Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from 2015.

Growing the economy by encouraging job creation was and remains my top priority. The tax-relief bill signed into law at the close of last year contains three key provisions I authored to help foster job creation and provide small businesses with the certainty they need to invest, grow, and, most important, hire new workers. Another provision I authored that became law last year gives a boost to both Maine's economy and traffic safety. This provision permanently changed the federal law that previously had forced the heaviest trucks onto our country roads and downtown streets, rather than allowing them to use Maine's federal Interstates. In addition, I was glad to help secure another significant award for the University of Maine's deepwater offshore wind initiative, which has the potential to advance an emerging industry and create thousands of good jobs in our state.

Maine's historic contributions to our nation's defense must continue. In 2015, I secured funding toward a much-needed additional Navy destroyer, likely to be built at Bath Iron Works. Modernization projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that I have long advocated for were also completed, as were projects for the Maine National Guard.

I was also deeply involved in crafting the new education reform law to better empower states and communities in setting educational policy for their students. The law also extends a program I co-authored that provides additional assistance to rural schools, which has greatly benefitted our state. A \$250 tax deduction I authored in 2002 for teachers who spend their own money on classroom supplies was also made permanent last year.

As a result of a scientific evaluation of the nutritional value of potatoes required by a law that I wrote, the wholesome fresh potato finally was included in the federal WIC nutrition program. I also worked on other issues important to Maine's farmers and growers, including research on wild blueberries and pollinating bees.

As Chairman of the Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I have made combating veterans' homelessness a priority. This year's housing funding law includes \$60 million for 8,000 new supportive housing vouchers for homeless veterans. Since this program began in 2008, the number of homeless veterans nationwide has dropped by one third. Maine has received nearly 200 vouchers to support homeless veterans.

Last year, I became Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee. My top three priorities for the committee are retirement security, investing more in biomedical research, and fighting fraud and financial abuses targeting our nation's seniors. I advocated for the \$2 billion increase in funding for the National Institutes of Health to advance research on such diseases as diabetes and Alzheimer's. The Senate also unanimously passed my bill to support family caregivers. The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for senior citizens to report suspected fraud and receive assistance and has already received more than 1,000 calls.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. As 2015 ended, I cast my 6,072nd consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

Dear Friends of Van Buren:

It has been a privilege to serve the State of Maine since being sworn into the U.S. Senate.

Much of my time in Washington this past year has been devoted to the Senate Armed Services Committee and the Select Committee on Intelligence. Protecting our homeland and the people of Maine from terrorism and violence remains one of my top priorities. Through my work on the Armed Services Committee, I was able to secure several provisions in the 2016 National Defense Authorization Act that benefit Maine. The legislation authorizes the construction of an additional DDG-51 Arleigh Burke Class Destroyer that could be built at Bath Iron Works and expands the HUBZone program to stimulate economic growth at former military installations like the former Brunswick Naval Air Station.

Returning control to teachers, school districts, and states has also been a primary concern of mine. I am encouraged that the Every Student Succeeds Act has become law. It eliminates the burdensome requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act and ensures access to a quality education for all students. A provision I helped author in the bill will give states the opportunity to pilot the use of their own proficiency-based assessments in lieu of federally-mandated standardized tests. Also included in the bill are several measures I secured to promote local input, fund education technology initiatives, and explore new strategies to increase student access to the internet outside of school.

Communities across Maine have taken bold action to improve their broadband connectivity, and I have been proud to foster federal support for these types of projects. My amendments to the Every Student Succeeds Act will promote the type of work already occurring in Washington County, where students who lack broadband access are able to check out mobile hotspots from their local libraries. Additionally, a bill I cosponsored, the Community Broadband Act, helped pave the way for the FCC to enact rules protecting the ability of municipalities to invest in better broadband. I am excited by Maine's leadership on this important economic development issue and will continue to support local efforts in this area.

After extensive negotiations, the Senate passed a five-year transportation bill that will increase highway and transit funding in Maine and provide stability to improve our transportation infrastructure. The legislation contains provisions I cosponsored to cut red tape and improve predictability and timeliness by streamlining the federal permitting process for large infrastructure projects. Also incorporated in this bill are my provisions to relieve financial regulations on Maine's community banks and credit unions and to reauthorize the Export-Import Bank, a critical tool that supports communities and small business across the state.

Following my inquiries in the Energy and Natural Resources Committee, the National Park Service has announced they will begin exploring strategies to allow park visitors to purchase electronic passes online and will pilot the program at Acadia National Park. These passes would improve access to our nation's most treasured landscapes and would generate resources for years to come. I remain deeply engaged in preserving Maine's natural beauty and strengthening our outdoor recreation economy.

It is with solemn responsibility that I have focused my energy addressing the opioid epidemic in Maine. This work includes convening roundtables with a wide-range of health care and law enforcement professionals to combat addiction; introducing a proposal to safely dispose of excess prescription drugs; cosponsoring a

Senate-passed bill that addresses mothers struggling with addiction and the alarming effect it has on newborns; cosponsoring the TREAT Act, which expands the ability of medical specialists to provide life-saving medication-assisted therapies for patients battling heroin and prescription drug addiction; and calling on the Commander of U.S. Southern Command to increase efforts to stop the flow of heroin at our southern border.

I like to think of Maine as a big small town – and in a small town, the leaders are accessible and eager to listen. In that spirit, I've made it a priority to stay connected with people from all over Maine who e-mail, write, and call with suggestions or questions. Inhabitants of Van Buren,

During the 2016 tax year the Town of Van Buren observed a minimal decrease in personal property, but more substantially a decrease in real estate valuation. The biggest driving factor of the real estate valuation decrease is the State's adjustment to the Homestead Exemption. For the 2016-2017 tax year the Homestead Exemption will be \$15,000. The increased exemption will help to reduce the tax bills of qualifying homeowners even if there is a slight increase in the Mill Rate. As always, if you have any questions regarding your valuation, please contact the Town Office.

The following statements and documents are the responsibility of the Board of Assessors. It is the Board of Assessors responsibility to ensure that all documents are both complete and accurate, to the best of their knowledge.

In our opinion, the subsequent documents presented below, fairly represent, in all material respects, the total assessment for the Town of Van Buren, and the results are in conformity with the assessment principles accepted by the State of Maine.

ASSESSORS' NOTICE

To resident owners, all Inhabitants of the Town of Van Buren, Maine, and all Administrators, Executors, Trustees, etc. of all estates taxable in said Town, such persons are hereby notified to: MAKE AND BRING IN TO THE ASSESSORS [A] TRUE AND PERFECT LISTS OF THEIR ESTATE, REAL AND PERSONAL, not by law exempt from taxation of which they are possessed on the FIRST DAY OF APRIL, 2016, and be prepared to make oath to the truth of the same and to answer all property inquiries in writing as to the nature, situation, and value of ALL property liable to be taxed.

FAILURE TO NOTIFY

And any resident owner who neglects to comply with this notice is hereby barred of the right to make application to the Assessors of the County Commissioners for any abatement of taxes, unless a list is provided, accompanied with satisfaction, as to why the list was unable to be offered at the time appointed.

HOMESTEAD EXMEPTION

Do you have a homestead exemption?

Homestead Exemption. This program provides a measure of property tax relief for certain individuals that have owned homestead property in Maine for at least twelve months and make the property they occupy on April first their permanent residence. Property owners would receive an exemption of \$15,000. In order to be eligible for a tax exemption, please notify, IN WRITING THROUGH APPLICATION, the Assessors of the Municipality of Van Buren, together with proof of residency. Once made, it need not be repeated in succeeding years. If an application is not completed by April 1, 2017, the applicant will not be considered for a 2017 homestead exemption.

VETERAN'S EXEMPTION

Are you a veteran?

Veteran Exemption. A veteran who served during a recognized war period and is 62 years or older; or, is receiving 100% disability as a Veteran; or, became 100% disabled while serving, is eligible for \$6,000. In order to be eligible for a tax exemption, please notify, IN WRITING THROUGH APPLICATION, the Assessors of the Municipality of Van Buren, together with proof of residency. Once made, it need not be repeated in succeeding years. If an application is not completed by April 1, 2017, the applicant will not be considered for a 2017 veteran's exemption.

BLIND EXEMPTION

Are you legally blind?

Blind Exemption. An individual who is determined to be legally blind receives \$4,000. In order to be eligible for a tax exemption, please notify, IN WRITING THROUGH APPLICATION, the Assessors of the Municipality of Van Buren, together with proof of residency. Once made, it need not be repeated in succeeding years. If an application is not completed by April 1, 2017, the applicant will not be considered for a 2017 blind exemption.

BETE EXEMPTION

ATTENTION ALL BUSINESSES!!!

Business Equipment Tax Exemption (BETE). Partial exemptions must be adjusted by the municipality's certified assessment ratio. All of the above exemptions require completion of an application to the local town office where the property is located. Exemption claims may require additional information to support the claim for exemption, and must be delivered to the Assessor's office no later than April 1. In order to be eligible for a tax exemption, please notify, IN WRITING THROUGH APPLICATION, the Assessors of the Municipality of Van Buren, together with a true and perfect list of personal property. The application MUST be submitted every year by April 1 in order to qualify for any given year. If an application is not completed by April 1, 2017, the applicant will not be considered for a 2017 BETE exemption. * RETAIL, SERIVCES, & SALES DO NOT QUALIFY FOR BETE^{1*}. For more information, please contact the Town Office.

PERSONS DOOMED

Any persons or entity neglecting to comply with this notice is hereby barred of the right to make application to the Assessors of the County Commissioners for any abatement of taxes, unless a list is provided, accompanied with satisfaction, as to why the list was unable to be offered at the time appointed.

Retail operations may qualify for BETR. Please contact Maine Revenue Services for more information.

TOWN COUNCIL REPORT

To the Citizens of Van Buren:

The Town Council has made many changes in the past year to keep the services to the citizens of Van Buren. It is getting harder each year to do this without cutting services needed to meet our needs. Our tax base has been declining each year, funding and grants from the State and Federal Governments are declining and the cost of getting the grants are on the rise. The State of Maine Legislature is in a grid lock on Revenue Sharing. They are putting a bigger burden on the Town's tax payer.

We wish to thank our Town Manager, Dan McClung, for his long hours, hard work and dedication in keeping us well informed and getting us the right tools to make our decisions in making this town a better place to live.

The Council wishes to thank the Department Heads for helping us make the changes in Town government, to save money and to keep our services. We want to thank all our town employees for their dedication and hard work in providing these services to the people of our town.

The Council voted to have a complete reevaluation of the Town. This will take part in a two-year period. For 2016-2017, the land value will be looked at and updated. This will show up on the tax base in 2017-2018. The next part will be the real estate values which may take up to two years to complete. This will help in making a fair value on our taxpayer. The last evaluation was done over fifteen years ago.

2016 Annual Report for the Van Buren Police Department

On behalf of the Van Buren police Department, I am pleased to submit this year's annual report to the citizens of Van Buren. I would like to start this year's report by thanking our Town Council, Town Manager, and the community members for their continued support of the Police department.

The police department is made up of three full-time officers. The full-time officers are a police chief, patrol sergeant, and a patrol officer. The department also relies on reserve officers to assist with shift coverage. The police department continually trains it's officers so that the department maintains the highest level of proficiency. Currently, we have an officer assigned and trained to investigate all sex crimes within the town. This officer is also a member of the Aroostook County Computer Crimes Task Force. Other specialized training includes a Drug Recognition Expert, Advanced Crime Scene Investigations, Drug Interdiction/Detection, and Firearms Instructor. With the Firearms Instructor training we have been able to provide handgun safety courses to residents of our community. We are anticipating a new firearms range in Van Buren. This will only add to the frequency of safety course's offered in our area.

The crime rate has remained consistent over the past five years; however the crime trend has shifted. The Van Buren Police Department has seen a substantial increase in drug related crimes. Van Buren has also seen an increase in the drug "Heroin". We also continue to struggle with pharmaceuticals. These drugs and their addictive qualities can rapidly have a negative impact upon a community. It is for this reason the police department has stepped up it's efforts to confront this problem. Our collaborative relationship with various state and federal agencies, combined with our proactive enforcement, has yielded positive results. The Van Buren Police Department continues to collect unused medications and sharps from residents. This collection limits the often highly sought after prescriptions within our community while simultaneously disposing of them properly.

The Police department continues to call on the community to assist in apprehending offenders who attempt to poison our youth with drugs, engage in other criminal activities and who would otherwise compromise the safety of our community. There is a direct correlation between a community's support for public safety officers and the effectiveness of those departments. The Van Buren Police Department's successes are a reflection of the positive relationships between community members and the officers. We thank you for your assistance and greatly appreciate your continued support.

As in past years, we have been busy maintain our stations and fleet of Fire Fighting vehicles and equipment, which we are very proud of. One of our most important roles as firefighters is making sure the annual training requirement of our firefighter are completed. We were also fortunate to get additional State Certified Training including EVOC, HAZMAT OPS, S130-190. Just recently we were able to meet with a Maine Fire Training Coordinator to set up a Firefighter qualification training program for newer members.

We were able to get a state instructor up here for FREE...to get all Firefighters EVOC certified, (emergency vehicle operation certification). This was a 16 plus hour certification course including a driver qualification test, which all firefighters successfully passed. Also the Aroostook County EMA office sponsored a Hazmat Awareness & Operations level class with hands on practical test giving us a lot of Hazmat knowledge. This course was a 24 hour certification course.

The most recent training was the Forestry S130-190. This class is to be able to fight Forest Fires and how to use forestry tools (hand tools, portable pumps, water sources, radio communications, fire shelters etc.) This class had 16 plus class room hours and 10 hands on (field) hours. This gives the VBFD the capabilities to work hand in hand with the Maine forest service and the equipment that they use on forest fires.

Lastly the Fire department has applied for a FEMA / FAG (Fire Act Grant) to replace aging equipment that no longer meets NFPA standards. This includes; all brass 1 ½" attack line hose, a hose testing machine that will allow us to test the hose to current NFPA standards, a Thermal Imaging Camera that will replace a 20 year old camera, new SCBA carbon fiber bottles, structural firefighting gear for the entire dept. The total project cost is \$160,000.00. If we are awarded this grant, we will be obligated to pay 5% which will be \$8000 I think that would be a good deal if we are approved.

In closing I would like to Thank All Who Support the Fire Dept. and all the Fire Fighters, spouses and families on the fire department for their dedication!!!

The Van Buren Highway consists of one director and four employees who maintain the town's infrastructure and roadways.

Our fleet of equipment and tools require regular maintenance. The fleet consists of two plow trucks, one motor grader, one pay loader, one backhoe loader, one street sweeper, one sidewalk snowplowing tractor and four snow hauling trucks. The town purchased a new Volvo L90 payloader; the loader is the backbone of our daily operations.

In 2015, the Van Buren Wastewater Treatment Plant treated over 260,000 gallons of sewage sludge. Infiltration continues to be a problem throughout our collection system. Homeowners can do their part by removing sump pumps and roof drains from the sewer system.

The treatment plant and two pump stations received new pumps this year. This project was funded entirely from wastewater surplus and C.I.P. funding.

Successful grants and low interest loans from rural development and CGBG will help fund the Ferry Street and High Street Sewer Replacement Project. This project should get underway soon.

We've recently been experiencing an alarming number of clogged sewer lines and clogged sewer pumps because of foreign material being flushed down the toilets or poured down drains. The sewer lines and sewer pumps stations are designed to handle water, human waste and tissue paper only.

Examples of what should not be flushed down toilets or poured down drains are as follows:

- Baby wipes, toilet wipes, towelettes, disinfecting wipes, or cloth wipes of any kind (even if the container indicates that they are "flushable")
- Paper (other than toilet paper/tissue)
- Medications
- Feminine hygiene products of any kind
- Beauty products, Q-tips, dental floss
- Grease of any kind especially cooking grease
- Pesticides, fertilizers, paint, varnish and paint removers
- Motor oil, anti –freeze, gasoline or any explosive material

All of the above items mentioned should be thrown out with your household trash or disposed of properly. Remember... only water, human waste and tissue paper should be flushed down toilets. Clogged sewer lines and pumps lead to sewer backups into homes, which are expensive to clean and repair. This cost is incurred by you the sewer rate payer.

The Waste Water Rate committee and Town Council both recommended a 2% rate increase this upcoming year.

Town Council has the final decision on setting, amending, adjusting and abating any and all fees listed or not listed, as needed. The following definitions should be used to determine which classification all customers would fall within. If the Council feels a customer does not fall within any listed classification, they may determine a rate for that particular customer. This rate schedule supersedes all previous schedules and should be reviewed and if applicable adjusted annually.

Rate Classification Definitions

- R1 Single family home, each duplex or apartment unit attached or non-attached at the same location are a combined total.
- R2 Same as R1 with a business operated out of the same location attached or non-attached.
- R3 Residential unit with a business such as a child daycare facility, beauty salon, green house or any other business considered high water usage.
- **C1** A commercial entity without any public facilities available and is used by employees only; facilities such as a service office or retail.

- C2 A commercial entity with public facilities available for use on a minimal basis or a commercial entity with no public facilities available but has high usage; facilities such as service stations, car washes, funereal homes, and any other facilities meeting the above criteria.
- C3 Same as C2 but have been identified as unique commercial entities with public facilities available with major high usage; facilities such as restaurants and bars)
- **C4** Hospitals, boarding homes, nursing homes have been designated as a unique commercial entity with less than or equal to 50 employees/customers or combination thereof.
- C5 Same as C4 with more than 50 employees/customers or combination thereof.
- I1 An industrial entity with less than or equal to 25 employees.
- **I2** Same as **I1** but with less than or equal to 50 employees.
- 13 Same as I1 but with more than 50 employees.
- **G1** A federal, state or local government entity with less than or equal to 10 employees or customers housed on a regular basis within that facility.
- **G2** A federal, state or local government entity with less than or equal to 25 employees or customers housed on a regular basis within that facility.
- **G2** Same as G1 but with less than or equal to 50 employees/customers.
- **G3** Same as G1 but with less than or equal to 100 employees/customers.
- **G4 -** Same as G1 but with more than 100 employees/customers.
- V1 Religious organizations such as churches or rectories.
- **V2** Organizations include profit or non-profit clubs or civic organizations.

To the Citizens of Van Buren:

Van Buren Ambulance Service had 776 calls for service for the calendar year ending 12/31/2015. Through the end of May 2016, we have already responded to 378 calls for service – nearly 50 calls higher than where we were at this time last year. This data for can be found at www.memsrr.org by clicking on the map on the right hand side and searching for Van Buren. The 2015 transport totals are broken down as follows:

We are pleased to have been able to finalize a contract with the Teamsters Union which went into effect earlier this year. Since the contract has been signed, we have filled our full-time vacancies and are currently at 6 full-time employees. We are still constantly looking for part-time individuals and there are quite a few training opportunities out there. If anyone is interested in becoming an EMT and helping to serve your community, please contact me and I will provide you with the information on these opportunities.

Our EMT course offered last summer went well. Two of our current full-time employees are students from that course. Additionally, a majority of our current EMT's are in various stages of continuing their education. Four of our six full-time employees and one of our part-time employees are in various stages of completing the education process of becoming Paramedics. By this time next year we should have five paramedics on staff, four of them in a full-time capacity. I want to take this time to congratulate Crystal Michaud and Angela LaPlante on recently becoming licensed AEMT's and Amanda Skidgel on graduating from the Paramedic program at Northern Maine Community College. It is an intensive 2 ½ year course of study to complete the Paramedic program and they should be very proud of their accomplishments. Our service is very fortunate to have employees that have the drive to advance in license levels and help improve the quality of care offered by Van Buren Ambulance Service.

Earlier this year we took delivery of two new Stryker Stretchers to replace our old ones that had seen the end of their life span. It was a much needed, though expensive, replacement. We will need to be looking at the replacement of our 2009 ambulance in the very near future and also looking at being able to replace our Lifepak 12 cardiac monitors which are nearing the end of their support life from the manufacturer.

We currently have four American Heart Association CPR instructors on staff and we have been busy offering CPR, First Aid and Bloodborne Pathogen courses throughout the community. We will be looking at offering CPR training in the community at some point this summer if there is enough of an interest. In the meantime, if your group or organization is in need of any of these courses, please contact me and we will try to set up a course that will meet your needs.

I want to take this time to thank the citizens of Van Buren, Grand Isle, Hamlin and Cyr Plantation for their continued support as well as the Town Manager and other officials from all of these communities. Without your support, we would not be able to provide the services we have been. I am looking forward to working with everyone in the upcoming year.
