- 7. Identify various ways to become a campus leader.
- 8. Identify processes in making ethical decisions.
- 9. Identify personal learning goals and processes leading to attainment of those goals.

STUDENT PERFORMANCE ASSESSMENT METHODS AND GRADING PROCEDURES:

There will be points given for attendance (5 each), journals (5 each). There will be two outside small group experiences (your choice and at any point in the semester) you will report on the experience to the class as a whole so that others may benefit from what you learned/experienced. Each of the reports will be given 20 points. Letter grades will be determined by dividing points earned by total points available.

Grading scale: Traditional Letter Grades 90-100 = A; 80-89= B; 70-79=C; Below 70=F

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Some classes will meet in the evening so that students may experience a planned aspect of UM-M university life. To make up the time, there will be some days when class will not meet.
