## Science Classes Schedule Visit to Dow Chemical

On June 1st all the physics and chemistry classes of Mr. Neil Nutter will be taking a trip to the Dow Chemical Company in Midland, Michigan.

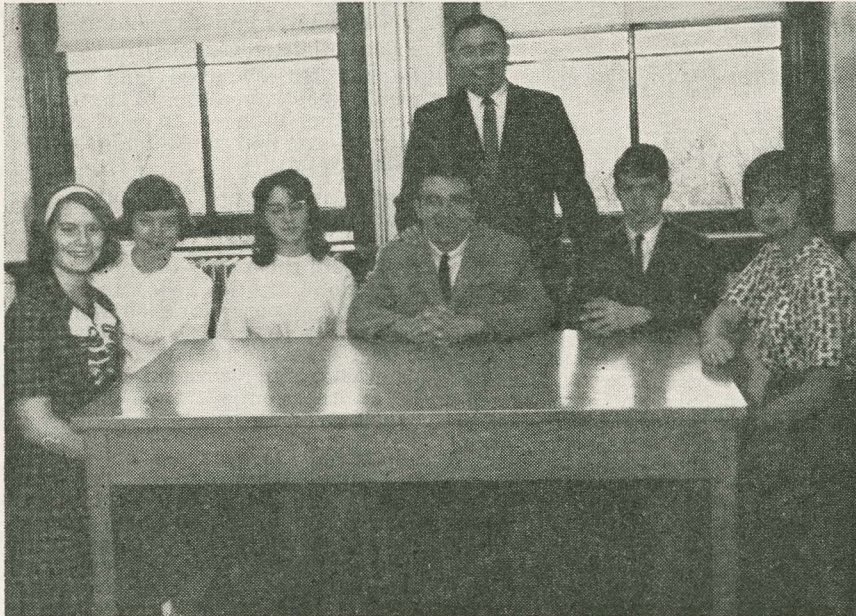
The students accompanied by teachers and some student teachers, will leave Kalamazoo about 6:30 a.m. The group will travel to Midland by bus.

After they arrive the students will be divided into two groups. One group will tour the main Dow Chemical Plant in the morning while the other group will tour the Bio-Products Plant. The two groups will meet at noon to eat lunch together in the Dow cafe. In the afternoon the groups will visit the plant they did not see in the morning.

The busloads of students will probably return to Kalamazoo by 7:30 that night.

Among the many things the students will see are: research and analytical labs, the production of some Dow Chemical products, glass blowing, and many more. The students will be given a chance to break up into smaller groups and ask questions.

An interesting feature of this trip is that the number of students going is so large that the plant can only have this group on one day. University High will be the only visitors on tour of the plant all day.

## Debate Team Does Well In First Year

There are few schools that can boast a debate team which has won as many awards as ours has won this year. The entire school should be proud of the team's achievements. Through the hard work and serious efforts of the entire team and their coach, Mr. Melvin Donaho, the group has won many honors despite the fact that this is the first year the group has been in existence.

Anyone who has attended one of our team's debates has witnessed the skill with which they handle the issue. However, a great deal of credit goes to Mr. Donaho, their coach. He is not only the coach of our team, but also is the director of forensics at Western Michigan University.

Before the tournaments began our team stood in the high position of first in class C of the state and ninth in class A. The team was very suc-

cessful throughout the tournament and was not defeated until they reached the semi-finals. This was held at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor on Friday, April 2. They ended in fifth place at this contest. However, before our group reached the semi-finals they won three trophies for winning in several other debates. These awards included the state league plaque for placing first in the state league tournament. They also were the top team in the district tournament regional tournament. These honors were earned by the entire debate team.

Although our team has a splendid record, Daphne Szmuszkovicz is the only debater to win individual awards. She debated with Pat Raher on the negative team. Together they maintained a fine record of thirty-one

wins and four losses. At the Battle Creek Cereal Bowl Tournament, Daphne was judged to be the best second negative debater. This honor entitles her to go on to the Detroit Free Press Scholarship Tournament to be held in Detroit on May 21 and 22. At this time she will compete with the approximately twenty-two other top debaters from other districts for one of several scholarships which are being offered.

## Council Draws Up New University High Constitution

As you may faintly know, the Student Council has been trying for some time to draw up a new constitution for U-High. It has taken so long to do because they wanted to work it out carefully and end up with a flexible, durable constitution.

Not all details have been worked out as this article is written, so none of the specific proposals are available, but to help improve council-student communications you should at least know how they have gone about framing the constitution. First a constitution study committee was formed with Bernie Stulberg as its chairman. Each of the other seven members were assigned as chairmen of the sub-committees in charge of each section of the constitution. These chairmen are: cabinet, Ann Rosegrant; committee chairmen, Jim Betz; elections, Al Mulder; finance, Mike Mulder; house rules, Mike Holaday; officers, Paul Scott; and representatives, Bruce Karr. The constitutional study group's job was to gather a list of problems and possibilities for their solutions. To accomplish this the students were asked to take their opinions and ideas to the sub-committee meetings one morning a few weeks ago. Then each of the chairmen used his information to write a draft for his section of the constitution. These were presented to the Council for issue by issue discussion. Barring unforeseen interruptions the discussion should be finished by today. Now the chairmen have to write up their sections in final form. The Council will approve them. Then, after an assembly to explain it, the new constitution will be submitted to the student body for adoption.

## Voice of the Students Bill Barr Expresses Views on Viet Nam

### The Optimistic Isolationist

I have just finished watching the television special, **Prelude to War**. This special outlined the manner in which Hitler gained power in Europe through the appeasement policy of the Allies. It told how his generals wanted to arrest him but feared his strength after Czechoslovakia was sold down the river into his hands. Britain's Prime Minister Chamberlin said that he had Hitler's word, and that he would keep it because, "This time he made the promise to me." Hitler said later, "Why must I always deal with nonentities."

The Allies had conceded Austria, the Rhineland, and half of Czechoslovakia to Hitler. He took the other half. With this policy of appeasement, a quixotic, futile hope, the Allies tried to buy peace for their world. On September first, 1939, less than half a year after the submission of Czechoslovakia Hitler invaded Poland and began the conflagration known as World War II.

And yet today some of our parents, and others of their generation, people who lived and fought in that regression of civilization, cannot understand why we are taking an active part in the Viet Nam war. They seem to be incapable of drawing a parallel between Nazi aggression in Europe and Communist aggression in Asia. They are the same thing. Both are aimed at causing men to relinquish their freedom and submit to tyranny.

To these people who refuse to learn from bloody experience, I have only this to say, "Those who refuse to fight for justice now will fight for their lives in the future."

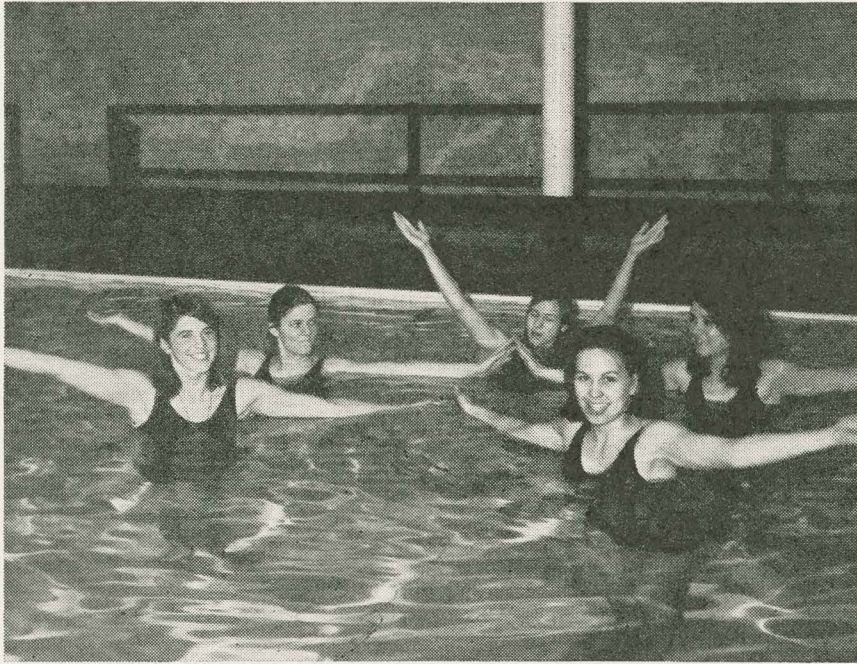
