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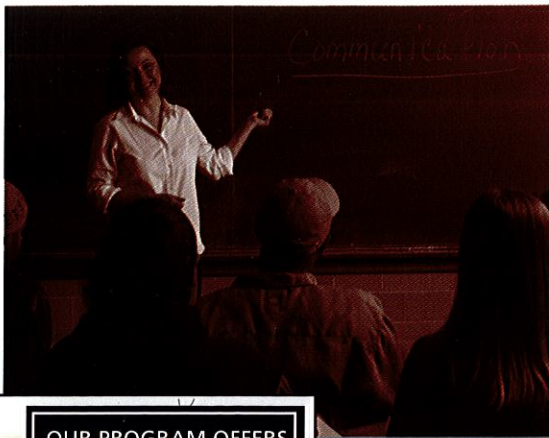

ABOUT THE INTERDISCIPLINARY MASTER'S DEGREE

This degree is for students seeking advanced-level communication skills in combination with knowledge and skills in another area. The communication core is complemented and supplemented by the secondary area(s), which may be chosen from the disciplines of business, international languages, health care, the arts or the humanities.

ARE SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE?

ARE GRADUATE ASSISTANTSHIPS AVAILABLE?

Assistantships are available to graduate Communication students. Assistantships range from 10-20 hours per week, and availability is based on departmental and student need. Connect with the Communication department for applications and further information.

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

- The program requires a minimum of 37 semester credits, with at least 25 of these credits in Communication.
- Course work must be approved by the student's supervising committee and consist of Communication courses and courses in at least one other subject area.
- At the end of the program, students must pass a comprehensive examination over the areas selected for the degree.

TRANSFER CREDITS

Graduate courses taken at another recognized, accredited (U.S. or equivalent) institution are evaluated through a petition process, and will be accepted if academic criteria are met. Transfer courses taken less than six years prior to the expected graduation year can be applied to the Andrews University degree. 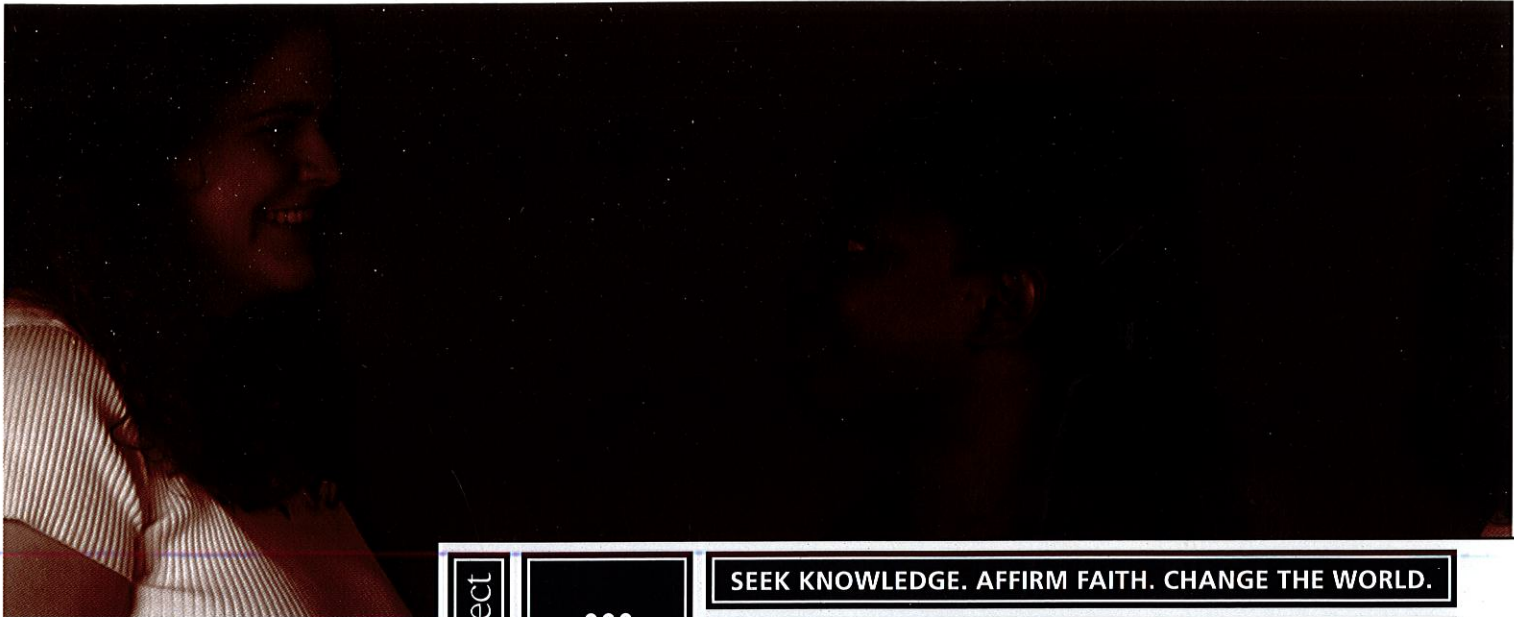
ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENTS

You must complete and submit all indicated and requested materials included in the Andrews University graduate application packet. You also need to meet the following departmental criteria:

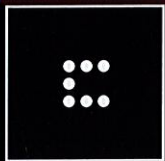
- Obtain a baccalaureate/bachelor degree, with a GPA of at least 2.75. Individuals with a GPA of 2.75-3.00 must submit GRE scores, with the following minimum results: Verbal 500, Quantitative 500 and, because scores are reported differently as of October 2002, Analytical 500 or 4.5, as long as the GRE was taken after that date.
- A minimum of 12 undergraduate semester credits in Communication, Journalism or Public Relations. Students with at least 6 semester credits can fulfill prerequisites in the first year of study and take some graduate courses congruently.
- Submit the MA in Interdisciplinary Studies: Communication Statement of Purpose. The statement must 1) explain why you have chosen this degree, 2) state which other area(s) you plan to study, 3) describe your goals in studying these area(s), and 4) propose how you plan to relate these area(s) to each other and how the combination will meet your personal and professional goals. This statement is used in consultation with a faculty advisor in designing a plan of study, and for evaluating your success at the end of the program. More detailed guidelines for this 1-2 page essay are included in the graduate application packet.
