Paula Nelson graduated from UNF in spring 2012 and is employed by Crowley Liner Services as a Customer Service Representative for inland operations. In this position she works in the intermodal department an average of 40 -45 hours per week, dealing with imports and exports, confirming appointments with customers for deliveries and pick-ups, and handling issues that arise during transport, as well as rescheduling. During her time in TLS Paula held a position as the secretary. Paula says, "Holding any position in TLS allows the student to have a greater responsibility for the work you do and your actions. Holding the position of secretary I had to listen carefully, record details and others relied on my notes for the next meeting. This helped with my job to decipher important details when on the phone with customer and to make very detailed notes for records."
