New York Sept. 1st 1824

Dear Sir! Yours have come duly to hand, I have nothing particular to pay to you but according to your request must pay something, the first of which is not very pleasant, which is that I shall not have as much money in the case as you, but we can get as much Credit here as we shall want, but still it is necessary that you send on as soon as the 20th the balance of your money because I have promised the full amount of what we both can start counting all that W. Morgan owes you. Tell Macey, Arthur, Wellisaw, Quinn and Baumer that I put out the finest Cloth I could find to make their Coats or Coats, I have real good Casimirs for pants which will please I know, I shall get our hats of old

White Brothers & Co. I have not given orders
for Shaw yet but will in a day or two
The shoemakers are running after me
to make them an order, so that the
competition is so great that we will
have no difficulty in getting what they
we may want at a weeks notice. —

I shall get our Cloaths of Stuart
Wollan & Sons of Snowdens partners, they
will attend to our Taylor for us as he
is but a few doors off. I suppose
James Hosa & Co. have moved by
this time and showing out large
I think you had better tell our friends
that about the 20 Oct. we will open
as good and fashionable stock as can be
made up in any market. Our Cloaths

is actually made by as fashionable
a Taylor as is in this City, & I am not a-
fraid to show our Cloathes with any
of the Taylors in Columbia, you will
see, that they will not be done in that
bungling manner that I give Mr
are. I know old Horn, and I think
it is a hard case if we can't please

and we have already an acquaintance
all over the state, therefore I don't fear them
