"Twilight" is the second ay from her series, "On the Road: Search for the American Charcter." Her first play of the series was the critically acclaimed play "Fires in the Mirror" based on the 1991 riot in Crown Heights, Brooklyn.

Twilight opened in 1993 in Los Angeles, moved to New York City where it was the first non-musical show by a black woman to open on Broadway in ten years. Twilight earned two Tony Award nominations, an Obie Award, A Drama Desk Award, and an Outer Circle Critics Special Achievement Award.

In addition to being a talented playwright, Anna Deveare Smith is also an accomplished actress, featured in films such as Philadelphia, Dave, and An American President, and she plays a recurring role on the television show "The West Wing." She also teaches at Stanford University.

Directing the show is Dr. Tim Raphael, assistant professor in Communications Studies and Theatre. This is his third production at Ursinus College. His first was "Stalin's Daughter," by August Baker. Raphael says his reason for choosing to produce this play was in remembrance of the verdict and the people who were affected by it.

April is the month that the four officers that beat Rodney King were acquitted and the riots oc-

curred. He hopes that we will listen to the poems these people have so that we can leave the theatre and learn from them as their lives were changed in 1992. He also states that he wanted to do what the Greeks tried to do so long ago when theatre was for catharsis.

The play runs tonight, Friday and Saturday at 7:30 pm. There will also be an extra showing on Saturday at 2pm. Tickets are \$2 for students and senior citizens and \$5 for adults. To reserve tickets call 1-610-409-2631.

Adolph Reed To Deliver Pancoast Lecture

On April 24, Adolph Reed will be delivering the Pancoast Lecture at Ursinus. The topic of his talk is entitled, " Has Terrorism Trumped the Domestic, Political, and Economic Agenda?" Reed has been a big proponent for domestic needs in America.

He argues that federal anti-terrorism efforts should not be used as an excuse for the lack of attention paid to domestic issues. He will be discussing, amongst other things, his effort to encourage tu-

ition costs at public colleges and universities to be provided by the United States government.

Adolph Reed received his Bachelor of Science from the University of North Carolina- Chapel Hill in 1971. He than obtained the Doctor of Philosophy in Political Science from Atlanta University in 1981.


Reed is a Professor of Political Science on the Graduate Faculty of the New School for Social Research in New York since 1998. He has also taught at the University of Illinois at Chicago, where

he was a professor of Political Science and African American Studies. In previous years he taught at both Yale University and Northwestern University.

Over the past fifteen years, Reed has published five books including: Class Notes: Posing as Politics and Other Thoughts on the American Scene; Stirrings in the Jug: Black Politics in the Post-Segregation Era; Without Justice for All: The New Liberalism and Our Retreat from Racial Equality; The Jesse Jackson Phenomenon: The Crisis of Pur-

pose in Afro-American Politics: Race, Politics and Culture: Critical Essays on the Radicalism of the 1960s.

In addition to his other accomplishments Adolph Reed served on the American Councils of the American Political Science Asso. ciation and the National Conference of Black Political Scientists. Some of Reed's writings can be found in numerous scholarly journals such as, Urban Affairs Quarterly, Studies in American Political Development and Political theory.

In the past male contraception has been limited to three options: a vasectomy, the condom, or the withdraw method. None of these methods rivals the success, reversibility, and reliability of the oral contraceptives that are available to females.

Researchers in Australia have completed a study on men using an injected type of birth control. Patients in the trial were administered 3 monthly shots of a combination of two hormones. Progestin and testosterone were the two hormones that were injected into the arm of the males in the study. According to researchers this hormonal cocktail was totally effective in preventing pregnancy of the men's partners for two years. The men chosen to participate were fertile and led normal sex lives for the duration of the study

around for over forty years the recent development of this male contraceptive may lead some skeptics to wonder why its male counmaking? There are actually several explanations for this. The first is that in order to develop a an oral contraceptive for women scientists needed only to suppress the production on one egg; whereas with a male contraception they have to suppress the production of a massive amount of sperm.

of contraception, comparable to that of the pill, exists for men is the fact that many large drug companies do not want to invest a large amount of money into creating a product that will only compete with one of their existing products. They

With female contraception do not wan tot create another product that would compete with the success of female oral contraceptives.

The final reason why there is no terpart has been so long in the male contraceptive pill has to do with societal attitudes and taboos. There is not as much of a demand for a male birth control pill because much of American society holds the position that birth control is a responsibility of the female, not the male. There may also be the social taboo, and shame for a man that is associated with not being fertile, The second reason why no form and virile, and to be incapable of producing offspring.

> Although there are many reasons that contraception for men is so slow in the coming, you should be happy to know that there is a range of products currently being tested for such a purpose. One of these methods is an implant device or a

pill that would contain hormone that suppress sperm production This would be comparable to the hormones used in oral contracep tives for women that suppress egg Another option production. works in a manner similar to that o a vasectomy. Rather than an evasive surgical procedure that block the vas deferens (the tube in the penis that carries sperm out of the body), this only involves an injec tion into the vas deferens that de mobilizes the sperm. Scientists have also recently discovered protein that enables the sperm' tail to move. Manipulation of this protein, and its structure could de mobilize the sperm, therefore pre venting the fertilization of the egg For more information visit http: /asrm.org/





Oh, No! Diego!

On Friday, April 5th, Q102 personality Diego Ramos made headlines across radio broadcasting country when he pulled a prank that landed him in handcuffs.

Diego appears on the Chio in the Morning Show on Q102, visiting different people and places as a prankster while the episodes are aired live on the station.

On this particular morning, Diego was at an IHOP restaurant in Northeast Philadelphia to work his prank. He enjoyed a full breakfast, and when it came time to pay, Diego refused to do so; he told the staff of the restaurant that he would come back at a later time to pay his debt, calling himself the "IOU Man."

The whole prank was being aired live on the morning show, via Diego's cell phone. Apparently, the staff did not know that it was a joke and that it was being aired on the radio. When the manager was called and he started getting anxious because of this IOU Man, he called 911 for police assistance in the fiasco.

The police arrived on the scene at 8:15 a.m., lights and sirens blaring. They were told that a customer was trying to pay with an IOU that he would go back and redeem the following week. When the police were told the whole thing was a joke, they were not at all amused; Inspector William Colarulo stated that the occurrence would be investigated as a criminal incident, based on either "recklessly endangering persons and risking a catastrophe," or breaking the wiretapping law because of the use of the cell phone to bring the prank to the airwayes.

The night of the incident, Diego had not yet been charged with anything in particular, but police said they would seek a subpoena to acquire a tape of the prank as it was broadcast.

The first officer to arrive on the scene on April 5th remains unnamed, but was the one who, on March 24th of this year, was also called to the scene of this particular IHOP to investigate an armed robbery by two men. Police were also very upset about Diego's prank on Friday because the emergency call to the officers had come in during morning rush hour traffic, "placing at risk the responding officers, other motorists, and children going to school," Colarulo's report stated.

After asking Diego whether or not he had any means by which to pay for his meal, he continually responded negatively, stating that he also did not have with him any form of identification.

He did, however, offer to wash dishes for 30 minutes.

Officers told him that if he did not show ID and pay for his meal, he would be placed under arrest. As soon as Diego heard the word arrest, reports state that he, at that moment, jumped up and yelled that the whole incident was a practical joke and that he worked for Q102's Morning Show.

Diego was then placed in custody for a brief while.

Colarulo stated, "This was a prank that we don't consider funny. The manager of the IHOP was acting in good faith by calling 911." He also praised the officer that handled the situation, claiming that he had "handled everything by the book."

When the Morning Show jockeys heard the commotion from the incident broadcast by way of Diego's cell phone, station officials called the police station and offered to pay by credit card. Diego was then taken out of custody and released.

What did Diego have to say about the incident? "If we inconvenienced anyone, I apologize."

Inspector Colarulo's remark when initially asked if Diego would be placed under arrest and taken to prison? "If he is arrested, we do not take IOU's for bail."





Each year more than a million people in the United States are diagnosed with the most common forms of skin cancer.

Most people who are diagnosed with non-melanoma skin cancers are age 50 or older, but because these diseases often are a result of too much exposure to the sun year after year with out or little sunblock. Everyone — even the youngest toddlers - should take precautions against them.

Sunlight and Skin Cancer


Ultraviolet (UV) radiation is the single most important cause of skin cancer, especially when the overexposure resulted in sunburn and blistering. Other, less common radiation assocauses of skin cancer include repeated exposure to x-rays and exposure to coal tar, arsenic, and other industrial compounds.
