Dear James Meredith,

I write to you to say how mich I admire your firm stand taken in the name of freedom for all peoples. I want you to know that there are many of us who support you in your braveness, a braveness which provides a sharp contrast for the hysterical and disgusting reactions of the white students at your university.

I am a student at the University of the Witwatersrand where the flame of academic freedom has been extinguished by the Nationalist government of South Africa. Non-white students are no longer allowed to attend the same universities nor lectures, nor play sport alongside their fellow white students. Segregation - or apartheid as it is known here - is legally enforced throughout the country, and many of us eagerly await the day when all may enjoy their natural, and equal rights throughout the whole world.
