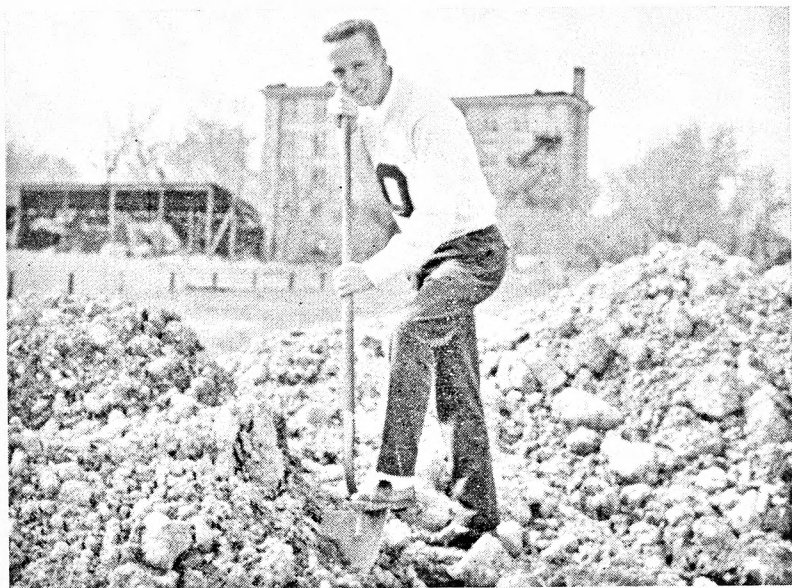

As old Olivet prepares to assume a major role in supporting the new "Better Roads for America" campaign organized by the foreign legion road builders, six buildings including Burke Administration Building, Chapman Hall, Memorial Library, Williams Hall, Miller Dining Hall, and Birchard Field House will be torn down this week to make way for the new Illinois super cross-

country highway which will cut directly thru the campus. This announcement was made recently by Jim Bedsworth, president of the Student Destruction Council.

Committee chairman of the building destruction program, Dick Wreckit Reiss, said that if Olivet gets the prestige and recognition it wants from the Foreign Legion road builders then these buildings gotta go. Dick also states "we gotta get behind this thing and give it all we've got, gang!" Mr. Reiss is asking all students interested in volunteering to bring their shovels and picks and meet on the "big green" behind the library at 7:00 p.m., Monday evening for a little pep rally. Instructions on organizing a wreckit crew will also be taken care of at this meeting.

Charlie James, president of the Wrecker Service Club said he was sure his wrecker service could take care of any wrecking which may not be completed by next week. He also stated that he has been consulting with engineers from the world famed Building Blasters, Inc. of Manteno, and he is sure we are winning recognition for the "classic" plan they have given us to blow up the entire remaining campus by Friday. Although Charlie is not at all in favor of seeing dear old Oliver destroyed, he feels that it is his and every student's patriotic duty to support this terrific "road" campaign. To sum it all up, Charlie says — "what ever will be, will be."

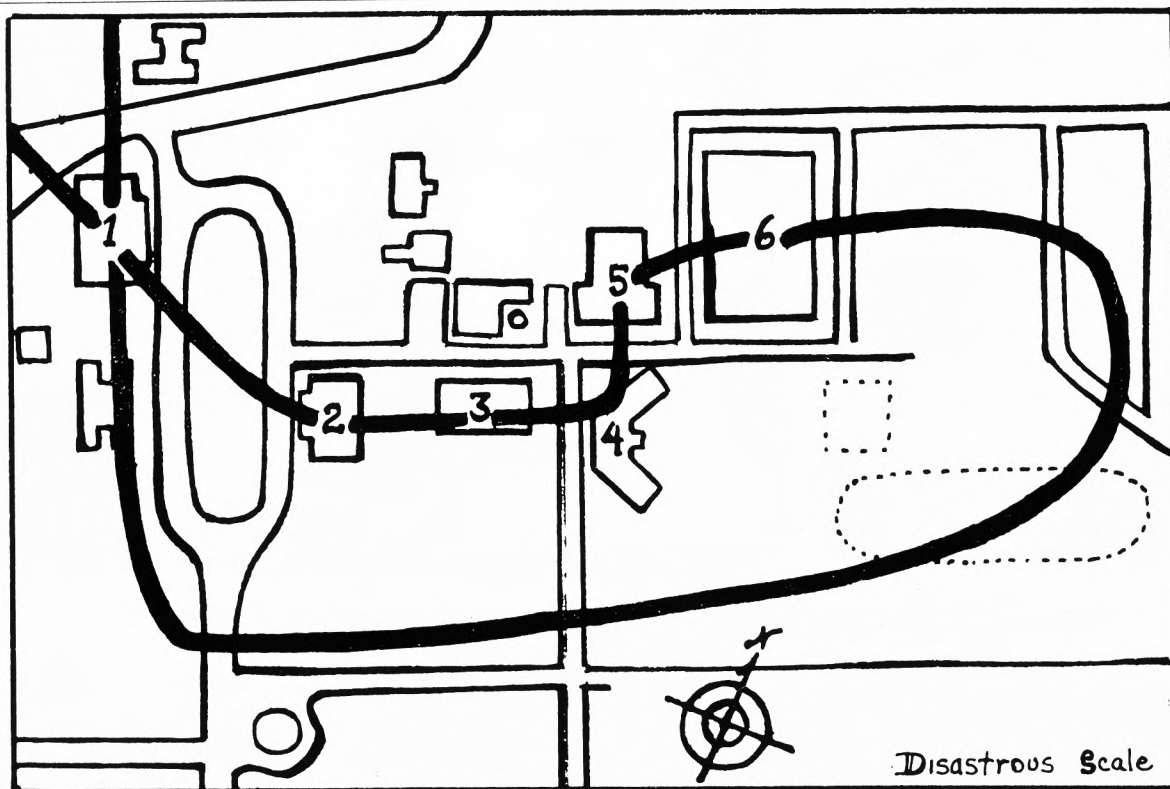

POOCS POONS

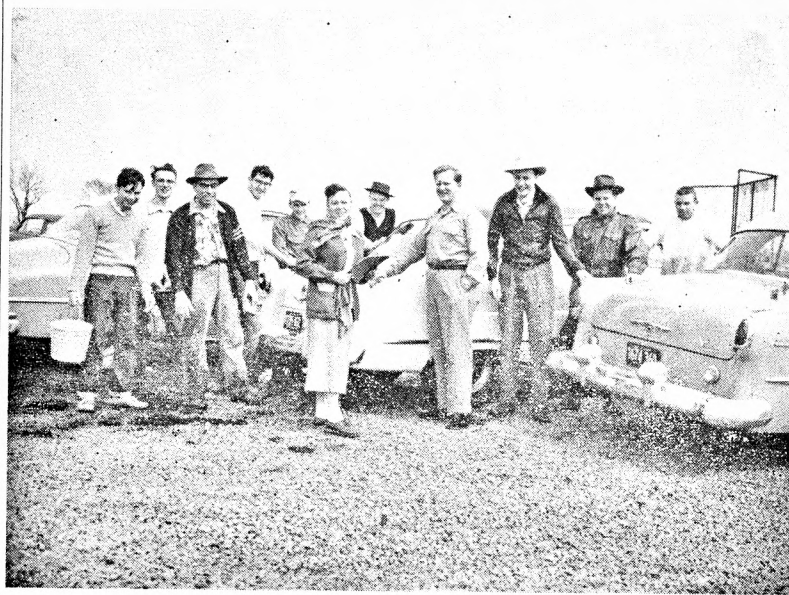

When last seen, Merwyn was headed for Burke Administration Building to pose for another picture to be used in uplifting student morale.

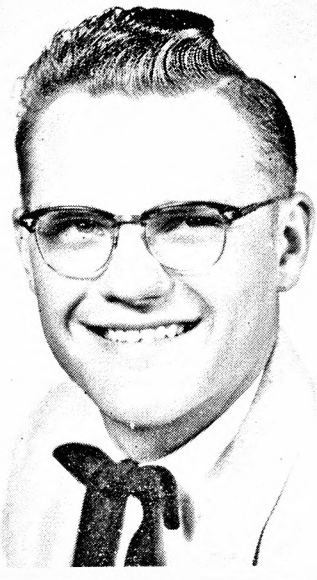

4. Don't eat. Save your food for the big Pike's Peak picnic.

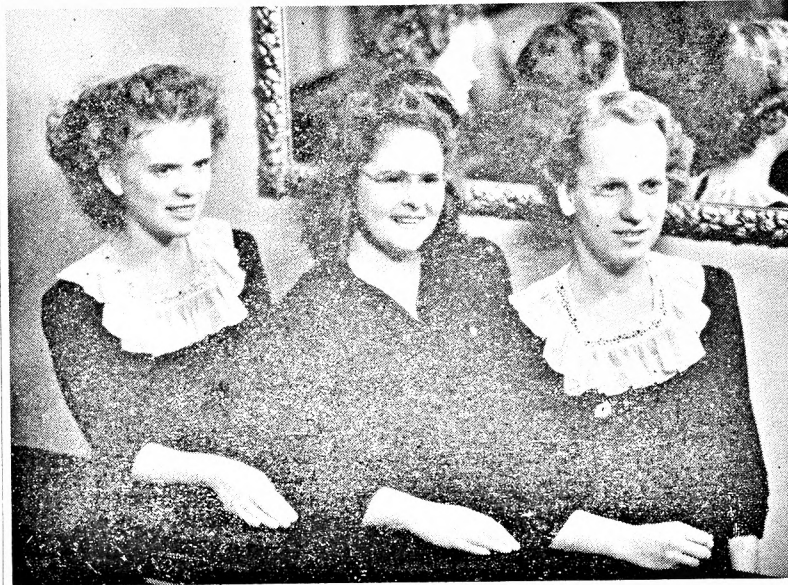


PROF. SCHWADA HAS THIS TO SAY

TREBLE TONE TRIO TO TOUR EIGHT FOREIGN COUNTRIES

Much of Olivet's future lies in the hands of these three girls, as the impressions which they make on the foreigners during their journeys will either make or break us, kids. Any free donations of sharp clothing for these girls will be greatly appreciated and gladly accepted.

Rev. John Swearingen, Field Secretary, announced today that a drastic change will have to be made in the itinerary of the Treble Tone Trio this summer.

"My lands," said Rev. Swearingen, "we're in a terrible mess now. Our whole educational zone has been taken from us due to the 'Better Roads for America' Campaign."

"Our only alternative is to tour the whole world. After all, our relocation is the Alaskan Klondikes will be very conducive to young people of every land and nation."

"There is no telling where this thing will end" said Swearingen.

"I'm counting on our trio to bring us through to victory. I predict that by 1960 our total enrollment will be at least 35,000."

The Treble Tone's tour will be in order as follows:

Borneo, May 4, 1958; Nova Scotia, July 5, 1958; Ethiopia, August 1, 1958; Stockholm, November 3, 1958; Constantinople, January 16, 1959; Madagascar, March 25, 1959; Soviet Russia, June 11, 1959; (yes - our gals will even tackle the "Iron Curtain"), Canary Islands, August 32, 1959; Belgium, September 10, 1959; Christmas Island, December 31, 1959; Yugoslavia, March 13, 1960, and the tour will end in Siberia, June 30, 1960, so near the Klondikes that the girls plan to take a flying leap across the Bering Strait to Alaska's frozen shore where

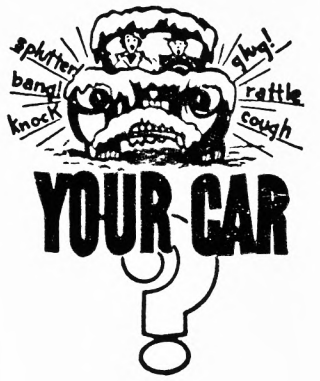
thousands of Eskimo Olivetians will be anxiously awaiting their return.

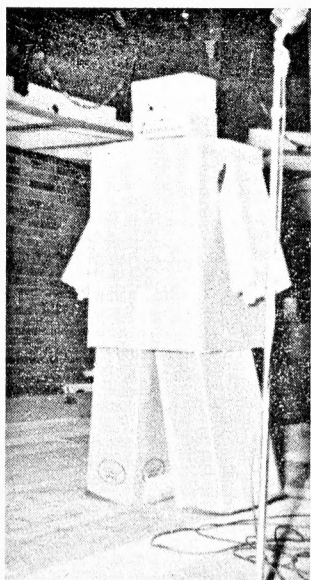

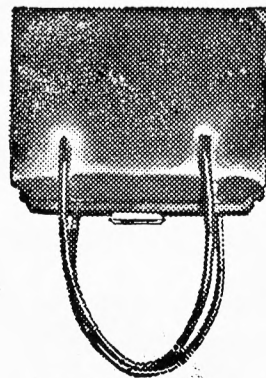
