Happy School Year! Still time to register for MSU spring semester classes

To begin a new decade in 2020, you can begin or continue your higher education journey at a top 20 public university in the South and one of the safest college campuses in the nation.

New or returning Morehead State University students can still register for MSU's 2020 spring academic term. Classes begin Monday, Jan. 13, 2020, at all MSU locations. Registration for Spring 2020 is available online at my.moreheadstate.edu.

For those not yet enrolled who are considering attending MSU, there is still time to apply for the spring term.

Current students also may view and pay their bill online. Those who are registered for the spring semester will receive monthly e-billing statements via their MSU email account. 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MSU ranked safest campus in Kentucky

Morehead State has been ranked as the safest college campus in the state of Kentucky by the National Council for Home Safety and Security.

The council compiled data from 490 college campuses across the country, looking at crime reports from local law enforcement and the FBI. The list considered two variables: crime rate and police adequacy. The complete list is available at <u>www.alarms.org/safest-colleges</u>.

MSU fosters an environment dedicated to the safety of our students and is consistently ranked among the safest campuses in the Commonwealth and the nation.

"Our main mission is the safety of the campus community and we exert all of our efforts with this in mind. Our officers do a great overall job of making this safe campus even safer," said MSU Police Chief Merrell Harrison. "We are constantly trying to improve, to come up with innovative ways to improve campus safety. We also recognize our law enforcement partners in the community, including Morehead Police Department, Rowan County Sheriff's Department, and Kentucky State Police. These agencies do a great job in their respective jurisdictions, which help to keep our campus safer."

The MSU Police Department (MSUPD) is staffed 24-7, 365 days a year, and offers numerous tools to keep the campus community safe, including a free after-hours shuttle service to transport students on and around campus at night. MSUPD provides weather and safety alerts via text and email and through the Live Safe smartphone app, students can report crimes and suspicious activity and contact police in the event of an emergency. LiveSafe provides for emergency communication between the campus community and the police department. Harrison says the most important tool the police department has in keeping students safe is the students themselves.

"Information sharing is the key to keeping our campus safe. With our safety app, LiveSafe, as well as other means of contacting us, we gather an abundance of important information from students and the rest of the campus community to enhance our operations further," he said.

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Dr. Chris Miller co-authors book on educational technology leadership

Dr. Chris Miller, Dean of the College of Education and professor of education at Morehead State and Dr. Anthony A. Piña, associate provost for teaching and learning at Sullivan University, have a newly published book by Springer publishing called "Lessons in Leadership in the Field of Educational Technology."

According to the publisher, the book focuses on sharing the lessons learned by leaders in the field on how they became a leader and what leadership means. The primary contributions address three central questions:

- What is your story about how you became a leader?
- What lessons have you learned about being an effective leader?
- What advice would you give others to become a leader?

Additionally, the book spotlights the impact that past leaders have had on current leaders and upon the field of educational technology.

"This book idea came out of a presidential panel session at the 2017 international convention of the Association for Educational Communications and Technology," Miller said. "We found that many people were not familiar with the stories of leaders in the field and what they learned as they developed as leaders. It was important for us to ensure the diversity of experiences and stories from around the world for current, developing and future leaders to learn and be inspired by some of the best in the field."

Morehead State University has been named one of the nation's Best College for Financial Aid by LendEDU.com. MSU was ranked 165th out of 829 public and private colleges and universities. It is the fourth-ranked university among all Kentucky higher education institutions and the best public university for financial aid in the Commonwealth.

"President Dr. Jay Morgan and MSU's administration do their best to keep our costs as low as possible, and then the financial aid staff uses the federal, state and institutional financial aid, along with private donations, to build financial packages to help students afford the cost of college," said Tim Rhodes, assistant vice president for the Office of Enrollment Services. "Caring about our students, being aggressive with trying to find enough financial aid to help, having quality faculty and providing quality student service makes MSU a great university and a great place to find success."

LendEDU.com is a website that helps consumers learn about and compare financial products, including student loans, personal loans, credit cards, insurance products and banking products, among others. Using data from the National Center for Education Statistics and Peterson's Financial Aid Dataset, its study considered need-based financial aid, non-need-based financial aid and financial aid for international students at 829 colleges and universities in the United States. The report was conducted to help future college students better understand which colleges may be affordable for them by taking into account more than just the cost of attendance.

At MSU, more than 90 percent of undergraduate students receive some financial aid. Helpful financial aid counselors are available to avoid any confusion and make the process as stress-free as possible. The application for admission also automatically makes prospective students eligible for institutional scholarships, as well as to research and award additional financial support.

Shows are held each Saturday throughout the month at 11 a.m., 1 p.m. and 4 p.m.

The 11 a.m. family show this month is "Stars: The Powerhouses of the Universe." Narrated by Mark Hamill, it focuses on the lives of the stars, how they are born, how they die and how human understanding of the stars has changed over time. From Native Americans to Newton, from the electromagnetic spectrum to Einstein, we will explore nebulae, star clusters, pulsars, black holes and more.

Join us at 1 p.m. to see "Awesome Light II." Using the large telescopes at the summit of Maunakea in Hawaii, like the James Clerk Maxwell, the Submillimeter Array, Caltech Submillimeter and Very Long Base Array observatories, we will explore star-forming regions, Jupiter's atmosphere and stunning submillimeter views of M51 and M87.

Following each full-dome video presentation, we will provide a live star talk highlighting our Kentucky skies. We'll show you the planets, stars and constellations you can see in your backyard the night of the show.

At 4 p.m. is "Laser Hypnotica." Techno music and lasers go together perfectly, and that is the mix that is Hypnotica. This program offers a mixture of techno and ambient electronic music taken directly from the latenight rave scene. Reflecting influences from hip-hop, soul and pop, this dance-based program with a rock-band feel will entertain the audience with pulsing beats, incredible imagery and dazzling laser light effects.

Tickets for planetarium shows are \$3 for adults, \$2 for seniors and children five and older and free to children under four and MSU faculty, staff and students. Tickets for laser shows are \$7 for adults, \$6 for seniors and children five and older and free to children under four and MSU faculty, staff and students.

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Mason County High School Eagle Scholars visit Morehead State

Eagle Scholar students from Mason County High School visited Morehead State University's campus Friday, Jan. 17. They had a tour of campus and met with MSU admissions staff and students.

Approximately 60 high schools and area technology centers offered MSU Eagle Scholars classes last fall with nearly 3,000 high school students participating in the program.

"The Eagle Scholars program allows students to take rigorous college courses during high school. The classes are the same classes that are offered on the Morehead campus. They are taught by local teachers through a partnership with Morehead State. The instructors meet the same high academic standards that are required of MSU faculty. These courses are challenging and allow students to be exposed to college coursework and utilize campus services like tutoring and the library," said Joel Pace, program director.

Qualifying students are given the opportunity to prepare for the future while attending high school. In the program, students may enroll in a course taught in their high school and receive college credit for successful completion. The program allows qualified high school faculty, who meet accreditation standards, to teach the University courses.

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MSU one of eight Kentucky colleges awarded National Science Foundation's EPSCoR grant

Morehead State University, along with six other Kentucky schools, is collaborating with the University of Kentucky (UK) on the Kentucky National Science Foundation's (NSF) EPSCoR (Established Program to Stimulate Competitive Research) grant. Those institutions have been awarded a five-year, \$24 million grant to support the fundamental science needed to advance next-generation manufacturing technologies, flexible electronics and robotics. The grant will also support the development of a greater STEM-literate workforce.

The project is titled the Kentucky Advanced Partnership for Enhanced Robotics and Structures (or KAMPERS) and will harness the collective research power of 40 multidisciplinary researchers from the eight Kentucky universities and colleges. These include MSU, UK, University of Louisville (UofL), Eastern Kentucky University, Kentucky State University, Somerset Community College, Transylvania University and Western Kentucky University. Each of these institutions has developed niche areas of expertise to become leaders in next-generation manufacturing technologies.

Dr. Kouroush Jenab and Dr. Jorge Ortega-Moody, both assistant professors of engineering and technology management at MSU, received \$500,000 to develop the laboratory for training in Condition Based Maintenance (CBM), Sustainable Advanced Manufacturing (SAM) and Industrial Controls. The MSU research team includes one post-doctorate candidate, two graduate assistants and two Undergraduate Research Fellows, all supported by the grant.

In next five years, the team will have a close collaboration with the UK and UofL research teams to develop testbed and modules in MSU's 21st Century Center for Manufacturing Systems for the following priorities: industrial controls, condition-based maintenance, and sustainable advanced manufacturing theories; training modules/workshops for manufacturing technician workforce and K-12 summer program; outreach to advanced manufacturing; support advanced manufacturing entrepreneurs; and an augmented and virtual reality laboratory (AVRL) to simulate real behavior of industrial and manufacturing equipment, training in the areas of control, automation and electrical maintenance. As a result, this project will forge partnerships with industries and other stakeholders and prepare a well-trained workforce capable of meeting the needs of advanced manufacturing sectors in Kentucky and beyond.

Gordon appointed full-time director of athletics at Morehead State

After serving in an interim role since April 2019, Jaime Gordon will now assume the full-time position of director of athletics at Morehead State. Gordon's appointment is effective on Feb. 1, 2020.

Gordon, who recently concluded his 17th season as the head coach of the Morehead State Volleyball program, is the winningest coach in the school's history in any sport. He has guided the Eagles to 309 victories since 2003.

"I am grateful for the faith and confidence that President Dr. Jay Morgan and Vice President for student Affairs Russ Mast have placed in me. Morehead State has shaped the lives of my family and me for the past 17 years," Gordon said. "I have been blessed to build a life working with young women during some of their most transformative years. Intercollegiate athletics is a tremendous vehicle to help young people develop into the best versions of themselves. I will remain committed to that charge and do all I can to support the exceptional work that our faculty does in educating all of our students."

President Morgan believes Gordon's leadership qualities will continue to enhance and improve all aspects of the department.

"Coach Gordon has provided a tremendous amount of leadership to our athletic program during the past eight months as interim athletic director and we are very pleased that he will be continuing on as our permanent athletic director," he said. "His reputation as a leader, an experienced and quality coach, and an advocate of student-athlete success both in competition and in the classroom made him a natural to fill this position."

Gordon has always strived to ensure students have the most positive experience while competing and making progress toward their degrees at Morehead State and wants that to continue to be at the heart of the department's goals.

"In athletics, we will echo the institutional commitment to place the student at the heart of every decision," he said. "We have an exceptional collection of coaches and staff who are dedicated to excellence both in the classroom and on competition venues. Much of this can be credited to (former director of athletics) Brian Hutchinson and his commitment to MSU."

While leading the department as director of athletics, Gordon will continue to be the head coach of the volleyball program.

"I am indebted to the trust that Dr. Morgan has placed in me. I am honored for the opportunity to guide a department that I have so much respect and gratefulness for," he said.

Gordon has led volleyball to seven Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) regular-season titles and 10 campaigns with 20 wins in the past 14 seasons. The Eagles also won Ohio Valley Conference Tournament titles in 2011 and 2013, earning berths to the NCAA Tournament both seasons.

His program has won eight OVC Team Academic Awards and 12 consecutive Team Academic Awards from the American Volleyball Coaches Association. MSU has also achieved eight straight Academic Progress Rate public recognition from the NCAA.

Gordon also oversaw the implementation of the Beach Volleyball program in 2017, one of just five full OVC member institutions with a Beach program.

Gordon has guided three players to earn All-American honors from the American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) and six who have earned AVCA All-Region accolades. During his leadership, four student-athletes have won OVC Player of the Year awards, while five have been named OVC Freshman of the Year. He has been selected OVC Coach of the Year three times.

Numerous players under Gordon have also been named CoSIDA Academic All-District and Academic All-Americans. The Eagles have been leaders in earning nods on the OVC Commissioner's Honor Roll and being awarded OVC Academic Medals of Honor.

He started his coaching career at Henry Clay High School in Lexington. He had successful stints at both West Virginia Wesleyan College and the University of Kentucky before coming to Morehead State.

A three-time graduate of the University of Kentucky, Gordon earned bachelor's degrees in architecture in 1994 and art history in 1996. He also received a master's degree in sport management in 1996 and is currently pursuing a Doctorate in Educational Leadership from Morehead State. He is also an active member of the AVCA.

As a player, he spent six years as a member of the nationally ranked Kentucky men's club team. He served as a three-year team captain and was selected to the 1994 U.S. Olympic Festival Team as an alternate.

Gordon and his wife, Ashley, are parents of two daughters, Sydney and Jamison. Sydney graduated from the Craft Academy for Excellence in Science and Mathematics at Morehead State.

MSU education program recognized in Teacher Prep Review

Morehead State University's Bachelor of Arts in Elementary Education (P-5) program was recognized by the National Council on Teacher Quality (NCTQ) in its 2020 Teacher Prep Review, specifically on the preparation it provides to elementary teacher candidates in how to teach children to read.

This program was part of a small group – only about a quarter of programs nationwide – to qualify for an "A" by providing a combination of the following:

- Explicit instruction on each of the five components of reading instruction;
- Support for instruction with high-quality textbooks that accurately detail established principles of scientifically based reading practices; and,
- Evidence that teacher candidates must demonstrate mastery through in-class assignments, tests and fieldwork.

"I am exceedingly proud that MSU ranks in the top 26% of institutions offering early reading within traditional elementary programs. I regularly hear from alumni and school district personnel about the high quality of reading preparation MSU students receive and it is gratifying to see that it is recognized at a national level as well," said Dr. Christopher Miller, dean and professor in MSU's College of Education. "We have amazing faculty in education that focus on trying to prepare our students to become the best possible teachers in the field. This recognition demonstrates the quality of the hard work our faculty put towards teacher preparation."

The NCTQ Teacher Prep Review evaluates the quality of programs that provide preservice preparation of teachers, including both traditional and nontraditional programs. The university-based and college-based preparation programs that were assessed are responsible for producing 99% of traditionally prepared teachers.

MSU's Bachelor of Arts in Early Elementary (P-5) program prepares future teachers to provide quality, research-based instruction to children in primary through fifth grade. Students work with faculty members who have years of experience working in P-12 schools before teaching in higher education. Class sizes are small to foster close interaction with professors and other students in the classroom, providing opportunities for individual mentoring to support growth as an educator.

It wasn't Bailey Richardson's first time taking a summer job when she wasn't attending Morehead State University, but it was the first time her summer job resulted in her making an appearance on a popular CBS reality show.

As a supervisor of food and beverage for Dippin' Dots ice cream stands at the Kentucky Kingdom amusement park in her hometown of Louisville, the junior nursing major was recently featured on an episode of "Undercover Boss," where Dippin' Dots CEO Scott Walker went in disguise to visit Kentucky Kingdom's Dippin' Dots carts and the company's production plant in Paducah.

"The producers told me that we were filming for a documentary on buying a franchise of Dippin' Dots. That 'Brad' (Walker's fake name), a former welder, wanted to purchase a franchise. I kind of thought that they just wanted to make a documentary on all of the different aspects of Dippin' Dots," Richardson said. "I guess it was kind of weird to me that he wanted to go from welding to an ice cream company, but, hey, I wasn't one to judge."

During the show, which aired on CBS on Jan. 22, Richardson talks about her background and how losing her older brother, Devin, to heart failure inspired her to become a nurse. She ultimately chose MSU due to its size, cost and beautiful "safe feeling" campus. Richardson feels like her experience in and out of the classroom has equipped her to make an impact in her field.

"I think what has prepared me the most for life after college is, for one, making the choice of going away. I have learned so much being on my own these past three years," she said. "I also think my professors have truly prepared me for what is to come in my career."

At the end of the show, when Walker revealed his identity to Richardson, he gave her \$20,000 to use toward her schooling. He also provided a luxury vacation to Universal Studios Hollywood on Walker's private jet for her and her family and offered \$20,000 to establish the Devin Webb Foundation, a charity to raise money to battle heart disease.

"The biggest thing to me that came from 'Undercover Boss' was the breath of fresh air it gave to me and my family. It seriously was the light at the end of the tunnel. My family has been through so much more than I even mentioned on the show. It was so nice to have something good happen after so much bad," Richardson said. "It gave me hope and strength that I needed, me and my family."
