My Dear Bro. Gilead

Your favour of the 10th Inst was rec^d. in due time, and is now before me. Your former letter to which you allude was also rec^d. but at a time when I was suffering a severe and protracted paroxysm of Asthma so that weeks elapsed before I was able to write and since I have for no sufficient reason been putting it off from time to time, still I should have answered it even if you had not reminded of my culpable neglect by a second letter, which however I am truly glad to receive, and thank you kindly for taking the trouble to give me satisfactory information it contains concerning those more dear to me than any others on Earth my own immediate family excepted.

I gave me the greatest pleasure to hear from yourself that you had not only made a profession of Religion but lived in the enjoyment of it. Those difficulties to which you alluded are such as are common to all believers and inseparable with a state of trial. I feel thankful to hear of the prosperity of my dear Brethren in that Country and especially that they are men of sober, and temperate habits occupying a respectful position in the community where they live

I know you all have the best wishes of my heart for your prosperity both in this life, and in the more important Matters in the life to come.

I rejoice to hear of the continued good health of our aged & honoured Mother, you can't imagin how much real pleasure it would afford me to enjoy the privilege of seeing & conversing with her and mine, but, there is but little probability that I shall enjoy such a privilege soon if ever, and if ever it must be soon. Give her the warmest affections of my heart Love. I have so many little incumbrances that it is hardly probable that I shall soon if ever see that country, merely on a visit. My own health you are aware is quite feeble, but you or brother Reuben or both of you might pay me a visit, why do you not come out & see us? You have no incumbrances to detain you at home, or to give you any anxiety when from home.

Remember us affectionately to all the family Bro: Reuben, Timmons, Bethel, Sister Eliza, & Margaret and all the children, Allison & Pownall, & all the rest. I how I would rejoice to see you all, so many of you together than I think some of you might visit us.

Crops are only tolerably good this year, the Cotton crop will be quite short, but there is some improvement in our Markets, so if we get a better price for what we have we may likely do as well as if we made more at less prices.

You did not mention whether you had heard
of the Death of dear Elder Bro. Benjamin
He died on the 10th day of last April
& suppose in great pain, he was not
confined to his Bed more than about 8 days
I hope his spirit is at rest

his affairs were insolvent

Present our kind remembrance
to Mr & Mrs Martain & family - also to
other of my acquaintances in that section
write to us often and remember
all to our dear Mother Bros & Sisters
accept for yourself the assurances of
our love & friendship.
