New York. July 30th 1824

Mr. J. L. Tridwell

Dear Sir! I have
made a settlement with Squier & Ross
It is done quite as we wished it, they continue
in Columbia and keep the old stock,
I don't know what to do about purchasing
right away as we have not any one to open
and sell for us, as they keep the goods, and I
told them they might stay in the store until
our goods arrived, or till they could get
another store. I can buy to advantage here
now if we could do anything with the
goods in Columbia before I get them.

You will please send on the balance
of your money to me here, and say to me
whether I shall buy and send on in small
lots or accompany my purchases in Oct.
It would be to our advantage if you were
at leisure to attend to our goods immediately
and quit Morgan's, as I could have you a
lot of one thousand ^{dollar} worth in three or four

writes from this time. I shall wait until
I get your advise before I ship any thing to you
as it would be unnecessary to have goods
in Columbia before they could be attended
to. I shall have to make a mark for
our goods, but it is time enough now for
that, I will explain that to you when I give
you the first Invoice.

Pray tell me what prospects
there are for managing the goods, if any,
before I return.

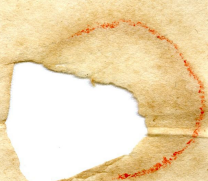

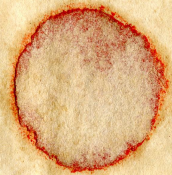
