# Geology receives \$1 million Kingdom Geoscience software package; plans to participate in international geoscience competition

Marshall has received a \$1,040,850 Kingdom Geoscience software package from IHS Markit (www.ihsmarkit.com), an international company that provides information, analytics and solutions to clients in a variety of sectors. The Kingdom Geoscience Bundle and LoadPAK are industry-standard tools and technology that are used by geoscientists and engineers to explore for and develop petroleum resources. Now Marshall students will have access to these tools as part of their hands-on education and faculty will be able to conduct and present research at a more advanced and technical level.

These software applications are designed to integrate geophysical and seismic data into 2D and 3D models that are used to discover and develop new oil and gas reserves. West Virginia ranks seventh

nationally in natural gas production and 14th for oil production. With these industries providing critical severance taxes to the state economy, it's crucial that Marshall produce graduates who are experienced with industry software and have the knowledge move the economy forward.

"The Kingdom software is far more advanced than anything we have used before and allows students to work with the same kind of real-world data that are used in industry," said Dr. Ronald Martino, professor and chair of geology at Marshall. "It will allow them to conduct a vastly more comprehensive analysis of petroleum prospects using a workflow that mirrors that used by major oil and gas companies. Our B.S. geology graduates will have training and experience that is rarely encountered in other undergraduate programs. In addition, their participation in the IBA competition will allow then to network with, and be mentored by, industry professionals which will further enhance their employment opportunities."

Martino fielded a team of four senior geology majors who have been granted a waiver to participate in the 2020 Imperial Barrel Award (IBA) Competition, sponsored by the American Association of Petroleum Geologists (AAPG). The Kingdom software donation was necessary in order for them to be able to process and interpret the competition data set provided by AAPG.

It's a competition usually restricted to graduate students, but the Marshall team has experience in basin analysis and prospect generation through previous course study. They will participate in the competition under the leadership of Martino and two petroleum industry mentors, Marshall alum Joe Lemon and Ed Rothman, who both worked for Columbia Natural Gas and Chesapeake Energy in Charleston.

The Imperial Barrel Award program is an annual prospective basin evaluation competition for geoscience students from universities around the world. The rigorous program gives students an opportunity to experience the creative process and high-tech science that are the foundation of today's energy industry. University teams compete for scholarship funds for their geoscience departments and international recognition.

Participants analyze a dataset of geology, geophysics, land, production infrastructure and other relevant materials over the course of eight weeks prior to their local competition. Each team delivers their results in a 25-minute presentation to a panel of industry experts.

Judges select the winning team on the basis of the technical quality, clarity and originality of presentation. The team from Marshall will compete with eight other universities in the regional semifinals April 4.

# Minority Health Institute receives \$25K BRIDGE grant award



Herbert Henderson Office of Minority Affairs (HHOMA) awarded \$25,000 to the Marshall University Minority Health Institute to aid in their efforts to improve community health and economic development in Kanawha County. The pilot program, called Building Resources In Diverse Geographic Environments (BRIDGE), is a comprehensive community revitalization effort with a mission of addressing poverty, improving community-wide health, stimulating labor force participation and supporting economic development. The program also aims to combat substance abuse and improve crime



## Huntington's Kitchen unanimously accepted into prestigious teaching kitchen collaborative



Huntington's Kitchen, the outreach community food center of Cabell Huntington Hospital (CHH) and home of Marshall University's Department of Dietetics, was unanimously accepted into the prestigious Teaching Kitchen Collaborative (TKC). TKC is a dynamic, actionoriented network of thought-leading organizations with existing and/or planned teaching kitchens that are capable of shaping next-generation strategy and collaborative research on best practices for integrative lifestyle transformation.

and then you must go through an application process to be accepted," said Andrew Vaughan, M.D., M.B.A., a cardiologist at Marshall Health at CHH and an assistant professor in the Department of Cardiology at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. "This is a great honor that places Huntington's Kitchen in a network with prestigious teaching kitchens around the world."

Huntington's Kitchen becomes the first TKC member site in West Virginia, joining other well-respected teaching kitchens such as the Culinary Institute of America in New York, Princeton University in New Jersey, Barilla and Barilla Center for Food & Nutrition in Italy and the Cleveland Clinic in Ohio.

"Being a part of this network will allow us, as a medical community, to learn and share best practices with some of the leading organizations dedicated to culinary literacy and integrative lifestyle transformation," said Vaughan, who is also a certified culinary medicine specialist. "We will enhance our knowledge of providing medical students with a deeper understanding of how food is used to shape health."

TKC members benefit from virtual work groups and member-only sharing platforms, and serve as catalysts for enhanced personal and public health across medical, corporate, school and community settings.

Dr. Kelli Williams, chair of Marshall's dietetics department, said the TKC partnership will provide exciting opportunities for students to gain insights and experiences related to community nutrition. "The Department of Dietetics welcomes the opportunity to be part of this collaborative. It provides us unique opportunities to explore best practices in community-based kitchens and engage in research activities to strengthen the impact of community nutrition programs throughout the country," Williams said. "We hope to work with the university's School of Medicine, Mountain Health Network and the collaborative to explore innovations and ideas for growth and development of Huntington's Kitchen. It is a wonderful opportunity and privilege to be recognized for our collaborative efforts and work related to community nutrition."

"Our mission is to help prevent and reduce diet-related disease through education and healthy cooking.

## School of Theatre to present 'The Laramie Project'



The Marshall University School of Theatre and Dance will present "The Laramie Project," a play by Moises Kauffman and participants of the Tectonic Theatre Project. The production will be at 7:30 p.m. nightly from Tuesday-Saturday, Feb. 18-22, with a matinee performance offered as well at 2 p.m. on Saturday, Feb. 22, in the Francis-Booth Experimental Theatre in the Joan C. Edwards Performing Arts Center.

The play discusses the death of 21-year-old Matthew Shepard in Laramie, Wyoming, who was beaten, tied to a fence and left to die in October of 1998, and the aftermath. The prevailing view is that he was the victim of a hate crime because of his sexual orientation, and the play is based on over 200 interviews by Kauffman and other participants in the Tectonic Theatre Project, conducted with people of Laramie after Shepard's death. The result is a moving theatrical experience that explores the bad and good of humanity.


"Mr. Shepard's story is just as relevant today as it was 22 years ago," said Samuel Kincaid, project coordinator for the School of Theatre.


Tickets are \$20 at the door, \$15 for seniors and faculty, and \$7 for children age 12 and under. Marshall University students are admitted free with a valid ID.




Health has hosted a free dental clinic during National Children's Dental Health Month.

# Gardner reelected to InfraGard West Virginia Board of Directors

Bill Gardner, assistant professor in the digital forensics and information assurance program and the new cyber forensics and security graduate program, has been reelected to the InfraGard West Virginia Board of Directors for a new two-year term.

The board operates the InfraGard West Virginia Members Alliance (IWVMA) and collaborates with the FBI's InfraGard Program Coordinators. The InfraGard West Virginia Members Alliance consists of individual members from academic institutions and state and local law enforcement agencies, as well as professionals who manage critical infrastructure in West Virginia. Members represent the following sectors: chemical, information technology, water supply systems, energy, emergency services, health care and public health, transportation, finance and telecommunications. The members are dedicated to sharing information and intelligence to prevent hostile acts against the United States.

Gardner was originally elected to the board in 2017. His new term begins January 2020.

"It's an honor and a privilege to serve an additional term on the board," Gardner said. "Information is the key to ensuring the nation's infrastructure as new threats continue to emerge."
