New York September 7<sup>th</sup> 1824

Mr. T. L. Treadwell!

Dear Sir, Your favour of the 24<sup>th</sup> Ult came duly to hand. I have determined to accompany our purchases to Columbia, but from the state of the yellow fever in Charleston, I can't tell when that will be. I have made arrangements with Mr. Mollan (Snowden's partner) to attend to our Clothing business here, he will sell us goods and have our Cloaths made by our Taylor whose name is Fowler, and charge us with the whole, so that we will not have any acc<sup>t</sup> with any but Mr. Mollan on the Clothing account.

I could buy as many dry goods as we might want at six months but I can't tell how it would answer, but am of Morgans opinion that we had better continue the business that I was in before for some time yet, at least until you can have an opportunity to make the selection. I have been told by several dry good merchants here that they will sell to us as low in Charleston as they will here, so that after you are done with

Mr. Morgan if you think it best we make arrangements  
for you to make purchases in Charleston of them.  
I shall get our hats of White Brothers & Co.

If it were not for the confounded  
expense I would return by land, perhaps I may  
be compelled to do it yet, but if I can be per-  
suaded that the voyage would not be too great  
I will leave here about the first of Oct. or  
15<sup>th</sup> Oct. for Charleston, so that you need  
not write to me too late for the letter to get  
here by the first Oct. I am completely tired  
out with idleness. Give my respects to all friends  
and accept the same yourself from  
your friend
