The other five cases reversed were of the murder, Monday. on affidavits of whiskey sales to George Shingledecker for medical purposes without a prescription. The evidence showed that the witness had purchased for beverage purposes. As Prosecutor Johnson had drawn the affidavits he agreed to the action of Judge Kyle and the cases will be tried again on the charge of selling for a beverage.

The four cases of making sales for medicinal purposes without a perscription to Marion Buchanan, Roy Matthews and Robert Taylor were held good by the court as was the first charge of keeping a place.

Another case reversed was that of keeping a place against Mose Jones. who recently stole and slaughtered a hor on the D. S. Ervin farm, Judge Kyle held that the evidence did not show that the sale was made in Jones home to the detectives, Roy Lewis and Lester Barlow. The Judge held that even though Jones purchased liquor he acted only as agent for the detectives, the sale being made elsewhere. The Judge considered the case a "frame up" on the part of the detectives who wer employed by Prosecutor John-



The best plan we have heard proposed is to empower the county auditor to place all building and loan associations, trust companies, savings organizations and the like on the tax duplicate for a lump sum equal to the average amount of the daily deposit for the year. This would relieve the depositor from the trouble of returning his money to the assessor, and also save many from making a false statement as to their return. Another proposition that has merit and will return a different class of security for taxation is to require every unsecured personal note by mortgage to be stamped each year by the assessor before collection can be made. This too would enlarge the tax duplicate and infure no one. The statements of different financial institutions in every community in the state shows greater deposits than are returned for taxation.

We hear more or less criticism of the attitude of Gov. Cox on questions now up for consideration in the legislature. The Herald has no defense -to offer in behalf of the Governor in a political way. LESSON TEXT—Mark 18:1-11.
GOLDEN TEXT—"Now hath Christ been raised from the dead, the first fruits of them that are asleep." I Cor. 15-20. Some teachers may prefer the study of the lesson of Israel and Rebekah, Gen., 24, but because of its relative value and its relation to the day we celebrate we prefer to consider the Easter lesson. There are five main points in the

evidence St. Mark presents to show us that Jesus was the True Son of God. (1) the testimony of John the Baptiser, 1:2-8; (2) the baptism of Jesus, 1:9-11; (3) the transfiguration, 9:2.8; (4) the testimony of the centurian at his crucifizion, 15:39, and (5) the testimony of the resurrection of Jesus, 'Of the ten different appearances of our Lord. Mark records four, (a) to Mary, 16-9; (b) on the way to Emmaus, 16:12, 13; (c) in the upper room, 16:14, and (d) the ascension, 16:19,

Purchased Spices. Today we are to consider the first of these appearances. From a careful reading of this and the parallel accounts it is evident that as soon as the Sabbath day had closed and the shops were opened these friends of Jesus purchased spices that early the next morning they might annoint his dend body. Matthew 28:1 R. V. would indicate a possible earlier visit on Saturday, the Jewish Sabbath.

I. "In the morning of the first day of the week." vv. 1-3. Starting while it was yet dark (John 20:1) these faithful friends hurrled on their way to the tomb.. It was Mary Magdalene who first reached the tomb, Matt. 28:1, John 20:1, she who had received much (Luke 8:2) loved much. Nor was it the Virgin Mary that had the privilege of first beholding him (v. 9). It was the love of these women (v. 1) "which should have redeemed Israel" (Luke 24:21). That all the followers were shaken in faith the records clearly suggest, yet love remained, hence this desire to annoint his body. This service though unnecessary (Matt.

Serious Question Raised. Pursuing their way a very serious question was raised (v. 3), but God had already removed the difficulty (v. will enable us to overcome all difficulrebuke for all skeptics. If he be not

Had the friends pondered well the words of Christ they would not have wasted their time and money seeking to annoint a dead body. That was the reason why they did not know and that is why we do not know many things we ought to know about our Lord. It is noticeable that none of the men were at the tomb.

Entering the tomb they found, not his body, but a young man, and later two in dazzling apparel (Luke 23:4) stood beside them. When Mary returned from the city, having told the news, the two angels were sitting one at the head and one at the feet of where the body had lain. John notes that the disciples found the napkin which had bound his head lying folded in its original folds in a place by

itself (John 20:7). In the midst of all their perplexity as to what had become of the body of him whom they loved they failed to recall his words (Luke 9:22) and hence could offer no solution of the difficulty. But the God of mercy supplied their need (Phil. 4:19) and hence the glad triumphant message of the angel, "He is risen; he is not here; behold the place where they (enemies and friends) laid him," v. 6. Cf. Matt. 28:6. Then, as though to make their knowledge of service to others, he commands them to go and tell the disciples "and Peter" and that they are no more to look for him there for "He goeth before you into


Galilee," v. 7. II. "And they went out quickly," vv. 8-11. It is well to reverence holy places and to remember sacred associations, but God is a spirit and cannot be localized. Of course the women would like to dwell at that place in meditation, but having had revealed to them the fact, their duty was to publish it abroad. A definite knowledge imposes a definite oblica-


tion of testimony. Out of death came forth life. The seeming defeat of Jesus was the prelude to the world's greatest victory-its most astounding miracle. #### SPEED KING IS READY



That "Wild Bob" Burman, the Speed Sing, will participate in the third annual five-hundred-mile International Sweepstakes Race at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, May 30, is a matter of interest to all followers of auto closely identified with this sport for years and his reputation for speed and courage is second to none. A list of his brilliant victories would fill a large volume and he was crowned the speed King at Indianapolis May 30, which was held in New York in January, Burman went from the Pacific coast to New York City with the avowed purpose of selecting a mount for the five-hundred-mile race at Indianapolis. He settled on the Keeton car and soon entered into negotiations with that company. His proposition was accepted and Burman immediate y went to Detroit to supervise the construction of the car he elected to drive. Burman is confident that he will be among those present when the prize money is distributed, after the 500-mile race, May 30.

ORDERS HAVE NOW BEEN RE-CEIVED FROM EVERY STATE.

Foreign Organizations Anxious to Attend 500-Mile Race to Support Their Country's Cars.

Although it is over two months be ore the third annual 500-mile International Sweepstakes race will be staged at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, May 30, a large force of ticket sellers is now busy at the Speedway office in Indianapolis filing mall orders and sending out tickets to hose who are securing their reservations in advance. The sale was opened January 13, and from the very arst day the rush was unusually leavy, and never, since the Speedway aces became the hig sporting event of the country four years ago, has the advance sale been as heavy as it is at esept. It is a matter of record that State in the Union, and in addition to these, there have been numerous orders from Canada, Mexico, Cuba, Panama and various European countries. One of the first orders received came from a party of Englishmen, who expect to make a tour of America this summer and who will begin their trip by a visit to the indianapolis races. These men are interested in the Sunbeam car, which is considered the fastest of all English cars and which will participate in the race with Albert Gurot, the celebrated French driver at the wheel.

English societies in Chicago, Cleveland, New York, Pittsburg and San Francisco have also reserved large blocks of seats, and two of these societies have announced their inten-tion of coming to the race headed by military bands. One Canadian organization expects to come in a special train and will bring a band of Scottish pipers, dressed in the kilts of the Highland clans. The Alliance Francaise, one of the most prominent French societies of the country, which has branches in almost every city where there is a French colony, has made inquiries regarding seat reservations, and is anxious to be represented by members from as many chapters as possible. The interest of the Frenchmen has been proused since it became known that two Peugeots, the well known French cars, would be en-

tered in the contest. This will be the first time that the 500-mile race has been truly international in character, for although foreign cars have taken part in the previous races, they were entered by American owners and were driven by American drivers. Conditions have changed, however, and this year will see the foreign card entered by their manufacturers and with men at the wheels who have established reputations for themselves in the native

### OHIO TAXPAYERS WILL SUFFER

Green Compulsory Compensation Bill Under Fire.

#### TXPENSE IS NOT CONSIDERED

Instead of Putting Burden On Taxpayers, the Industry Should Stand Cost of Administering Incurance

Columbus, O .- (Special.) - Primarily the adequate compensation of the injured-employe, or the dependents of the killed employe, is a matter between the employer and the employe. Manifestly, and admittedly, the expense is a proper charge against production—the consumer should pay it. The compensation is, in effect, a contract—the employer, in consideration of the honest and continued service of the employe, agrees to compensate the employe for loss of employment caused by injuries sustained in the course of his service, or, his dependents, in the event his life is lost in the course of that service. The state is indirectly a party to this contract duty, of the state to see that the contract is faithfully carried out by both the employer and employe. Since this contract does not involve the expenditure of a penny on the part of either the employer or the employe, why should it cost the state money? And, yet, it is going to cost the state A MILLION DOLLARS A YEAR, for the Green bill, now pending in the general assembly, provides that the expense of safe-guarding and administering the provisions of this contract shall be paid out of the general revenue fund. Adroitly it is made to appear that the Ohio taxpayer has no interest in the Green bill-that it does not con-

Loading It On the Taxpayer. The taxpayer must foot the bill of nearly HALF A MILLION DOLLARS for direct premium to insure the public employes; i. e., policemen, firemen (where no pension fund exists), school teachers and all others in the public service, and in addition another ROUND MILLION DOLLARS annually to pay for running the machine.

Apparently the guardlans of this measure in the general assembly have succeeded in making the representatives of these TAX-PAYERS think that ONE MIL-LION DOLLARS is a mere trifle, since not a single legislator has, thus far, raised his valce in protest against it.

why should the taxpayer be saddled with a portion of the cost which should be paid by the consumer whose use of the product makes him a participant in and beneficiary of the toll necessary to its production. Compel the user and not the taxpayer to shoulder the load. The idea of compensation was born

of the minds of the workingmen. The idea survived and developed to a lusty majority because the workingmen claimed, and proxed that it was not a hardship on the employer; that, it wouldn't cost him a dollar; that the whole cost of it would be added to production and paid by the consumer; thate it would mean a laving for the GENERAL TAX-PAYER because it would reduce, by many thousands, the indigent victims of accidents whom the TAXPAYER has always had to house, and feed, and clothe. And all this is true, in theory, and should be made true, in FACT. Contemplate, for a moment. this Green compensation bill. Find in it, if you can, a sentence that will save a penny of the taxes now being paid for the maintenance of public, charitable and benevolent institutions. Instead of lightening the burden it proposes to ADD to the load ONE MILLION DOLLARS A YEAR.

But one excuse has ever been offered by anybody, anywhere, to justify dacing even a penny of the cost of he administration of a compensation fund on the general taxpayer, probably because it is THE ONLY POSSIBLE EXCUSE. The excuse is that compulsory compensation is HUMANI-TARIAN and for that reason society at large should help to bear part of the burden of it. That this excuse in ILLOGICAL is apparent. Consider the general taxpayer, the UNIT of SOCIETY! He is neither an EM-PLOYER nor an EMPLOYE. If he one or the other the CON-LUSION IS INEVITABLY THE BAME. Most of the accidents in infustrial establishments are due to the arelessness or negligence of the emtloyer, the employe, or of some tel-by employe. The MORE accidents the MORE the general taxpayer has to PUT UP—and yet the general taxpayer CANNOT DO A SINGLE THING to prevent carelessness or negligence on the part of employer, employe or fellow employe. He must STAND HELPLESSLY by while accidents are occuring that COULD and SHOULD be prevented, and for which he, he general taxpayer, must

help to pay. It appears that New Jersey, the mother of trusts is preparing to hand come much-needed discipling to her
