that no dividends shall be declared or paid except out of profits.

In view of this situation, therefore, it appears evident to your committee that the present state laws furnish no satisfactory basis for the definition of earned surplus available for dividends. Further inquiry and investigation indicated, also, that any attempt at this time to secure the passage of uniform legislation by a substantial number of the states, regulating the payment of dividends would necessarily be fraught with many difficulties and delays since legislation of this character would require radical revision and adjustment of present laws and would, in many instances, tend to have the effect of reducing the revenue derived from incorporation fees.

From a study of the procedures followed by accountants in their certificates and reports, it further appears to your committee that, at the present time, there exists a serious lack of uniformity among the members of our own profession as to just what constitutes earned surplus available for dividends. This situation is well illustrated by the lack of unanimity of accounting opinion with respect to the proper treatment of depreciation on appreciation, or of appropriations of surplus in conformity with sinking-fund stipulations embodied in agreements covering the issue of preferred stock. The proper presentation of the essential facts on a balance-sheet in case deficits from operations of prior years have been wiped out by means of an internal recapitalization constitutes a problem on which our practice is by no means standardized.

Numerous other examples might be cited indicative of the variations in procedure, as followed by recognized accounting firms, in presenting the essential facts with respect to surplus. After careful consideration, therefore, of what may be wise and expedient to attempt at this time, your committee has concluded that a standardization of practice and procedure, relating to the treatment of surplus, by the principal accounting firms of the country, furnishes the surest foundation for any action looking to an improvement in the state laws governing corporations, and, further, that the American Institute of Accountants should assume the responsibility for developing and promulgating this standard practice.

Your committee would recommend that it be empowered to prepare and submit in the near future, to our members in the form of a letter, a questionnaire designed to cover the principal questions that arise with respect to the proper accounting treatment of transactions affecting the three types of surplus, namely:

> Earned surplus Paid-in surplus Surplus arising from appreciation

It is felt that a careful study and analysis of the replies received in response to this questionnaire should furnish a satisfactory basis for the preparation of a report by your committee embodying recommended standard practices relating to the presentation of surplus accounts. It is

believed that such a report, subject to its acceptance and confirmation by the Institute, should be published by the Institute and promulgated as an official statement of the position of the Institute with respect to these questions.

Your committee has not been unmindful of the fact that the original resolution by which it was created provided that steps be taken, in coöperation with similar committees of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, the American Bar Association and the American Bankers' Association, to draft and secure the enactment by the several states of appropriate legislation affording a uniform interpretation of earned surplus from which dividends can be paid.

In conformity with the intent of this resolution, your committee has made the study and examination, previously referred to, of the statutes of all the states governing the payment of dividends. It developed upon investigation, however, that the present laws of the states are couched in such general terms and are so varied in their requirements that the passage of uniform legislation of this character can come only as the result of an intelligent and insistent popular demand, and your committee has come to the conclusion that the first step to be taken is to secure agreement and standardization among accountants, the country over, as to procedures to be followed in the presentation of the different types of surplus. Once this agreement and standardization of practice have been generally secured among the members of our own profession, it is felt that we may then be much better situated to approach other organizations with a view to cooperating with them in the effort to secure the desired revision of our present corporate laws. But until such time as this agreement and standardization obtain, we doubt that much can be accomplished in coöperation with other organizations which will naturally look to us for definitions that are primarily matters of accounting. Our first duty is to put our own house in order.

Your committee recommends, therefore, that it be empowered to take preliminary action looking toward the promulgation by the Institute of an official statement with respect to approved procedures and forms of presentation of the different types of surplus, and with the purpose and expectation that the promulgation of this statement by the Institute will be shortly followed by action, taken in coöperation with other representative bodies and associations, to provide for the drafting of a suitable corporation law and for such undertakings as may be necessary to secure its enactment by the states of the United States.

Report of Special Committee for Placements

To the Council of the American Institute of Accountants:

GENTLEMEN: The report of this committee last year contained a summary of the reasons for the establishment of the bureau for placements early in 1926, a sketch of the operating routine adopted at the outset, and the actual results obtained to the end of the fiscal year of the Institute on August 31, 1926.

The present report will contain the following:

(a) Changes in procedure during year.

(b) Results obtained from January, 1926, to August 31, 1927.
(c) Analysis of educational qualifications of members admitted to the Institute during ten years ended with 1926.

(d) Résumé of committee's experience.

CHANGES IN OPERATING PROCEDURE DURING YEAR

The principal change has been a material elevation of the requirements as to the mental ability and personality of the applicants approved by the committee. Inasmuch as the entire programme of the bureau is based upon a promise of three years' continuous employment for acceptable candidates, subject to their satisfactory work and conduct, it seemed proper that such a promise should be made only to exceptional men. As a result of this change, practically all candidates approved by the committee during the current year have been employed. On the other hand, the number of such candidates available has been far short of the demand for them.

The booklet prepared last year for distribution to students has been radically revised along lines suggested by representatives of the vocational departments of some of the prominent colleges.

The application questionnaires have been considerably improved and we have prepared forms for standardizing the reports of interviews by Institute members and for the confidential reports which are received by the bureau directly from the deans of the colleges.

We have experimented somewhat with the method of allocating approved applicants to firms which desire men. While there has been some improvement in this respect, the results are not yet entirely satisfactory. If we are able to obtain approximately as many approved applicants as there are positions available, most of this difficulty will disappear.

RESULTS OBTAINED TO DATE

Last year, applications were filed by 285 men from 94 colleges. This year, 210 applications were received, representing 84 colleges. Last year, 32 men representing 25 colleges were employed by 16 different firms. This year, to date, 19 men representing 16 colleges have been employed by 14 different firms. A considerable number of men from this year's graduating

classes should be placed in the fall in addition to those already placed. Last year, 28 firms stated that they were interested in obtaining assistants through the bureau if candidates suitable to them were available, while this year 143 firms located in 44 cities in 30 different states indicated that they were interested. About 5,000 booklets describing the opportunities offered by a career in public accounting were distributed to college students last year and 5,000 additional copies were similarly distributed this year.

Last year, contributions of \$3,025 were received from members for the support of the bureau and similar contributions during the current year amounted to \$3,155. Expenses last year were \$2,193.54 compared with \$2,469.33 for the current year.

The expenditures have been entirely for stenographic work, printing and postage. Naturally, the bureau has a large amount of correspondence to handle.

EDUCATIONAL QUALIFICATIONS OF INSTITUTE MEMBERS

In order that definite facts might be available concerning the educational background of the members of the Institute, an analysis was prepared from the applications of the members admitted from 1917 to 1926 inclusive. Thinking that this information might be interesting to the membership, we have included a summary in this report:

Approximately 22 per cent. of the members admitted during this tenyear period have a degree from a recognized college, while the average for the last five years of the period has been 23 per cent. with a tendency to remain steady at about that figure.

Many of the college degrees listed above were granted after completing courses consisting almost entirely of technical subjects. Consequently, very few of the present members of the Institute have had a formal education in those subjects which are generally supposed to develop the mind to its full possibilities, for example, English composition and literature, modern languages, higher mathematics, history, Latin and Greek, physics and chemistry, political economy, philosophy, economics and related subjects.

Despite the above statistics which give evidence that many men have succeeded as public accountants in the past without a formal general education, your committee is of the opinion that the public accountant of the future would be materially benefited by a study of some of these subjects before he takes up his technical education or concurrently with the latter, and judging from the letters which have been received most of the successful firms throughout the country concur in this opinion.

RÉSUMÉ OF COMMITTEE'S EXPERIENCE

The favorable comments and cooperation received from the members in all parts of the country have been very encouraging to the committee.

With the possible exception of the larger cities in the middle west and a small number of other towns in which certain colleges are situated, there appears to be a definite desire among the membership both for the publicity among the students and for the facilities for weeding out undesirable candidates and placing suitable applicants in touch with positions.

We believe that our propaganda is resulting in a definite interest in public accounting as a career among highly qualified young men in the colleges, whereas many such men were inclined to view such a career dubiously several years ago. The statistics given in the previous section of this report show that less than one fourth of the new members coming into the Institute have had a college education. Since it is probably reasonable to suppose that a much smaller proportion of the non-Institute members who are engaged in public practice on their own account or as assistants have such an education, the need for a continuation of the work of this bureau is evident.

We have not attempted to compete actively with the hundreds of important industrial organizations which send representatives to many colleges each year to "sign up" the good men. It appears to us that men obtained by these high-pressure methods are likely to get an undue sense of their immediate value and, moreover, are likely to be unhappy in their positions. Our method has been to seek men who, upon mature deliberation, and after considering all the facts, themselves choose accountancy as their life work.

APPENDIX C

By-Laws of the American Institute of Accountants.
Rules of Professional Conduct, including
amendment adopted at the Annual
Meeting, September, 1927. Rules
of the Board of Examiners.

BY-LAWS

OF THE

American Institute of Accountants

ARTICLE I

NAME AND PURPOSES

Section 1. The name of this organization shall be the American Institute of Accountants. Its objects shall be to unite the accountancy profession of the United States; to promote and maintain high professional and moral standards; to safeguard the interests of public accountants; to advance the science of accountancy; to develop and improve accountancy education; to provide for the examination of candidates for membership; and to encourage cordial intercourse among accountants practising in the United States of America.

ARTICLE II

MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Institute shall consist of members and associates.

SEC. 2. Members shall be:

- (a) Fellows of the American Association of Public Accountants at September 19, 1916, admitted to membership prior to November 1, 1916.
- (b) Persons who shall qualify for examination and election as provided in section 4 of this article and shall be recommended by the board of examiners after examination and shall be elected by the council.

SEC. 3. Associates shall be:

- (a) Associate members of the American Association of Public Accountants at September 19, 1916, admitted as associates prior to November 1, 1916.
- (b) Persons who shall qualify for examination and election as provided in section 5 of this article and shall be recommended by the board of examiners after examination and shall be elected by the council.
- SEC. 4. The following persons, provided that they shall be not less than twenty-one years of age, may qualify for examination and election as members of the Institute:
- (a) Associates in practice who shall have been in practice on their own account or in the employ of a practising public accountant for five years next preceding the date of application.

- (b) Accountants in practice who shall present evidence of preliminary education satisfactory to the board of examiners and shall have been in practice on their own account or in the employ of a practising public accountant for not less than five years next preceding the date of application, including at least one year of practice in the United States of America.
- (c) Accountants in practice who shall present evidence of preliminary education satisfactory to the board of examiners and shall have been in practice on their own account or in the employ of a practising public accountant for not less than ten years, one year of which shall have next preceded the date of application, and at least one year of which shall have been in the United States of America.
- (d) Accountants in possession of certified public accountant certificates of acceptable standard, who shall have been engaged in accountancy instruction, in schools recognized by the board of examiners, for a period of not less than five years next preceding the date of application.
- SEC. 5. The following persons may qualify for examination and election as associates of the Institute, provided that they shall be not less than twenty-one years of age and shall present evidence of preliminary education satisfactory to the board of examiners:
- (a) Accountants who shall have been in practice on their own account or in the employ of a practising public accountant for not less than four years. Applicants may receive credit for two years' public practice if they are in possession of certified public accountant certificates of acceptable standard or if they are graduates of accounting schools recognized by the board of examiners, but no applicant shall be admitted to examination or recommended for election who shall have had less than two years of actual public practice, at least one year of which shall have been in the United States of America.
- (b) Accountants in possession of accountants' certificates issued under the laws of foreign governments and accepted by unanimous action of the board of examiners, who shall have been in practice on their own account or in the employ of a practising public accountant for not less than two years, at least one year of which shall have been in the United States of America.
- (c) Accountants who shall have been engaged in accountancy instruction for a period of not less than three years in schools recognized by the board of examiners.
- SEC. 6. All credits for education and experience shall be allotted by the board of examiners.
- SEC. 7. Upon election each member or associate shall be entitled to a certificate setting forth that he is a member or an associate of the Institute, but no certificate shall be issued until receipt of initiation fee and dues

for the current year. Certificates of membership shall be returned to the council upon suspension or termination of membership for any cause except death.

SEC. 8. Members of the Institute shall be entitled to describe themselves as Members of the American Institute of Accountants and associates as Associates of the American Institute of Accountants.

ARTICE III

FEES AND DUES

SECTION 1. Initiation fees shall be as follows:

SEC. 2. The dues for each fiscal year shall include cost of subscription to *The Journal of Accountancy* and of the year-book of the Institute and shall be as follows:

SEC. 3. The initiation fee shall be paid when application is made. If application be rejected such fee shall be promptly returned to the applicant. All dues shall be paid in advance and shall be apportioned in the first instance to the end of the fiscal year. No dues shall be paid by members and associates of the Institute while they are engaged in military or naval service of the United States or its allies during war.

ARTICLE IV

VOTING

- Section 1. Every member of the Institute shall be entitled to attend all meetings of the Institute and to cast a vote upon all questions brought before such meetings.
- SEC. 2. Associates of the Institute shall not be entitled to vote, but may attend all meetings of the Institute and have the privilege of the floor in the discretion of the chair or of the meeting in session.
- SEC. 3. No member shall be entitled to vote at any meeting when his dues shall be sixty days in arrears.
- SEC. 4. Any member of the Institute may be represented at regular and special meetings of the Institute by another member acting as his proxy, provided, however:
 - (a) That no person shall act as a proxy for more than five members.
- (b) That no proxy given shall confer power of substitution and that all proxies shall be valid only for the meeting for which specifically given.

ARTICLE V

TERMINATION OF MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1. Resignations of members and associates may be offered in writing at any time and shall be effective on the date of acceptance. Action upon the resignation of a member or an associate in good standing shall be taken by the executive committee and, in the case of a member or an associate under charges, by the council.
- SEC. 2. A member or an associate who fails to pay his annual dues or any subscription, assessment or other obligation to the Institute within five months after such debt has become due shall automatically cease to be a member or an associate of the Institute.
- SEC. 3. No person whose membership shall have been forfeited for non-payment of dues or other sum due by him to the Institute may be reinstated, but a member or an associate who shall resign while in good standing may be reinstated by a three-fourths vote of the members of the council present and voting at any regular or special meeting of the council, provided the person applying shall submit with his application for reinstatement the amount of dues and assessments, subscriptions, etc., not in any case to exceed \$25.00, which would have been payable by him if he had continued in membership from the time of resignation to the date of application for reinstatement. No person shall be considered to have resigned while in good standing if at the time of his resignation he was in debt to the Institute for dues or other obligation.
- SEC. 4. A member or an associate renders himself liable to expulsion or suspension by the council sitting as a trial board if
- (a) he refuses or neglects to give effect to any decision of the Institute or of the council, or
- (b) he infringes any of these by-laws or any of the rules of professional conduct as approved by the council of the Institute, or
 - (c) he is convicted of a felony or misdemeanor, or
- (d) he is declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to have committed any fraud, or
- (e) he is held by the council to have been guilty of an act discreditable to the profession, or
- (f) he is declared by any competent court to be insane or otherwise incompetent, or
- (g) his certificate as a certified public accountant is revoked or withdrawn by the authority of any state or territory of the United States or of the District of Columbia, or
- (h) his certificate as a certified public accountant shall have been revoked or withdrawn by the authority of any state or territory of the United States or of the District of Columbia and such revocation or withdrawal remains in effect.

ARTICLE VI

TRIALS AND PENALTIES

- Section 1. Any complaint preferred against a member or an associate under section 4 of article V shall be submitted to the committee on professional ethics. If, upon consideration of a complaint, it appears to the committee that a prima facie case is established showing a violation of any by-law or rule of conduct of the Institute or conduct discreditable to a public accountant, the committee on professional ethics shall report the matter to the executive committee, which shall summon the member or associate involved thereby to appear in answer at the next regular or special meeting of the council.
- SEC. 2. If the committee on professional ethics shall dismiss any complaint preferred against a member or an associate, or shall fail to act thereon within ninety days after such complaint is presented to it in writing, the member or associate preferring the complaint may present the complaint in writing to the council. The council shall make such investigation of the matter as it may deem necessary and shall either dismiss the complaint or refer it to the executive committee which shall summon the member or associate involved thereby to appear in answer at the next regular or special meeting of the council.
- SEC. 3. For the purpose of adjudicating charges against members or associates of the Institute as provided in the foregoing sections, the council shall convene as a trial board. The executive committee shall instruct the secretary to send due notice to the parties concerned at least thirty days prior to the proposed session. After hearing the evidence presented by the committee on professional ethics or other complainant and by the defense, the trial board by a two-thirds vote of the members present may admonish or suspend for a period of not more than two years the member or associate against whom complaint is made or by a three-fourths vote of the members present may expel the member or associate against whom complaint is made. A statement of the case and the decision of the trial board thereon, either with or without the name of the person involved, shall be prepared by the executive committee and published in *The Journal of Accountancy*.
- Sec. 4. At any time within two years after the expulsion or suspension of any member or associate, the council, sitting as a trial board, by a three-fourths vote of the members present may recall, rescind or modify such expulsion or suspension.

ARTICLE VII

COUNCIL AND OFFICERS

- Section 1. The governing body of the Institute shall be a council consisting of:
- (a) Thirty-five members in practice, not more than six of whom shall be residents of the same state, seven of whom shall be elected at each

annual meeting for a term of five years or until their successors shall have been elected, and

- (b) The following officers of the Institute: a president, two vice-presidents (both vice-presidents shall not be residents of one state), and a treasurer, all of whom shall be members in practice and shall be elected at the annual meeting for a term of one year or until their successors shall have been elected, and
 - (c) All past presidents who are members of the Institute.
- SEC. 2. The same person shall not hold the office of president for more than two successive years.
- SEC. 3. The council shall elect a secretary of the Institute who shall act as an executive officer under the direction of the council. The secretary may be chosen from without the membership of the Institute, but he shall have the privilege of the floor at meetings of the Institute, the council and the executive committee.
- SEC. 4. The Institute at each annual meeting shall elect two auditors, who shall audit the accounts for the current fiscal year and report at the next annual meeting. The books and accounts shall be submitted by the treasurer for audit at least one week preceding the date of the annual meeting.
- SEC. 5. In the event of a vacancy or vacancies occurring between meetings of the Institute in the membership of the council or in any of the executive offices of the Institute, the council shall be empowered to elect a member or members to fill such vacancy or vacancies until the next annual meeting or until a successor or successors shall have been elected. Such election shall be by majority vote of the council and may take place at any regular or special meeting of the council or, in lieu of a meeting, nominations may be called for by the president and the names of the nominees submitted to the members of council for election by mail ballot. Vacancies in the membership of the council shall be filled at the next annual meeting by election by the Institute for the unexpired terms.
- SEC. 6. The office of a member of the council shall be rendered vacant by his absence from four consecutive meetings of the council.

ARTICLE VIII

DUTIES OF COUNCIL AND OFFICERS

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the president or, in his absence, of one of the vice-presidents or other members of the council designated by the council to preside at all meetings of the Institute and of the council. The president shall call special meetings of the Institute or of the council when he deems it necessary, or when requested to do so by the executive committee, or upon the written request of at least one hundred members of the Institute for a meeting of the Institute, or of at least five members of the council for a meeting of the council.

The duties of the vice-presidents and the treasurer shall be those usually appertaining to their respective offices.

The secretary, in addition to performing the usual duties of his office, shall discharge such other duties as may be assigned to him by the council or by the executive committee. The secretary of the Institute shall be the secretary of all committees.

- Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the council to take control and management of all the property of the Institute, to elect or appoint such agents or employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the affairs of the Institute, to keep a record of its proceedings and to report to the Institute at each annual meeting. The council shall exercise all powers requisite for the purposes of the Institute.
- SEC. 3. The council shall adopt an annual budget showing the money appropriated for the purposes of the Institute and estimating the revenue for the ensuing year. No debts shall be contracted nor money expended otherwise than as provided in the budget without the approval of a majority of the council.
- SEC. 4. The council may, in its discretion, delegate to the executive committee all functions of the council except the election of officers and members, the right to review the rules and regulations of the board of examiners, discipline of members, filling a vacancy in the executive committee and the adoption or alteration of a budget.

ARTICLE IX

COMMITTEES

Section 1. There shall be twelve regular standing committees, namely: EXECUTIVE.

STATE LEGISLATION.

- SEC. 2. (a) The executive committee shall consist of the president and treasurer of the Institute and five other members of the council elected by the council.
- (b) The committee on professional ethics shall be elected by the council and shall consist of five members of the council not members of the executive committee.

- (c) The committee on nominations shall consist of seven members. Two members of the committee shall be elected by the council from its membership at the meeting of the council held on the Monday preceding the annual meeting of the Institute or at any adjournment thereof. Officers and other members of council whose terms expire within one year shall not be elected to the committee on nominations. The five remaining members of the committee shall be elected by the Institute at the annual meeting and shall be members in practice who are not officers or members of the council.
- (d) The committee on education shall consist of five members appointed by the president for a term of three years, except that, of the members first appointed, one shall serve for a term of one year, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of three years. Appointments to fill vacancies occurring before the end of a term shall be for the unexpired term only.
- (e) All other standing committees shall be appointed by the president and shall consist of a chairman and two other members of the Institute.
- (f) Except as provided above, all standing committees shall serve until the annual meeting of the Institute next following their election or appointment.
- SEC. 3. The president of the Institute shall be ex-officio a member of all committees.
- SEC. 4. A majority of each committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. All committees shall be subject to the call of their respective chairmen, but, in lieu of a meeting of a committee, the chairman may submit any question to the members of the committee for vote by mail, and any action approved in writing by not less than two-thirds of the whole committee shall be declared an act of the committee.

ARTICLE X

DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

- Section 1. The duties of the various committees shall be as described in this article and, in addition, such other duties as are indicated by their respective titles.
- SEC. 2. The executive committee shall administer the affairs of the Institute, supervise the finances and exercise such other powers as may be designated by the council. It shall keep minutes of its proceedings and shall report fully to the council at each meeting thereof.

No payments except for duly authorized salaries shall be made by the treasurer without the approval of the executive committee.

SEC. 3. The committee on professional ethics shall perform the duties set forth in section 1 of article VI and may advise any one applying to it as to whether or not a submitted action or state of facts warrants a

complaint against a member or an associate of the Institute, provided, however, that if the committee finds itself unable to express an opinion, such inability shall not be construed as an endorsement of the action or state of facts.

- SEC. 4. The committee on arbitration shall sit as a committee in equity to investigate and decide disputes between members or associates of the Institute or others which shall, by agreement of the parties, be submitted to the committee in due form. If the decision of the committee on arbitration in any dispute be rejected by any member or associate of the Institute, the matter shall be reported to the council, which may instruct the executive committee to prefer charges against the offending member or associate if it shall decide, by a two-thirds vote of members present, that the recommendation of the committee on arbitration should have been accepted.
- SEC. 5. The committee on credentials shall convene immediately after the annual meeting of the Institute shall have been called to order and at any time during the meeting may register proxies submitted to it. Only proxies validated by this committee shall be entitled to vote.
- Sec. 6. The committee on publication shall supervise The Journal of Accountancy.

ARTICLE XI

NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF COUNCIL

- Section 1. (a) Nominations for officers and members of the council shall be made by the committee on nominations at least sixty days prior to the date of the annual meeting at which the elections are to take place. Notice of such nominations shall be mailed by the secretary to all members at least thirty days prior to the annual meeting.
- (b) Any ten members of the Institute may submit independent nominations, provided that such nominations be filed with the secretary at least twenty days prior to the date of the annual meeting. Notice of such independent nominations shall be mailed by the secretary to all members at least ten days prior to the annual meeting.
- (c) Nominations for officers and members of council may be made from the floor at the time of the annual meeting only by the consent of the majority of the members present in person.
- SEC. 2. Election of officers, members of council and auditors shall be by ballot. The president shall appoint a chairman and two tellers, who shall receive and count the ballots cast for each officer, member of council and auditor and shall announce the result to the presiding officer. A majority of votes shall elect.

If there be no majority on the first ballot for any one or more officers or members of council or auditors, additional ballots shall be taken at once for the particular office or offices in which there shall have been no election until an election be effected.

SEC. 3. The members present at any election of officers, members of council and auditors, and eligible to vote in such election, may direct the secretary to cast a ballot for any nominee or nominees for such office or offices, and election by such ballot shall be valid and effective.

ARTICLE XII

EXAMINATIONS

- Section 1. The examination of candidates for admission to the Institute shall be under the supervision of a board of examiners, which shall consist of nine members in practice, three of whom shall be elected each year by the council, at its first meeting after the annual meeting of the Institute, to serve for a term of three years.
- SEC. 2. The board of examiners shall hold simultaneous examinations for candidates either annually or semi-annually, as it may deem expedient, at such places in different parts of the country as it may select, where candidates for admission may conveniently attend. Such examinations shall be oral or written or partly oral and partly written, and by this method or such other methods as may be adopted, the board of examiners shall determine the preliminary education and training and the technical qualifications of all candidates for admission before the applications shall be submitted to the council.
- SEC. 3. The board of examiners shall organize by the election of a chairman and shall formulate the necessary rules and regulations for the conduct of its work, but all such rules and regulations may be amended, suspended or revoked by the council. The board may appoint duly qualified examiners to prepare examination questions and to grade the papers of applicants. Each applicant shall pay an examination fee, which shall be applied to the payment of expenses incident to examinations.

ARTICLE XIII

MEETINGS

- Section 1. There shall be a regular meeting of the Institute on the third Tuesday of September of each year. The fiscal year of the Institute shall end with the 31st day of August of each year.
- SEC. 2. Special meetings of the Institute may be convened as provided in article VIII, section 1, at such places as the executive committee shall designate. No business shall be transacted at such meetings other than that for which the meetings shall have been convened.
- SEC. 3. Notice of each meeting of the Institute, whether regular or special, shall be mailed to each member and associate of the Institute, at his last-known address, at least thirty days prior to the date of such meeting.
- SEC. 4. In lieu of a special meeting, the Institute in meeting assembled may direct, or the council by a majority vote may direct, that the president submit any question to the entire membership for a vote by mail, and any

action approved in writing by not less than a majority of the members of the Institute shall be declared by the president an act of the Institute and shall be so recorded in its minutes. Mail ballots shall be valid and counted only if received within sixty days after date of mailing ballot forms from the office of the Institute.

- SEC. 5. Regular meetings of the council shall be held on the Thursday next after the third Tuesday in September, the second Monday in April and the Monday next preceding the third Tuesday in September in each year.
- SEC. 6. Special meetings of the council may be called as provided in article VIII, section 1, of these by-laws.
- SEC. 7. Notice of each meeting of the council except the meeting on the Thursday after the third Tuesday in September shall be sent to each member of the council at his last-known address twenty-one days before such meeting. Such notice as far as practicable shall contain a statement of the business to be transacted.
- SEC. 8. A transcript of the minutes of each meeting shall be forwarded to each member of the council within thirty days after such meeting.
- SEC. 9. In lieu of a special meeting of the council the president may submit any question to the council for vote by mail and any action approved in writing by not less than two-thirds of the whole membership of the council shall be declared by the president an act of the council and shall be recorded in the minutes of the council.
- SEC. 10. Fifty members of the Institute shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business duly presented at any meeting of the Institute. Twenty members of the council shall constitute a quorum of the council.
- SEC. 11. The rules of parliamentary procedure contained in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern all meetings of the Institute and of the council.

ARTICLE XIV

CHAPTERS

Upon application to the council of the Institute and subject to its approval there may be organized in any state or territory of the United States, by members of the Institute resident or having a place of business therein, subsidiary bodies to be known as chapters of the American Institute of Accountants. The council shall prescribe the rules and regulations for the government of such chapters.

ARTICLE XV

AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the by-laws of the Institute shall be proposed only at an annual meeting of the Institute. If approved by a two-thirds vote of the members present at such meeting, any such proposed amendment shall

be submitted to all the members of the Institute for a vote by mail, and if approved in writing by a majority of the members of the Institute shall be declared by the president to be effective. Mail ballots shall be valid and counted only if received within sixty days after the date of mailing ballot forms from the office of the Institute.

It shall be compulsory for the secretary to embody in the call for the annual meeting all proposals to amend prepared by the committee on by-laws for submission to such meeting and any other proposals to amend of which he shall have had notice endorsed in writing by thirty or more members in good standing at least sixty days prior to the date of such meeting.

RULES OF PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT

Including amendments prepared by the committee on professional ethics and approved by the council September 19, 1927.

- (1) A firm or partnership, all the individual members of which are members of the Institute (or in part members and in part associates, provided all the members of the firm are either members or associates), may describe itself as "Members of the American Institute of Accountants," but a firm or partnership, all the individual members of which are not members of the Institute (or in part members and in part associates), or an individual practising under a style denoting a partnership when in fact there be no partner or partners or a corporation or an individual or individuals practising under a style denoting a corporate organization shall not use the designation "Members (or Associates) of the American Institute of Accountants."
- (2) The preparation and certification of exhibits, statements, schedules or other forms of accountancy work, containing an essential misstatement of fact or omission therefrom of such a fact as would amount to an essential misstatement or a failure to put prospective investors on notice in respect of an essential or material fact not specifically shown in the balance-sheet itself shall be, ipso facto, cause for expulsion or for such other discipline as the council may impose upon proper presentation of proof that such misstatement was either wilful or the result of such gross negligence as to be inexcusable.
- (3) No member or associate shall allow any person to practise in his name as a public accountant who is not a member or an associate of the Institute or in partnership with him or in his employ on a salary.
- (4) No member or associate shall directly or indirectly allow or agree to allow a commission, brokerage or other participation by the laity in the fees or profits of his professional work; nor shall he accept directly or indirectly from the laity any commission, brokerage or other participation for professional or commercial business turned over to others as an incident of his services to clients.
- (5) No member or associate shall engage in any business or occupation conjointly with that of a public accountant, which in the opinion of the executive committee or of the council is incompatible or inconsistent therewith.
- (6) No member or associate shall certify to any accounts, exhibits, statements, schedules or other forms of accountancy work which have not been verified entirely under the supervision of himself, a member of his firm, one of his staff, a member or an associate of this Institute or a member of a similar association of good standing in a foreign country which has been approved by the council.

- (7) No member or associate shall take part in any effort to secure the enactment or amendment of any state or federal law or of any regulation of any governmental or civic body, affecting the practice of the profession, without giving immediate notice thereof to the secretary of the Institute, who in turn shall at once advise the executive committee or the council.
- (8) No member or associate shall directly or indirectly solicit the clients or encroach upon the business of another member or associate, but it is the right of any member or associate to give proper service and advice to those asking such service or advice.
- (9) No member or associate shall directly or indirectly offer employment to an employee of a fellow member or associate without first informing said fellow member or associate of his intent. This rule shall not be construed so as to inhibit negotiations with any one who of his own initiative or in response to public advertisement shall apply to a member or associate for employment.
- (10) No member or associate shall render or offer to render professional service, the fee for which shall be contingent upon his findings and the results thereof.
- (11) No member or associate of the Institute shall advertise his or her professional attainments or service through the mails, in the public prints, by circular letters or by any other written word except that a member or an associate may cause to be published in the public prints what is technically known as a card. A card is hereby defined as an advertisement of the name, title (member of American Institute of Accountants, C. P. A., or other professional affiliation or designation), class of service and address of the advertiser, without any further qualifying words or letters, or in the case of announcement of change of address or personnel of firm the plain statement of the fact for the publication of which the announcement purports to be made. Cards permitted by this rule when appearing in newspapers shall not exceed two columns in width and three inches in depth; when appearing in magazines, directories and similar publications cards shall not exceed one quarter page in size. This rule shall not be construed to inhibit the proper and professional dissemination of impersonal information among a member's own clients or personal associates or the properly restricted circulation of firm bulletins containing staff personnel and professional information.

RULES OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS

OF THE

American Institute of Accountants

As Amended March 2, 1926

OFFICERS

The officers of the board shall be a chairman, a secretary and a treasurer.

MEETINGS

Meetings of the board shall be held upon the call of the chairman and shall be called by the chairman upon the written request of three members of the board. Five days' notice of all meetings shall be given by the secretary, except that the annual meeting may be held at the place of the annual meeting of the Institute on the day following the adjournment of that meeting. Five members of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

SECRETARY

The secretary of the Institute shall be the secretary of the board. The secretary shall keep a record of all applications received and also the records of the meetings and transactions of the board. He shall turn over to the treasurer of the board all moneys received by him.

TREASURER

The treasurer of the Institute shall be the treasurer of the board. All moneys received by the board shall be turned over to the treasurer. Disbursements shall not be made by the treasurer except upon the approval of three members of the board.

OFFICE

The office of the Institute shall be the office of the board.

APPLICATIONS AND FEES

Applications will be considered only when made on blanks which will be furnished by the secretary on written request. The fees for examination and for investigation of applicants' records shall be as follows:

For admission as member	\$25.00
For advancement from associate to member	10.00
For admission as associate	25.00
For re-examination in one subject	10.00

Examination fees and initiation fees must accompany the application.

No applicant shall be entitled to an examination by the board unless his application shall have been in the hands of the secretary of the board sixty days prior to the date of examination.

EXAMINATIONS

Except as hereinafter provided, the examinations of the board shall be written, and every applicant for admission as a member or an associate or for advancement to membership who shall be found to be qualified to take an examination under the by-laws shall be entitled to take the written examination of the board and upon passing such examination to the satisfaction of the board may be recommended to the council for admission or advancement as the case may be.

No applicant shall be allowed to take an examination who shall not previously have satisfied the board as to his preliminary education. A high-school graduation certificate will be regarded as satisfactory evidence of such preliminary education, but until further notice the board will consider such other evidence as may be submitted.

EXAMINATIONS-WRITTEN

Written examinations shall be conducted simultaneously in such places as may be determined by the board of examiners during May and November, the dates to be selected ninety days in advance of examination.

Due notice will be given to each applicant of the time and place selected for holding the examination. Failure to be present and prepared at the time appointed will be sufficient cause for exclusion from any session of the examination.

Examinations shall include questions in (1) Accounting theory and practice, including optional problems in the elements of actuarial science, (2) Auditing and (3) Commercial law. The time required shall not exceed two days.

Answers shall be written in ink in accordance with instructions which will be issued at the time of the examination. All supplies necessary to the examination will be furnished by the board and, after use, shall remain the property of the board.

The secretary shall communicate in writing to each applicant the result of his examination, and the applicant shall not be entitled to further information.

Applicants who shall have passed the examination in two subjects shall have the right, on payment of the required fees, to be re-examined, within a limited period, in the third subject.

EXAMINATIONS-ORAL

Applicants possessing such qualifications as the board from time to time may prescribe in the discretion of the board and upon the request of the applicants may be subjected to oral instead of written examination in one or more subjects. Oral examinations shall be conducted at times and places to be selected by the board.

Rules of the Board of Examiners

An affirmative vote of five members of the board shall be required before any applicant who has taken an oral examination shall be recommended to the council for election or for advancement to membership.

The board in its discretion may allow any candidate who has had five years' practice on his own account or seven years' experience in public accounting, provided that such applicant shall be over forty years of age or shall have passed a written examination conducted by a recognized accounting body, to take an oral instead of a written examination in one or more subjects.

CREDIT FOR CERTAIN OTHER EXAMINATIONS

Until further notice, the board of examiners in its discretion exercised in the case of any individual applicant for admission as an associate of the Institute may accept in lieu of its own examinations a certificate as a certified public accountant of any state of the United States, the laws of which are held by the board of examiners of the Institute to be adequate and well administered, or a certificate of membership in a society of professional accountants in a foreign country whose requirements for admission are considered by the board of examiners of the Institute equivalent to the Institute's examinations, provided that such applicant shall have received such certificate as certified public accountant or member of a society of professional accountants after adequate examination, and that he shall have been in practice as a public accountant or in the employ on the accounting staff of a public accountant for a period of two years next preceding the date of his application, and provided further that he shall be recommended for admission by three members of the Institute residing near the place of residence of the applicant, such members to be selected by the board of examiners without knowledge of the applicant and to report to the board of examiners upon the applicant's professional qualifications, character and reputation.

In the case of an applicant conforming to all the provisions contained in the foregoing paragraph, and presenting evidence of five years' public practice immediately preceding the date of his application or ten years' public practice, one year of which shall have immediately preceded date of application, the board of examiners may require such applicant to submit a thesis upon one of a group of subjects to be designated by the board and upon the result of such thesis may recommend the applicant for admission as member of the American Institute of Accountants. The board, however, may accept other evidence of professional qualifications in lieu of a thesis.

The board of examiners reserves to itself the right to reject the application of any applicant for admission as member or associate and shall not be required to state cause for any such rejection.
