## Holy War, Inc. : An Inside Look at Terrorism Networks

"Somewhere there is a group no one has heard of with an agenda no one knows who is waiting to deploy weapons of mass destruction," said Peter Bergen, a global terrorism expert and New York Times best selling author.

The CNN terrorism analyst discussed his knowledge of the current world situation on Wednesday, March 26th at 7:00 p.m. in Olin Auditorium, delivering his message to over 300 students, faculty and staff.

Mixing humor and experience, Bergen began his talk by reporting on the status of al-Qaeda, which he described as an "amazing and disciplined operation." Although the terrorist group has lost its base in Afghanistan due to attacks by United States forces, Bergen believes the group will survive.

A rumored 40,000 people went through al-Qaeda training camps

and if the current war in Iraq results in high civilian casualties, Bergen feels "Al-Qaeda will attract more recruits from the Middle East."

"The planes that struck the towers on September 11 did not come out of the blue," Bergen explained. "There are reasons al-Qaeda did this and many people in the Middle East disagree with U.S. policy."

One of the most outspoken and infamous critics of the presence of U.S. troops in the Holy Land is Osama Bin Laden. For nearly a decade, Bergen has covered bin Laden and the Jihadist terrorist network that operates globally and in secrecy.

He is one of only a few Western journalists to have interviewed the world's most wanted man, face to face.

"We drove into the mountains, the middle of nowhere it seemed,"

Bergen said of the trip to interview BinLaden. "He was tall but stooped over, looking more like a cleric than a revolutionary."

Bergen described the man as highly intelligent and passionate in his rage but nearly whispering when speaking as he explained his reasons for jihad.

Based on that interview, Bergen discredited the commonly held belief that Americans were attacked for their freedoms.

"There is a strong belief that infidels should not be in the Holy Land," he said. "That is the reason. It took a 9-11 to give everyone a sense of this."

"Everyone underestimated him," Bergen said of bin Laden. Bergen also said he was not surprised to learn of the connection to the African embassy bombings.

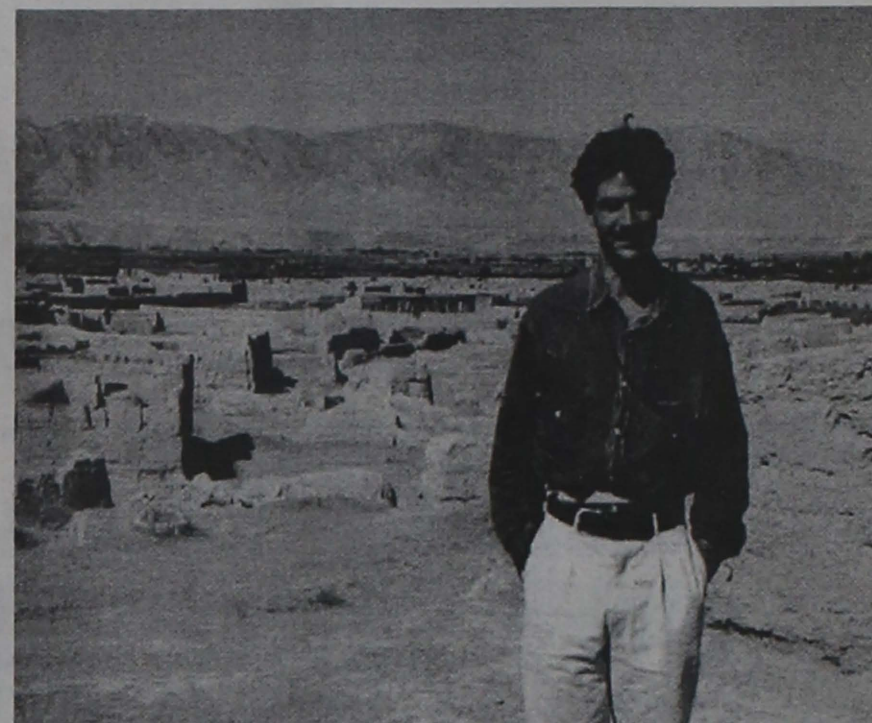
"I knew it was him right away and I think they (al-Qaeda) will

continue to attack us," he said.

When asked what single question he might ask bin Laden if given the chance to interview him again, Bergen responded, "Where in the Koran does it say you can kill innocent people in the name of Allah? It doesn't."

Students were able to talk with Bergen after his talk and experience some of his work. He signed copies of his book after his discussion and Mr. Bergen's latest documentary on al-Qaeda 2.0 aired at 7:00 p.m. yesterday for students to view.

Peter Bergen is the author of Holy War, Inc. about Osama bin Laden and Islamist militant groups around the world. The book has been translated into fifteen languages and was a New York Times bestseller. Bergen has written for a variety of publications including The New Republic, Vanity Fair,



the Washington Post and the Washington Times. In the U.K. he has written for the The Times, The Guardian and the Daily Telegraph. He is presently a fellow at the New America Foundation in Washington, D.C. Bergen is a graduate of Oxford University where he earned a B.A. in Modern History and continues to report for CNN.

## How Safe Are Ursinus Students: An Interview with Mike Ditty

In light of recent concerns about national safety, there has also been some concern about the safety within our little campus community. A lot of cities, offices, and school districts are implementing or updating emergency plans in light of terrorist threats and the recent war. This brings to question; does Ursinus have an emergency plan?

In a recent conversation with Mike Ditty, Director of Campus Safety, he assured me that the college has always had emergency plans. Ditty is currently working with his staff and agencies within the Collegeville area to fine tune these plans in case of a possible emergency.

What exactly is an emergency? They have extensive plans ranging from a building fire, to a downed aircraft, to a leak at the Limerick Nuclear Power Plant. I was told that in the case of a leakage at Limerick, for example, Ursinus is included in Collegeville's plan to evacuate by bus (leaving from Wismer) to Jenkintown Sr. High School.

Since Mike was appointed Director of Safety, last semester, he has had meetings with the Collegeville Chief of Police, the Mayor, the Emergency Operation Center of Montgomery County as well as members of the township, in order to update current emer-

gency plans for the college and make sure they are in working order.

Along with those meetings, there are monthly meetings with the safety staff in order to better train the officers. For example, this month they will focus intensely on fire response techniques. Ditty is also looking forward to working more closely with S.E.R.V. to incorporate their skills with those of safety to insure the campus community the best service possible. I also asked about updating the buildings on campus with fire systems. He is working with Physical Plant on this and they have a schedule of what buildings will be done when and so forth, but rest assured that it will be done.

In other Safety News...

The safety department has recently retired the old safety jeep with a brand new Ford Explorer. It's not lettered yet and its blue, but Mike assured me that it is much more reliable than the jeep.

Also as a side note, but worth mentioning, safety now has a new system of identifying the owners of unregistered vehicles their license plate number. So, if you aren't registered, don't be surprised if a ticket appears under your wiper and a price gets added to your school bill. It's all apart of making Campus Safety more efficient.

## Ursinus "Wired" Since 1946

Almost all students at Ursinus have Dell laptops, signifying the technologically advanced school that is Ursinus. It should then come as no surprise that the first computer, the ENIAC (Electronic Numerical Integrator and Computer), traces its roots back to this college; specifically in the basement of Pfahler.

John W. Mauchly, the co-inventor of ENIAC, was a professor at Ursinus. He got his graduate and undergraduate education at Johns Hopkins University. He graduated from the Johns Hopkins School of Engineering in 1927, then transferred to the Department of Physics as a graduate student. He finally received his Ph. D from that university in 1932.

He went to Ursinus in 1933 to become a physics teacher. At the time, there was no physics department, so he became the depart-

ment. He was a very smart man and friendly to all of his students.

Mauchly worked very late at night, loved talking to people, and was the typical absent-minded professor. He was also quite unconventional with his teaching styles.

For example, during the Christmas lectures, he would take a board and attach roller skate wheels on it and prove some laws of motion. (It is also rumored that he invented the first skateboard this way). During one lecture, the laws of motion proved to be too great for him as he fell and broke his arm.

When he wasn't doing all of this, he began to build a computer. He wanted a machine that would help him with his weather research, making calculations faster than the calculator could. Mauchly's hypothesis was that weather changes are cyclical and directly affected by solar activity (this was later

disproved as there are too many variables).

Before long, his computer was well under construction in Pfahler. He soon met J. Presper Eckert, the other co-inventor of ENIAC. This was when Mauchly left Ursinus to work at the University of Pennsylvania.

Initially, their project saw a lot of skepticism as it was being built in a university, but they pressed onward. It wasn't before long that war broke out in the United States. The Army then contracted Mauchly and Eckert to work on the computer for 100,000 (the final cost was 486,804).

However, they finished their project after the war, in 1946. When it was unveiled, it began solving addition problems at a rate of 5,000 per second.

It was a success, and the ENIAC

was launched in the annals of computer fame. However, others wanted to take credit for this invention, especially the University of Pennsylvania. The school wanted Mauchly and Eckert to sign over the rights to ENIAC to them. Needless to say, Mauchly and Eckert refused. They were fired.

Then the duo had patent battles with other computer companies. Unfortunately, they lost the patent to ENIAC in 1973. Had they mentioned Mauchly's early stages of work at Ursinus, the patent would have stayed with them.

John Mauchly never lived to see the computer revolution. He died January 8, 1980. His work has changed the world and left a legacy behind that everyone can see, but few know where the computer came from, or who started it...until now.

The Ursinus College women's gymnastics team scored 181.325 to finish 3rd at the NCGA Division III National Championships in Eau Claire, Wisconsin.

It is the Bears' highest finish in school history. The University of Wisconsin-

LaCrosse captured its third straight national championship with a 183.950, while Cortland finished second with a team score of 183.775.

Ursinus won the balance beam with a 46.325 and scored a 43.550 to finish third on bars.

Kristen Grimmel and Megan Hollern garnered All-American honors in the all-around competition.

Grimmel posted a 37.000 to finish second, while Hollern was fourth with a 36.700.

In the individual competition, Hollern earned All-American honors on the uneven bars, finishing third with a 18.675.

Grimmel finish sixth on beam (18.725) to earn All-American honors in that event.

Tuesday the girls were defeated by the nationally ranked College of New Jersey Lions by a score of 14-2.

The Bears were outplayed by a much more experienced Lion squad. College of New Jersey sprinted out to an 8-1 lead at the

half and never looked back.

The second game of the week ended just the same with the Bears falling short to Haverford, 5-2.

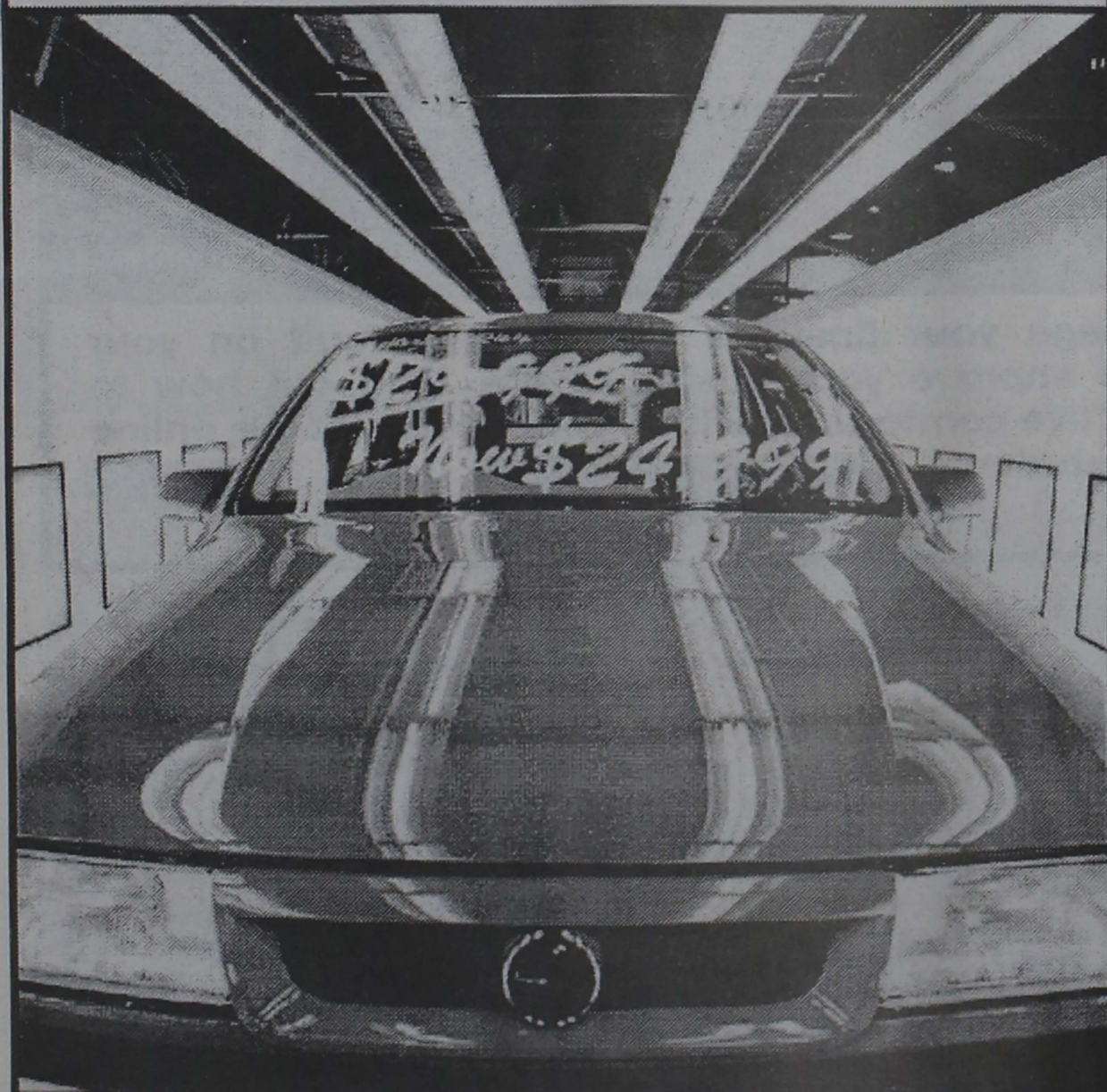
