Muscular Frank Stranahan of Toledo tries to become the first American ever to win the British Amateur Golf tournament three times when he tees up here against Harvey Ward at Prestwick, Scotland.

Dapper Lloyd Mangrum of Chicago carries a three-stroke lead in today's third round of the Western Open Golf Tournament at St. Louis. Mangrum took the lead yesterday with a par 70 while Tommy Bolt of Durham, N.C., and Carlos Gascara of the lead at 18 holes.

The rematch between lightweight Chuck Davey and Chico Walker originally set for June 11 in Detroit has been postponed to June 25th in New London, Conn.

The ICAAAA track and field meet takes into the final stage today at New York with a trip to California and the Olympic trials leading for winners.

Mythen stable's stretch-running Master Fiddler is the overnight favorite to win today's featured Peter Pan Handicap at Belmont Park. The mile and one-eighth, 2:26 event has attracted a total of 110,000 bettors.

A total of \$5,900,000 in bets were placed on the race. The favorite, Master Fiddler, is a 2-1 shot.

At the first contest, Bill Pierce, who came in after Ron Kline held St. Louis scoresless until the ninth, gets the win. Roy Staley, who relieved Clyde Boyer in the ninth, is the loser.

The Chicago Cubs got two hit pitches from Bob Bush to win the nightcap 11-0, nothing and sweep the twin bill from Cincinnati. Bud Evers stayed in all the way for the loss.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 31 (UP)—A twist of fate gave the young driver in the field of 33, yesterday in the 300-mile Indianapolis race.
