Dear Margery

I send you a few lines by Mr. Baust to let you know that we are still well. Hoping that these lines may find you and the children all well. I have nothing of importance at present to write since I wrote. Only that it is that we will start for Kentucky about Sunday or Monday we are all getting along very well in the Country. I want you to write to me as often as you can and let me know how things are getting along. I do not expect that I will write any more until I know at what time we will start. Then I will write again. But it will not be necessary for you to write until you hear from me again when we get up there I will write to you again and how to direct your letters. I saw nothing now at present so farewell at present and don't forget that that it is with my best love that I write to you. Kiss the children for me and remember that I often think of you and the children take good care of the small ones and your self. I saw no man at present but remain your affectionate
Husband.
