
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### How Do I Use My Activity Book?




A bone marrow test will be done before I go into the hospital.





Radiation is like invisible medicine that I get while lying in a bed in a quiet room. I can watch TV or listen to music. My mom and dad can't stay in the special room, but the nurses can watch me on a TV, just like a movie star. Radiation doesn't hurt, but it does make me feel sick and tired later.



After conditioning, I could get an infection. To help protect me from germs, all of my visitors must not have a cold or the flu. Good handwashing is very important. Everyone must wash their hands when they come into my room. It's okay to remind people to wash their hands when coming to see me.

Good handwashing takes a long time. Singing "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star" is exactly the right amount of time to wash my hands. Here are the words so I can teach all my friends and family:



Twinkle, twinkle little star

Like a diamond in the sky

Eating is also important. I may not feel like eating, so I will probably have to start hyperalimentation, or HA. HA is liquid food given through my central line.

My HA bag will hang on an IV pole. Other things hanging on my IV pole are: (circle)

Hydration	PCA Pump	Stuffed animal




Cut on the dotted lines, and hang from your IV pole.





#### Graft-Versus-Host Disease

When my new cells start to grow, I may get GVHD. If it affects my skin, I'll get an itchy red rash. If it affects my gut, I may have belly pains, throw up, or have diarrhea. If it affects my liver, my skin will turn yellow and my stomach will get bigger.

I will be on special medicine to treat GVHD.




























I will have a tutor for at least one year after my transplant because I cannot join my class in school until my new immune system is really healthy. I'll be ready to join my class when I get well.




Sometimes I feel angry and don't know why.

I am the captain of this ship. This is a picture of where I will go.




When my counts reach a magic number and when I start to eat and drink, I may be able to leave the hospital. Now comes more hard work.

Snacks give me energy and help make me strong.



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#### **GLOSSARY**

ALL:

See "leukemia."

Allogeneic:

Stem cells that come from someone else such as your mom

or brother or even someone you don't know.

AML:

See "leukemia."

Amphotericin:

Medicine given for fungal infections. It is given through

your central line.

Antiemetic:

Medicine that helps with upset stomach &/or throwing up.

It may be given in your central line or by mouth.

Anesthesia:

Medicine that makes you sleep during surgery or for a test.

It may be given through your central line or by a mask.

Antibiotic:

Medicine that helps with bacterial infections. It may be

given through your central line or by mouth.

Aplastic Anemia: When your bone marrow doesn't make enough healthy red

and white blood cells.

Attending:

Doctor who is the leader of your team.

<u>Autologous:</u>

Stem cells that come from you. They are frozen and may

smell funny when you get them given back to you.

Biopsy:

When a sample of a part of your body is taken and looked at

under a microscope, such as a small piece of your skin, lip, or

bone marrow.

Bone Marrow:

Liquid found in the middle of your bone that makes

platelets, red blood cells and white blood cells.

Bone Marrow Aspirate: Test that is done to check your bone marrow for bad

cells or to see how well your new cells are growing. It is the test that is done in the bone above your bum while you are

asleep.

Calcium:

Nutrient that helps to build strong bones and teeth.

Calories:

A measurement of how much energy your food gives you.

Cancer:

A word used for many diseases where bad cells grow

uncontrollably.

Central Line:

Tube put in your chest while you are asleep. It is used to

give all your IV medicine and blood products.

Chaplain:

Person from a church that works with patients/families in

the hospital.

Chemotherapy:

Medicine given to kill the bad cells. It is usually given

through your central line or by mouth.

Child Life Specialist: Person who helps make your stay special and teaches you

about things that happen in the hospital. They also give you

fun stuff to do.

CML:

See "leukemia."

Conditioning:

Medicine or radiation that makes your bone marrow ready

for it's new stem cells.

Constipation:

When you can't poop.

CT Scan:

Test that takes a picture of a part of your body. You lie on a

skinny table and slide through a "donut hole." The machine

makes a whirling sound as it takes the picture.

Culture:

Test to see if you have an infection somewhere such as in

your blood, snot, poop or pee.

Cyclosporine:

Medicine to prevent graft vs. host disease.

Diarrhea:

When your poop gets runny and you make lots of it.

<u>Dental Hygienist:</u> Person who checks your mouth and teeth to make sure they

look healthy.

Dentist:

Doctor who fixes cavities or broken teeth.

Dietitian:

Person who works with you to find foods that you can eat

to help you feel better and give you energy.

EKG:

(Electrocardiogram) Stickers are put on your body so that a

machine can draw a picture of your heart beating.

Emesis:

When and what you "throw up."

Endoscopy:

Test done while you are asleep that takes pictures of your

throat and stomach.

**Engraftment:** 

When your new stem cells start to grow.

Fellow:

Doctor who examines you daily and can answer your

questions.

Fluid:

Liquid that your body needs. It can be given in your IV or

you can drink it.

**GVHD**:

(Graft versus host disease) A reaction that your skin, liver or

stomach ("qut") may have because it hasn't gotten used to

your new stem cells.

HA/TPN:

(Total Parental Nutrition / Hyperalimentation) Liquid

nutrition that is infused through your central line.

<u>Hickman:</u>

Another name for your central line (Dr. Hickman invented

it).

ICU:

(Intensive Care Unit) A special room where you stay when

you need extra close monitoring.

IGG:

(Immune Globulin) Medicine given to help boost your

immune system to help it fight infections. It is given

through your central line.

Infection:

A "bug" found in your body that may cause a fever or make

you feel bad.

IV:

(Intravenous) Another name for putting medicines/fluids

into your Hickman central line.

Kidney:

A part in your body that makes urine. You have 2 found

near your back.

Lab Tech:

Person who looks at your blood under a microscope.

Leukemia:

Cancer that starts when blood cells are very young. They

take over the good cells and make you very sick.

Liver:

A part in your body that filters out yucky stuff. It is found

near your stomach.

Lungs:

A part in your body that makes you to breathe. You have 2

located in your chest.

Lymphoma:

Cancer cells found in your lymph system (the lymph system

helps fight infections).

Magnesium:

Nutrient that helps the cells in your body to work well. You

need lots of magnesium when taking cyclosporine.

MMF:

Medicine that is given for "gut" GVHD. It usually comes in a

pill.

MRI:

Picture taken by a big camera while riding into a tunnel. It

is very loud and sounds like a jackhammer. You may have to wear a helmet if the picture is of your head. It doesn't

hurt and you may be asleep during it.

<u>Mucositis:</u>

Sores in your mouth, throat and lips caused by your

conditioning.

Nasal Wash:

Test that may be done when you have a runny nose. Water

is put in your nose and then taken back out.

Nausea:

When your stomach feels upset.

Neuroblastoma:

Cancer in the nerve that is found in your chest or tummy.

PA:

Physician's assistant.

PFT's:

(Pulmonary Function Test) Test to see how well your lungs

work. You will be asked to blow as hard as you can into a

big tube.

Physical Therapist: Person who helps you to get exercise by playing fun games.

<u>Platelets:</u> Cells that form blood clots and help you stop bleeding.

They are given through your central line.

<u>Pneumonia:</u> Infection in your lungs.

Potassium: Nutrient that helps your heart beat normally. You need lots

of potassium when taking prednisone or amphotericin.

PRBC's: (Packed Red Blood Cells) Red blood cells carry oxygen from

your lungs to the rest of your body. They are given through

your central line.

Prednisone: Medicine used to prevent or control GVHD. It may make

you feel moody and hungry and make your cheeks look fat.

It can be given in your central line or by mouth.

Primary Nurse: Special nurse who is picked to take care of you and plan your

care.

<u>Protein:</u> Nutrient that helps you to build strong muscles.

Radiation: Invisible medicine that kills bad cells. It is not a medicine

that you have to take in your mouth or central line. You get to go to a special room and lay in a bed to receive it. It doesn't hurt during the treatment, but it may make you feel

sick later.

Relapse: When your cancer comes back.

Respiratory Therapist: Person who gives you oxygen or other special medicine

to help you breathe better. You just breathe in the

medicine.

<u>Scheduler:</u> Person who sets up your appointment in the clinic.

SCIDS: (Severe Combined Immune Deficiency Syndrome) A disease

where you don't have enough infection fighting cells.

Social Worker: Person you can talk to about your feelings. They can also

help your mom & dad with things during your transplant.

Spinal Tap: Test done to see if any bad cells live in your spinal fluid (in

your back). You will be asleep during this test.

Stem Cells: Cells that grow into healthy white blood cells, red blood

cells, and platelets.

Steroid: See "prednisone."

Surgeon: Doctor who operates on you.

Surgery: Operation done in an operating room with lots of doctors

and nurses. You will be given medicine to make you sleep.

TBI: (Total Body Irradiation) See "radiation."

<u>Transfusion:</u> Red cells, platelets, or stem cells that are given through your

central line.

Ultrasound: A way to take pictures of a part of your body. Cold jelly is

used to help a magic wand see the picture better.

VOD: (Veno-Occlusive Disease) Your liver gets sick from chemo

or radiation. It can make your tummy swell and your skin

look yellow.

Volunteer: Person (who is not paid) who can visit you, play with you,

and help your family while you're in the hospital.

Weight: How heavy you are. You will be weighed on a scale every

day while you are in the hospital.

X-Ray: Picture taken of a part of your body. It doesn't hurt at all.




