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## Samuel Hamilton Wiley to Mr. Meredith (4 October 1951)

Samuel Hamilton Wiley

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answered 11/20/60 Lagos, Portugal, October 4, 1951. Mr. James Meredith. University of Mississipi. Oxford, Mississipi. Dear Mr. Meredith: I read yesterday in the Lisbon newspaper"Diario De Noticias", that the Alumni of Portuguese Overseas Students had offered you a scholarship in any Portuguese University you preferred to frequente. Having lived in Portugal nearly 20 years at various

times, nearly 10 years of which was as Consul in Oporto and later Consul General in Lisbon, I feel that I know the Portuguese character intimately. I wish to assure you that this offer was not made in any attempt to obtain publicity or to show up the disgraceful race enmity shown in your and other cases, but was done from pure kindness of heart. The Portuguese are the most hospitable, the kindest and most considerate people I have ever lived among. They have not and never have had any racial discrimination. It just isnt in their nature. A man is judged solely by his character and actions and not by his race or color.

If you should ever feel too deeply the race gatred shown by your fellow students and accept the offer from Portugal, I can assure you that you will be treated with sincere friendship as an honored guest.

You dont need to reply to this letter, but if you did want to, my address for several months will be Apt. 105 Park View Apartments, Raleigh, N.C. since I am leaving tomorrow morning, for a visit of 3 days to Fatima, and then by TWA on the 10th for North

Carolina.

I congratulate on your dignified and corageous behavior You said that your insistance in regeatering at The University of Mississipi was done more for the United States than for yourself. In my opinion you were too modest, it was done also for your race all over the world and for the world, since there can never be peace until racial discrinimation has completely disappeared.
