## New Menigitis Vaccine Law in

We've all noticed that super long line at registration, that wasn't there last year but do you know why it's such a big deal at Ursinus?

There is a new Pennsylvania Law that requires all college students in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. obtain the meningitis vaccine.

The letter you recieved over the summer states that you must either prove that you've had the shot, or waiver your option to get it. That's because the law now requires that all students either have the vaccine, or sign a waiver stating that they would rather not have the immunization.

The fact is that this is a law that was in the making quite a few years ago when it was noticed that college freshman are six times more likely to contract meningitis.

Although not very much is known about meningitis it is known that ages 14-25 are at the highest risk for the disease and that coughing, sneezing, and intimate kissing can transmit the disease.

It is also believed that the college atmosphere, of communal living, moking, and irregular sleep patterns can increase the likelyhood of the disease being spread.





COLLEGEVILLE, Pa.-Fiftyfour Ursinus students presented their research at a total of eight academic conferences at the end of the 2002 Spring Semester. In a typical year, over 200 of the college's students will present papers or posters at such events. Those presenting in the spring

Stephanie Parker, a senior economics and business administration and international relations major from Allentown, Pa., reported on her honors research at the National Conference on Undergraduate Research (CUR) in, Wisc., in April. Her paper was titled "Connections Between Civility and Citizenship at Work: A Preliminary Investigation."

Three Ursinus students, Alicia Morgans '02, of Reading, Pa., Michelle Janelsins '02, of Monkton, Md., and Lindsey Lewis-Calabrette '03, of Quakertown, Pa., were selected to participate in the 6th annual "Posters on the Hill" display, also sponsored by CUR, on April 18 on Capitol Hill, Washington, D.C.

All biology majors, the students presented their joint poster, titled "Analysis of Clonal Diversity Amongst Hybrids of F. heteroclitus and F. diaphanus Using Varied Portions of the Mhc Complex," to Congressional representatives. The goal of Posters on the Hill is to help members of Congress understand the importance of highquality undergraduate research.

stations are good for music in the same way that paved roads are good for images from a year or two ago, when cars - they keep things progressing smoothly. So it might come as a shock to most sensible people that the recording industry has succeeded in pushing legislation, effective Oct. 20, that will probably destroy about 90 percent of Internet radio stations. As in all matters regarding record labels, this one is driven by money.

After the deadline, Internet radio proprietors will be forced to pay seven cents per listener per song. That may not sound like much, but the Internet is a big place with lots of music fans, and that seven cents multiplies rapidly. The result is a bill that vastly exceeds each station's annual income. And since the bill is that is unacceptable. No music is good retroactive to 1998, they will also have to pay for everything they've

head with Napster and succeeded in bringing the file-sharing program to its knees, much to the disappointment of music fans everywhere. But Internet radio is much different than Napster. It uses streaming technology that can't be stored, making it strikingly similar to the radio you listen to in the car everyday.
