FIVE AFFIRMED; SIX REVERSED.

Judge Kyle on Monday affirmed five of the Isaac Wistormann cases sent up from Mayor Bull's court on error and reversed six. One of the six was for keeping a place as a result of the second raid when a barrel of whiskey had been unloaded by the drayman during the night. This case Prosecutor Johnson will appeal to the Court of Appeals.

The other five cases reversed were on affidavits of whiskey sales to George Shingledacker for medicinal purposes without a prescription. The evidence showed that the witness had purchased for beverage purposes. As Prosecutor Johnson had drawn the affidavits he agreed to the action of Judge Kyle and the cases will be tried again on the charge of selling for a beverage.

The four cases of making sales for medicinal purposes without a prescription to Marion Buchanan, Roy Matthews and Robert Taylor were held good by the court as was the first charge of keeping a place.

Another case reversed was that of keeping a place against Mose Jones, who recently stole and slaughtered a hog on the D. S. Ervin farm. Judge Kyle held that the evidence did not show that the sale was made in Jones home to the detectives; Roy Lewis and Lester Barlow. The Judge held that even though Jones purchased liquor he acted only as agent for the detectives, the sale being made elsewhere. The Judge considered the case a "frame up" on the part of the detectives who were employed by Prosecutor Johnson.

NOTICE TO USERS OF PUBLIC ROADS.

Section 4031 of the Revised Statutes of Ohio provides for penalties and fines for hauling burdens of more than 3000 pounds, including weight of vehicle, on tires less than three inches in width, and provides for weight to be fixed by County Commissioners for greater width of tires. The County Commissioners have therefore fixed, by resolutions, the following allowable weights:

Tires 3 to 4 inches in width, 3000 pounds.

Tires over 4 inches in width, 3900 pounds.

Including weight of vehicle in each case. The penalty prescribed in said Section provides for a fine in any sum from \$5 to \$50, and imprisonment until paid.

Superintendent Of Domestic Science.

Rev. W. W. Hill, of Brookline, Mass., writes an interesting letter concerning Miss Jessie Barber, formerly of this place, now Superintendent of Domestic Science in the high school at Brookton, Mass. "Miss Barber holds one of the most honored positions in the schools in this state. She has three assistants, having charge of all the buying besides supervision of the night classes and the afternoon classes for married women. Some idea of the magnitude of the work can be gained from the fact that each day 1,200 boys and girls of the high school are furnished lunch all of which must be completed in thirty minutes.

"Such a department is more or less common in Massachusetts schools but which is not so common in the fact that Miss Barber makes her department pay. One third of the towns in the state have sent delegations to Brookton to inspect Miss Barber's work and ascertain her methods. The papers have devoted much space to this work and Miss Barber is being sought for as a lecturer along the lines of her work.

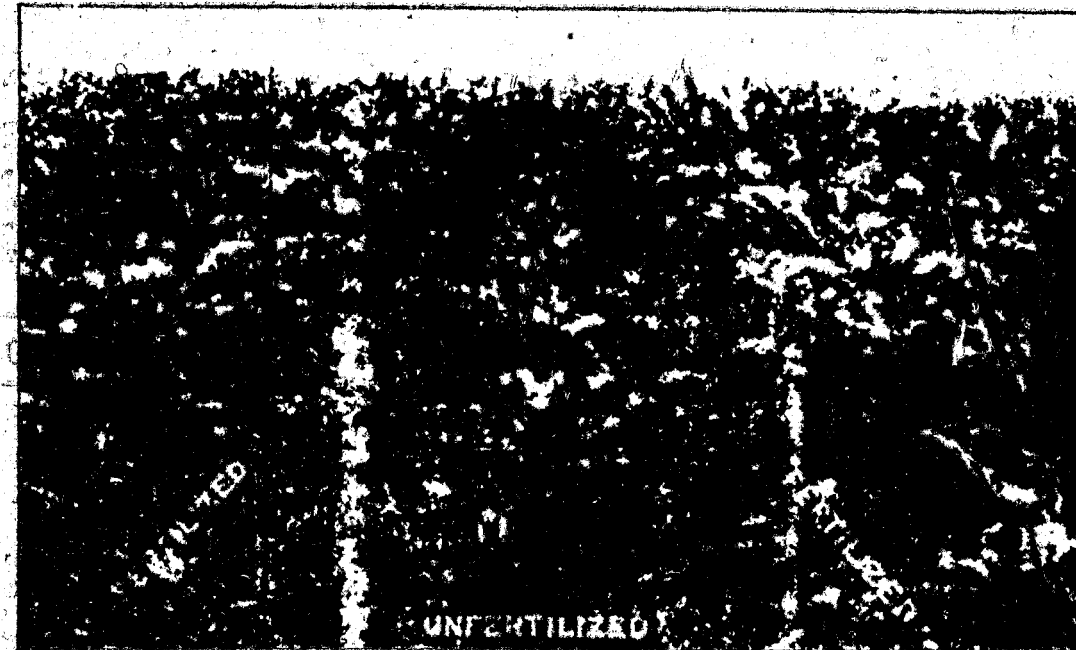

The proposed tax bills introduced by the tax commission should not be allowed to become a law in its present form. The first reason would expose private business to the curiosity of everyone, and second that it is socialistic. We see the urgent need of stringent legislation to bring our personal property to produce the necessary revenue under the one per cent law, but we doubt the result being acquired under the proposed tax law without subjecting bankers, manufacturers, and others to a test that will drive money and investments out of the state. The best plan we have heard proposed is to empower the county auditor to place all building and loan associations, trust companies, savings organizations and the like on the tax duplicate for a lump sum equal to the average amount of the daily deposits for the year. This would relieve the depositor from the trouble of returning his money to the assessor and also save many from making a false statement as to their return. Another proposition that has merit and will return a different class of security for taxation is to require every unsecured personal note by mortgage to be stamped each year by the assessor before collection can be made. This too would enlarge the tax duplicate and injure no one. The statements of different financial institutions in every community in the state shows greater deposits than are returned for taxation.

We hear more or less criticism of the attitude of Gov. Cox on questions now up for consideration in the legislature. The Herald has no defense to offer in behalf of the Governor in a political way. But we do say that so far all criticism is unjust. The Governor is charged with building a machine with the liquor interests on the license question. Who made the Governor's action possible? Was it not the constitutional convention? Was not the work of the convention endorsed by the people? Did not the Governor take the stump in behalf of amendments? Did he not pledge himself in his campaign that his best efforts would be made to enact legislation in accordance with the work of the convention? To date the Governor Cox is within the bounds of his party platform and what he promised the people in the constitutional convention. The dear public has no grounds for faultfinding with Mr. Cox. The time to stop some of the legislation that is being fostered now was in the defeat of constitutional amendments. Greens county did her share in turning down the amendments regardless of the fact that her rainbow chasing delegate stamp the state and advocated their adoption. Greens county did give a second-hand endorsement of this delegate's action in placing an exponent of such heresy in congress. As we live under a government of the majority we cannot complain because a few office holders were allowed to know what this majority would do, whether it was right or not, and gave it to them.

The politicians have already taken advantage of the minimum wage law and are working over-time in the hope of getting closer to the people. It is interesting to note the various views of social settlement workers, merchants, manufacturers, ministers and leaders of all reform organizations over this question. But of all the evidence produced little has been offered to show that the fallen woman would have lived a different life had her wages been increased. Occasionally we find such a person but the general run have admitted that their fall was due to the environment in early life. When a woman had decided to live a life of shame what inducement

would wages offer? Morality cannot be legislated into people nor can it be injected by the proposed minimum wage law. The statement of a Chicago amusement proprietor that the passage of a wage law for women such as is proposed in that state would increase his business and that of his follower about settles the question. Women are entitled to a living wage—just as with men but when it comes to making the minimum \$12 as is proposed in Illinois, then women will lose their positions and men will fill their places. The public must also bear in mind that double wages in department stores, factories, etc., means more expense in the manufacture, and marketing of goods that always has been and always will be paid by the consumer. At the present time the minimum wage agitation is due largely to politicians that have found a popular subject to occupy the public mind.

Death Of David Gregg.

Mr. David Gregg, aged 77, died at 4:15 this morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. G. Lowry. Short funeral services will be held Sabbath afternoon from the residence at 2 o'clock. The body will be taken to the home of his son, Will, in Xenia, and services will be conducted from the First U. P. church, Monday at 2:30 p. m. Burial at Woodlawn.

WITNESSED MEXICAN WAR.

The following gives some idea of the experiences of Mr. Ralph McMillan who is located in Mexico City and saw the result of the recent war. The letter is from Mrs. J. C. McMillan, Columbus, to her father, Mr. Alex. Turnbull. I thought you might be as anxious as we are about Ralph. We have been very uneasy about him, have had two telegrams, the last was last Thursday. But we got the first letter since the trouble began this a. m. He surely has been in some close places. I will try to tell you some of what he wrote. The second day after the battle began the soldiers came into the Y. M. C. A. where he was rooming at 2 o'clock in the morning and drove every body out. He had every thing stolen that he had except what he wore out. They put soldiers in the building and mounted guns on top of the building. All the Americans went from the Y. M. C. A. to the American Club House. The second day after he was there there were seven shells entered and burst in that building. Two American women were trying to get them some dinner when a shell came in and killed one of them instantly and out the other one legs both off and she died in a few hours. He said they could not get any help in nor the bodies out. There was about forty people in the building. They had a few others who were injured but were able to get out. They all left that night after dark then Ralph said he and another fellow went to a hotel where the fellow had two sisters out a little way.

He said the day they had the first battle he went to where they had been fighting, only six or seven blocks from the Y. M. C. A. and the houses looked like sieves and the ground and grass was covered with blood, one man leaning up against a door post with the blood spurting out against the door and running down over the sill, horses either walking or lying every where on the streets all shot to pieces. They hustled the people away and buried them. He said one day he and another fellow went to the American Embassy together, he stayed but the other fellow came back down street and when he got part of the way back the two parties opened fire for battle and the fellow ran for his life, and while trying to get away a man was shot and fell over against him another had half of his bowels shot off and just as this fellow ran into a door another had his hand and arm shot off and he dragged him inside and helped him. Ralph's room mate an American was wounded the first day of the fight and he said he had not heard from him since. He wrote the letter in such a hurry and sent it out by a private party that he did not give very much particulars. He did not say what he intended to do or whether he could do any thing but stay in for awhile. I do hope he will come back home. He seemed to think it kind of sport at first but when those women got killed and he had to stay in the house with them until after night came on I guess the funny part was all over as he has not had any appetite to eat since.

She talked the matter over with her husband and his mother and then with the proprietor of the store, and in the end, all the "modern" furniture was taken back and the same amount traded out for several beautiful rugs and the curtains for all the rooms on the first floor of the old house.

Then the bride went to work and fixed up all the "old fashioned" furniture which had been stored in the attic. A dining table was found, and four chairs to match. These she had scraped and sanded, then a filler applied, and lastly, a good quality varnish. This, when thoroughly dry was again rubbed down until the final finish was dull, and the effect was splendid. It suggested age, but good condition.

LONG IMBEDDED IN AMBER

Dragon Fly Preserved for Centuries, Is a Most Remarkable Natural Curiosity.

Flies in amber are not uncommon, but a dragon fly, almost perfect, is unique. The piece of amber with its large insect impossibly imprisoned was presented a few weeks ago to an English statesman by a rich Russian merchant.

This piece is remarkable for its size and the purity of its transparent yellow, but more especially for this insect it contains. This particular dragon fly flitted about over the marshes of what geologists call the tertiary period, tens or hundreds of thousands of years ago, and was engulfed by the resin that flowed from a pine tree. This resin, in the course of ages turned to the stone that we now call amber. Several thousand species of fossil insects have been found in amber but this is one of the finest ever seen.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(By E. O. SELLERS, Director of Evening Department, The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

LESSON FOR MARCH 23 THE EMPTY TOMB.

LESSON TEXT: Mark 16:1-8. GOLDEN TEXT: "Now hath Christ risen from the dead, the first fruits of them that are asleep." I Cor. 15:20.

Some teachers may prefer the study of the lesson of Isaiah and Rebekah, Gen., 24, but because of its relative value and its relation to the day we celebrate we prefer to consider the Easter lesson.

There are five main points in the evidence St. Mark presents to show us that Jesus was the True Son of God. (1) the testimony of John the Baptist, 1:2-8; (2) the baptism of Jesus, 1:9-11; (3) the transfiguration, 9:2-8; (4) the testimony of the centurion at his crucifixion, 15:39, and (5) the testimony of the resurrection of Jesus. Of these ten different appearances of our Lord, Mark records four, (a) to Mary, 16:9; (b) on the way to Emmaus, 16:12, 13; (c) in the upper room, 16:14, and (d) the ascension, 16:19.

Purchased Spices. Today we are to consider the first of these appearances. From a careful reading of this and the parallel accounts it is evident that as soon as the Sabbath day had closed and the shops were opened these friends of Jesus purchased spices that early the next morning they might anoint his dead body. Matthew 28:1 R. V. would indicate a possible earlier visit on Saturday, the Jewish Sabbath.

I. "In the morning of the first day of the week" (v. 1). Starting while it was yet dark (John 20:1) these faithful friends hurried on their way to the tomb. It was Mary Magdalene who first reached the tomb, 28:1. John 20:1 also who had received much (Luke 8:2) loved much. Nor was it the Virgin Mary that had the privilege of first beholding him (v. 9). It was the love of these women (v. 1) that brought them to the tomb of him, which should have redeemed Israel (Luke 24:21). The all the flowers were shaken in faith the records clearly suggest, yet love remained, hence this desire to anoint his body. This service though unnecessary (Matt. 16:21, 20:19) was, however, rewarded by the revelation of the angelic messengers.

Serious Question Raised.

Pursuing their way a very serious question was raised (v. 3), but God had already removed the difficulty (v. 4), so, too, if we will but be "looking up" (v. 4 R. V.), God will give us all necessary knowledge. (Jas. 1:5), and will enable us to overcome all difficulties. The empty tomb is the standing rebuke for all skeptics. If he be not risen let his enemies tell us where and what became of his body. The true basis of Christianity is in the risen Christ, see I Cor. 15:1-8.

Had the friends pondered well the words of Christ they would not have wasted their time and money seeking to anoint a dead body. That was the reason why they did not know and that is why we do not know many things we ought to know about our Lord. It is noticeable that none of the men were at the tomb.

Entering the tomb they found, not his body, but a young man, and Luke 23:4 stood beside them. When Mary returned from the city, having told the news, the two angels were sitting one at the head and one at the feet of where the body had lain. John notes that the disciples found a napkin which had been bound in place folded in its original folds in a place by itself (John 20:7).

In the midst of all their perplexity as to what had become of the body of him whom they loved they failed to recall his words (Luke 9:22) and hence could offer no solution of the difficulty. But the God of mercy supplied their need (Phil. 4:19) and hence the glad triumphant message of the angel, "He is risen; he is not here; behold the place where they (enemies and friends) laid him," v. 6. Cf. Matt. 28:6. Then, as though to make their knowledge of service to others, he commands them to go and tell the disciples "and Peter" and that they are no more to look for him there for "He goeth before you into Galilee," v. 7.

II. "And they went out quickly," v. 8. It is well to reverence his place and to remember sacred associations, but God is a spirit and cannot be localized. Of course the women would like to dwell at that place in meditation, but having had revealed to them the fact, their duty was to publish it abroad. A definite knowledge imposes a definite obligation of testimony.

Out of death came forth life. The seeming defeat of Jesus was the prelude to the world's greatest victory—its most astounding miracle. Living unto self means claiming your life for yourself. Living "unto him" means that in your mind your spirit, your body, your soul, your vision, victorious, triumphant life.

This Easter day is the day of all days to remember such words as these: Just as I am, young, strong and free, To be the best that I can be, For truth, and righteousness and thee, Lord of my life, I come, I come.

A list of his brilliant victories would fill a large volume and he was crowned the Speed King at Indianapolis May 29, 1911. During the automobile show which was held in New York in January, Burman went from the Pacific coast to New York City with the avowed purpose of selecting a mount for the five-hundred-mile race at Indianapolis. He settled on the Keeton car and soon entered into negotiations with that company. His proposition was accepted and Burman immediately went to Detroit to supervise the construction of the car he elected to drive. Burman is confident that he will be among the leaders when the prize money is distributed, after the 500-mile race, May 30.

SEAT SALE HEAVY

ORDERS HAVE NOW BEEN RECEIVED FROM EVERY STATE.

Foreign Organizations Anxious to Attend 500-Mile Race to Support Their Country's Cars.

Although it is over two months before the third annual 500-mile International Sweepstakes race will be staged at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, May 30, a large force of ticket sellers is now busy at the Speedway office in Indianapolis filling small orders and sending out tickets to those who are securing their reservations in advance. The sale was opened January 13, and from the very first day the rush was unusually heavy, and never, since the Speedway races became the big sporting event of the country four years ago, has the advance sale been as heavy as it is at present. It is a matter of record that orders have been received from every State in the Union, and in addition to these, there have been numerous orders from Canada, Mexico, Cuba, Panama and various European countries. One of the first orders received came from a party of Englishmen, who expect to make a tour of the country this summer and who will begin their trip by a visit to the Indianapolis races. These men are interested in the Studebaker car, which is considered the fastest of all English cars and which will participate in the race with Albert Guyot, the celebrated French driver at the wheel.

English societies in Chicago, Cleveland, New York, Pittsburgh and San Francisco have also reserved large blocks of seats, and two of these societies have announced their intention of coming to the race by way of military bands. One Canadian organization expects to come in a special train and will bring a band of Scottish pipers dressed in the kilts of the Highland clans. The Alliance Française, one of the most prominent French societies of the country, which has branches in almost every city where there is a French colony, has made inquiries regarding seat reservations, and is anxious to be represented by members from as many chapters as possible. OHIO TAXPAYERS WILL SUFFER

Green Compulsory Compensation Bill Under Fire.

EXPENSE IS NOT CONSIDERED

Instead of Putting Burden On Taxpayers, the Industry Should Stand Cost of Administrative Insurance System.

Columbus, O.—(Special).—Primarily the adequate compensation of the injured employee, or the dependents of the killed employee, is a matter between the employer and the employee. Manifestly, and admittedly, the expense is a proper charge against production—the consumer should pay it. The compensation is in the nature of a contract—the employer, in consideration of the honest and continued service of the employee, agrees to compensate the employee for loss of employment caused by injuries sustained in the course of his service, or his dependents, in the event his life is lost in the course of that service. The state is indirectly a party to this contract in that it is a proper function, and duty, of the state to see that the contract is faithfully carried out by both the employer and employee. Since this contract does not involve the expenditure of a penny on the part of either the employer or the employee, why should it cost the state money? And, yet, it is going to cost the state A MILLION DOLLARS A YEAR, for the Green bill, now pending in the general assembly, provides that the expense of safeguarding and administering the provisions of this contract shall be paid out of the general revenue fund. Admittedly it is made to appear that the Ohio taxpayer has no interest in the Green bill—that it does not concern him. What are the facts?

Loading it On the Taxpayer. The taxpayer must foot the bill of nearly HALF A MILLION DOLLARS for direct premium to insure the public employees, i. e., policemen, firemen (where no pension fund exists), school teachers and all others in the public service, and in addition another ROUND MILLION DOLLARS annually to pay for running the machine.

One million dollars may seem somewhat small to the TAX SPENDERS who will profit by the establishment of this state monopoly. Apparently the guardians of this measure in the general assembly have succeeded in making the representatives of these TAXPAYERS think that ONE MILLION DOLLARS is a mere trifle, since not a single legislator has, thus far, raised his voice in protest against it.

Compensation for work injuries is a good thing but in pushing it along why should the taxpayer be saddled with a portion of the cost which should be paid by the consumer whose use of the product makes him a participant in and beneficiary of the toll necessary to its production. Compel the user and not the taxpayer to shoulder the load. The idea of compensation was born of the minds of the workmen. The idea survived and developed to a lusty majority because the workmen claimed, and proved that it was not a hardship on the employer; that it wouldn't cost him a dollar; that the whole cost of it would be added to production and paid by the consumer; that it would mean a saving for the GENERAL TAXPAYER because it would reduce, by many thousands, the indigent victims of accidents whom the TAXPAYER would be obliged to support, feed and clothe. And all this is true, in theory, and should be made true, in FACT. Contemplate, for a moment, this Green compensation bill. Find in it, if you can, a sentence that will save a penny of the taxes now being levied for the maintenance of police, charitable and benevolent institutions. Instead of lightening the burden it proposes to ADD to the load ONE MILLION DOLLARS A YEAR.

But one excuse has ever been offered by anybody, anywhere, to justify placing even a penny of the cost of the administration of a compensation fund on the general taxpayer, probably because it is THE ONLY POSSIBLE EXCUSE. The excuse is that compulsory compensation is HUMANITARIAN and for that reason society at large should help to bear part of the burden of it. That this excuse is ILLOGICAL is apparent. Consider the general taxpayer, the UNIT OF SOCIETY! He is neither an EMPLOYER nor an EMPLOYEE. If he is one or the other the CONCLUSION IS INEVITABLY THE SAME. Most of the accidents in industrial establishments are due to the carelessness or negligence of the employer, the employee, or of some fellow employee. The MORE accidents the MORE the general taxpayer has to PUT UP—and yet the general taxpayer CANNOT DO A SINGLE THING to prevent carelessness or negligence on the part of employer, employee or fellow employee. He must STAND HELPLESSLY while accidents are occurring that COULD and SHOULD be prevented, and for which he, the general taxpayer, must help to pay.

It appears that New Jersey, the mother of trusts is preparing to hand some much-needed discipline to her children.—Indianapolis News.
