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Annual Narrative Report of Mrs. Flossie Wills Barmes Home Demonstration Agent.

GREENLEE COUNTY

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ORGANIZATION

Having two Counties to serve, the Agent has tried to divide her time as judiciously as possible between the two. Much more time has been given to the work in Graham than in Greenlee County, because there are many more communities there to be served.

In Greenlee County the communities number seven. In the northeast in the mountainous part, are Clifton, Morenci, and Metcalf. These were formerly flourishing mining camps, but the mining has practically ceased in all three, and only a few hundred people are left there. Being isolated as they are, they lend themselves to certain types of home demonstration and 4-H Club work. Apparently no extension work has been done in these localities.

Franklin, Duncan, York and Sheldon are in the Duncan Valley. The people in these communities are, for the most part, living on ranches. Considerable home demonstration and club work has been done here in the past, but there has been no Home Demonstration Agent in the County for four years. At Franklin an organized group has worked with the Agent throughout the year. One 4-H Garment Making Club was organized at Duncan. One home management project was given at Clifton.

HOMEMAKERS CLUBS

The Agent went to the Relief Society at Franklin in January. Discussed with them the program of work. This group decided to form a Homemakers Club, and meet regularly on the third Thursday of the month. Twenty women enrolled and the organization was completed at the February meeting. Eleven meetings were held with a total attendance of one hundred and seventy-six women, an average of seventeen per meeting. A club picnic was also held, but not having been very well advertised, it was not well attended. Only fifteen were present. All had a good time, playing games and a delicious supper was served.

Five of the meetings were devoted to the Home Management Specialist's demonstrations. At two meetings the "Care of the Sick" was demonstrated. The Agent demonstrated the making of a

closed bed and changing the bed with a patient in it. She also discussed "How to Make A Patient Mentally and Physically Comfortable." The members took active part in the two meetings.

Mrs. Edith Quinn discussed "Care of a Fever Patient". She had given careful thought to the subject and discussed it well. Mrs. Jane Moyers demonstrated the "Making of a Foot Rest," Mrs. Annie Arnett, the "Bed Cradle", Mrs. Clara Wilkins demonstrated the "Making of a Newspaper pad for the Sick Bed". Mrs. Annie O'Dell demonstrated the "Making of a tray for the Sick Room" from an old picture frame.

A day was spent in Pleasant Patching. The Agent demonstrated various types of patches and darns. The hemmed patch, overhand patch and darns on wool were made. The 2-minute patch on overalls was emphasized and each of the six women present made a "set-in-set-on patch" which they then judged. The best patch was awarded a prize.

The wmaking of tailored buttonholes was demonstrated by the Agent at another meeting and ten of the twelve women present made a good buttonhole.

At the demonstration of the making of the hat stand for soft crowned hats, five patterns were made with the idea of passing them round for the use of all.

The women seemed to enjoy most of those demonstrations where they actually did something themselves, no matter how simple a demonstration it might have been. The Agent will continue to meet regularly with this Club next year.

· HOME MANAGEMENT

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The Home Management Specialist from the University of Arizona, Miss Thelma Huber, presented six projects to the homemakers of Franklin. Meetings were held in the Relief Society Hall. Work was organized in April and five meetings were held with an enrollment of twenty women.

One project was taken to Clifton. The Clifton meeting was in answer to a request of Mrs. Helen Gould, Supervisor of MPA work in Greenlee County. Mrs. Gould brought seven of her group from Clifton to Franklin (30 miles over mountain roads) to two of the demonstrations at Franklin.

The Home Management work was carried on as in Graham County. The women were much interested in the work, voicing their appreciation often and adopting many of the home practices that were recommended. The thirty-nine women who were present at the Clifton demonstration on "Cleaning Methods" were especially enthusiastic. Most of the women came up after the demonstration to request other future meetings. One woman said "I had no idea what I was coming to, when I came here today. I think it is wonderfully helpful." Another said she was well satisfied and felt that it was well worth the time given, to say nothing of the help received, and she felt the recipe for the silver polish was very helpful.

This group of women chose Mrs. Gladys Sidebottom, of Clifton as their group leader, and asked that monthly meetings be held in their community. The Agent explained that she would be away on Annual Leave during the month of October, but would come to them for a demonstration in November and at that time plan for next year's work. The Home Management Projects taken up in this county were:

Kitchen Improvements: Many gadgets for the kitchen were demonstrated. All could be easily made by the women, or could be easily purchased very cheaply. The desirability of proper

working heights for kitchen equipment with suggestions for correcting them if necessary, was discussed. Twenty-eight women were present. At a later meeting one of the group reported making dustless dusters, another a broom-holder. A third reported adjusting the working height of her kitchen table. All the women report watching their posture and trying to improve it.

Control of Household Pests: A demonstration on how to control such pests as flies, ants, cock roaches, mice, mosquitoes, was given. Twenty-five women were present and eight fly traps were made. Later reports showed five more traps made and five breeding places of flies cleaned up.

Housewifery: Two demonstrations were given on "Cleaning Methods". Silver polish, furniture polish and floor wax were made and their use demonstrated. At the close of the demonstration, one of the women said she would like to see a demonstration of the cleaning and polishing of the Relief Society piano. So everyone lent a hand and gave the piano a thorough cleaning. As a result it looked like a different instrument. Two women report having cleaned their own pianos at home and three others have cleaned other furniture. Some good home-made soap was exhibited and the making of it discussed. Two quarts of hand lotion were made.

Kitchen Arrangement: One of the projects most enjoyed by the Greenlee County women was the one in which the Home Management Specialist showed two kitchens; one poorly, the other well arranged and by actual measuring of steps taken in each while mixing a cake. The women were surprised to learn that it required two and a half times as many steps to do the work in the poorly arranged kitchen as in the well arranged kitchen. At least one women rearranged the furniture in her kitchen, following this demonstration.

Home Accounts: The value of keeping home accounts was thoroughly discussed at one of the meetings. The Agent hopes there may be a Home Accounts Project here next year, but at present there is reluctance on the part of the women to start it.

Food and Drug Act: With the aid of excellent illustrative material, the Home Management Specialist showed the women how important it is to have our present Food and Drug Act ammended. Some of them learned that some of their favorite cosmetics were harmful, although the manufacturers had complied with the law in putting them on the market.

The women feel that they have received much valuable help from the Home Management Projects and there will be a continuance of this project in 1937.

HOME FURNISHINGS

Furniture Making From Boxes: In response to a request from the Homemakers of Franklin, a three and a half day class in making furniture from boxes was held at the Relief Society Hall. Eight women enrolled for the work. The Home Furnishings Specialist, Mrs. Margaret E. Watson, from the University of Arizona, gave the instructions and the project was carried on in a way similar to those in Graham County. The interest was keen and some very nice articles were made. The weather was so pleasant that the women preferred doing much of their work out under the trees.



One book case; one dressing table; one radio table; five shoe racks and six magazine racks were made. There is a possibility that other communities in Greenlee County may wish similar classes in 1937. The women in our Counties have not had the money to buy new furniture for so many years, and so are very happy to be able to make something both attractive and useful.

Some Home Furnishings Projects will be included in next year's plan for Clifton, the specific projects will be decided by the committee in December.

CLOTHING

Adults: The Agent gave two demonstrations at Franklin Homemakers Club on "Tailored Buttonholes" and "Patching" and a third at the Duncan WPA Sewing Room. These were reported elsewhere.

Junior: Organized a garment making club at Duncan. (See 4-H Clubs)

4-H CLUBS

One First Year Garment Making Club was carried on at Duncan, The leader, Miss Lillian Hoover, was a High School Teacher. The twelve members of the club were eighth grade girls.

Miss Hoover allowed five of the High School Girls in her Home Economics class to act as Assistant Leaders. She developed each lesson with her assistants, then delegated two of the girls to present the work to the Club and be held responsible for the girls completing it properly. As a result of this training, one of the Assistant Leaders, Iona Wilkins, will assume leadership of a First Year Club at Franklin this coming year.

Miss Hoover allowed forty minutes school time once a week for her club meetings. Eleven of the club completed their work and received their pins at a special auditorium period.

A judging team was trained and sent to the Annual 4-H Club Week at Tucson in June. The girls Eunice Nunn and Shirley Lovett were accompanied by one of the Assistant Leaders, Iona Wilkins. The girls joined the Graham County Club Girls and Boys at Safford, and made the trip with them. This team placed first in the Junior Class in judging sewing, and Shirley placed first in individual judging.

If her schedule of school work will permit, Miss Hoover will lead another 4-H Club this year.

A request has come from a girl at Morenci for a 4-H Club. The Agent plans to organize it the first week in December.

MISCELLANEOUS

The Agent cooperated with the WPA at Duncan and Clifton, sup-

plying them with subject matter material on Home Management. She also gave one demonstration on "Making Zipper Plackets" to the twenty-one women workers at the W.P.A. Sewing Room at Duncan.

At the annual anniversary of the founding of the Relief Society, the Agent was asked to talk to the Franklin Relief Society. She chose as her subject "Home Customs Among Our Colonial Ancestors."

CANNING

Kerr Canning Contest: While canning has been encouraged among all the homemakers in the County, the Kerr Canning contest is the only project that has been carried on as such. Twelve women enrolled in the contest, but there were only four completions. Two of the women were called from home by illness of relatives and failed to get their exhibits in the judging. Three others had not canned meat. The other three said they had not done their canning because they had raised no gardens and had not had the money to buy the product when it was cheap enough to can. The judging of the exhibits was done by Mrs. Henry E. Collins, of Safford, a former Home Economics teacher with the Indian Service at Fort Wingate, New Mexico. She explained to the women her reasons for placing the jars as she did. This was very helpful.

The first prize was awarded to Mrs. Irene Hanchett of Franklin; the second to Mrs. Vera Pease of Franklin; the third to Mrs. Annie O'Dell of Franklin. The first and second prize winning exhibits will be sent to Tucson for entrance in the State Contest.

This group of women report having canned 851 quarts of fruit, 800 quarts of vegetables and 526 quarts of meat, a total of 2,177 quarts. They also report using 1880 Kerr Jars.

Reports of canning done by women other than those entered in the Kerr Contest makes a total for the county of 3,884 quarts of fruit, 3,911 quarts of vegetables and 1125 quarts of meat.

Women Of Franklin Interested In Canning Home-grownProducts

The women of the Franklin Community believe that it pays to can the surplus of fruit, meat and vegetables produced on the farm. The county home demonstration agent, Mrs. Flossie Wills Barmes states that sixteen women of this community report having canned 6,743 quarts of food for home use this year. Of this total, there were 3033 quarts of fruit, 3111 quarts of vegetables and 599 of meat. More meat will be canned before the season is over.

These women attribute the interest and their knowledge of proper mehtods of canning to the efforts of Miss Hortense White, former home demonstration agent of Graham and Greenlee counties.


Series Meetings On Home Management To Be Held In Franklin
