I know you must have, at some time, wondered about me - if I am still alive and, if so, if I ever received that most appreciated and enjoyed letter from you. Well, I am alive and I did get the letter and you can never know just how much it meant to me and how I loved hearing from you again. I had every intention of answering it right away and here I am just now doing what I have wanted to very much to do for so many days. We lead quite a busy life here. It is leave home

well now and hope you
continue to enjoy good health.
How I would love to see
all of you and especially
would I love to have a
nice long chat with you.

Yes, Sister, Brownie
and I are living together
here in Washington. We
are in a small apartment
at present but hope to
make a move of some
kind soon. We have
wanted so much to get
settled back home - buy
a little house in Memphis
and have tried hard to
get transfers to Memphis
but so far have not
succeeded. There just
isn't anything there now
in our departments for
us to get transferred to. We
feel it would be best for

early in the morning for the long day at the office. returning between five and six o'clock most too tired as a rule, to attempt to do anything. Especially has this been the case since the war started. Regular Saturday work ended tho' the last of June, except for last Saturday when we had to work to make up for the Friday after the "Fourth of July" which Congress finally, and so kindly, decided to give with the understanding it be made up on Saturday. Now with Saturdays off we can have more time to rest and do things we want to do that too often have had to go undone.

So often I think of you and yours and even tho' so many years have elapsed since the three delightful ones lived in your home, I still at times find myself reliving and enjoying many of the happy and enjoyable times we had together. They are memories I shall always cherish.

I was truly interested, as you well know, to hear of each member of your family and so happy to know all are getting along so well! I didn't know about your long illness in 1942 until received your letter. Mr. Huger (I never know how to spell his name) told me once you had been very ill but I didn't know it had been so serious. I am so glad you are.

The house has been
closed all this time, which
of course isn't best for
any place, but we didn't
want to rent it. We hope
now we can sell it, even
tho' it will be hard to part
with it. It has been home
to us for so long and
we love it so. It has
been the scene of much
joy and happiness in
years past but since
the terrible, terrible shock
of Del's going we just
don't feel we can even
live there. Too, it is much
too large a place for the
three of us. We are going
to Byghalia last of next
week and hope we can

do something about it while there.

Oh, "Miss Eric" the outlook on life has been so changed since Del was snatched away from us as he was and for a long, long time I had a struggle to keep from being bitter. There are times still when I border on such a feeling but I fight it with the thought that Del would not have me be like that, and I think of what a fine Christian character he was. He meant so much in every way to all of us and his death was a blow we can never recover from. I know the Lord has been good to me in many ways - for more than I deserve - and I am grateful - but oh, if He could only have seen fit to spare Liddell in that horrible accident.

You said Lucia has two grown daughters and a small son. I just can't realize she has such a big family - And Joe has a family too. But you didn't say whether Boyce had any children or not. And Rivers is still all your boy. Maybe he is like Clyde Keely - you remember him don't you? He used to say he knew his mother loved him but he didn't know about a wife so he wouldn't marry - and he didn't either until after his mother's death.
