SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

THE ONENESS OF ALL PEOPLES

Acts 10:3-15, 28-32, 34-35, 44-45.

This chapter relates the circumstances in connection with the first preaching of the gospel among the Gentiles. Although Christ had commanded His disciples to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature, they had been somewhat slow in undertaking this glorious task. The Jews had enjoyed exclusive privileges, but they had abused them. Their attitude towards the Gentiles was that of a disdain. They arrogated to themselves the opinion that they were better than others and that God loved them only. As yet, they did not believe that the Lord's salvation was available to the Gentiles, as well as to Israel. They had thought that the Gentiles were outside the covenant mercies of God, and without any possibility of salvation to his favor. Some even believed that no Jew, however wicked, would be condemned, and that no Gentile, however righteous, would be saved. But, this opinion makes it clear that the grace of God is for all men, and that the Lord will save all who receive Christ as their Saviour.

Cornelius, a Gentile, was a military officer in command of a hundred soldiers at Caesarea. He was a God-fearing, duty-performing, unselfish and hospitable man. He was a man who was a man in whom he saw an angel, appearing to him. Imagine the task that came to him when the angel told him to send to Joppa and seek for Peter, who would instruct him as to what he should do. Cornelius did as the heavenly messenger told him.

School Officials Set State Meet

FRANKFORT, Ky.—Superintendent of Public Instruction Wendell P. Butler today called a conference of all city and county school superintendents to be held here Dec. 17 and 18 for a discussion of school problems. The conferences will be held in co-operation with the Kentucky Association of School Administrators.

Theme of the Conference will be "The Superintendent as an Administrative Leader."

The recent amendment to the Constitution dealing with distribution of school funds is to receive considerable attention at the conference, with President Lyman Ginger of the Kentucky Education Association and Butler scheduled to speak on Kentucky's school future.

Union County Superintendent of Schools Carlos Oakley will preside at a banquet. There will be panels on such topics as school finance, buildings, and transportation which various superintendents may attend.

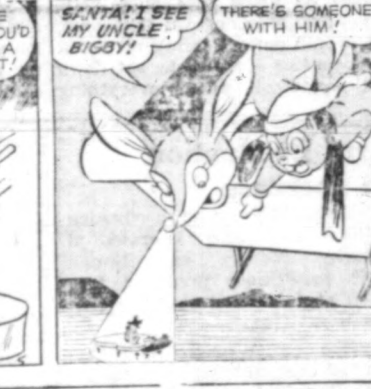

Mr. Bosch cites case after case of bungled or about-to-be-bungled conservation or flood control projects in Louisiana, and as usual the Army Corps of Engineers appears to be one of the major culprits.

Public Apathy Dangerous To Conservation

BATON ROUGE, La.—The two greatest threats to fish and wildlife conservation are public apathy and the failure of certain government agencies, and private firms, to recognize the vast economic, recreational, and esthetic value of our wildlife, according to Charley Bosch, executive secretary of the Louisiana Wildlife Federation.

In an article for the November issue of the Louisiana Conservationist, Mr. Bosch declared that the public's and certain agencies' indifference to wildlife values constitute the conservation program's "fifth" and "sixth column" respectively.

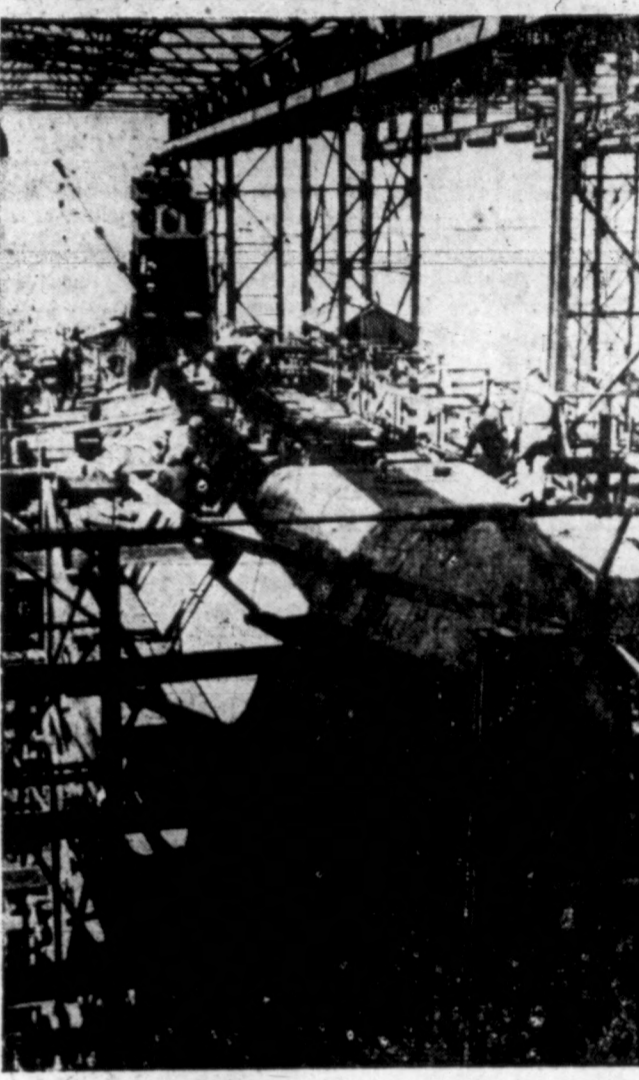
But, as far as the fifth column is concerned, "all can be forgiven if the members will now work to control the sixth column (which) is the most dangerous," he continues, and then urges every citizen to exercise his voice and vote to prod the guilty agencies into correcting their mistakes.

Mr. Bosch reminds us that the value of wildlife and fisheries in the state of Louisiana "is greater than the annual value of all livestock in the state, two-thirds the value of all farm products, and greater than any single crop in Louisiana." Furthermore, at least 25 per cent of Louisiana residents' hunt or fish, and, of course, the very real yet intangible esthetic value of wildlife should also be remembered.

Yet, in spite of this overwhelming evidence of the value of wildlife, "the so-called progress made has not been progress at all." Outmoded and useless methods, such as restocking and predator control, are still relied on. Moreover, "the so-called progress has benefited small minority groups at the expense of the majority. . . . Has alleviated present conditions with little or no regard to the needs of future generations. . . . (and) has sided small areas with no consideration given the damage done miles away from the project area."

Retirement Funds Total \$26 Million

FRANKFORT, Ky.—Kentucky's Teacher Retirement Fund—which aggregated more than \$26,035,000 last June 30—are being managed efficiently and investments are producing a yield of 2.646 per cent a year, according to State Auditor T. Herbert Tinsley in a report released today.

Funds for administration, averaging approximately \$50,000, are well within the four per cent maximum set by law for that purpose, the auditor added.

The fund is built up by teacher payments into the fund, matched by an equal state contribution. In addition, the fund earns interest on its total investment.

The current investment includes \$25,400,000 of which all but \$100,000 is in United States Government bonds. The latter sum is invested in voted bonds of the Ashland School System.

Payments into the fund last year totaled \$4,266,414.37 — including teacher contributions of \$1,474,460.29; State contributions of \$2,161,720.02 and interest earnings of \$630,234.06.

Disbursements included \$62,768.93 for administrative purposes; re-funds of \$312,979.48; retirement allowances of \$646,647.25 and investments of \$3,053,856.82.

Farm Production On Increase

Frankfort, Ky.—Food production on the same farms operated at Kentucky Welfare and Mental Health institutions produced food valued at \$681,582 during the first 10 months of 1953.

A report issued by the State Division of Agricultural Production shows that food produced was sufficient to supply each patient and inmate with 1.25 pints of milk and 21 pounds of vegetables a day. The value of food produced an acre was \$121.89.

The State Reformatory at La Grange had the top farm with food valued at \$221,721. Other farms

were, in order, Central State Hospital, Lakeland, \$151,554; Western State Hospital, Hopkinsville, \$134,801; Kentucky State Hospital, Danville, \$122,391; Eastern State Hospital, Lexington, \$106,433; State Penitentiary, Eddyville, \$99,448; Kentucky Training Home, Frankfort, \$67,023; Kentucky Village, Greendale, \$61,783; and Kentucky Children's Home, Lyndon, \$29,330.
