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Cleveland Police Report, December 11, 1954, Detective Pete Decker describes the questioning of Sam Sheppard on July 31, 1954 in the Cuyahoga County Jail

Shoppard Homicido---Interrogation of SAM SHEPPARD at County Jail.

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On July 31st, 1954, I reported for onty at 4:30 P.M. and with Detective Loncher was assigned to proceed to County Juil and their releive Detectives Schottke and Gareau, who were questioning Dr. Sem Sheppard. This assignment was given to us by Sergt. Herold Lockwood, the at that time told us that in the event that Dr. Sheppard refused to answer questions relative to the night of the murder that we were to try and make him as angry as possible at us, and that he would releive us and use a different a proach in his questioning of Dr. Shepperd.

When Detective Lonchar and I arrived at County Jail we signed in and went to the fourth floor where after a few minutes we met Detectives Gareau and Schottke. At that time Deputy Sheriff Resshaek and Sheriff Sweeney were on the fourth floor and they advised us that we would have to wait to talk to Dr. Sam until after be had esten his dinner. Resoback then informed up that after the prisoner had eaten we could use his faurth floor office to question the Caonor.

Unile Dr. Sem had gone to est, Detective Schottke and Detective Garoom briefed us as to the progress of their interrogation just finished. They told us that the defendant carried on a nice conversation about enything they night talk to him about except the night in question. They stated that any mention made about the night of July 3rd or the early morning of the 4th, that his usual acover was to the effect that "UPON THE ADVICE OF MY COURSEL I WAS TOLD HOT TO TALE ABOUT THAT". They went on to say that the closest that they could get him to the time of the murder, was that when he was asleep on the couch and was awakened by his wife calling.

With the thought in mind that we could possibly get him to talking about the time in question, we had various photographs relative to this homicide brought over to us at County Jail, while Sem was esting.

A short while later Sam Shoppard was brought to the office of Doputy Sheriff Rossback, on the fourth floor, we informed him that we were Cleveland Homicide Detectives, telling him our names, and that we wished to talk to him. We asked him to sit down; there were three chairs in the room and be requested to sit in the straight back chair, so that he could rest his head and the book of his neck against the wall. He was not wearing an orthopedic collar.

We storted questioning him about what he had caten and how he was being fod, and he told us, and further stated that he had taken a shower. be talked to him about a number of subjects removed from the murder, for quite time. This included a dicussion about his age, high school days, various leties, his college education, his days in L.A. During this time he began valking quite freely and began to ask us about court proceedures, and the manne. in which indistrects and arreignments were made, stating that this was all new to him, and he wondered what the next steps were.

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He asked us about the various degrees of homicide and the penalties in each of these degrees and and we explained the differences and the differences in the penalties.

We continued talking to him and advised him that he was in serious trouble and that it was up to him to help himselfif he was as innocent as he professed to be. We then a sked him to submit to a polygraph examination because if as long as he was innocent he would have nothing to fear or hide. He stated that his counsel had told him, that if he submitted to a Polygraph examination or to truth serum, that his counsel would drop the case.

We went on to say to him, that it was certainly unusual for an indocent person, in our experience, to be reluctant about taking any examination, that any one would offer, to prove his innocence, if he was that, we went on to say that in numerous homicide cases where the assailant is not immediately apprehended, members of the family are usually in constant contact with our office, asking about the case, the progress that hasbeen made, making suggestions, supplying information, and that it was might unusual, that in his particular case, where his wife was killed, that he had crawled into a protective shell, and had to this date, not offered any information, nor had he ever called to question our progress, we also told him that the actions of members of his family indicated that they did not want us to question him about this crime.

We went on to ask him what he would do in the event that the positions were reversed and he was a policemen and his enswer was that he was a doctor. We saked him why he had engaged attorneys as quickly as he had end he stated: " IF YOU WERE SICE YOU WOULD GO TO A DOCTOR AND ABIDE MY WHAT HE SAYS. SI AM ACCUSED OF THIS THING AND I WILL HAVE TO DEPEND ON MY COUNSEL."

We impressed on him that as far as we were concerned , that he didn't act like any imposent person but that of aguilty person by his refusal to cooperate completely, and by the actions of him and certain members of his femily. A At about by this time I arranged a series of photos which were taken at the scene, same depitting the front yard, the entrance, the back yard, the beach, the various inside rooms, the cot, the upstairs stairway, and various other photos, And through these photographs we got him talking about the night in question. We then a sked him who he thought might have committed this crime and he stated that he was of the opinion that his wife met her death by someone who knew her and possibly him too, and worshipped her from afar and held her in high esteem. That somehow, this person changed his mind about her, and had to kill her, because he was disappointed , or because of something he had learned about Marilyn, possibly the fact that she was pregnant, and that he had to kill her because he was disillusioned, He described this person as a schizophrenic paranoid, some one with a Jekyl and Hyde personality.

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Through the photos as mestioned previously, we led him to identifications of the front of the house, the beach, the stairway to the beach, the bouse inside rooms, the cot and the stairway leading upstairs. At this time he was telling us that he was ewaked by bearing his wife shout for him, and that he then ren upstairs. He stated that as he reached the landing on top of the stairs, and before he actually got into the room he VISUALIZED a form, beside his wifes bod, he went on to say that at that time he was CLOBBERED from behind he though went on to say that the next thing be know was when he came to be noticed what appeared to be a shiny object behick him on the floor, and he remambered that it was a badge he h ad on his billfold. We then went on to question him about whether there was more than one, and he stated that he was of the opinic that there was more than one person as the time, but wasn't sure. We asked his how he could have been hit from the rear if he was on the landing and he said everything was hary. Attempting to get him further we then showed him the photo of Herily Sheppard on the bed and he glameed at it messentarily and then aloned his eyes and refused to look at any further photos. HE WHIT OH TO SAY AT THAT THAT GH GROWERS FROM HIS COURSEL HE WAS HOT TO DISCUSS IT WITH US.

We attempted to question him further about why he should refuse to discuss it if he had nothing to feer and he SAID HE HAD CREEKS HOT TO TAIK ABOUT IT, when asked why he was so hery about descriptions and describing these individuals as forms, them, they, silouettes, it, he liked himself to a football player that senetime in a game received a head injury and yet acted normal and played a wonderful game, but that later when he came to could remember nothing about it.

I then realized that we would not got much further with him at this time and thought it better to change my tactics, and try to make him as angry as possible and set him up for Sergt, Lockwood, IN A VERY LOW VOICE in a sudden outburst I called Sam Sheppard a CGD-DAMMED-LIAR if there were any possible explanations for the missing "?" shirt, the missing weapon, the fact that he opparently had not been attached by the so called burglar with the some weapon as he was not cut, the fact that the burglar would certainly attack him more victously because of possible future identification, especially if he was the parenoid he suspected and possibly know, the fact that in the short time he took to get up the stairs after bearing his wife shout would not allow time for the number of blown the sustained, and the fact that after a burglar is found out he would not tarry around waiting for him to come to after apparently only striking him once to be caught, the fact that his cost was neatly folded on the bed, that then was no theft, the fact that if the thief renscoke the house first be would certainly have seen Son on the ock, and the fact the to by all means would not remasok the house in such a neet manner after be he been cought and had to fight his way out, he wast on to say that we know his family life was not the picture of harmony he was trying to lead us to beleive on to knew that his wife at one time had contacted a West Side private eye with a view of heving someone tailed, and that it must have been him, as she apparently know about Susan Hayos

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I told him that I realized why he did not core to discuss the night in quastion tion and that there was only one person in the world that could have killed Merilyo Shepperd and that it was him. He was visably shooked at this sudden outcomes, and I continued to abuse him by stating that in my estimation he was nothing but a spoiled, pampered, molly-coddled baby all his life, bidi behind his family apron strings, probably always had everything that he ever worked, and now that he was involved in this serious or ine he was still trying to hide behind his family and frience. The result of which due to his selfishness has not only ruined his own life but that of his family members as well, slong with Boy-Viow hospital. I told him that he was a discredit to the entire profession of enterpothy and that as for as him being a brein surgoon that with his neeger education in neuro-surgery, which is certainly a specialty, I wouldn't let him operate on my dog. I wont on to tell him that any burn on the streets could come up with a story of that type. I told him that from my part in this investigation there was no doubl in my my mind as to who had killed his wife. I told him that in my time on the police copartment he was one of the coldest blooded individuals that I had ever encountere discontinued talking to him and Dat. Loncher asked him a few more questions and hearing Sorgt. Lockwood in the hallway I left Deputy Rosebacks office.

Before we left sem Sheppard again asked our name and we told him. We both noted and remarked that he seemed very upset when we left.
