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Agreement between J. L. Dreadwell of the
first part, and Asbery Booth and his
wife Hannah, George Washington and his
wife Mollie Alexander Hargrove, and
his wife Sarah,

all of the second part, "Known as Asbery
Booth & Co." The said Dreadwell of the
first part, agrees to let the said Asbery
Booth & Co. cultivate the same ^{the part of the valley} land ~~land~~ they ~~lost~~
lost ^{and the corn} year, The said Asbery Booth & Co.
agreeing to give the said Dreadwell for
the rent of the same ^{three} ~~five~~ bales of lint
cotton, weighing each five hundred pounds,
two out of the first picking out, and
two out of the third, Also ^{four} ~~two~~ loads of
corn slip shucked, to be measured in the
said Dreadwell's large wagon body will
tramped in, Also ^{four} ~~two~~ hundred bundles
of good fodder of good size, The said
Dreadwell agrees to furnish the said
Asbery Booth & Co. one hundred pounds
of good meat at cost for the same, to be
paid for out of the crop of 1867, The said
Dreadwell is not to charge any toll for

ginsing or grinding, The Said Asbery
Booth & Co are to do their part of repairing
the fence around the farm and lots, also
to assist in keeping plenty of fire wood at
Edgfield, during the year 1867, and if the
Said Asbery Booth & Co or any of them
move away next year, they are to leave the
Cotton Seed on the farm, The Said ^{Treadwell} agrees
to let the Said Asbery Booth & Co have
ten Acres of Sage land free of rent, and
if the Said Asbery Booth & Co need more
land to cultivate they agree to pay one
third ($\frac{1}{3}$) of the Cotton and one fourth
of the Corn and fodder made on said
land, The Mules and Horses to do all
Necessary work to be done on the farm
hauling Wood &c
