"On January 31, 1963, Chan-cellor Williams of the University of Mississippi, issued a directive against students and faculty giving out press releases, state-ment, radio and TV interviews likely to create disorder or do harm to our educational program stating that they would be re-garded as unacceptable behavior. "Student James H. Meredith

has repeatedly made public statements which, in my opin-ion, clearly and unmistakably violate the terms of this directive.

"'I, James H. Meredith, call for a general boycott or "every-thing possible" by all Negroes State of Mississippi." We all know that a boycott is a strict violation of the laws of the State of Mississippi. of Mississippi.

"Other inflammatory remarks of James Meredith which appeared in print are:

" 'I want this non - coopera-tion by Negroes with the System of White Supremacy to last until the system is changed."

" 'A Negro's life is not worth the air it takes to keep it alive in Mississippi.'

" 'This system under which we live in Mississippi and throughout the South must be changed at any cost.'

" 'There is nothing provided under this system for the Negro
