translated to 'Invite your crush' is an adaptation from Walid's 2015 novel of the same title, he shared his inspiration for directing it into a theatre performance, "I took the idea of having a crush and love within teenagers because my target is the new audiences of theatre in Sarawak."

He stresses that the young generations are going to be the future of theatre performances, and by using something that is close to them, it could encourage them to show further interest towards performing arts.

Using the technique site-specific theatre which is uncommon in Malaysia, Walid managed to capture his audience's attention with this witty performance of two different gender individuals to share on their experiences with having an unrequited love, or love that they do not have the chance to proclaim yet, better known as having a 'crush'.

The performances that was held on March 16 to 18 was at Borneo Laboratory - Creative Residence, Kuching due to its venue characteristics that reflects the performance which was dedicated especially for the millennials.

The story tells the tale of a man wanting to commit suicide by jumping from the KLCC Twin Towers due to being disappointed for the 100th time. During his attempt, he met a girl who shares the same intention as his, at the top of KLCC.

For his production as a Director this time, Walid shared that his challenge was in terms of practice as both him, and the student casts for the show were busy with their own commitments.
