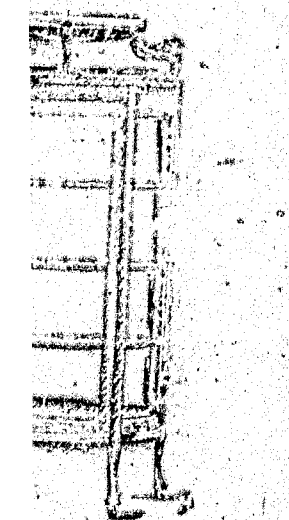

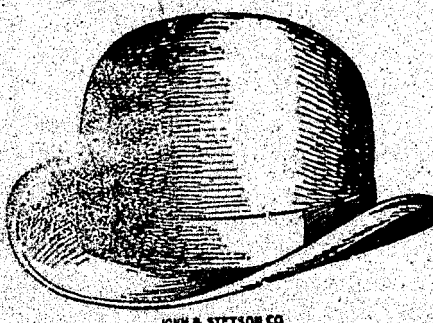

ENSLEY ARRESTED COMING NORTH

STOCK, FARM, FIELD, GARDEN.

Notes in Regard to Various Items of Interest to the Farmer and Stockman.

J. S. Brown sold and delivered to Springfield parties, this week a fine Polled Jersey calf.

Frank Townsley, shipped three cars of fat hogs last Saturday. The consignment represented first class stock. Hogs for shipping are said to be rather scarce at the present time. Many of the farmers in the north side of the township have had heavy losses from cholera.

A 700 pound Chester White hog was marketed at Millersburg, Ohio, Friday. Mr. Calhoun, the raiser, has others which will weigh 400 to 600 pounds.

E. S. Kelly will have a car load of his stock at the International Live Stock show at Chicago, Nov. 28 to Dec. 5.—Yellow Springs News.

Patrick Mahoney, a farm hand of Derby, Conn., saved \$5,200 in working 32 years on a farm at \$12 per month. Just think of it! He only changed employers three times and in all those years only spent \$44.90 an average of less than 12 cents a month. He has gone back to Ireland to spend the rest of his days.

Mrs. Lucy Beach and E. E. Cole have purchase of S. W. Durlinger, trustee under the will of Eliza Crisman, deceased, nearly all the remainder of the Crisman land in Oak Run township, five miles south of London. The parcel, except one small tract lies north of the Mt. Sterling and London pike and embraces 780.62 acres, the consideration being in the neighborhood of \$43,000, or about \$55 per acre. This is one of the biggest land deals of the year.—London Democrat.

D. W. Black, of Lyndon, one of the foremost stockmen of this section of the country, and well known in this county, is preparing to take a fine bunch of Hereford cattle to the coming fat stock show in Chicago. Mr. Black won the grand prize on the pen of fat cattle in the 1901 show and the many who have visited his farm and seen the present bunch of cattle say that they are better than the prize cattle. Mr. Black has twenty-four head of two-year-olds, born on the famous Adam ranch in Texas, which he is getting into shape. He will take all of them to the show but only fifteen will be selected to enter.—Fayette County Record.

A correspondent of Breeder's Gazette puts the oft repeated query, "Why is it that all veterinarians advise the feeding of old hay in preference to new and trunks of race horses and fitters of high class carriage horses invariably use old hay till they are forced to use the new?" This question has been answered many times, but apparently there are always many men who desire to have the reply made all over again. Old hay is preferable for the reason that it has entirely passed through the process of sweating or fermentation. This renders it much less likely to cause digestive disorders in the equine subject. Again, many different sorts of insects lay their eggs on the stems of the grasses which enter into the composition of hay. These remain on the stems when the grass is cut down, and the process of curing does not destroy their vitality; hence when new hay is fed these eggs, replete with life, are taken into the horse's stomach and there hatch out, causing much trouble. Then in all new hay there is much more water than in old hay, and as the nourishment comes from the dry matter a lesser quantity of the old hay does the same work of nutrition and the old is for that additional reason to be preferred. Those are the main reasons for the preference of all good horsemen for old hay.

Export of Cattle and Sheep. Exports of cattle and sheep have resumed from Boston and Portland, in New England, to Great Britain and Ireland. Swine, however, are still under the ban, the prohibition of landing such animals from New England ports still remaining in force, says the Breeder's Gazette. This raising of the quarantine in cattle and sheep in the United States for the reason that it will provide carrying space, which has not been available since Great Britain scheduled these animals last winter. Some of the cattle carrying ships which formerly plied between Boston and Liverpool, London and Hull have since the scheduling of Portland and Boston changed their American destination to New York, Baltimore or Newport News, and hence the increase in space may not be so large as might be expected, but for all it is to be hoped that a wholesome fillip will be given to the trade.

As every grape grower knows, posts are ordinarily put in the ground scarcely last as long as it requires for the vine to come to bearing age. The trellis illustrated is designed to obviate this waste of wood and labor. It will be seen that the part of the braces and posts buried in the earth are joined to the upper portion by mortise and tenon. By this arrangement, when the buried posts are decayed, they can be renewed easily without loss of that part which is yet in a state of preservation, and which will last a lifetime. If painted, posts and braces are joined in a similar manner at the top, being held in their respective places, both above and below, by loose fitting pins, which permit their easy withdrawal. By removing the side braces, the trellis can be laid down on its side, permitting the vine to be covered for the winter, if protection is necessary.

SPARROWS AND CARP.

Assisted Immigrants, Which Are Considered as More Worthless Than Beneficial.

German carp which were put in some of the southern lakes of Wisconsin years ago seem to have done more harm than good in eating the eggs of bass and other fishes, and a plan has been suggested for getting hold of the large, almost worthless, creatures in large quantities, shipping them east and riding the lakes of their undesirable presence. But the carp does not want German carp, alive or dead. They are a coarse, rank, unpalatable fish, dwellers in mud. It was a mistake ever to import them, as it was to import English sparrows, says the New York Tribune.

WAYS OF THE BURRO.

The burro of to-day has degenerated woefully in the matter of speed. While his ancestors could outrun the swiftest horse, the burro is very much opposed to movement of any kind. It requires the constant application of a stout cudgel to induce him to move even at a slow gait. But he comes not to his slow-footedness that has lost to him by right of heritage. Slowly but surely the burro lands his pack at its destination. He waits not for the dinner whistle to blow; he belongs to no union. He is ready to eat at all times if there be anything to eat; if there be nothing the burro does not worry. If he can't get hay, he will take whatever happens to pass above ground in the way of vegetation; if no vegetation is in sight, he contents himself with calmly waiting." —From "The Patient Burro," by Thomas H. Davies, in Four-Track News.

HOW RAFFING IMPROVES WOOD.

German experts say that wood which has been floated in rafts, or otherwise, gives a more trustworthy material for joinery and building purposes than does that which has been carried, or otherwise carried dry, to the sawmill and workshop. The reason is that while the raft is lying in the water its sap and albuminous and salty materials are dissolved out. If these substances remain in the wood they readily absorb moisture from the atmosphere, after coming out of the drying rooms, and the wood swells. Artificial processes of washing out the hygroscopic substances from wood which has been floated are practiced in Germany.

ALUMINUM IN PLANTS.

Hitherto aluminum has not been found in plantain or other plants, or at most only in minute traces, although cryptogams appear to use it as food material. Mr. H. C. Smith, of Sydney, however, has recently found it in one tree belonging to the Proteaceae, viz., *Orthea excelsa*, E. Br., in even greater abundance than it is found in any of the cryptogams. In a paper read before the meeting of the Royal Society of New South Wales, Mr. Smith showed that this tree uses aluminum almost to the exclusion of other mineral elements, and that the aluminum is deposited in cavities and natural fissures as a basic succinate. —Scientific American.

UNCLE SAM'S MAIL BILLS.

We spend some ten millions of dollars a year more than any other country in the world in carrying our mails, and most of this excessive expenditure goes to pay for the unremunerative work of delivering mail on the outskirts of civilization. In spite of Russia's great size and England's remarkable efficiency in handling her mails, the mail routes of the United States are some 315,000 miles longer than those of any other country, and we employ some 8,000 more workmen to handle them, and have fully 30,000 more post offices. —St. Nicholas.

MOSQUITO CAMPAIGN.

The Suez Canal campaign reports that in consequence of the campaign conducted by Maj. Ross of the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine, the number of cases of malarial fever at Ismailia has decreased in a most noticeable manner, and that the ordinary mosquitoes have been annihilated almost absolutely, so that even in the worst period of the hot season it has been found possible to dispense with mosquito netting. Mosquitoes are systematically killed, and all places where larvae can be hatched are successfully guarded. —London News.

PARROTS INCREASING.

Each year the burden of Chicago landfills is added to by the sale of 2,000 parrots to flat dwellers, and the demand is increasing rapidly. The birds are usually brought to this country from Cuba, Mexico and Africa by sailing vessels, the slow voyage gradually accustoming them to the climate. Any good parrot should say a word or two at three months of age, and at the end of a year should pick up expressions readily. So common have they become that unless a varied vocabulary is used they are seldom noticed. Where there was formerly one dealer in domestic pets, who sold parrots, there are now a dozen. This alone will give an idea of the increased demand for these birds.

SOIL THAT BREEDS FINE HORSES.

In describing experiments made for the department of agriculture on the effects of lime and magnesia upon animal production, D. W. May, of the Kentucky experiment station, remarks that it is a well known fact that the greatest development in live stock has been attained in limestone regions. He adds that in the bluegrass region of Kentucky, long noted for the beauty and quality of its live stock, and especially of its thoroughbred horses, the soil has been formed largely by the disintegration of a limestone very rich in phosphorus. But even in that favored region, the experiments are under way to determine whether the quality of the animals may not be improved by the addition of certain mineral elements to the food.—Youth's Companion.

CHECKMATING ANTS AND ELEPHANTS.

In constructing the power transmission line from the Cauvery falls to the Kolar gold mines in Mysore, India, which was recently completed, the American engineers employed to do the work had to deal with some uncommon problems. The line, 32 miles long, is carried on lofty poles through the jungle. Here the depredations of white ants and wild elephants had to be prevented. The ants attacked the poles at the top and the elephants at the bottom. Iron sockets seven feet high were found to be effective against the ants, and after careful measurements of the highest reach of the elephants' trunks, the wires were strung at a safe elevation.—Youth's Companion.

TOLD OF GLADIATORS.

Gladiators' biography tells of a royal party at Windsor in Queen Victoria's reign which, after dining, instantly took to cards. The sums involved were not, however, enormous. "I found," writes Gladstone, for once a gambler, "I had two shillings twopence at the end of which eight pence was paid me by the prince. I mean to keep the two penny piece the distance I cannot identify accordingly." This unique confession of his gambling prowess would scarcely expect to be prized by a serious statesman.

WHERE GIRLS ARE ESSENTIAL FIRST.

In a recent report on the results of extended measurements of mental traits in the two sexes, Prof. E. L. Thorndike said that in the measurements of abilities the greatest difference found was the female superiority in the tests of impressibility, such as the rate and accuracy of perception, verbal memory and spelling. In these matters girls are almost one-third of the boys reach the median mark for girls. In general the girls were found to be mentally less variable than the boys.—Youth's Companion.

EXPLANATION OF THE FAILURE OF GREEN HUNTERS WHEN OUT AFTER BIG GAME.

The usual number of disguised sportsmen are complaining of their inability to hit what they shoot at in the woods. The cause of this inaccuracy is not generally understood. "I've been in the woods for years," said a returning hunter to the Sun correspondent, "and it can't be the rifle, because I know that's all right; but I might just as well admit that I employed my magazine at a fine buck and never touched a hair. I can't understand it."

The real cause of this kind of shooting, according to an old guide, lies in the city man's eyes. The average city resident, confined within houses in the greater part of the year, becomes so accustomed to seeing at short distances only and to looking at familiar objects of the city, that he cannot see clearly at a distance in the forest and amid unfamiliar surroundings.

Not only is his vision blurred because of this, but often when he does see he is unable to gauge accurately the distance that lies between him and the game. This is particularly true of shooting from the woods at an animal standing against the sky or dim in forest or undergrowth.

Shooting at a mark does little good, but preliminary trips to the country for the purpose of distinguishing objects at long range would very soon overcome the fault. As it is, the hunter with a short time at his disposal hardly gets accustomed to new surroundings before his time is up, and this often accounts for poor marksmanship. The bird hunter or one who is accustomed to long vision rarely has this trouble, even though he is an indifferent marksman.

A NEW IDEA

And the Interesting Story of Its Development



PROBABLY there are not a hundred persons in the United States who are familiar with the interesting history of the development of the system which has come to be designated as the "Battle Creek Idea," though no longer presented in its original form. The system has become quite widely diffused throughout the civilized world.

Among the 140 members of the community, most of whom afterward became eminent in various professions and callings, were Emerson, the philosopher; Bronson Alcott, the transcendentalist; Thoreau, the interpreter of nature; Margaret Fuller, the educational reformer; Charles Dana, the founder of the New York Sun, and Hawthorne, one of the greatest literary lights of the century. The Brook Farm experiment failed for lack of financial management, but the ideals survived.

A little less than 100 years ago a fourteen-year-old peasant boy, who was barely able to read and had not been taught to write, while engaged in cutting wood on a mountain near his home, observed a wounded deer baying its injured leg in one of the numerous springs which abound in that particular region. Preussnitz soon after suffered a severe accident from which the physicians were consulted declared he could not recover. 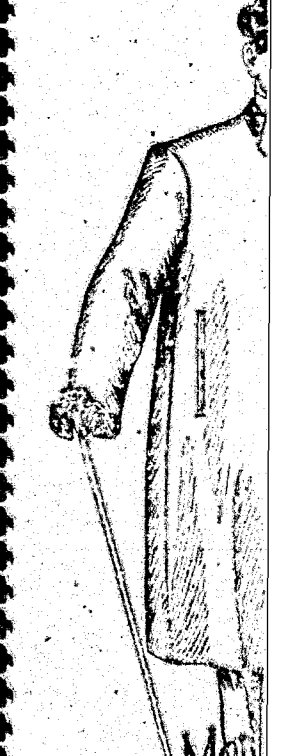
