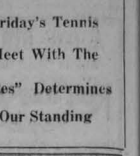

College Has Enviably Athletic Record; Wins R.M.C.; Three State Football Championships

Y. NET ARTISTS WIN 4 MATCHES FROM U.

Now Hold R. M. C. Track and Field Championship Strong in Minor Sports

In order that the visiting high school students may become acquainted with the position or condition of the colleges as to athletics and may better sense the importance of the institution in the athletic realm the Editor of Athletics deems it practical and advisable to give a brief history of Athletics at this college. It is by means of complete and is of necessity condensed because of the need of space. The first teams of Cedar R. L. Romney dates back to 1918 when he first assumed the reins as athletic director. Following are a few recaps from the files of Student Life.

Football: In six seasons from 1918 to 1923 the football team have played 43 games, won 20, lost 13 and tied two. The first Rocky Mountain Championship was won in 1920. The team in 1921 and 1922 and tied for the championship in 1924.

Baseball: In six seasons last season the team have played 43 and won 26. The casual assistants led for the championship in 1920. The team has also finished second place in the Utah race for four seasons. Tennis: Utah State Championship in 1922 and 1923. In 1922 four men representing the college lost to the finale in the Rocky Mountain Doubles Tournament, one composed of Miles and Herrick with Fred Youngling. The visiting team under the capable instruction of George Nelson was the state finalist in championship last winter and looks good for a repetition next year.

The only dual Track Meet of the Aggie, held at Provo, resulted in the 5-2 tie. It is detrimental to the cause of 5-2 tie to 4-2 tie. The track squad was capable of taking another championship and is headed in that direction. The tennis team as yet has not been able to repeat. It is not a discouraging in view of the fact that only one letter man of last years team has returned and all the other men are relatively new to the game.

Aggies Drop Second Meet to Artists From Y. University
